

Susie Robin of the Milwaukee Art Museum will present the program and states, "This will be a peaceful time, whether you are good at art or not, the end result is wonderful." Susie added, "As a self developed artist of 10 years, I oppose traditional weaving forms of structure and space. After studying many art forms, I chose weaving as the most expressive and peaceful." She feels the unique mediums utilized in these weavings incorporate the spirit of nature. Fur, feathers, wool and silk with the support of tree limbs and roots, create pieces that are as individual as each of us are. Gathering these earthy treasures begins the creative process. Robins, with an impressive professional background, has taught this workshop at the Milwaukee Art Museum, the Milwaukee Public Schools and also with the Very Special Arts. She reiterated, "I'm quite sure this art form will calm all involved and bring a sense of appreciation to weaving." The program will be ongoing from 12 to 4 p.m. and everyone is invited to participate and bring something pertaining to Kewaskum to add to this "weaving."







An annual count of animals rahabilitated are a low of 400 to a high count of over 750. Stop at the Children's Tent and see one of the shows on Saturday.



pieces of fabric, bones, paper snowmen, a walking stick... are pulled along on wheels wherever she goes to talk with children about "this wonderful journey we're all on."



The Marketing and Education Department at the Zoological Society has said of Chris' work: "We're proud







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Vaccinations Scheduled at Meadow Creek Oct. 10 **Prepare for Flu and** Pneumonia Season

Adults, especially those age 65 and over, are strongy encouraged to receive influenza (flu) and pneumonia vaccines.

According to the Healthy Washington County 2001 Committee, influenza and pneumococcal disease together are the sixth leading cause of death for older adults, but can easily be prevented by safe, effective vaccines.

The Washington County **Community Health Nursing** Service is holding vaccination clinics: October 10 from 1 to 2 p.m. at Meadow Creek in Kewaskum; October 14 from 1 to 2:30 p.m. at the Germantown Senior Center; October 17 from 1 to 2:30 p.m. at Hartford City Hall; October 24 from 9 to 11 a.m. at the West Bend Public Agency Center; October 24 from 1:30 to 2:30

p.m. at St. Peter's Church Hall, Slinger; and November 5 from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. at the West Bend Public Agency Center.

The cost for the flu shot is \$7 and the cost for the pneumonia shot is \$10. Both vaccines are covered by Medicare.

Because the influenza virus changes from year to year, it is important to get vaccinated against influenza on a yearly basis. The pneumonia vaccine usually lasts most people a lifetime, but anyone who received the pneumonia vaccine before age 65 should check with his or her physician to see if a booster is needed.

Plan Now for Retirement

It's never too late to start planning for retirement. It's true that the earlier you start, the better, but experts agree that a late plan is better than no plan at all.

While your options may not be as great if you're over 50, you do have some options. The important thing is that you recognize what they are and factor them into a plan of action. You need to understand, for example, that, statistically speaking, you need to plan on living longer than your parents and grandparents did. And people over age 85 represent the largest growing segment of the population.

If you are within 10 years of retirement, here are some Social Security considerations:

Find out what you've got coming from Social Security. You should call 1-800-772-1213 to get a copy of a "Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement." That's a report on the earnings you have credited to your Social Security account, and the retirement, survivors, or disability benefits payable on those earnings.

Remember, benefits decrease if you retire early. Although many people retire early, this may not be your best option. You can retire as early as age 62, but benefits are decreased for each month before age 65 you are receiving benefits, up to a maximum of 20 percent.

Note that benefits increase if you delay retirement. If you're in good health and don't mind working, you should know that Social Security benefits increase for each month after full retirement age (65 in 1997) you delay retirement. In 1997, the "delayed retirement credit" is five percent, but it's scheduled to go up to eight percent by the year 2008.

Know how other retirement income may affect your Social Security benefits. Most types of retirement income will not affect your Social Security benefits. This means you can have income from savings and investments and other pensions over and above your Social Security benefits. In general, earnings are the most common income that would reduce benefits \$1 for every \$2.

The earnings limits do not apply to beneficiaries age 70 and older.

Social Security is a good starting point even for late



HELPING COMMUNITIES FIGHT CRIME

Racine Chief of Police Richard Polzin looks at his city today and likes what he sees. Crime rates for the last two years have dropped to their lowest levels since 1980, in part because Racine has been able to free up police officers to spend more time on the streets

"There's been a tremendous turnaround in some of our neighborhoods," Chief Polzin says, and, as an example, he points to one area of the city that had suffered from an infestation of drug-related criminal activity and now is being cleaned up.

