A one car motor vehicle accident occurred Friday, August 22, around 6:31 p.m. on northbound US Highway 41, south of STH 28, in the Town of Wayne.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department, along with the Kohlsville First Responders, Kohlsville Fire Department, Kewaskum Rescue Squad and Jaws of Life and Flight for Life were dispatched to the scene of the accident where three young people were injured.

Scott C. Storma, of West

Allis, driving a 1996 Toyota Camry, was traveling northbound, behind his parent's vehicle, headed for a campground. According to the Sheriff's Department, Storma lost control of the vehicle, and entered the gravel shoulder on the east side of the roadway on the passenger side. The vehicle spun clockwise, left the east roadway, traveled down a 15 foot embankment and overturned, coming to rest on its roof.

One passenger, Mark Storma, was removed directly from the scene of the

accident by the Flight for Life helicopter to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee. The driver of the vehicle and another passenger, Christine Pulaski, also of West Allis, were taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend by the Kewaskum Rescue Squad. The driver was later transported to Milwaukee by Flight for Life.

No one was ejected from the vehicle and the passengers and driver were all said to have been wearing their seat belts. The driver was not cited.



# Kewaskum Loses Dedicated Educator

A wise man once said, "only the good die young," and that theory proved true this past weekend, as Tim Leader, fifth grade Farmington Elementary school teacher passed away on Friday, August 22.

In a letter to employees of the Kewaskum School District Elementary School Principal Kieth Kriewaldt stated Mr. Leader's family had informed the district that he had suffered a heart attack some time ago which went unnoticed. The family believes Leader suffered another heart attack on August 16, which again went unnoticed. Leader returned to work for three days, but was checked into the hospital on August 21. It was at that time the doctors identified the problem. According to Mr. Leader's daughter, "Tim was called to heaven at 7:15 p.m."

According to District Administrator Clark Pearson, Leader had served the district since September 1, 1965. He also taught at Kewaskum Middle School and was principal at Wayne Elementary School for 13 years prior to taking his position at Farmington.

"I have had the opportunity to know and work with Tim Leader for the past 25 years. Tim was an excellent teacher, he enjoyed working with kids and always had their best interests at heart. This is a definitely a huge loss to our school district. Mr. Leader will sorely be missed but always remembered as a dedicated educator," stated Pearson.

A crisis action team is

now in place for students of Mr. Leader. Kieth Kriewaldt, Jim Botting and guidance counselor Jodi Mundlinger will be available to talk to current and past students. The staff will also be available at Kewaskum Middle School.

If parents notice any unusual stress in their children because of the untimely death, they should contact their local school counselor.

Until a replacement is found, a substitute will take

over Leader's class.

Leader was recognized in 1990 and 1994 in Who's Who Among America's Teachers for instructors who made a difference in their student's lives.

One student, Keith Novotny, remembers, "Mr. Leader was one of my best teachers. I loved his stories he would tell in class."

One thing is for sure, we have lost a very dedicated man. Mr. Leader, though, will always be remembered, especially for the differences he made in the lives of his students.





# Dairyland Seed Research Team Releases Twelve New Soybeans

WEST BEND -- The Dairyland research team was proud to announce the introduction of 12 new DSR soybeans for the 1998 season. These new soybeans run a broad range of maturities and provide genetic diversity to the Dairyland lineup. Beyond diversity, they bring added performance, stability, yield capacity and, in some cases, herbicide tolerance to Dairyland customers. These 12 new products range from Group 0 through Group IV.

Dairyland's soybean breeding research team is headed by Dr. Paul Sun and includes Hunt Wiley, Bill Campbell, Gene Moore, Bob Campbell, Lorilea Reible and Ron Secrist. The research team introduced its new soybeans during its National Sales Meeting this past summer. The following provides information on these new DSR soybeans.

