# Fidelity Environmental Opens Regional Office in Kewaskum

Fidelity Environmental of Skokie, Illinois, has successfully located its second regional office at 1055 Fond du Lac Avenue in Kewaskum this past April, and division managers Mike Davis and Chuck Cunningham propose the new location will enhance the development of their firm throughout the eastern section of the state.

Fidelity Environmental, an asbestos and lead abatement contracting company offers full service environmental contracting with capabilities of working through the midwest. The ten-year-old Skokie firm opened a Madison office in 1994, and located in Kewaskum this year because of its convenient placement between Milwaukee and Fond du Lac, the two major cities where much of their work is performed.

The Wisconsin office employs between 40 and 80 skilled workers, who, along with supervisors, go through a state training program, as well as medical clearance to work in asbestos abatement. The field remains competitive and ongoing, with most of their work taking place during the summer months.

Cunningham points out that the company's clients are equally divided between commercial, industrial and educational facilities. "Since 1987, the federal government has mandated schools to manage their asbestos," he remarked.

Widespread use of asbestos took place during the time span between World War I and 1979, and was heralded as an ideal insula-

tor that could resist high temperatures. The natural mineral was mined for use as far back as ancient Egypt, where it was woven into tablecloths that withstood burning as a means of cleaning.

The extremely strong, tiny fibers are what causes asbestos to be such a dangerous health risk. "The fibers are so small, they can actually lodge between your cells," Cunningham maintains, adding that alternative insulators like fiberglass, mineral wool and calcium silicate base products have now replaced asbestos use in all industries.

Chuck Cunningham, his wife Cheryl, and three sons moved to Wisconsin from the Chicago area in 1991. He joined Fidelity Environmental in 1995 and his job as area director has led him to discover Kewaskum as a very "friendly, helpful and accessible community." He enjoys living in Wisconsin and presently resides in Cedarburg.

Mike Davis is the previous owner of Davis Abatement located in Fond du Lac. He brings to Fidelity 20 years of experience in the field of Asbestos Abating and Contracting. He commutes from Fond du Lac, where he lives with his wife Sarah and their two daughters.

Both Cunningham and Davis live a mutual distance from their new office, with a main warehouse headquartered in Fond du Lac.

Office manager Monica Lettow is a Kewaskum native, who previously worked for Mike when he owned his own business. She recently re-entered the work force after suffering from "empty-nest" syndrome. Her family includes her husband, Leo, two daughters, and one son.






# Memories

# A Stroll Down Main Street ...



Moving along on our weekly "Stroll Down Main Street" (traveling east on the south side of the street, nearly 50 years ago, we come to the Gerhard Reinders Funeral Home. The building at this time is vacant but housed the Village Bootery just a short time ago, until the retirement of owner Don Sedgwick. Prior to the time the building was occupied by the Reinders Funeral Home, it was used as a boarding house by a Mrs. Jakobitz who rented mostly to local teachers. Two of Kewaskum's dentists, Dr. Nolting and Dr. Klumbt, also resided there at one point in time. Twenty-five years ago, before the Village Bootery purchased the building, it was occupied by Mrs. Stachia (Casper) Swan who owned and operated Stachia's Variety and Gift Store for 18 years. Mrs. Swan sold her business to Mrs. Agatha Breit of West Bend who operated the store under the name of "Busy B's," and featured crafts, giftware and a general variety of merchandise. Jouce Schultz and her partner (name just doesn't come to mind at this writing) also ran a craft-type store in the location where they sold their creative and beautiful drape dolls." ADDENDUM: "Tiny" Terlinden did indeed confirm that Sylvester Harter's business, the "Kewaskum Locker Plant" (the name before it was changed to Kewaskum Frozen Foods) occupied the building where McLaughlin Meat Market was located after Phillip McLaughlin.

The Village Board would like to remind the residents of the Village of a topic covered in the Village's Municipal Code. The topic is covered in Chapter 10, Public Nuisances, we shall refer to this problem as a health hazard. The Village has undertaken several steps to improve the clearwater (storm water) discharge in the entire community, but yet people are not cooperating. We find that people cut their grass and catch it just to dump it in a designated clearwater collection point to help plug up and eventually cause water to backup during certain times of the year. The Village would ask that all residents keep their grass clippings and leaves away from the catch basins in the curb area. Also to refrain from dumping their grass clippings and leaves in ditched areas.

