## District Facilities Planning Committee Reports Evaluations to School Board

The seven members of the Kewaskum school board nodded in agreement as they listened to the Facilities Planning Committee discuss the many frustrations and roadblocks they had encountered while trying to come up with some concrete plans for the future of the school district.

We had difficulty with the very same issues, Board President Jean Goeden told the group as they gathered in the high school library on November 4 to review the committee's findings after six months of research.

Working from a task list received from the board last April, the committee worked independently, emphasizing, "they were not spoon fed anything" from reams of data that included enrollment information, land use, traffic flow, previous facilities studies, surveys, model assessments with the architect, bus routes, and SEWR-PC reports.

The process has been slow and time consuming, stated member Scott Waranius, "and we've gotten a far better idea of why the board could not and did not come to a consensus on a

feasibility plan."

Chairperson Amy Pamperin said that the group decided they needed to reevaluate some of the information they received, and modify the original architect plans that called for doubling school sizes to accommodate a 4% growth rate. "The enrollment projections and building needs were too high, so we went back and told the architects to do it a little smaller," she pointed out. "That's why we aren't as far along as we thought we'd be at this

Although not always in total agreement, the committee showed strong support in general for replacing the current Kewaskum Elementary School, either on the same site or a new location, reopening Beechwood Elementary School, doing an energy audit on all district buildings and upgrading accordingly, and purchasing land.

The potential plans are not fine tuned, and up to this point there is not yet broad based support for only one or two plans, but the committee has worked diligently to bring all facts

to the board, both good points and bad, for each developing plan.

The answer to many questions still lies in the foundation of the district in choosing a K-4, K-5 or a K-6 grade alignment. Although the committee was orginally tasked to also look into the possibility of K-8, it didn't make sense to any of the group, and the majority supported either a K-5 or K-6 alignment.

Three basic models were presented to the board for discussion that evening, the first one being a K-4 or K-5 plan that would include building a new high school with the purchase of land outside the congestion of the village, moving the current middle school to the high school (housing either 5-8, 6-8, or 6-9), and utilizing Kewaskum Middle School as the much needed grade school

The new high school could include a state of the art auditorium or auditorium/gymnasium combination for use by the entire community.

This plan would allow for the use of all the district's buildings while at the same time minimizing the overcrowding at some district schools, namely the middle school and KES

The administration offices could be moved to where there was extra room at either KMS or KHS, and the outlying elementary schools would be remodeled. "This is a plan that benefits every child in our district for years to come," supporter Debbie Donath told the board, adding that this plan could or could not include opening Beechwood, and would require some remodeling at both KMS and KHS to accommodate the new grade levels.

Cost estimates for the proposal ranged anywhere from 21 to 26 million, depending on the extent of remodeling of each building, and the added extras to the

new high school. Donath believed the plan would cost the distict less than any of the others in the long run, and was backed by board member Tom Timblin, who thought creative financing may be the key to taxpayer's acceptance of this costly alter-

"I like the idea of your new high school, but I can't afford it," committee member Lloyd Koch told the rest

The K-5 model presents two KES options; build a new school at the present location or on a new site. Many alternatives were still open ended in this model and ideas tossed about included demolishing the old part of KES, leaving the rest to build onto, demolishing the entire building and using the land for additional parking, reopening Beechwood and adding to Wayne and Farmington.

Again, depending on the extent of remodeling, costs mentioned for reopening Beechwood have ranged from \$200,000 (with lots of volunteer help) to \$640,000 (for a K-6 level plan). Architect's drawings show the addition of a 2,000 square foot IMC and a gym/cafeteria.

At Wayne, a \$600,000 remodeling project would also add an IMC and gym, and Farmington would receive the most extensive remodeling package since the largest population growth is being seen in that area. On its 20 acres, the school would potentially hold 10,840 additional square feet, a two station gym, and a cafeteria, for a cost of around \$1,300,000.

The entire K-5 model runs about \$13.5 million, as opposed to the K-6 proposal for \$16 million. The only real difference between the two plans calls for upping the remodeling of the outlying schools and KES to accommodate an additional

The Facilities Committee saw the future of Kewaskum Middle School needing to contain a two station gym (\$600,000) and six additional classrooms if it was to continue being the middle school, and the high school, a "gym-atorium," capable of holding an audi-

ence of 500, at least. Plans were still being looked at that would join the two schools with a corridor containing a new IMC, commons, gym-atorium, and locker room. The land east of the school toward the river would be filled for playground and parking use, at a cost of about \$500,000.

