Gaffke Recommended for Music Clinic Scholarship

Two hundred-fifty of the more than 11,000 vocal and instrumental soloists who participated in the Wisconsin School Music Association State Solo and Ensemble Festivals held throughout the state were recognized for their superior performances April 26 and May 3, by being recommended to audition for a scholarship to attend a summer music clinic.

All 250 students received an attractive personalized certificate recognizing this achievement in musical excellence. Fourteen of these outstanding students will be offered scholarships.

Judges at the seven WSMA State Music Festivals could each recommend two students out of the 50-60 musicians who

performed for them. The State Music Festivals are held at UW-Eau Claire, UW-Stevens Point, UW-Green Bay, UW-Oshkosh, UW-Whitewater, UW-Milwaukee, and UW-Platteville. Two scholarships will be awarded at each state site; one provided by the host campus and one provided by Wisconsin School Music Association.

The Kewaskum School Board hired ALL new administrators a year ago, sending some of them to be licensed or certified, or whatever, and now they are not listening to them. The Administration has spent many hours on finding a way to handle our overcrowding in the Elementary Schools. The Administration and the Study Committee have come up with several plans that would work. It appears that the Board has NO TRUST in the people who have done extensive research on the issue. It also appears that only two members of the Board understood the situation our district is in now! I understand that the Board had only a few work sessions or discussions on the various plans.

I attend alot of School Meetings and it looks to me that most of the Board makes their decisions and vote according to their select friends and rarely take the whole District into consideration. They should not decide their vote by the few people that attend meetings or by the few phone calls they get. They are not speaking for the whole District. They should

be voting by facts presented by the Administration. A good example was the all-day kindergarten issue. The Board voted it down. Not that I am for all-day kindergarten, but our teachers and Administration know more about the benefits than any of us do. Do the parents know that they do not even have to send their child to kindergarten at all? It is not a law...

I think it is time our Board put their trust in the Administration they hired and start working with them. They've had months to learn to understand the situation. The outcome of the referendum told us the taxpayers are not ready to buy land so we have to make do with the facilities we have, be it adding or re-opening buildings.

Have you heard the projected enrollment for the year 2000?? KES - 425, FES - 356, WES - 164, Beechwood ES - 163. Note the enrollment at BES would be almost the same as Wayne, if opened! That projection is for K-6 schools. Where are they to go with all these children? Interesting, isn't it?

The closing of the Beechwood School was never put on a referendum and does

Sue Daggett Finishes Record Breaking Career

Sue Daggett has been named to this year's All-American Farm Sports Team, a team sponsored in part by Successful Farming magazine, for her illustrious college track career that includes being a six time conference champion in the 3,000 and 10,000 meter runs, two-time All-American in cross country at Illinois State University, and named Academic all-conference six times as well.

Daggett ended her senior year by winning the 1,500, 3,000, 5,000 and 10,000 meter runs at the Missouri Valley Conference meet, making her the first athlete in conference history to accomplish this feat and earning her the title of female athlete of the meet.

Now referred to by fans as "Sue-per Woman," her unprecedented MVC wins helped the Illinois State Redbirds grab the Women's team title with 140 points, with Daggett contributing 40 of those.

Earlier this year, she was named female athlete of the MVC indoor meet, taking home the 3,000 and 5,000 meter win.

Sue finished with 17 conference championships in cross country and track, including MVC records in the 10,000 (34 minutes, 13.7 seconds) and the 5,000 (16:29.74).

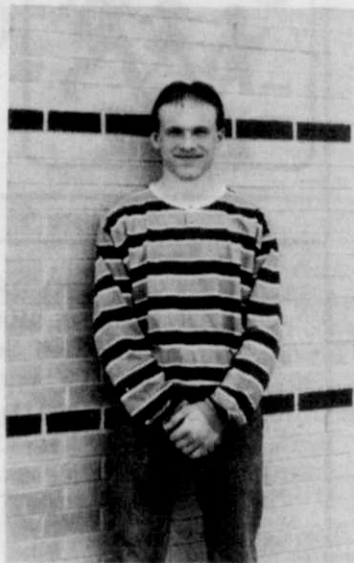

A School Divided... KMS Civil War Reenactment

Regiments dressed in blue and gray -- regiments with names like the 8th Virginia, the 71st Pennsylvania -- readied to march in formation, preparing for a battle at Kiwanis Park, a battle in which none was sure who would live and who would die.

