Fire and Police Chiefs Report to Village Board

The 1997 annual reports by Fire Chief Mark Groeschel and Police Chief Richard Knoebel were presented at Monday evening's Village Board meeting.

Chief Groeschel opened comments stating in 1997 his department received a total of 24 fire calls, of which 11 or 45.8%, were in the Village of Kewaskum. The Jaws of Life calls totaled 32, with the Jaws actually used five times.

The rescue ambulance was dispatched in the village 129 times or 55.6%; in the Town of Kewaskum, there were 37 calls; in the Town of Wayne, 27 calls; in the Town of Farmington, 44 calls; in the Town of Barton, two calls, and there were 13 calls made to the Town of Auburn.

Groeschel also reported at the present time the fire department has 51 active volunteer members, 22 of which are registered EMT's with five additional members currently enrolled in ambulance/rescue training.

Groeschel also stated at a recent fire department officers' meeting, two pieces of equipment came to mind which are causing some concerns to his department. One is a 1965 model, which he stated has served the department well over the years, but lately, there have been problems with it. He added, "it's time to replace it. I just want to know how the board feels about it or which way we should go."

The second piece of quipment causing major concerns, was, according to Groeschel, "just starting to fall apart on us." The pump was fixed last year but the body is "falling apart" and starting to rust through. The model happens to have a steel tank and two vears a hole was fixed and upon refilling additional holes were found. They were rusted through but were also fixed and "so far it's holding" but Groeschel was unsure how long the repairs would last. Groeschel added, even in the best scenario, if they decided to replace one or the other pieces of equipment, it would still take a full year before delivery could be made. Upon further discussion on more repairs or replacement, the Board agreed to meet at the fire house prior to the meeting on April 20

to check the equipment in question that are causing the concern and then they will decide what course of action to take.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel gave a summary of his department's 1997 activities, stating the total crime rate in Kewaskum has dropped by 4.9%. He added that "when you look at some of the figures you got to remember if you have one robbery one year and zero the next year it's a 100% decrease. So our figures do fluctuate."

Knoebel pointed out that during 1997 all crime rates in Kewaskum were considerably less than both those of comparable cities and those of the entire state.

Thirty-four of 78 or 43.6% of reported index crimes were cleared by arrest. This 1997 clearance rate is greater than the 1997 statewide clearance rate of 27.6% and greater than the 1996 Kewaskum clearance rate of 34.1%.

Total adult arrests increased by 48% from 206 in 1996 to 299 in 1997. Total juvenile arrests increased from 183 during 1996 to 241 in 1997.

Trustee Gary Gavin asked the Police Chief what he attributed the increases to. Knoebel added adult arrests rose due to the fact disorderly conduct arrests went up, as did the writing of bad checks.

He added reasons juvenile arrests went up was due to law changes regarding smoking violations, vanyouth are now more "mobile," but the severity of the crimes has not increased. When questioned about gang-related incidents, he added, "even in Washington County, there isn't as much gang stuff as there was several years ago."

Knoebel also commented that the 1997 property recovery rate for Kewaskum of 90.8% was much greater than both its 1996 rate of 66.7% and the 1997 statewide recovery rate of 43%.

There were a total of 415 traffic citations issued in 1997 while there were a total of 1,766 traffic warnings given during the same period. That is one citation issued for approximately every 4.5 vehicles stopped by the Kewaskum Police Department in 1997.

In conclusion, Knoebel partm stated the Kewaskum Police Appro Department handled 2,018 Satur complaints in 1997 compared to 1,902 in 1996, and patrolled a total of 67,071 extend miles in 1997. bers,

Trustee Gary Gavin made the motion to purchase the speed sign board which was unanimously passed by the rest of the board. Monies could be used from the Police Department's restricted fund to purchase the sign board, which would cost approximately \$2,700. Following dinner, Fire Chief Mark Groeschel welcomed everyone, briefly recapped the year and introduced guest speaker, Washington County Sheriff Jack Theusch.

