Johnson Bus Honors Employees For Safe Driving Records

During National School Bus Safety Week, October 19th through the 25th, Johnson Bus took the opportunity to recognize their employees who have achieved a safe driving record and whose efforts greatly enhance the bus company's reputation for safe student transportation.

In addition to a new Safe Driver Recognition Program which has been implemented this year, they have also created a "Safety Is No Accident" Driver Hall of Fame. It recognizes an outstanding roster of Johnson Bus drivers who have achieved a record of safe driving for the past 10 years or more.

The "unveiling" was held at the Johnson Bus West Bend corporate offices on Tuesday, October 21. The Kewaskum school bus drivers who were entered into 1997's Hall and the number of years of safe driving they have achieved are: John Schmidt - 20 years (!!), Joe

Sekeres - 15 years, and Irene Gnacinski - 11 years.

Other Kewaskum drivers who have achieved at least five years of safe driving includes Stan Heisler, eight years; Ronald Knoeck, seven years; Diane Clark, seven years; Terry Diels, six years; Lisa Boylen, six years; Charles Kleinke, five years; Howard Fischer, five years, and Dorie Krahn, five years

Within the past month there have been two tragic school bus accidents in eastern Wisconsin involving motorists not stopping for the red flashing lights and stop arm of a school bus. One resulted in the terrible death of a six year old boy who was struck by a car that failed to stop as he was crossing the road after leaving his school bus. The other accident involved a young 26 year old man who was killed when his car struck the rear of a school bus that was stopped to drop off students at their

Johnson Bus drivers report that each year there seems to be more and more motorists who ignore the red flashing lights and stop arm of the school bus. Whether it is a lack of knowledge or perhaps more people in a hurry to get where they're going is unknown.

The public needs to know that, by law, ALL motorists are required to stop for the school bus when it is stopped with its red flashing lights operating and stop arm extended. This means that children are boarding or exiting the bus. School bus drivers have the authority to report those who fail to do so and penalties can be quite severe, with fines up to \$360 and four points. But more importantly, another needless tragedy could be avoid-

Board Begins Tedious Chore of Budget Work

Village President Robert Wagner opened last Monday evening's board meeting with an apology to the Kewaskum Athletic Club baseball team for comments made at a recent Village Board meeting as reported in the West Bend News.

Wagner stated he had communicated with Ron Theusch and Doug Gonring of the Athletic Club and he had hoped they had come to an understanding and some good had come out of the

conversations.

He added, "I must say, I was a little disappointed with the West Bend News that they didn't probably report the whole complete story and elaborate on the tree program. Sometimes what you put in the paper can change the whole nature of an article. I sometimes think that it's a way to spur controversy, and it does help sell newspapers because we know that's human nature, we all like to hear the dirt.

Wagner then went on to elaborate on the neglect of the news media in reporting the village's land use plan. He added, "We put four years in on this and I felt that it was a very important process and it affects everybody in this community and also Washington County, and I think that all newspapers are important and are here to service the community and I felt that that would have been a very important service. A good comprehensive article on the land use plan would have served everybody in the community very well.'

The board then moved to review the preliminary budget information for 1998 for the Library Board. Trustee John Kenworthy, representative to the Library Board, opened comments, stating, "I guess the big thing that is sort of a variation off the norm, is we're asking that Shellie (library director Shellie Anderson) become full time. I know one of the things we talked about on the library board is we want to really professionalize our library and to do that I think we need to have somebody there full time."

The board then reviewed the basic breakdown of the library budget, with the total expenditures coming in at a proposed \$107,300. 00 for 1998 as opposed to

\$100,500.00 in 1997. Reviewing revenues, Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated "If you look at the total increase, obviously that's roughly a \$6,800 or 6.8% increase.

No action will be taken on the library budget until the public hearing and before that time the board will decide on adjustments, if any, need to be made to the library budget.

Kenworthy added if the director's position was increased to full-time, we would be able to keep the library open an additional day each week.

Anderson stated, "Basically we'd cut out a couple hours in the morning where we don't really get very many people. We usually get most of our walk-ins after school. So we'd be open on Tuesday, as well.

President Wagner asked if the proposed budget reflected the director going to full-time to which he received an affirmative answer.

Department Heads then gave their reports beginning with Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herriges, who also brought the board up-todate on repairs to the pumper.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel followed with his report, adding the Packer cards "went over real well and gave us good contact with the kids. We would like to again thank St. Francis Bank for sponsoring them."

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles reviewed his department's use of traffic paint.