Brave soldiers, most not older than middle school age, marched through the streets of Kewaskum for their date with destiny, the final confrontation of Pickett's Charge.

When it was all over, the Union had indeed prevailed, eight out of every ten Confederate troops had met their match, bodies lay silent across the meadow. Amidst fluttering regimental flags, trumpeters blew taps, commemorating fallen comrades. The battle had been fought, the challenge had been met.

The soldiers were Kewaskum Middle School eighth graders who participated as part of their annual reenactment of a Civil War battle at Kiwanis Park. KMS

classes had been incorporating Civil War studies into virtually all subject areas to prepare for the exciting and memorable event.

Early on the morning to the reenactment, students divided into their Union and Confederate regiments. Members of the 33rd Wisconsin (official adult reenactors) drilled the recruits with wooden guns, teaching the formations and the steps they would need during the day's culminating reenactment of the battle of Pickett's Charge.

Regiments then marched under sunny skies to the strains of "Dixie," and "When Johnny Comes Marching Home," (played by marching eighth grade band members), past flag-waving students at Kewaskum Elementary, to Kiwanis Park.

Once there, the student soldiers attended regimental meetings to learn about various other aspects of the Civil War, from civilian life to the military uniform. Their lunches, brought from

home, needed to be simple (as though from the 1860's) -- some homemade cornbread or biscuits -- and water was the only available beverage.

Before setting up for the confrontation, students randomly chose envelopes containing their fates in the upcoming battle. Messages such as, "You survive, but are haunted by memories of this day for years to come," or "You are shot and killed as you reload" accompanied armbands of white, red or black to identify, respectively, the survivors, the wounded and the dead.

Upon lining up for battle across the field, regiments took aim on one another: advancing, firing (the students yelling "bang," the adult reenactors firing blanks) and reloading. As the battle progressed, those slated to die fell upon the grass, the wounded lay requesting assistance. Finally, the overmatched Confederate army retreated, leaving dozens of gray-

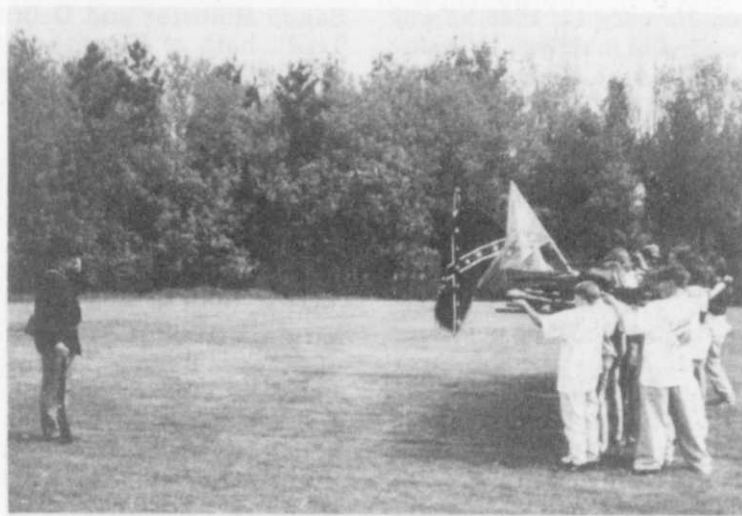
clad bodies in its wake.

Student soldiers and spectators then assembled to hear taps, Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, and a reading of the war dead from the Kewaskum area that actually fought and died in the Civil War.

Comments from KMS Principal Mr. Pearson and District Administrator Dr.

Johnson reinforced the powerful message of remembering those who had fought to preserve this country and its freedoms over the years.

As a result of the day's memorable activities, though, such a message is one that few of the KMS students or onlookers will ever forget.



