"I thought we'd always be in the same place. We moved in January, 1994, and they really did a fantastic job decorating the interior for us. My office is beautiful."

A brand new building with her very own executive office does have its perks, but that's not really Charleen. The core of her business life centers around her "super great" customers as she calls them. "I've made many friends through the years, both customers and the people I've worked with. Everywhere you go, whether it's to church or the grocery store, people of this community greet you with a

Many times it's because they remember Charleen Barutha was there when they needed her. She calls on them at the hospital, at their home, or at a nursing home, ready to assist in helping customers with their financial needs, whatever situation arises.

"I think things like that are really important," she stresses. "Knowing they can count on you. Following the failure of the school referendum in early April, members of the Kewaskum School Board were asked to address the issue of future facility planning for the district. Their comments were printed in the April 24 and May 1 issue of the Statesman.

At those times, voters of the district were asked to send in their ideas and opinions. They have been trickling in, slowly but surely, and we are beginning to print those comments in this issue. Due to space constraints this week, more will be printed in next week's issue.

There is still time to submit your ideas on why the referendum failed and what to do to rectify the overcrowding issue at the schools. Comments will be published anonymously, however we do ask you to sign your "letter" with your name and telephone number. At your request, the name and phone number will be withheld from publication and only one person is aware of those names (and I'm not talking!)

Why was that referendum voted down? Why don't taxpayers ask more questions? Here's the questions I'd like answered.

- Do you really think our corn fields are worth ten thousand dollars an acre? -after a 30% "gentleman's/ concerned citizens" discount. Ninety-eight acres next to me sat on the market for five years at one thousand dollars an acre. I know of 68 acres of very developable land outside of West Bend that sold for about \$5,000/acre -- half the price of our proposed "discounted" land -- it was on the market for over two years.

- Do you really think the current owners of the property to be purchased have been paying \$14,000/year in taxes on seventy-some acres of corn field? (\$19.4/m of assessed value). If they haven't, the town has been getting ripped off. If we buy land wouldn't we want to reassess the value of the surrounding land to this new found "market" value?

- Do you really think I want to spend my money today to secure a proper facility for the future Milwaukee and Illinois refugees? There are 1200 sq. ft. houses going up on every available parcel of farm land that can get a variance. There are also large tracts of our farm land being converted to apartment dwellings -- with proper variances of course, that house people that don't pay any property taxes at all! -but their kids sure do go to our schools. My new ex-Milwaukee neighbors aren't

concerned about our schools
-- they are much better then
what they were used to.
Their concerns have been:
why doesn't Kewaskum
have more parks, how can
you raise a cow from a little
calf just to butcher and eat
it and how can you participate in a barbaric sport like
deer hunting and slaughter
those innocent Bambi's.

- Do you really think I want to spend my money today because of "predictions" about tomorrow? Governments, municipalities, village boards, school boards, etc. predict the future like modern day meteorologists predict the weather -- with about as much accountability!

RECOMMENDATIONS: Let's get our elected officials together -- specifically the Village Board and the School Board and brain storm a solution to our school over-crowding problem, which in reality, is really a problem of uncontrolled urban sprawl and disintegration of our rural heritage. We all know the quality of education is really tied to people -- teachers, professors, and educators, not land, buildings and facilities. When our industrial base migrated south for cheaper wages -- the South built beautiful schools and educational facilities, but their standards and quality of education are still not on par with ours. I would vote approval to spend money on canvasing the country for two of the best professors or doctors of education money can attract. I would also vote to approve pay raises for our current teachers to bring them to a level that encourages extra effort, and sends a message of appreciation for a job done above and beyond the call of duty. Now put all these people in a room to come up with real solutions to our problems -- over and above just throwing hard earned tax dollars at them. I think the quality of education will skyrocket.

Students should be prepared for their role as responsible, resourceful assets to society in a totally unbiased educational environment completely devoid of waste.

This simply means each penny spent on education must add unbiased value to the student's knowledge bank.

Classic areas of absolute waste are school bussing, burdensome administration costs, superfluous courses, and biased slant to class presentations.

A K-7 or K-8 school system is the most efficient transportation-wise. A junior and senior high school complex would minimize long distance bus runs.

1 c. stuffing mix (can use more)


1/4 c. melted butter 1 can cream of chicken soup 1/4 c. white cooking wine

Mid-Monthly Meeting April 21, 1997 8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Mid-Monthly Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.







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Lynn is Triple Winner

KHS Girls Win Vanderpan

The Kewaskum High School girls' track team won the Vanderpan Invitational Friday, May 9, at Sheboygan Falls by scoring 141.5 points compared to runnerup New Holstein's 114 points.

Again the double places in the distance events, hurdles, sprints, and throwing events led the KHS team to their second major win in the last two weeks. The first major outdoor win was the Washington County Outdoor Championships held on April 29.

Senior distance runner, Marni Lynn, competed in three individual events, the 1600m, 800, and 3200m runs for the first time this season, and won all three races.

Lynn's first win came in the 1600m run, where she got out front at the beginning and battled the strong gusting wind and the competition to finish first in 5:33.8. Teammate, sophomore Carol Neumann, finished second in 5:47.8 to give Kewaskum a 1-2 finish and 18 points.

In the 800m run, Lynn again led from start to finish and won in 2:33.3. Teammate Carol Neumann finished fourth in 2:34.8.

Initially Lynn was entered in the 3200m run with the idea she could scratch and switch to running a leg on the 1600m relay team if she wasn't up to running three events. After she won the 800m run, girls head coach Joe Kinney asked her if she was going to run the 3200m. Lynn replied, "If it will help us win, I will. I want us to win the meet."

Lynn's strategy in the 3200m was not to lead, but to stay behind the lead pack until about two laps to go. With the gun lap approaching, Lynn surged to the lead, then lengthened her lead and won by over seven seconds over Peterson of Plymouth. Lynn ran a season best time of 12:20.1.

At the conclusion of the meet, Lynn was voted the "Outstanding Female Athlete" of the meet and presented a trophy. "Marni receiving the outstanding female athlete award was the icing on the cake," commended a proud Coach Kinney.

"The team as a group



Katie Kopecky hit 3 for 3 with a powerful home run, Janz and Lev went 2 for 3. Olewinski and Becky Guelig added hits.


In their second game, against Sheboygan South, they played nose to nose with end result of 9-10.

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