DSR-065: This Group 0 soybean matures a couple days later than DSR-068 and five days earlier than DSR-133. Entered in 1996 state trials as DST-0805, it took seventh with 65bu/a. in the South Dakota University trial at Frankfort. It is showing a 1.9 bushel per acre yield advantage over DSR-068. It features strong yields, very good iron chlorosis tolerance and the Rpslc gene for phytophthora root rot resistance. It is outyielding Dawson and Pioneer variety 9061 by over three bushels/acre.

DSR-158: This Group I soybean topped a number of their strip trials this past year when entered as DST-1220. In addition to high yield, DSR-158 features resistance to brown stem rot and has good tolerance to white mold. In research trials, it is showing a 2.7 bushel/acre yield advantage over Pioneer variety 9171. It also shows a 1.4 bushel/acre yield advantage over Northrup King S16-60.

DSR-180/STS: This late Group I STS herbicide tolerant soybean variety replaces DSR-190/STS due to its exceptional yields. It is showing a 1.2 bushel yield advantage over Asgrow A1900 and a three bushel yield advantage over Northrup King S19-90 in trials where STS herbicides were not being used. If Reliance or Synchrony herbicide were to have been used in these trials, it is anticipated that the yield advantage would be even greater. DSR-180/STS features very good emergence and excellent standability. There will be limited availability for

DSR-182/RR: DSR-182/RR is one of the earliest Roundup Ready soybean products in the industry. Dairyland has taken great precautions to be sure that the Roundup Ready products they introduce will have competitive performance. They believe this

Group I+ soybean provides just that. A medium plant type, DSR-182/RR features very good emergence and excellent standability. It also features very good iron chlorosis tolerance. DSR-182/RR will have limited availability in 1998.

DSR-215/RR: This early Group II matures three days earlier than DSR-220/STS and three days later than Northrup King S19-90. It is showing a slight yield advantage over S19-90 in Dairyland research trials. Although three days earlier than Pioneer variety 9273, its yields are comparable. DSR-215/RR features excellent standability, moderate resistance to brown stem rot, good phytophthora tolerance and very good iron chlorosis tolerance.

DSR-241/RR: This mid Group II matures one day later than Pioneer variety 9231 and is outyielding it in research trials. A medium plant type, DSR-241/RR features very good standability and very good tolerance to phytophthora root rot. Availability will be limited for 1998.

DSR-271/RR: One of the most exciting Roundup resistant soybeans, DSR-271/RR is the same maturity as Pioneer variety 9273, but is outyielding it by nearly two bushels in research trials. It is also the same maturity as DeKalb CX250b and also shows a two bushel yield advantage. In addition to excellent yields, this Group II+ soybean features very good iron chlorosis tolerance and phytophthora root rot tolerance. In addition to very good standability, DSR-271/RR also features moderate resistance to brown stem

DSR-293/RR: This late Group II matures about three days later than DSR-271/RR. It features very high yields with excellent standability and is moderately resistant to brown stem rot. In three years of research trials, it is two days later than Pioneer variety 9273 and shows a 1-1/2 bushel yield advantage. It also shows nearly a two bushel yield advantage over Pioneer variety 9304, maturing at the same time. This medium plant type has excellent yield potential.

DSR-351/RR: DSR-351/RR carries the Roundup Ready® gene and matures one day earlier than A3304 and has a two bu/a. yield advantage in research trials. One day earlier than DSR-317, it features moderate resistance to brown stem rot, good standability, and very good iron chlorosis resistance.

DSR-371/RR: DSR-371/RR matures one day later than DSR-317 and one day earler than DSR-370/STS. This Group III+soybean is showing moderate resistance to both race

three and race four of soybean cyst nematode. DSR-371/RR features very good standability. In three years of research trials, it matures the same as Pioneer variety 9392, has comparable yields, features moderate cyst resistance and Roundup resistance!

