Dairyland Seed Donates \$25,000 to New Fair Site

The Washington County Ag and Extension committee recently accepted a \$25,000 pledge from Dairyland Seed Company, to help fund the cost of four livestock barns at the new Washington County fairgrounds.

The \$25,000 gift from Dairyland Seed is "in appreciation for the loyalty" of Washington County farmers to the 1907 family owned and operated business, announced chief executive officer Tom Strachota.

The donation brings the total amount of contributions

to around \$278,000 to help offset the cost of \$615,000 to develop the livestock area. The sizable contribution has earned Dairyland Seed the privilege of naming the dairy livestock building, "Dairyland Seed Dairy Building."

The goal cost of \$615,000 for the livestock area includes four livestock barns at \$100,000 each, a show arena (\$150,000) and a \$65,000 milking parlor.

The new fairgrounds will be located on a 133 acre site in the Town of Polk, scheduled for completion in 1999.

Area Artist's Work is 'Light As a Feather'

Bette Voek's "light as a feather" works of art began five years ago when her son came home clutching a gift in his hand, the kind only boys bring home to their mothers after rescuing the treasure from the roadside or the edge of a field or even the front yard.

It was a bronze turkey feather, and when Bette admired the offering, the design of the feather revealed to her artist's eye the scene of a she-bear and her cub.

As an experienced ceramic crafter and teacher, Bette brought out her acrylic paints and proceeded to transfer the scene onto the feather, and the result was her first work of feather art, which she entitled, "Barely There."

She entered the piece in the Washington County Fair and won first place in the adult art division. Since then, a chocolate lab, a standing bear, a goose, and wolf eyes have been added to the Barely There series of feather paintings.

"You have to really look into the scene to see it,' Bette explains, lying out feathers around her as she works to study them in search of formations, like the kind you see in clouds.

In 1993 her swan entitled, "Elegance," one of two pieces that aren't for sale, won the title of grand champion in art competition at the fair, and sent her winging her way into a new career.

Bette's feather art is beautifully matted and framed, with beads, leather, shells, or polished stone added to the composition to enhance the natural scene. "I use whatever I feel goes well with the finished piece," she relates. Her unique art form offers one of a kind pieces that pay tribute to the delicate balance of nature, along with things that may be endangered.

"I've done many wildlife paintings, tigers, cougars, birds, dolphins, and things like sailboats because they are light and driven by air. Painting on feathers, for me personally, relates the feeling that if you don't take care of something, it will be gone, like a feather in the wind.

She is currently working on special orders for a lighthouse and an Amish scene, but turns away requests for cars and trucks and the like.

She claims she is an artist that cannot draw or even sketch. "When I'm sketching down ideas on paper it looks like stick figures, but put a brush in my hand, and I can do it," she maintains, and keeps busy working in her studio in fall and spring, with winter months set aside for traveling to various craft shows, doing about fifteen a year.

It's been expanding, but I can't do too much, I don't mass produce. I enjoy doing the commissioned work, but I also like to be creative.

The Voeks still maintain husband Don's family farm, the 1817 Plaum homestead. Within 35 acres, there are different kinds of turkeys, along with geese, ducks and chickens. Once raised for food, they now enjoy a life of leisure, existing for the pleasure of their owners and the feathers.

There are several different types of feathers, some are finer and softer, others are stronger, and each is different in quality and texture," Bette points

With waterfowl, a different kind of acrylic paint has to be used because of the feathers' water repel-lent nature. "We used to have a peacock, and I found those to be the most difficult to paint on."

Always seeking new forms for her creativity, Bette has been working out a scene for a whole pheasant wing, and also developing an idea that involves the use of a turkey tail.

Her commissioned work has brought many requests from people to do their pets, including birds, cats, dogs

always sending me unusual from her parrot and wanted the finished composition."

By necessity, Bette has become an expert in feather identification and is extremely careful in knowing what she is working with, or what people send her way. "I can't touch eagle, hawk, or owl feathers, or any migratory birds, even if they are found on the ground, because it's against the law," Bette asserts. Only Native Americans are allowed to use the feathers through a special government dispensation.

In her search to locate and share ideas with other artists who paint on feathers, Bette has found her choice of canvas to be rare. "So far, I've found a Native American that does it, an artist in Missouri, one in Illinois, and a man in Minnesota, but not one of us does it the same," she states, hoping that someday they could meet or correspond.

Art galleries in Cambridge, Appleton, and Oconomowoc carry Bette's feather art, and she hopes to add

"I love the interaction with people and the look they get on their faces when they stop to take a closer look at my work and realize it's a feather."

She also loves traveling with a family of artists; her father, Ron Schultz, is a photographer who specializes in scenes of northern Wisconsin, and her fatherin-law, Don Voeks, does fine wood turning. "All Don's wood comes from our property up north, and my father's photographs captures scenes from up north, and most of the feathers I use come from my birds, so we call it our 'homegrown'

Bette will be exhibiting her art for the last time this year at Shorewood High School on December 7, with approximately 50 pieces on display. When she isn't busy in her studio, she enjoys spending time on the farm with her family, her flock of birds, and her quar-

'My son Troy, is actually the one that started it all, along with some very good friends who had chickens and couldn't slaughter their champions from the fair, so I took them, and I can see now how it's all come from gifts," she observes. "Now I'm looking for a feather from a red turkey. I heard there's one out there

Pumpkin **Cheese Squares**

1 - 16 oz. yellow cake mix

2 - TBLS. melted butter

1 - 14 oz. Eagle Brand Condensed Milk

4 - tsp. pumpkin pie spice

1 cup chopped nuts

3 eggs

1 - 8 oz. cream cheese l - 16 oz. pumpkin

1/2 tsp. salt

Mix on low - cake mix, 1 egg, butter, and 2 tsp. of pumpkin pie spice, should be crumbly. Press into 10 by 15 inch pan or cookie sheet. Set aside.