HINTS FOR **HOMEOWNERS** Don't Be All Wet After A Rain

Automobile engines, garden equipment, tools and sporting gear are often the first victims of heavy rains or flooding. According to relief experts, dirt and moisture can cause irreparable damage if immediate emergency action is not taken. The following is sound advice to resurrect and protect flooded equipment.

Stalled Automobile Engines: Steam clean or flush your engine to remove all dirt and debris. Spray WD-40 on the distributor, rotor, plug caps and all electrical wiring, including battery terminals and cables. Allow the WD-40 to dry, then start the car.

Electric motors (Lawn mowers, weed cutters, trimmers): Flush dirt and debris out with fresh water and then saturate armature and field windings with WD-40. Allow WD-40 to dry for several hours. If bearings are dirt-free, run motor for an hour at no load before returning to service.

Bicycles, golf clubs, garden tools, fishing gear: Flush as soon as possible with fresh water. Apply generous amounts of WD-40 on all moving parts and surface areas to remove all traces of moisture. Allow to dry.

Locks, rusty hinges: Flush both with generous amounts of WD-40 to remove corrosion. Locks that have been treated with graphite, silicone or teflon may be gummy. If so, flush out with additional amounts of WD-40. Allow time to dry.



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
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# Patient Rooms at St. Joseph's Hospital Undergoing a Facelift



# TOWN OF WAYNE ORDINANCE NO. 97-3

# ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A POLICE DEPARTMENT

THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN OF WAYNE, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. POLICE DEPARTMENT. (1) COMPOSITION. The Police Department shall consist of the Town Police Chief and such other policemen as the Town Board shall, from time to time, appoint.

(2) REGULATIONS. Members of the Department shall be governed by the rules, regulations and ordinances adopted by the Town Board and the Wisconsin statutes.

Section 2. TOWN POLICE CHIEF, POWERS AND DUTIES.

(1) SUPERVISION. The Police Chief shall see that all laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, resolutions and orders of every kind applicable within the Town set forth by the Wisconsin statutes and the Town Board are enforced.

(2) ARREST. The Police Chief shall cause to be arrested all persons who shall be found violating any ordinances or regulations of the Town and all persons chargeable with offenses punishable by the laws of the State and Shall bring such persons before the proper tribunal.

(3) RECORDS. The Police Chief shall keep an accurate and complete record of all complaints, arrests, traffic violations, convictions and the disposition of each case handled by him.

(4) REPORTS. The Police Chief shall, at the January, April, July and October Town Board meetings, submit to the Board a written report on all activities and transactions of the Department during the previous 3 months.

(5) TO ATTEND TOWN BOARD MEETINGS. The Police Chief shall, upon the request of the Town Chairman, attend all meetings of the Town Board and, under the direction of the Town Chairman, shall preserve order and decorum.

Section 3. POLICE POWERS. (1) TOWN POLICE CHIEF. The Town Police Chief and all Town police officers shall have such powers and shall perform such duties as are prescribed by State and Federal law, all ordinances of the Town and orders, rules and regulations lawfully prescribed by the Town Chairman or the Town Board. The Police Chief and each police officer shall possess the powers, enjoy the privileges and be subject to the liabilities conferred and imposed by law upon constables, and be taken as included in all writs and papers addressed to constables, shall arrest with or without process and with reasonable diligence take before the proper court every person in the Town engaged in any disturbance of the peace or violating any law of the State or ordinance of the Town. It shall be their duty to familiarize themselves with provisions of the ordinances and all rules and regulations relating to the police and given themselves accordingly. Any fees paid to the Police Chief or any other salaried police officer shall be paid over to the Town Treasurer.

Section 4. SEARCH AND SEIZURE. The police officers of the Town may search and seize with respect to violation of Town ordinances under the same restrictions and rules governing search and seizure with respect to offenses against State statutes.

Section 5. ARRESTS, PERSONS CALLED TO ASSIST. All persons in the Town, when called upon by any police officer, shall promptly aid and assist such officer in the execution of his duties. Failure or neglect to give such assistance shall be and constitute a violation of this section.

Section 6. INTERFERING WITH OR RESISTING POLICE OFFI-CER. Any person in the Town who shall willfully resist or in any way interfere with any police officer or member of the Police Department in the discharge of his duty or shall hinder or prevent him from discharging his duty as such officer or member, or shall offer or endeavor so to do, and whoever shall, in any manner, assist any person in custody, shall be subject to the penalty provided in this ordinance.