DSR-417/RR: A Group IV-soybean, DSR-417/RR is related to DSR-317 and carries the Roundup resistant trait. It matures four days later than DSR-317 and is showing a 1.3 bushel per acre yield advantage. It is three days earlier than Asgrow A4138 with comparable yields. It has a large plant type -- similar in stature to DSR-317. A very fine product that should be excellent on those type forest soils.

DSR-418: This early Group IV features very high yield potential. Although similar in stature to DSR-317, it is four to five days later with a 4-1/2 bushel yield advantage. It is one day later and four bushels better than both CX411 and A3935. It also shows a four bushel advantage over P9392 while being three days later. Good standability and great eye appeal compliment its yield.

# Hospital Therapists Certified In Acute Illness Massage

Certified massage therapists with St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend have received additional certification to perform and teach massage for people living with cancer and life-threatening illness.

Pamela Schall, Karen Hammen and Jamilee Schick earned certification in Bodywork for Life-Threatening Illness, Cancer and HIV/AIDS after completing a course of study taught by Cheryl Chapman, RN, NCTMB, an oncology nurse massage specialist who is a nationally certified massage therapist and educator.

Schall said the certification was important to the therapists because they work for a hospital and because many massage clients with chronic illness look to massage for relief.

"The number one benefit of massage for a person with an acute illness is pain relief and relaxation. It can be effective in reducing nausea for cancer patients who are in chemotherapy, and can speed the healing and recovery process for women

who have had a mastectomy," she said. "Overall, it can enhance a person's quality of life."

The therapists are certified not only to work on people with acute illness but also to instruct health care providers, such as a family member or nurse, in massage techniques to lower pain and stress. The therapists are also available to speak to community groups about the benefits of this type of massage.

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





Private family services were held on Monday, August 25, at the Twohig Funeral Home, Campbellsport. Rev. Robert Braun officiated. She was cremated.









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



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
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#### Village Board **Meeting Minutes**

Regular Meeting August 4, 1997 8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

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
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


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

# Sturgeon Management Plan Being Developed Statewide

OSHKOSH -- A comprehensive management plan for the sturgeon resources of Wisconsin aimed at ensuring the state remains one of the world's leaders in management of these prehistoric fish is currently under development by a group of more than 30 sturgeon experts and public sturgeon enthusiasts.

The group has been working since last January and is scheduled to finish its work by December, according to Karl Scheidegger of the DNR Bureau of Fisheries and Habitat Pro-

'Wisconsin is home to some of the best natural sturgeon populations in the world," Scheidegger said. "This is a result of decades of stringent regulations on harvest and ban on commercialization of the spe-

Because sturgeon are a long lived, late maturing fish, their population can be easily hurt by overharvest, habitat loss and commercialization, he said. Most other states and countries around the world have seen their sturgeon stocks decline or go extinct over the last 50 to 100 years.

"We are very proud of our sturgeon populations and management program here in Wisconsin," Scheidegger said, "but we have worked hard for decades to protect this fragile fish and retain the fisheries that we have.

The new Sturgeon Management Plan calls for careful monitoring of current sturgeon population and fisheries in Wisconsin, preservation and enhancement of critical habitat, continuation of the ban on commercialization of sturgeon, restoration of remnant populations, and continued public involvement. The plan also calls for continuation of the state's recreational fisheries, such as winter spearing on Lake Winnebago and the fall hook-and-line season on other inland waters, but that monitoring of these fisheries be increased to ensure that overharvest does not occur of this unique resource.

"Delegates from 20 countries in Europe, Asia and North America at a recent International Symposium on Sturgeon held in Italy in July found that the Wisconsin sturgeon populations are the best remaining naturally reproduced populations in the world," said Ron Bruch, DNR Lake Winnebago fisheries manager who represented the state at the conference. "Wisconsin's sturgeon management program has become the worldwide model for management of this group of

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# Anglers Asked to Donate Organs of Fish Caught Sturgeon Season Opens Sept. 6

POYNETTE -- The 1997 statewide hook and line sturgeon season will open on Saturday, September 6, and run through October 15.