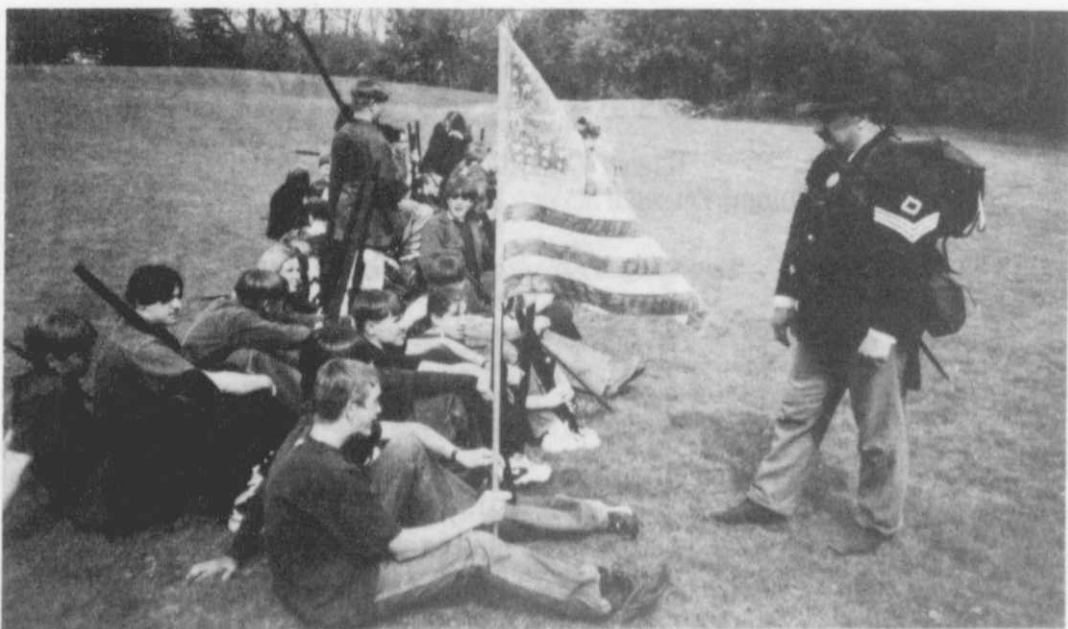
As part of their training, students in this Confederate regiment practice their shooting for the upcoming battle reenactment.

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KHS Girls Tie for Second at Sectionals

Wiesner, Nysse Qualify for State

Two days earlier at the Kewaskum Regional, the Kewaskum High School girls' track team had little difficulty with the competition while running and competing in front of the home crowd.

On Thursday, May 29, some members of the same team saw their dreams, hopes and goals come crashing down at the WIAA Sectional Track and Field meet held at Delavan-Darien High School in Delavan. Only the top two individuals in each event at sectionals qualify for the State Track and Field Meet at UW-La Crosse Friday and Saturday, June 6 and 7.

Whitewater won the sectional team title with 82 points. The Kewaskum girls tied for second with Mayville with 62 points. Even though the team did well, many of the girls were deeply disappointed not to advance to the state competition.

The highlights for the KHS girls' track team included junior Carrie Wiesner winning the 300m low hurdles in 48.6 and finishing second in the 100m high hurdles in 16.1. Thus Wiesner qualifies for the State Meet in two events. The 100m high hurdles was an extremely close race with Wiesner just edging out second place. In the 300m low hurdles, Wiesner came from behind and steadily picked up ground and won the race by only 0.1 seconds.

Jackie Michaels qualified for sectionals in the 300m hurdles, but did not make the trip to Delavan due to illness.

Rachel Nysse finished third in the shot put with a throw of 36' 4.5", but had to wait until Friday afternoon to find out that her throw was one of the eight best at all of the sectionals and thus qualified for state again this year. Last year, as a junior, Nysse placed at the State Meet. Teammate Katie Yogerst threw 31' 6.25" and did not make the finals in the shot put.

Katie Yogerst also had an off day in the discus and finished fourth with a 112' 10" throw. A performance of 116' 5" would have advanced her for a return trip to the State Meet.

Yogerst's 125' 4" throw on Tuesday would have placed her second at the sectional competition behind Stacy Sawhille of Delavan-Darien who threw 133' 5". Nysse finished fifth with a 111' 4" throw.

Katie Yogerst leaves Kewaskum High School as the school record holder in the discus with a mark of 128' 9". Yogerst set the record last year at the State Meet when she finished second.

Equally shocking to the Kewaskum team was Marnie Lynn not advancing

in the 1600m run or the 800m run. In the 1600m run, Lynn finished third in 5:26.5 when she had difficulty in the last lap bringing her race home in the manner she has displayed dozens of times.

