# Town of Scott Treasurer Edeler Resigns; Irene Gnacinski Appointed

There was a definite difference of opinion among members of the Town of Scott of supervisors expressed during a public hearing related to the 1998 budget and again during the special and regular meetings which followed.

With the tax season fast approaching, and the resignation of the town treasurer, the board was left in a dilemma of finding a town resident who would be willing to take over treasurer duties and be available to collect the taxes. The problem appeared to be solved with the appointment of Irene Gnacinski to fill the unexpired term of Marie Edeler whose term was to expire in April of

Gnacinski took the oath of office at the beginning of the regular December meeting. Then the discussion began. Because it was a large task to

take on by a newcomer, Supervisor Richard Bemis continued to support his position on having the county collect the taxes. Other board members felt that the new treasurer should be the one to make that decision.

Clerk Colleen Narbatovics reminded the board that according to state statutes, the treasurer had the option of hiring a deputy to assist, even if only for a few months.

That announcement brought up the next question. "Who will pay the deputy?" Bemis quickly responded, "I don't think we (the town) should pay a deputy. New Treasurer Gnacinski responded, "If I need help, I'll pay the deputy out my own pocket."

Several motions followed, all being decided by a roll call vote. First, Supervisor Ira Weber moved, Bemis seconded, not to pay a deputy treasurer...supported by Bemis and Weber, opposed Supervisors Dale Burke, Clarence Janz and Chairman Larry Martin.

Second: Moved by Burke, second by Martin to pay a deputy treasurer...supported by Chairman Martin, Supervisors Burke and Janz, opposed by Supervisors Weber, Bemis.

During a Special meeting which followed, the subject was again discussed. In the proposed budget, there appeared a line item showing \$1200 for payment to a deputy treasurer. First discussion was to eliminate that line item, however a motion by Burke and Martin followed to alter the line item which would allow for payment of \$300 to a deputy treasurer, if needed. It was determined that there would be no more than three months of heavy work during the tax season and that \$100 per month should be sufficient for the assistant. The roll call vote on that issue resulted in Janz, Burke and Martin voting for and Bemis and Weber voting against.

Speaking to the two negait myself, and this is how it should be." Bemis also indicated that he was not ashamed of his vote.

With the passage of the treasurer payment change, adjustments were made so that the Batavia First Responders will receive an additional \$1,000 to be used for payment of recently purchased defibrillator. Although several minor change of figures were made, the proposed levy remained the same at \$3.65 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation.

On a vote to adopt the \$3.65 tax levy, Weber and Bemis voted against. State Statues determine that Highway expenditures over \$10,000 must be approved at a special meeting. Approval of \$180,753.00 was given for Highway Expenditures.

Many of these qualities have been lost or are threatened due to residential sprawl, drumlin top development, lack of modern land use standards, and old, worn out zoning ordinances that lack vision for the future.

Pulling together, citizens need to build a future vision for the drumlin region and back it up with realistic and community accepted land use

# Chamber Member of the Month

Mike and Julie Desterhoft invested in the northern Kettle Moraine area two years ago, when they purchased Parkview General Store across from Mauthe Lake, and set about changing it's image from a Ma & Pa convenience store to a '90's style outfitters shop destined to draw the recreationists who come to the forest to enjoy the outdoors.

Sparked by the gnawing enthusiasm that makes a person have to go and tell everyone about the great place they live, and how it has the potential to be something bigger and better than it is now, Mike got involved in promoting the Kettle Moraine area and the businesses within through his interest in tourism and his involvement in the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce

Area Chamber of Commerce. Through the chamber, which the Desterhofts joined in 1995, Mike was introduced to other like-minded business persons, and a year later he became a charter member of the newly formed Kettle Moraine Tourism Council. The Council's big endeavor was the creation and publication of a tourist map/brochure, which was distributed by the thousands to local businesses and tourist stops. "The map was so well received we've run out and will be redoing it in '98 to bring it up to date," Mike explains.

Mike has also been instrumental in starting and manning a tourism booth at Kewaskum's annual Kettle Kountry Kolors, which he has done for two years in a row now. "A lot of work needs to be done with the Tourism Council, and I feel it can stand on it's own and should become independent from all local

chambers of commerce," he maintains.

In 1996, the Desterhofts were involved in a Tourism Assessment done through a series of meetings with Debbie Skinner from the Wisconsin Dept. of Tourism. "We worked on a self assessment of tourism in the Kewaskum, Campbellsport, and Kettle Moraine Forest area, and came to the conclusion that the area definitely needs more attention, more promotions, and was found lacking in offering

visitors medium priced lodging facilities," he points out. "I know there's a need for more lodging in the area, and I'm hoping we can work on that in the near future."

Parkview General Store has been steadily increasing it's offerings to visitors of the lake and forest region, supplying rowboats, canoes, and paddle boats for use on Mauthe Lake, along with the rental boats at Forest and Auburn Lakes, and Lake Seven. This past summer, they added a nine hole miniature golf course to their grounds, and the store now holds a full line bait shop for the many fishing enthusiasts that frequent the waters in both summer and winter.

"People come to this area not to find another convenience store, that's why we've shifted our focus more towards the outdoors and recreation," Mike emphasizes. "We've sort of evolved into this 90's style outfitters type of business, and it fits in well with our location." Laying evidence to this claim, the Desterhoft's latest addition to the store is cross county and snow shoe rental, with plans to organize afternoon group outings that end in chili dinners with hot cocoa." The forest staff stops in here a

lot, and I'd like to talk to them about getting something like this started," Mike pauses, with that gleam of enthusiasm in his eyes again.

There are more projects than that on the fire in Mike's mind, for Parkview General Store. Next will be an outer face lift on the building, and then there's the development of the canoe livery, a type of shuttle operation from different points along the Milwaukee River. "You can canoe from here to River Hill Park in Kewaskum," Mike

relates, adding the project is already being worked on.

Mike and Julie continue to be supporters of the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, with emphasis on the development of the northern Kettle Moraine into a prime area for tourism "We really need to network with other businesses within these communities, and then I really believe we can make it work for the benefit of everyone."

# Lady Indians Find Offense Split Two Games

The girls varsity basketball squad from Kewaskum scored more points than it has in a long while, in defeating the Huskies from New Holstein, 67-58 on December 18th. The Lady Indians have incorporated a new up-tempo style of play, and for the first time this season it paid dividends in their first road victory.

The young Indians opened the first quarter eager to get their teammates involved offensively. Unselfish play resulted with six players breaking into the scoring column by the end of the first stanza. Those points were needed to keep pace with the home team as they were awarded numerous trips to the free throw line. The quarter ended with the Indians trailing by a score of 20-18.

The nets cooled off slightly in the second quarter with the girls managing just ten points and running into some foul difficulties. The Huskies continued to put points on the board from the charity stripe going 13 for 16 in the half. The result being a 33-28 deficit for the girls in green and gold going into the locker room.

The fireworks really got underway in the third quarter after the deficit reached seven points.