Sheriff Theusch's presentation was on the importance of volunteer departments and the vital contribution they make in the community. He stressed that residents of area communities should be aware and appreciate the number of hours required of volunteer members for education, training and responding to emergency situations while receiving little or no compensation. In addition, a volunteer's success is achieved with strong family support. Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herriges followed Sheriff Theusch's presentation and was pleased and honored to present the 1997 Firefighter of the Year Award to Larry Martin. Herriges shared a synopsis of Martin's accomplishments and department contributions prior to the announcement. Martin joined the department in 1987. He became an Emergency Medical Technician in 1993. In his duties as an EMT, Martin is certified to operate the

Martin currently serves in the capacity of Lieutenant Treasurer and is an excellent financial administrator. Herriges further stated, "Larry has sacrificed many hours away from his family to fulfill his duties as a firefighter and EMT."

Martin gratefully accepted the plaque amid a standing ovation from fellow firefighters.

Kewaskum Students Exceed National, State Test Scores

During the past few weeks, there has been considerable media attention and discussion on the results of the WSAS (Wisconsin State Assessment System).

All fourth, eighth and tenth graders in Wisconsin Public Schools were required to take the comprehensive battery of tests in the areas of reading, language arts, mathematics, science and social studies.

Kewaskum students exceeded the national and

state scores in every area, in every test, at every grade level. In comparison with surrounding districts, Kewaskum students did very well.

Using West Bend schools as a comparison, Kewaskum students exceeded their West Bend counterparts in every test area at every grade level, except two. West Bend and Kewaskum students scored identical percentiles in tenth grade essays while West Bend outscored Kewaskum tenth graders in math. In all other areas, Kewaskum fourth, eighth and tenth graders outscored West Bend students.

Listed below are the state and national percentiles for students who scored at the proficient or advanced levels on the examinations. Also listed are the Kewaskum scores and the West Bend School District scores for comparison purposes.







Memories

A Stroll Up Main Street

The above historic Kewaskum landmark on Main Street was razed in the mid-eighties but the business, under another name, still exists in the Village. According to "Kewaskum Then and Now" the Bank of Kewaskum had its origins in a banking business conducted in Rosenheimer's Store. On October 14, 1904 the bank was opened for business, having been incorporated and capitalized at \$15,000. In 1911 Adolph Rosenheimer received control of the bank, which he and his brother Moritz had operated on a smaller scale in the retail store since 1874. That same year (1911) a new two-story bank building on upper Main Street was erected, measuring 30' by 50'. It was ready for occupancy on January 1, 1912. The bank offices were located on the first floor with the Malt and Grain Co. and Kewaskum Fire Insurance Co. occupying the second floor. On January 22, 1912 the Bank of Kewaskum merged with the Citizens State Bank of Kewaskum. (The Citizen's State Bank was organized in August, 1904 as the Kewaskum State Bank and was located in the building now occupied by "Rookies." The name change came later because of the similarity to Bank of Kewaskum.) Another merger was completed in June, 1932 with the Farmers and Merchants Bank, which failed during the depression, having been organized on June 4, 1916 with Christ Schaeffer, president; L.D. Guth, vice president; and Elwyn Romaine, cashier. (It had opened for business on February 8, 1917 in a building on Fond du Lac Avenue.) In 1940 Maurice Rosenheimer became bank president and in 1965 he was elected chairman of the board, a title he held until his death in the summer of 1967. During the fall of 1968 Burns Nelthorpe, bank president, died and was replaced by James D. Reigle. This marked the end of active participation in the bank by a member of the Rosenheimer family. Late in 1971 the Bank of Kewaskum joined Valley Bancorporation, an Appleton based holding company. In January, 1972, Wayland D. Tessar was elected president and Gerald Zimmel, cashier. In May, 1973, it merged with Allenton State Bank, which then became a branch office of the Bank of Kewaskum, with its president, Ray Umbs, joining the board of directors. One month later the bank moved into its present building on Fond du Lac Avenue and in July, 1973, its name was changed to Valley Bank. On November 21, 1994, St. Francis Capital Corporation acquired the current holdings of Valley Bank and at that time the name was changed to Bank Wisconsin. Another change came recently when the name was changed to St. Francis Bank. The building on Main Street housed other businesses after the Bank moved, including an office supply and a church, until the building was torn down. Society Offers Workshop On Period Clothing

The Washington County Historical Society is offering an opportunity for the community to deck itself out for the upcoming Statehood Day, May 29, 1998.