Lynn's time missed qualifying her as an extra qualifier. Kinsey Eschenburg and Stacy Beste, both of Shorewood, went 1-2 in the event with times of 5:12.7 and 5:13.9. Carol Neumann finished fourth in 5:32.5 for Kewaskum. Lynn knew how good the two Shorewood runners were, but had planned to finish third with a time good enough to qualify for State. Lynn had planned on running a 5:20 or below which would have qualified, but it just didn't happen however.

"Marni had a great career! Not qualifying for state does not change that. She lowered the record for the 1600m run from 5:28 to 5:10 during her high school career and set numerous high school records. Marni is the best girls distance runner Kewaskum has ever had. It has been a pleasure coaching someone who worked so hard and was so coachable. She will be definitely missed," concluded her distance coach Jerry Gosa.

In the 800m run, Lynn finished fifth in a season's best time of 2:24.7 and Neumann finished in 2:30.6.

In the triple jump, Mackenzie Downs, who has been nursing a muscle pull the last few weeks in her leg, placed a disappointing sixth with a 31' 11" jump.

In the 100m high hurdles, senior Heather Downs finished fifth in a good time of 16.5, while JoAnne Thull was ninth in the preliminary and did not advance to the finals.

The 800m relay team of Mackenzie Downs, Ann Bodden, Carrie Wiesner and Jenny Jagielski finished fifth with a time of 1:53.5. 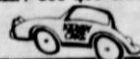

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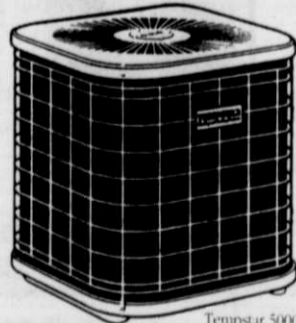

Regretfully, Julia and I have purchased the necessary materials and begun the initial layout work for the course based on two (2) conversations with former Auburn Town Chairman Harold Knolke in which Harry assured us without a doubt that our project did not require a building permit or special exceptions permit as long as the project did not include construction of any buildings. Our project does not include construction of any buildings and is landscape construction only. The course was designed and constructed by an industry leader, Coast of Wisconsin, Inc. of Rockfield, WI, and prides itself on building mini courses for small areas that complement its surroundings rather than detract from them. There will be no multi-colored giant animals or fantasy figures in our project. Our goal is to have mini-golf operational by the 4th of July weekend and is completely feasible with your prompt attention. Our fate is in your hands.

Chief Meetings w/depts. from Sheboygan County - 6 x a year

Safety Information sessions - Open Houses, Child Education, etc.

Check Air Packs - 12 x a year

Truck Maintenance (6 trucks) 2 hours per truck per month

Town Board meetings for Budget

Represent Town of Scott at area parades and picnics

Fire Commission Meetings
Eastern Wisconsin Firemen's Meetings

Chiefs Conventions - 1 x a year

Practice Evacuation Drills at Beechwood Nursing Home
Fire Inspections of local businesses.

The fire department gets budgeted money from the Town of Scott. They use this to cover their expenses such as truck fuel, heating fuel, electric, telephone, maintenance of equipment and buildings. Of the budgeted amount, over \$10,000 goes to pay for liability insurance and workmen's compensation.

The new tanker truck and building that houses the fire trucks and meeting room were paid for out of fundraising activities and involved no tax money. The firehouse along was over \$125,000.

Through the years, the Beechwood Fire Dept. Auxiliary has provided many items for the firemen. Among these items are: foaming educator to fight fires, bunker pants, firemen's boots, tables for meeting room, window treatments for the meeting room, Cascade oxygen system for filling air packs, Scott Air Packs, compressor, video camera to video fire scenes, 35mm camera for still photos at fires, Carbon Monoxide detector for checking gas levels in homes, pagers and hand held radios, VCR, TV and stand to view training videos and review tapes of actual fires, fitting for firetruck. We have provided the firemen with over \$25,000.00 through the years.

Funds for these items come from the picnic, bingo, games, ice cream/pie stand, and the Santa Brunch. We also organize the Easter Egg Hunt for the area children. We provide lunch for the firemen when they are called out to a fire for

an extended period of time.

Now that the firemen's picnic season is underway, we would appreciate it if you would support your local fire departments. They give so much of their time to ensure the fire safety for their communities and are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week if you need them. They never ask if it's convenient for them or their families -- they just go to do the job they're trained to do.