The problem with this plan is we're putting everything here again (in the village)," said committee member Mark Heise, echoing the

## KMS Student's Artwork School Board In Nationwide Exhibit

A colorful, abstract selfportrait of Kewaskum Middle School seventh grader Alison Yahnke will be one of only 81 artworks displayed in the nationwide Crayola Dream-Makers Exhibition.

Alison's work, done in "cray-pas" last spring, was one of about 1000 entries from throughout the country. The contest, sponsored but once every two years, selects artworks based on "visual appeal, originality, age appropriateness, craftsmanship, and other factors.

Alison created the piece as a classroom activity in which students drew pictures while looking in a mirror, on what happened to be "Weird Hair Day" at KMS. Her teacher, Ms. Molenda, entered it into the

contest over the summer.

"It was my first try at abstract art," Alison said. "I didn't think it was something that would turn out like this.'

Alison's piece is currently on exhibit in Columbia, Missouri, and will travel nearer Kewaskum in March (DeKalb, Illinois), and in April (Hudson, Wisconsin).

Alison plans on seeing the exhibition when it comes to Hudson over Spring Break. "It will be kind of cool to see what other kids have done.

Although Alison's artwork will eventually be on permanent display at the Binney and Smith (Crayola) offices, she has received an award plaque which includes a reduced version of her recognized artwork.

sentiments of others in the committee who feel the more the district builds upon the existing village sites, the more they will continue to be tied to it, and it's just too small an area to do that.

Any of the three plans proposed by the committee will solve district growth problems, and the next step will be to fine tune these plans with input from the school board members. "It would be better to decide on one plan because then we can do more to promote it to the community," Debbie Donath pointed out.

One concern for both groups was the reopening of Beechwood, with boundaries being decided according to bus routes. It was agreed the lines must remain consistent, so students would not have to keep changing schools in order to meet enrollment figures to maintain the school.

"If we please every faction, I believe that people will pay more money because everyone is getting a piece of the pie," Tom Timblin expressed, favoring

both the new high school and opening Beechwood.

Mary Andera cautioned that 70% of the voters in the district do not have children in school, and requested further cost analysis of the various models. A report from SEWRPC also indicated the general population of Kewaskum is getting older, and this, among various other factors, has to be taken into consideration.

The board, as a whole, was enthusiastic and supportive of the committee's work, with the majority

interested in the plan that would give the district a new high school. Board President Jean Goeden asked the committee to take into consideration the upcoming open enrollment policy, which could affect school numbers, if only slightly.

She also requested a tour of Kewaskum Elementary School, open to the public, so the community could view the serious condition of the school, some of which is unusable because of impending danger.





## A Stroll Up Main Street



As we journey on our "Stroll Up Main Street" this week on the north side of the street, heading west, we come to what is now a parking lot for Peace United Church of Christ. However, when the Memories photos were taken fifty years ago by Tiny Terlinden, the location was a hub of activity. It was the site of Joe Eberle's Tavern and Bowling Alley. We had numerous phone calls and notes this week from many people who fondly and vividly remember this establishment. Milly Odekirk sent a photo taken on her wedding day to Joe Odekirk, July 3, 1954. The building is in the background of her wedding photo. She states, "I don't know about the next building, but then came Elmer Klug's place which was a newer place unless he was visiting the one time I was there. That other building might have been his bachelor Pad. Joe had the first one lane bowling alley in Kewaskum. He had beagle show dogs."

(The Elmer Klug residence was located east of the Eberle location and was eventually purchased by the Peace Church and torn down for additional parking). Roger Reindl recalls the bowling alley and the beagles Joe Eberle was famous for statewide.

Roger also mentioned Linda Casper worked at Eberles, at one time, and that the establishment was very popular with Milwaukee sales-

men who made trips to Kewaskum buying/selling grain at the Malt House. During that time period, "Slippery Hank" McLaughlin was a bartender at Eberles. The locals normally requested a whiskey and a beer but these Milwaukee salesmen ordered a whiskey sour. Not knowing what this fancy "new" drink was all about, the bartender put up a shot of whiskey, an empty glass and a jug of vinegar and told the Milwaukee patrons, "There, now you can make it as \_ \_ \_ sour as you want!" Roger also shared information that Joe Eberle was sometimes called "one pull Joe." His expertise at the tapper only required one pull for your serving of cold brew. And last but not ebration since 1979.

least, John Kudek reminded us that Syl and Susie Serwe were the proprietors of the establishment from May of 1953 to July 1, 1959, when the building was torn down. 