Communities and organizations around the county are celebrating the Sesquicentennial in a variety of ways, and many visitors will be participating in these events in period costumes.

"In many cases, people already have some pieces of clothing that will work -- a long, black skirt, a hat, boots, wool pants, a white blouse or gingham shirt," said Dave Tanner, the Society's director. "Our workshop is designed to enhance all that."

Two workshop sessions will be held on Saturday, March 28, at the Old Courthouse Museum, 320 S. Fifth Avenue, West Bend.

Session #1, from 9 a.m. to Noon, will take you through the steps of making a pioneer-style bonnet, and a Session #2, from 1 to 4 p.m., participants will hand-craft an apron. Patterns for men's breeches and vest and a women's dress will be available for more advanced sewers. Professional seamstress Faye Janey of Allenton will lead the workshop. Each session costs \$10 per person or \$15 when you sign up for both, and a halfprice discount is offered to Society members. Pre-payment and registration are required. No refunds are available. No experience is necessary, but you must bring your own fabric. You will need at least one yard of material for the bonnet and four yards for the apron. Please call for amounts needed for advanced projects. Some fabric will be available at the workshop for separate purchase. Pins, thread and scissors will be on hand.

If you have a portable sewing machine, please bring it with you. The workshop is self-paced and some handsewing is required. Volunteers will be available to assist participants. Feel free to bring a lunch if you plan to attend both sessions. A snack and break will be provided at each session. Space is limited.

IBS Will Be Focus Of Hospital Program

Irritable bowel syndrome (IBS), one of the most common disorders of the digestive tract, will be the focus of a program sponsored by St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend on Monday, March 30, from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in the hospital's fourth floor east conference room.

Cindy Cartwright, R.N., and Denise Weittenhiller, R.N., of St. Joseph's will present the program. Diagnosis of IBS, its anatomy and physiology will be discussed. Presenters will also explain the difference between IBS and Inflammatory Bowel Disease (Crohn's Disease and Ulcerative Colitis) and will discuss therapies for living with IBS.

Letter to The Editor

Dear Residents of the Kewaskum School District:

Last week I indicated that as a candidate for reelection to the Kewaskum School Board, it was my intention to let you know my views on certain issues concerning education. I chose the Kewaskum Statesman as my forum.

As a first issue, I'll address academic expectations/standards. First of all, I'd like to congratulate our administrative team, teachers, support staff and, of course, our students for the excellent scores on the long awaited and dreaded WSAS achievement tests. Kewaskum not only outscored most of the schools in this area, but our students also finished higher than the national average.

We have come a long way but as good as our test results are, they can be deceptive. Let me explain. We can say that our students beat the national average, and they did. However, as you may have heard in the news, when compared with the rest of the world in math and science, our country scored abysmally low. Certainly the fact that Kewaskum outscored an abysmally low national average is no reason to believe that our work is finished. Many people will want to justify our country's low score by stating that the United States tested all of its students while the other nations tested only their high achievers. This may or may not be the case. Regardless, there was a time in the not too distant past when the United States led the world in these important core areas.

My point is this. I believe we need to continue to insist that our students take responsibility for their education and to take it seriously, not so that we will score well on tests, but because our students' futures as well as our country's future are at stake in this highly competitive world market. Our teachers need to insist on across-theboard excellence without grade inflation. Grade inflation hurts the poorer performer because it doesn't give an accurate picture of how well the student is actually doing. It also cheapens an "A" grade for the student who has truly earned it. One can argue that the knowledge the "real A" student has is more important than the grade itself and on the surface I'd have to agree. However, if all students can make the Honor Roll with little or no effort and concessions are made during the grading process that consider how hard a student "tries." grades become meaningless. When grades become meaningless, parents have no way of knowing how their

child is actually doing until it's too late.