There is a 50-inch minimum length limit and season bag limit of one fish. Anglers are also required to pick up a free registration tag prior to the season and register any fish they catch by the next day. Hook-andline fishing for sturgeon is prohibited on certain rivers and lakes in order to protect the species. Anglers should check the 1997-98 Guide to Wisconsin Hook-and-Line Fishing Regulations for a list of closed waters.

Department of Natural Resources fisheries managers are instituting a new program this year to help gain information on the sex ratio of fish caught and identify the species' feeding habits.

"We're asking anglers to allow registration stations to take the entrails of harvested fish," explains Tim Larson, DNR fisheries biologist at Poynette. "The entrails allow us to positively identify if the sturgeon is a male or female and they also provide us with additional information on what the fish was eating. This

information will help us better manage sturgeon in the future."

The angler catch rate on sturgeon in Lake Wisconsin world, remained low during the 1996 season, Larson

"This has been the case throughout the 1990s. Our population of younger fish, which contribute the most to the catch, remains low," Larson said. "Although we are seeing an increasing percentage of fish under 30 inches in the catch, which is encouraging."

Larson said the population of larger fish remains good, due to excellent reproduction during the early 1980s. Harvest, especially below the Prairie du Sac dam, has increased the last few years, accounting for 41 of the 60 fish harvested in 1996. The exceptional harvest there is due to the high amount of fishing pressure, whereas it has dropped threefold on the lake.

Anglers interested in hook-and-line fishing for sturgeon must first obtain a free angler tag from DNR service centers and other license outlets near waters that are open to hook-and-line sturgeon fishing. Even anglers who are not required to possess a license

must have a sturgeon tag. Duplicate tags may only be obtained at a DNR office.

A legal sturgeon selected for harvest is required to be registered at one of the identified registration stations by 6 p.m. the day after it is caught. Conservation warden Steve Schlimgen of Poynette, cautions that possession of an illegal or untagged sturgeon is a crime and may result in a fine of \$3,000, a mandatory three year revocation of all DNR licenses and possibly up to 90 days in jail.

It is also illegal to catch a sturgeon for someone else to tag or possess the tag of another person. Anyone who know of illegal or untagged sturgeon being taken may call the DNR poaching tip hotline at 1-800-TIP-WDNR (1-800-847-9367) or contact a local conservation warden or sheriff's department. All information will be kept confidential.

Lake sturgeon can live for 50 or more years. In 1953, an 81-year-old sturgeon was caught in Lake Winnebago. The state record, taken in 1979 from Yellow Lake in Burnett County, weighed in at 170 pounds, 10 ounces.

## First Time Hunters Safety Course Grads May Shoot Either Sex Deer

Good news for Hunters Safety Course graduates. On August 21, 1997, the

Governor signed Bill AB 79.

This bill allows for the harvest of a deer of either sex by first time Hunters Safety Course graduates. Students who took the course in 1997 will be allowed to use their Hunters Safety Certificate as their Hunters Choice for the 1997 deer gun season.

The following conditions must also be met. First, the date of issuance of the Safety Certificate must be in the calendar year 1997. Second, there must be Hunters Choice Permits issued for the deer management unit the hunter is hunting in.

Some of the units in northern Wisconsin have no permits available. And, finally, it is for first time Hunter Safety Course grads only. In other words, a parent who may have taken the course for a second time with his or her child is not eligible.

When registering the deer a safety course grad need only show his or her Hunters Safety Certificate at the registration station and the deer will be registered.

One important point is that this deer can not be harvested under the Group Bagging Law. The Safety Course graduate has to be the hunter that shoots the deer.

This rule change will be an incentive for older hunters to take the Hunters Safety Course along with a good opportunity for younger hunters to harvest their first deer.

that were on it last year have improved greatly."