<u>Section 7. POLICE NOT TO GIVE BAIL.</u> The Police Chief or other police officers shall in no case give bail for any person under arrest.

Section 8. PENALTY PROVISIONS. (1) GENERAL PENALTY. Except as provided in sub. (2) below, any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction or such violation, be subject to a penalty, which shall be as follows:

(a) <u>First Offense. Penalty.</u> Any person who shall violate any provision of this Code subject to a penalty, except for parking violations, shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$200, together with the costs of prosecution and, in default of payment of such forfeiture and costs or prosecution, shall be imprisoned in the County Jail until said forfeiture and costs are paid, but not exceeding 90 days.

(b) Second Offense, Penalty. Any person found guilty of violating any ordinance or part of an ordinance of this code who shall previously have been convicted of a violation of the same ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$500.00 for each such offense, together with the costs of prosecution and, in default of payment of such forfeiture and costs, shall be imprisoned in the County Jail until said forfeiture and costs of prosecution are paid, but not to exceed 6 months.

(2) PENALTY FOR MINORS. In the event proceedings are commenced against children aged 16 or older, or children 14 years of age or older, the provisions of 48.17(2), 48.237, 47.37, 48.343 and 48.344, Wis. Statutes, as amended from time to time shall be applicable.

(3) CONTINUED VIOLATIONS. Each violation and each day a violation continues or occurs shall constitute a separate offense. Nothing in this Code shall preclude the Town from maintaining any appropriate action to prevent or remove a violation of any provision of this Code.

(4) EXECUTION AGAINST DEFENDANT S PROPERTY. Whenever any person fails to pay any forfeiture and costs of prosecution upon the order of the court for violation of any ordinance of the Town, the court may, in lieu of ordering imprisonment of the defendant, or after the defendant has been released from custody, issue an execution against the property of the defendant for said forfeiture and costs.

Section 9. This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law.

# Well Owners Cautioned **About Contaminated Water**

Floodwater, if it rises. over the top of a well, can easily contaminate drinking water and the Department of Natural Resources cautions well owners in flooded areas to use bottled water and have their well water tested.

Massive amounts of bacteria, viruses, parasites and chemicals from washed-out septic and holding tanks, fields and sewage overflows can be carried along with floodwater, according to DNR water supply specialist Sharon Schaver.

"If your well or your neighbor's well had floodwater rise over the top, your water should not be used for drinking or cooking until it has been tested for coliform bacteria," Schaver said. "Use bottled water for drinking and cooking and make certain that all dishes are completely dry after washing. Bathing with the well water is usually okay, but not recommended for infants.

Well owners can test for coliform bacteria with a kit available from the State Lab of Hygiene in Madison. The cost of the kit is \$15; after July 1, it will be \$16. To order, call toll-free, 1-800-442-4618.

If the water tests positive for coliform, it is unsafe. If floodwater has submerged the well or conduit, the well must be raised, repaired, disinfected with chlorine bleach and retested. A licensed well contractor can advise on repairs and perform the chlorination. Brochures on how to chlorinate a well are also avail-

able from local DNR offices.

Since 1936, Wisconsin laws have required that wells be properly located and designed to prevent flooding contamination. Wells constructed prior to this law are not exempt if the well is subject to flooding. Wells can be located in a floodplain only if the top of the well projects at least two feet above the 100-year flood stage elevation and no other practical location is available. Well caps are not a substitute for proper well height because they are not watertight.

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

As a member of the current Community Facility Study Group, I have been reading with great interest the letters your readers have written to you. I have been trying to gather some of the information that they have been requesting.

I have enclosed a chart showing the district schools with some basic information about each building. If at all possible, I would like to see it receive front page coverage as our school facilities are one of the hottest topics in the area at this time.

As a commentary to the information on the chart, capacities at the elementary level are based on approximately 20-22 students per classroom. That is in the recommended class sizes for that grade level. Also, KMS has the fastest growing enrollment in the district, faster than originally expected. Therefore,

while the KMS addition is not that old, it is rapidly reaching capacity.

The acreages that have been mentioned for the different types of schools to be constructed should be noted as suggested sizes by the state, not legal requirements.


Our committee has met three times and in different school buildings each time. Our primary focus at this time is to visit each elementary to see first hand what condition the buildings are in, to evaluate enrollment projections at the elementary level and to study whether Beechwood Elementary is a responsible, cost-effective and reasonable tool to alleviate elementary over-crowding in the district.


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