Administrator Schmidt shared with the board a letter from the Department of Transportation regarding construction on Highway 45, (County Trunk Hwy. D to County Trunk Hwy. H), stating construction was scheduled for the year 2003. Schmidt added the construction was originally scheduled for the year 2000 and said he felt it would be advisable to draft a letter to our legislators stating the village was not too happy with this postponement.

During the committee reports, under Protection and Public Safety, the proposed placement of a stop sign at the intersection of Highland Avenue and Stark Street was discussed. The

Emergency School Closings Announced

The District Superintendent, Clark Pearson, has released for publication the 1997-98 policy for school closings.

As in the past, radio stations WBKV (1470 Am and 92.5 FM West Bend), KFIZ (107 FM and 1450 AM Fond du Lac), WHBL (1330 AM and 97.7 FM Sheboygan), and WTMJ (620 AM Milwaukee) will be used to announce school closings. News stations will only announce a closing. If they do not announce Kewaskum, it means our schools will be open. The announcement will be on the air as early as possible.

When school has opened but weather turns bad, it is recommended that parents listen to one of the above radio sta-


tions for a possible school closing announcement. The district is extremely hesitant about closing school during the day. Every effort will be made to announce school closings during the day at least an hour before we dismiss the students.

It should be remembered that if school has been cancelled it means that all activities for that day and evenings are cancelled as well. Also, parochial school students and special education students will not be transported when district schools close. If school is delayed by two hours, morning kindergarten and First Steps programs will automatically be cancelled.





Chapels Blend Past With Future



The little log chapel is a replica of the first St. John's United Church of Christ.

The Faith Haven non-profit Corp. is in the midst of constructing two interesting chapels for public use just east of County trunk WW in the town of Wayne. They are located at the west end of the former H. Engeleiter farm Hog's Back or Kettle Moraine Esker.

The one chapel made of old logs is a replica of the first little sanctuary St. John's United

Church of Christ folk erected in 1860. They shared its usage with the Roman Catholic and Lutheran Christians of the area until such time that they erected their own church buildings.

The other chapel also being constructed now is a Futuristic sanctuary open to anyone wishing to meditate, pray or just relax in its modest sacred beauty. Built to welcome in the out-of-doors glory of the



Faith Haven's Futuristic chapel has an unusual flying roof, with a deck overlooking the beautiful Kettle Moraine.

Lord's creation, two 6000 pound laminated beams purchased in the state of Oregon support the unusual "flying roof"...enhanced by a sculpture consisting of three twenty food tall twelve inch pipes portraying the Holy Trinity and tied together with a graceful plastic evergreen ribbon pipe

The east end of the chapel has a wooden deck overlooking acres of formal and forested carriage-art trails and lovely meadows including a natural wetland area and Wisconsin prairie.

To the south of the two chapels a pristine wetland consisting of fifty eight acres is a natural rookery for white egrets and blue herons to nest.

A three bridge trail provides marvelous spring and fall opportunities to view millions of native wild flowers. In fact, for four days a year between twelve to fifteen thousand Fawn Lilies grace the area with their golden and pure white fragile blossoms. A sight to behold!

Last year the Faith Haven board of directors opened a Drive Thru Sculpture Garden along W.W. for the public to drive thru and a little artist shop open Wednesdays and Saturdays from 2 to 4p.m. and/or by appointment where original works of art can be purchased.

Available to the public are horsedrawn hay rides; carriage rides plus motorized vehicle rides across the lovely carriage-art trails. The corporation also has a fine Carriage House filled with vehicles of days gone by and available to tour by registration.

4 Tbsp. butter





The Board reviewed the Park & Recreation related preliminary budget figures for 1998. There was no big discussion regarding the general maintenance accounts. The capital outlay account however brought considerable discussion. The budget included a lot of items discussed by the committee as well as items requested by other groups. By consensus, the 10 row bleacher for the SW diamond was taken out and replaced with a five row bleacher. The \$10,000 for water type equipment was left in the budget, hopefully to start with a water type fountain for the children. The \$3,000 for a new pier was not added. The Urban Forestry Grant was discussed in detail with \$6,000 being proposed for the budget and \$3,000 hopefully being reimbursed by the DNR grant program. It was noted in excess of \$4,000 would need to be spent for a consultant or intern to prepare a management plan and inventory. This would leave an estimated \$1,600 left for the purchase of trees. The Board indicated they needed more information on management plans, etc. and directed the Administrator to only budget \$3,000 to be used for purchasing trees this year and to possibly apply for the grant next year.

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