## KHS Class Tends to Plants, Business

For about one dollar a month, teachers at Kewaskum High School and Kewaskum Middle School will never again have to worry about their classroom

Thanks to CC's Rent-a-Plant, a business developed and run by Mr. Gonwa's second hour Careers class at KHS, a dollar a month (or less) will not only bring a plant into the classroom, it will ensure the plant is properly watered, pruned and kept free of insects and disease.

Teachers from KHS and KMS can come in, select a plant (\$1.00/month for a large plant, .75c month for a small one), and have members of the CC's Rent-a-Plant (the Careers class students) tend to it in their classrooms on a regular


The business brings not only hands-on work with plants for the Careers class students, it brings other real-world business aspects as well: bookkeeping, customer satisfaction, marketing, accounts managing, computer skills and others.

"It's good experience," said sophomore Brian Osuski.

And it's been that way for the last four years.

Current senior Craig Trzecinski is the only remaining member of the initial three that started the business in the 1994-95 school year. Craig and his partners wanted to start an enterprise that could use his carpentry skills (i.e., building a plant stand with grow lights), as well as the strengths of his partners, in accounting and farming. A plant rental for KHS classrooms seemed a perfect blend of the students' strengths.

After designing a business plan, students secured plants (many donated by

Milwaukee plant rental place Rentokil), and figured out how to market and maintain their investment. They designed advertisements for each teacher's mailbox, and, with donations of discarded plastic jugs from KHS food services, have made decorative pots to house the plants.

"(The students) have constantly taken the money they've earned and put it back into the business,' explained Mr. Gonwa.

Business has been booming, too. Since its start in the 1994-95 school year, CC's Rent-a-Plant has expanded to include both KHS and KMS, servicing about 45 accounts last year alone.

"(Every year) more people know about it, more people are telling others," said Craig, obviously pleased with the business's growth.

With more customers, comes more "paperwork." Right now, CC's Rent-a-Plant maintains a customer data base on the classroom computer, with methods for tracking billing and maintenance requirements.

"When the computer's down, it's kind of hard, shared junior Cory Radtke, "but even last year when we

lost our billing information, we were able to keep going.

The payback for all this hard work and business organization has been practical experience (plant care as well as billing and accounts management), a good addition to a resume, and, for high school students, perhaps something even more tangible.

"Well," said Craig, "we each get \$25 at the end of the year, too.'

It only seems fitting, then, that those who work hard to bring some green to the classrooms, should end up with a little bit of green themselves.

Although she claims she is not really a joiner at heart, Judy volunteered to take charge of several responsibilities despite the fact she was a newcomer to the organization.

Since joining the Chamber in February, 1996, Judy has been serving as this year's secretary, recording all the meeting minutes and representing the Chamber as an officer on the Welcoming Committee. "I'm new at this, but I'm willing to learn and contribute," she points out.

Her main focus and commitment lies in the promotion of tourism, and in May, 1996, Judy joined the newly formed Kettle Moraine Tourism Council, working with an enthusiastic committee that designed

Now two years old and prospering within a small town, Main Street Crafts offers a variety of unique collectibles and hand crafted items, many of which are made by Judy and her husband, Mike, who specializes in the ever popular cedar "birdhouse" benches.

"He only makes them for Kettle Kountry Kolors each year and the supply is limited to how many he finishes during that time."

Some items are brought in on consignment, and the Bergers are always looking for new ideas to bring into the area. Ceramics, dried flower arrangements, canning jar lamps, Door County candles, Packer gifts and wildlife sweatshirts are just a few of the merchandise selections available at Main Street Crafts.

Lately, they've also branched out into antiques, with a special corner of the store featuring old glass milk bottles, a collectible that has recently been growing in popularity.

"The sweatshirts are something new, and they've gone over very well," Judy mentions. Along with Kettle Moraine State Forest sweatshirts, there are wildlife and fall and winter scenes, with the wolves being most in demand.