The Racine police department, like more than 200 law enforcement agencies all around Wisconsin, has been able to put more police officers on the beat with the help of the Community Oriented Policing Services program, or COPS. COPS is a federal grants program created in 1994 to help local law enforcement agencies get the people, the training and the technical assistance they needed to fight crime more effectively. The COPS program provides federal grants to local communities to help them hire more police, re-deploy officers onto the street and to set up programs to combat specific problems like gangs and domestic violence.

There is an additional benefit to having more police on the streets, Chief Polzin says, and that is improved police-community relations, which in turn helps create better cooperation as people feel a sense of progress being made towards safer neighborhoods. Results of a 1996 survey, Chief Polzin says, showed city residents considered police officers valued community leaders.

The COPS program recognizes that, although modern law enforcement has many resources at its disposal, the fight against crime still relies, first and foremost, on the police officer. The program also recognizes that, while a police officer's main job is the investigation of crimes and the apprehension of criminals, that officer's presence on the beat also can be an effective deterrent to crime.

The COPS program also keeps the decision-making in the hands of local officials, who know best the kinds of specific law enforcement problems they face and which solutions will work best in their communities. To do that, the COPS program centers on the concept of community policing, that is, fighting crime on the street level and bringing law enforcement and other local resources together in that effort.

Under the COPS program, the federal government supports the local law enforcement agencies and helps with their particular needs, but it does not take over their efforts.

That is an appropriate role for the federal government, to help local law enforcement get the people and the tools to be more effective in the fight against crime and make the rest of us more secure.





Turnovers Contribute to Indian Loss

In the three previous games the Indians lost, they have turned the ball over at least five times in each game, but in their two wins they have turned the ball over only twice.

Coach Perry Koth knew going into their game with Manitowoc Roncalli Jets that turnovers would be a key if the Indians were to have a chance at beating the strong Roncalli team. Unfortunately the Indians turned the ball over four times in a 26-6 loss last Friday night.

The Jets used team speed, along with a balanced attack, to build a 26-0 halftime lead which the Indians could not challenge. Roncalli had 220 yards total offense in the first half as the Indian defense was no match for their quickness.

Roncalli scored first on a 24 yard touchdown pass from the Jets fine quarterback Greg Stelzer (8-17-179-4 TD's) to running back Eric Nellis who rushed for 81 yards, caught four passes for 60 yards, and scored three touchdowns.

We really had a lot of trouble tackling Nellis tonight," said Koth. "He probably broke 15 tackles tonight ... in fact, I think he broke five tackles on one play.

The Indians came back with a drive of its own but after a couple of first downs the drive was stopped when Tim Vetter fumbled and the Jets recovered.

In the second quarter, it was Nellis again catching an 18 yard pass as he eluded four tacklers on his way into the end zone. With three minutes remaining in the second quarter, the Jets struck again on another Nellis pass interception of six yards to make the score 20-0 just before the half.

The Indians came out throwing in an attempt to get back into the game but

a Josh Gaffke pass was intercepted and returned 27 yards to the Indians six yard line. It was the first of three interceptions thrown by the Indians.

Stelzer then hooked up with Beau Sanders for a six yard score making it 26-0 at the half. While the defense was having trouble tackling in the first half, the offense was struggling to move the ball against the swarming Jet defense.

'Our execution was terrible in the first half. We left everything we did in practice on the practice field tonight," said Koth. He added, "We didn't finish blocks, we ran to the wrong places, and our effort by some players was minimal."

The second half saw the defense play better and the offense had to turn to the air as they threw (18) second half passes for 140 yards. Ryan Rammer and Jim Kopecky were the main targets of Gaffke as Kopecky caught five passes for 51 yards and Rammer had four for 61. The Indians lone score came on a three yard run by Kopecky aided by Rammer's 30 yard pass reception that kept the scoring drive alive.

Statistically, the Indians were once again on the short end as they were outgained 402 to 264 yards. Despite the three interceptions, Gaffke was able to complete 14 of 25 passes for 161 yards. On the ground it was Vetter once again leading the Indians with 58 yards on 18 carries, while Rammer and Kopecky led the receivers with five catches each for 81 and 51 yards respectively. Vetter and Kopecky ran

real hard tonight and Rammer made some great catches," said Koth, about what he was pleased with. "I was also pleased with the pass protection our offensive line gave Gaffke tonight ... for the most part our quarterback had plenty of time to locate his receivers. The defense also picked it up in the second half shutting them out," added Koth. The Indians travel to Two Rivers (0-4, 0-6) this Saturday for a 1 p.m. afternoon game. It's Two Rivers homecoming so the Raiders will have plenty of incentive for this game. "I'm sure they are looking at this game as maybe the

only game they think they will have a realistic chance of winning this season," said Koth. "We need to be ready or we will have a tough time up there.
