Monday Meetings Temporarily Moved to Tuesdays

School Board Approves **Administrative Salaries**

The Kewaskum School Board voted 6-1 to move their regular monthly board meetings to Tuesday evenings at 6 p.m., beginning in October, and running through January, 1998.

Board member Mary Andera requested the change, stating there were town and other local organization's meetings on the same evening, and this would give board members a chance to attend.

Board President Jean Goeden was against the proposal, and told board members this was a policy change, which required recommendation from a separate committee. Board member Tom Timblin, who also serves as varsity high school basketball coach, said the schedule change would conflict with his coaching responsibilities, and he would be unable to attend some of the board meetings if the switch was made.

Larry Fechter backed the change, claiming he had other obligations to fulfill on Monday evenings for his employment, and this would

free him up to attend those meetings. Andera added that this had been done last year without any policy revision.

Goeden was the lone voter against the proposal.

Administrative salaries for the 1997-98 school year were approved by the Kewaskum School Board at Monday night's meeting.

The Superintendent's position, left vacant by the sudden resignation of Dr. Charles Johnson, has been increased by \$3,116 to \$85,116, reflecting a solid 3.8% increase. Temporarily filling the position is Interim Superintendent Clark Pearson, who left his role as Kewaskum Middle School Principal to serve as district Superintendent until a suitable replacement can be found. Pearson is being paid \$300 per day for the 97-98 school year.

The district business manager/curriculum coordinator George Allmann has been increased \$2,394 or 3.8%, for a total salary of \$65,394. High school principal Larry Wilson - \$65,405, up \$1,905 or 3%; Assistant high school principal John Wolfenberg - \$54,590, up \$1,590 or 3%; Interim middle school principal Ken Soerens will receive \$57,000 for the 1997-98 school year.

The vacant position of permanent middle school principal went up 4% or #2,460 to \$63,960. Other administrative compensation for this year includes Director of Elementary Education, Kieth Kriewaldt, increased to \$63,586, up \$2,386 or 3.9%.

Per a request from Heidi Olsson, Director of Pupil Services, the contract has been reduced by 40% to a 60% position, for a salary reduction of \$24,400. The adjusted wage is \$32,600.

The above figures reflect a salary decrease under last year of 2.4%.

Buildings and Grounds Superintendent Chad Kyle -\$47,600, up \$1,610 or 3.5%; Food Service Supervisor Kathy Robinson - \$24,200, up \$961 or 4.1%; administrative bookkeeper Deb Schubert - \$35,500, up \$1,392 or 4% and Administrative assistant Jeanne Jacak - \$35,500. The salary increases on these four positions reflect an increase over last year of 4.16%.

Village Issues Addressed by Board

Members of the Kewaskum Village Board handled assorted agenda items at their Monday, August 18th meeting.

Under reports by Department Heads, Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles stated he had been in contact with Wisconsin Electric concerning the contract for them taking over the wiring of the Main Street-Fond du Lac Avenue street lights project. Gilles reported the work was scheduled to begin in late August (which it did), providing contacts had been made with a few property owners.

Village Administrator Daniel Schmidt reviewed the building permits for the month of July, stating nine single family residence permits and two duplex permits had been issued.

Committee reports were given with Trustee Warren Dums updating board mem-

ation meeting held prior to the regular Village Board meeting.

Dums reviewed the plans for construction of a storage shed facility at Kiwanis Park. He stated the horseshoe league committee had been contacted and they agreed, to do repairs on the existing facility instead, and would look into the issue of a new building again a few years down the road.

Trustee Dums added discussion was held for budget purposes on the baseball diamonds in Kiwanis Park, including a fence on the west (right field) side and taller permanent bleachers. Work by the league on the concession stand was also discussed. It was decided to get clarification in writing from the baseball league regarding what exactly they were proposing to do.

Discussion was held on the T-ball and softball games overlapping whereby

bers on the park and recre-softball teams were knock ing balls on the T-ball playing area. Trustee Gary Gavin specified, "It's set up that T-ball is supposed to be done before the softball starts with a 15 minute window in there. We made that clear when we told them (softball) they could use it.'

Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herriges, who has children playing in T-ball, was asked the times T-ball games are scheduled Herriges stated, "T-ball plays at 6 and 7 p.m." Gavin added the schedules were supposed to be altered to 5:30 and 6:30 p.m. with softball games scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m.

The problem therein occurred when neither leagues adjusted their schedules. Due to the conclusion of the seasons, it was decided to address the issue and resolve it for next

Kewaskum Frozen Foods Sausage Raises \$900

Governor Auctions Winning Meat Products for 4-H Benefit

Guest auctioneer Governor Tommy G. Thompson worked the crowd of bidders at the 1997 Governor's Sweepstakes Meat Products Auction, an annual benefit for the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation. The Governor brought in a winning bid of \$5,200 for the Grand Champion Ham, bought by Harold Bitney, owner of Mini Pick, Milwaukee, and processed by Bloomington Custom Processing, Bloomington. Proceeds from the auction totaled over \$28,650, benefiting statewide 4-H programs and over 150,000 4-H youth.

The auction featured the winning entries from the 1997 Wisconsin State Fair Meat Products Show, including ham, bacon, summer sausage, cured and smoked beef, and meat snack sticks.

In addition, meat processors donated specialty items, such as a 25 pound summer sausage in the shape of Wisconsin, a five

foot summer sausage, and a specialty meat package. Also auctioned off were two domestic coach tickets courtesy of United Airlines and four Wisconsin Badger football tickets courtesy of the Wisconsin Agricultural and Life Sciences Alumni Association.

The evening's highest total bids belonged to Sentry Super Saver, Waukesha, who bought three items for a total of \$5,900 including the Grand Champion Bacon (Haen Meat Packing, Kaukauna), the Grand Champion Summer Sausage (Bloomington Custom Processing, Bloomington), and the Grand Champion Snack Sticks (Lake Geneva Country Meats, Lake Geneva).

Hartmann Sand and Gravel, Fredonia, contributed \$2,750 for the Reserve Grand Champion Bacon (The Butcher Shop, Fennimore), the Champion Cured and Smoked Beef (Pat's Country Market, Arcadia), and the 25 pound summer sausage (Kewaskum Frozen Foods, Kewaskum).







Turkey Statistics Continue to Impress Hunters, Biologists

By Bill Vander Zouwen Chief, DNR Wildlife and Landscape Ecology

Turkey hunters set another harvest record during the spring hunting season in Wisconsin this year, reflecting the continued growth of the state's wild turkey population and increasing popularity of turkey hunting. Hunters registered over 20,800 turkeys this past spring compared to 18,000 in 1996. More than 100,000 hunters applied for the 92,340 permits.

With a good turkey pop-


ulation base and projected average reproduction this year, fall hunters should also find many turkeys to pursue. The fall turkey permit application deadline was August 10. A total of 32,200 permits are available. Last year, 57,000 hunters applied for fall permits

Considering that the number of applicants will probably increase this year, many hunters can expect to be unsuccessful in the drawing, but will have preference for the 1998 fall turkey hunt. Hunters may want to obtain a hunting

permit leaflet that shows the zones that are open and the number of permits in each before applying. Not all spring zones are open in the fall.

Past experience has shown that the month-long fall hunt has not significantly changed either hunter success rates or interference rates among hunters. The change from three one-week hunting periods has allowed for similar numbers of permits and more flexibility for hunters.

Hunters are reminded that the spring turkey application deadline is December 10. For the first time, over 100,000 permits will be available next



The West Bend Knights of Columbus have about 525 members whose purpose is to witness Catholic faith values through community projects, scholarship efforts and donations to various local and state causes.