The Bergers moved to Kewaskum 25 years ago, Judy recalls, when the town "rolled up the streets at 5 p.m." "We've seen a lot of changes through the years, there's been so much growth, including new businesses moving into the area. It keeps getting better every year."







time of his death, Leo was employed at Envirotest Systems in West Bend.



### Village Board Meeting Minutes

Mid-Monthly Meeting October 20, 1997 8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner presided. Trustee Harry Roecker and Trustee Gary Gavin asked to be excused and were absent. All other Trustees Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Andy Pesch, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the October 6, 1997 meeting were approved as printed.

President Robert H. Wagner apologized for a comment made at the last meeting which was in the West Bend News. He noted his frustration and wanted to place children higher on the priority list. It was further noted he talked with the parties concerned and that a basis of understanding was derived. It is hopeful the budget process can address the majority of everyone's needs.

On a motion by Trustee Warren Dums, seconded by Trustee John Kenworthy and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board suspended the rules to take up action on VII. Committee reports (G) (1) review preliminary budget information for 1998.

The Library Director Shellie Anderson and Library Board Representative John Kenworthy reviewed the budget request. It was noted the primary increase is in wages and benefits because of the Library Board requesting the Director going to a 40 hours week versus 30 hours. The budget as prepared, reflects a 6.8% increase and the Village tax levy a 2.6% increase. The request will be taken under advisement.

On a motion by Trustee Warren Dums, seconded by Trustee Andy Pesch and unanimously carried voice vote the Board authorized the sale of a card index file from the Library to the Campbellsport Library at a cost of \$300.00.

Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herriges presented the September 1997 monthly report:

Fire calls - 2, Year to date - 18; Jaws of life - 5, Year to date - 23; Rescue calls - 28, Miles - 758.

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel presented the August 1997 monthly report:

Criminal arrests - 36, Criminal

investigations - 29; Traffic warnings - 123, Traffic citations - 28; Adults arrests - 53, Juvenile arrests - 31; Property stolen - \$4,500, Property recovered - \$-0-; Parking warnings - 8, Parking tags - 15.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles informed the Board of the following:

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Warren Dums and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the issuance of an Operators License upon proper payment of fees and documentation for the following:

3) Review of a letter received from the Department of Transportation informing the Board that they received resolution 97-18 and that the USH "45" (CTH "H" west to CTH "D") construction scheduled for 2000 has been postponed until 2003. The consensus of the Board was to prepare a letter to be sent both to our legislators and the DOT.

The Protection and Public Safety Committee, reviewed briefly the request for a stop sign to be placed at the intersection of Highland Avenue and Stark Street. It was noted the Police Department should continue to monitor the situation.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel reviewed the police departments proposed budget. It was noted the primary increase was routine personnel cost, and in the outlay account the squad car replacement, computer upgrade to CLUES and seed money towards a second MDC unit for the unmarked squad. It was also noted that a remote radio control system for the sirens is being budgeted for equaling \$2,000. The budget reflects an increase of \$26,066 or 7.2%.

Chairman of the Public Works Committee, Warren Dums reviewed with the Board the proposed budgets for the department accounts noting that the general categories are up by \$8,331 or 2.5%. The outlay accounts are up and down from 1997. The Board will look at suggested changes at the November 3, 1997 meeting.

It was announced that a Plan Commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 28, 1997 at 7:00 p.m.

Some general discussion on the overall proposed budget as previously discussed was reviewed.





## Convicted Felons Can Not Hunt

Recently I have received several calls from individuals asking if a convicted felon can hunt in Wisconsin. The question usually begins with, "I know this guy that is a convicted felon." In Wisconsin it is unlawful for a person who has been convicted of a felony to possess a firearm of any type. This would include all firearms, including muzzleloaders. The question that often comes up is," can a felon purchase a deer gun license and have someone else fill the tag for him under the Group Hunting Law." The answer is "NO.

To take part in group hunting each hunter must have a deer gun license and each member of the hunting party must be in possession of a firearm. A felon not being able to possess a firearm excludes him or her from taking part in group hunting. A felon would be able to purchase a deer gun license but would not be able to shoot or tag a deer during the gun deer season.

As far as I know a pardon from the governor's office is the only way around this for a felon. In some cases a person may have a Court order prohibiting the possession of a firearm. This also would not allow them to take part in Group Hunting for deer. Felons can purchase an archery license and hunt with a bow and arrow in most cases and could fill their hunters choice permit with the bow on an antlerless deer.