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Goeden Wins Three of Four Features; IRA Point Leader

With two feature wins on Memorial weekend, at Shawano and Beaver Dam and a "quick as a rabbit" pass for the lead, coming for the white flag lap of the Badgerland Triple Crown Feature on Saturday, May 31 at Beaver Dam, Don Goeden of Kewaskum has taken over the Interstate Racing Association (IRA) point lead.

Goeden is the new "hot-shoe" of the IRA. He posted the fastest qualifying lap and took fourth in the heat event to qualify for the feature. (One must finish in the top 5 in the heat to gain a position in the feature event).

There was a caution flag for minor incident and three red flags in the IRA feature event. On lap 2, #25 Al Schmidt of Kenosha and #1 Kim Mock tangled in the second turn, sending Al Schmidt into the wall, right in the path of #29 Terry Chesak of Newburg. Both flipped over, but neither driver were injured. (Terry had hit the wall in qualifying, but with his good and dedicated crew, they were able to get the

sprint car ready for the B-Main. Terry won that event and transferred to the A Main.)

On the restart, #5 Dale Peterson of Kenosha had the lead, with Kim Mock, Don Goeden and Joe Roe the 1996 IRA Champion, close behind. With the groove high on the track, Peterson found the wall and rolled over on the front straight away. Kim Mock (#1) inherited the lead with Goeden and Roe still in a row.

On Lap 19, the #5k sprint of Ken Ratchford hit the wall with Mock, Goeden and Roe holding the line. With five laps left it was a show down between Mock and Goeden. Mock jumped out to a good lead but in two laps he was in lapped traffic with Goeden following him. With a good run off the high groove in turn four, Goeden found that opening down the front straight away to pass Mock for the white flag.

On the last lap it was Goeden alone for the checkered. Giving Goeden his third feature in four nights of IRA

competition.

LL Fishing Club Receives Grant

The Long Lake Fishing Club has been awarded a Lake Management Protection Grant to fund a short term study of Long Lake's plant community.

Working in partnership with resource managers from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, the project will include a \$9,000 grant from the State of Wisconsin combined with approximately \$3,000 furnished by the Fishing Club. The Fox Lake Rehabilitation District will loan the project their buoys. The project is designed to be conducted throughout the 1997 recreational season.

The purpose of the grant is to help ensure good fishing, swimming, skiing and improve water clarity. Aquatic plants like water cabbage, coontail, wild celery, and bulrush provide cover, food, and nursery areas for northern pike, bluegills, perch, bass and wall-eye. These "weeds" as they are often called, also anchor lake sediments, compete with algae, and filter water. They are sensitive to many disturbances including silt, fertilizers, carp, shoreline development, water levels, and boating damage.

The goal is to protect the "weedbeds" from damage caused by unsuspecting boaters and fishermen who enter these areas not knowing the impact it has on these plant communities and the lake itself. This will help to keep the lake surface free of cut off and floating aquatic greenery and result in a clearer and cleaner lake. Protecting these native plants areas may also help prevent an invasion of Eurasian Water Millfoil, an extremely dominant nuisance

weed.

Aerial photos of the lake taken in 1995 show shallow areas along the east shore where normal patterns of plant growth appear to be disrupted, and in some cases nearly absent. These areas are generally within 300 feet of the shoreline and in water less than 5 feet deep.

The project will focus on the east shoreline of the lake from the southern end of Chinatown nearly to the State park fishing pier. Informational "no wake" buoys will be placed at the weedline edge which may vary out from shore between 300 and 400 feet. Inside these area there will be two small temporary "no motor" zones. Electric motors will be allowed in these areas. The entire remainder of the lake shoreline will continue to be "no wake" buoyed at 200 feet. Informational signage at access points and on the buoys themselves will advise the public of the project.

After buoy placement, periodic plant surveys, boat counts and updated aerial photos have been completed, a final report will be prepared to discuss and possibly recommend future plant protection actions. It is anticipated this project will help to improve lake clarity and protect the aquatic plants of Long Lake as well as to provide information for other lakes with similar problems. This is the first time a project of this extent will be conducted on a popular and heavily used lake in Wisconsin.

The warm weather has finally arrived and the area lakes will soon be filled with boats. What is the most common complaint heard while checking fishermen and boaters? Boats coming too close to other boats, rafts, piers and docks. Each year it appears to be more of a problem, which makes sense with the ever increasing number of boats on our lakes. There are laws which prohibit the operation of a motorboat above Slow-N-Wake (S-N-W) speed, in some situations. They include, when operating within 100 ft. of a raft, pier or dock. When pulling a water-skier, the boat pulling the skier can not travel within 100 ft. of an anchored fishing boat.