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
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Deaf Awareness Week Held at FES





Mid-Monthly Meeting November 17, 1997 8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner presided. Trustee Andy Pesch arrived at 8:04 p.m. All other Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Harry Roecker, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the November 3, 1997 meeting were approved as printed.

A public hearing was conducted on the application for a Combination Class "B" Fermented Malt Beverage and Intoxicating Liquor License for the period commencing November 18, 1997 and ending June 30, 1998 as noticed for Joel F. Fehlhaber (Stillwater), 240 Main Street, Kewaskum, WI. The Police Department had no objections to the application. It was noted the license, if approved, more than likely would not be issued. It was further noted the waiver notation regarding the location being within 300' of a school be included in the action. On a motion by John Kenworthy, seconded by Warren Dums and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call was 7 "Aye" 0 "Nay."

The bids/quotes as received for the sewer jetter replacement were reviewed by the Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles as follows:

1) SRECO - 72 HP gas Continental, 600 gallons water capacity - \$28,270.

2) Sewer Equipment - 81 HP Perkins Diesel, 700 gallons water capacity - \$27,385.

It was noted the warranties are identical and that the trade in value of \$3,200 has been applied to the prices as noted. The jetter has been budgeted for over the last few years and the money will be coming from the replacement account. Also it was mentioned that the old jetter was purchased in 1976.

On a motion by Trustee Harry Roecker, seconded by Trustee Gary Gavin and unanimously carried by voice vote the Board approved the purchase from the low bidder at a cost of \$27,385

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel presented the October 1997 monthly report:

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles informed the Board of the following:

The Protection and Public Safety Committee, reviewed briefly the request for an ordinance amendment to ban vehicles from parking on one's lot other than on a paved area/driveway. 

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

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Hunters Register 124,281 Deer On Opening Weekend of 1997 Gun Hunting Season

MADISON -- Hunters participating in opening weekend of the 1997 gun deer season registered 124,281 deer over the two day period, compared to 168,120 the previous year following two severe winters in the north and two seasons of special early season hunts.

'People say they're not seeing deer and there are fewer deer in the woods this year," said Bill Mytton, DNR deer ecologist. "We've weathered two hard winters in the north that really reduced reproduction up there, which accounts for fewer deer in that region."

As for the south, Mytton said, while opening weekend numbers are down about 25% from 1996, "when you add in the October Zone T harvest, these units are right on target for the total number of deer taken. If you want success, Zone T units are a good

DNR wildlife technicians, working registration stations over the weekend, also recorded a 30 to 40% increase in the number of 2 1/2-year and older deer coming out of the T Zones. Mytton said that was expected because of the emphasis on antlerless deer in those units and because of changing land use patterns in the south saying that as more privately owned lands are closed to hunters, deer are holding on those acres and surviving to the next year's hunt.

In the north, the opposite was true. Due to the hard winters, many fawns and

yearling deer did not survive the harsh conditions, and those bucks that did survive tended to have reduced rack size.

"The make-up and the distribution of the herd changes from year to year," said Mytton. "And so do hunter's habits and this affects the harvest too. We've noticed, at least on the public hunting grounds, that hunters are exiting the woods earlier and earlier on Sunday each year. Yeah, there was a big football game this year, but this is something we've noticed for some time now. Hunters as a group are spending less time in the woods and that's going to affect success.'

Wildlife managers across the state stated they felt there were great hunting opportunities out there at the end of the season.

We're still projecting about 290,000 for a total harvest," said Mytton. "The success of the upcoming muzzleloader hunt could boost that higher. Every year more and more hunters are participating in this unique hunt and finding it very enjoyable.

DNR wildlife health experts who examined the carcasses of 154 deer that hunters brought in to the Manitowoc deer registration station on the first three days of the gun-deer season found no evidence that the animals are infected with tuberculosis.

DNR officials examined the deer because they wanted to learn if the bovine tuberculosis infecting some animals in three Manitowoc

County captive elk herds had spread to wild deeer in the immediate area. Holes in the elk farm fence were big enough for deer and other mammals to enter and escape through.

Department wildlife experts found none of the yellowish or tan lumps in the deer's lungs that could have signaled possible TB infection. The wildlife health experts collected the deer's lymph nodes for laboratory testing, and results are expected back in six to

eight weeks.

DNR Health Education Administrator Tim Lawhern said seven hunting accidents, including one fatality, were reported over the opening weekend. That was the same number of accidents reported for the 1996 season, with two fatalities. The fatal accident this year involved a 29 year old non-resident hunter in Burnett County on Sunday morning. The hunter apparently was hunting from a tree stand and his rifle discharged.

The fatality and other accidents remain under investigation. The Department of Natural Resources will issue a more detailed accident report following close of the hunting season.

New head coach Tom Timblin's squad has no returning starters from last year's team that posted a 3-17 mark. The assistant varsity coach is Scott Pritzel, Perry Koth will coach the junior varsity and Jamie Jastrab will groom the freshmen team.

As usual for a Kewaskum team, they will be smaller than most of their opponents in the vast majority of their contests (must be something in the water!).


The word rebuilding will not be used because, according to Coach Timblin, "That's something we've been doing for the past number of years and can be perceived now as a built-in excuse.