Personal Water Craft (PWC), can at no time, be operate above S-N-W speed, when within 100 ft. of any other boat, which would include other PWC's. Boat operators must also travel at S-N-W when operating within 100 ft. of swim area, marked

as such with Restricted Area Buoys.

The bottom line is, be courteous to other boaters while boating. Keep your distance while boating this summer. In doing so you will be obeying and law and also be a safe boater.

MADISON -- Outdoor enthusiasts will find it easy to stay busy the weekend of June 7 and 8 with outdoor events scheduled at nearly 50 locations around the state as part of Free Fishing Weekend, and National Trails Day on June 7 and Wisconsin State Parks, Forests and Trails Open House on June 8.

FREE FISHING WEEKEND

The entire weekend is designated as Free Fishing Weekend in Wisconsin.

People who are interested in learning how to fish or who have not fished recently can take advantage of Free Fishing Weekend to fish any Wisconsin inland waters without a license or state trout stamp. The waiver of fishing licenses and stamps applies to both residents and nonresidents. During the free fishing weekend all fishing regulations, such as size and bag limits are still in effect.

"This is an excellent opportunity for everyone to take part in one of the state's most popular outdoor pursuits," says Theresa Stabo, angler education coordinator for the Department of Natural Resources.

Wisconsin has more than 14,000 inland lakes and thousands of miles of streams and rivers, Stabo says, so no one has to travel too far in Wisconsin to go fishing.

The weekend also provides a good opportunity to introduce young people to fishing. Fishing clinics are scheduled throughout the state, many of them on Sunday in conjunction with the state parks open house, so people do not need to purchase a fishing license or park admission sticker to participate.

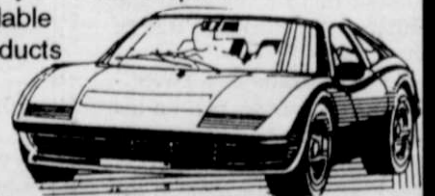

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Eleven Individuals, Two Relay Teams Advance to Sectionals

KHS Girls Win Track Regionals

Bodden finished fourth in the 100m dash but only the top three finishers qualify for the sectionals. Jagielski finished third in the 100m dash in the regionals, but during the sectionals, last year's runnerup at state in the 100m dash, did not advance to final competition. Jagielski also competed in the 200m dash in the regionals and came in seventh.



KHS junior Jill Wichtoski finished third in the long jump during regional play, but was eliminated from state competition during sectional action. Wichtoski also competed in the 1600m relay team which came in seventh in the regionals.

The Kewaskum High School girls' track team piled up a total of 169 points to win the WIAA Regional track meet at Kewaskum on Tuesday, May 27.

Runner-up Slinger finished second with 104 points at the eight-team competition. Sheboygan Falls finished third with 98, Kiel fourth with 78, Oostburg fifth with 68, Campbellsport sixth with 58, Grafton had 52 and Random Lake finished with 31 points.

The top three finishers in each event at the Kewaskum Regional qualified for sectional competition on Thursday, May 29, at Delavan-Darien High School.

The KHS hurdlers, throwers, and distance runners had another big meet for Kewaskum. The following individuals and relay teams qualified for sectionals.

Junior Carrie Wiesner was a double winner in both hurdle races. In the 100m hurdles, Wiesner led the KHS girls to a 1-2-3 sweep. Wiesner won in 16.44, while senior Heather Downs ran extremely well, finishing a close second in 16.48 and JoAnne Thull finished third in 17.14.

In the 300m low hurdles, Wiesner was out front all alone, finishing in 48.82 and teammate Jackie Michaels finished third in 52.25.

Both seniors Rachel Nysse and Katie Yogerst must have liked the home field advantage as both won their individual specialties. Rachel Nysse won the shot put with a personal best throw of 38' 1.75". Teammate Katie Yogerst gave the KHS team a 1-2 finish with a second place throw of 35' 1.5". Yogerst later won the discus with a season best throw of 125' 4". Nysse placed third with a season best throw of 114' 6".

In the 1600m run, senior distance star, Marni Lynn, won the event with a 5:27.1 clocking. Teammate