Grade inflation also stifles the competitive spirit that helped to build this country. Unfortunately. there is a trend in this country to do away with academic competition. Some school districts no longer have an Honor Roll. Some school districts have gone to a grading system that measures students as A, B, C or "not yet." Some school districts' focus is to have all students, "feel good about themselves," so demand little from their students. I feel that when little is expected, little is achieved. We all know that the best way to positive self-esteem is through hard work. Accomplishing a difficult task is an excellent character builder. But some students will never know the feeling of true accomplishment because we haven't asked them to "leap higher." We are afraid that they may become discouraged so we permit them to wallow in mediocrity. This does not help any student in the end, hurts the whole country. Thanks to the no-nonsense work ethic of previous generations, America became synonymous with "excellence." Competition helped raise the quality of life here in America to the highest standard in the world. As a result, we are able to be the most charitable of all nations. The entire world looks to us for help in times of political and economic crisis. Take away competition and you'll have -- well -Cuba.

Another key component

to a student's successful education is the parent. Parents, you need to see how valuable you are in the life of your child's schooling at all grade levels. Children need to know that you are interested in their school work. The younger students need you to listen to them read for a short time each day. 15 minutes goes a long way. Older children can explain their homework to you if the subject is "beyond you" (as is the case with geometry, my son and me). If nothing else, the communication alone will be beneficial to your relationship with your adolescents or older teens. Over and over I have heard teachers and administrators stress the importance of parental involvement. Communication and cooperation between home and school can work wonders. Step up to the plate, parents. You can have an enormous impact on your child's future with just a little involvement now. Our country's future depends on it.





NOTICE TO ALL WASHINGTON COUNTY DOG OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Washington County that dog licenses and rables vaccinations are required.

Vaccination by a licensed veterinarian against rabies is required of all dogs (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. The owner of a dog shall have the dog revaccinated against rabies by a veterinarian when the certificate expires or within three (3) years of previous vaccination. The certificate of rabies vaccination must be presented to the collecting official before a dog license may be issued.

All dogs five (5) months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3.00, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog or one-half of these amounts if the dog became five (5) months of age after July 1 of the license year. The governing body of any town, village or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. Any person who keeps or operates a kennel may apply for a kennel license. The fee is \$35.00 for twelve (12) dogs or less and an additional \$3.00 for each dog in excess of twelve (12).

Dog licenses can be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year. Dog owners should notify their treasurer if their dog is given away or has died, so that you will not be considered delinquent. An affidavit of death is available.

PENALTY Every owner of a dog 5 months of age or older who fails to obtain a license by April 1 will be assessed a late fee of \$5.00.

Mild February Weather Helped **Keep Traffic Fatalities Down**

El Nino's milder weather can be given some of the credit for helping keep Wisconsin's traffic fatalities down during the month of February.

Preliminary data from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation indicates that 37 people died in traffic crashes last month. That

places it among the top ten safest Februaries on record. It's 12 fewer than February, 1997. The safest February was 23 fatalities recorded in 1983. The deadliest February was 73 fatalities in 1968.

"With the milder weather, we had fewer slippery roads to contend with,

which, in itself, makes traveling safer," noted WisDOT Secretary Charles Thompson. "With the recent return of colder weather and temperatures jumping back and forth across the freezing mark, drivers will have to be especially alert for 'black ice' on roads and bridges, especially at night."

Through February, traffic crashes have claimed 84 lives, 15 fewer than the first two months of last year and 10 fewer than the most recent five year average.

This year's crashes have claimed 51 drivers, 24 passengers and nine pedestrians. Last year, 60 drivers, 26 passengers, 12 pedestrians and one motorcycle driver had been killed in crashes during the first two months of the year.

Urban Anglers Reminded Campus Notes **Of New Fishing Rules**

MILWAUKEE -- Because of the special fishing season, young anglers under 16 years and individuals with disabilities (and a resident disabled fishing license) have more opportunity to catch trout and panfish at urban lagoons and ponds in southeastern Wisconsin.

The 1998 restricted season started Saturday, March 14, and will continue through Friday, April 24, and allows only these anglers to fish the 58 designated urban fishing waters during this time. Beginning April 25, fishing on these waters will be open to include adults with a valid fishing license and trout stamp.

The new rule is designed to give young anglers and persons with disabilities an opportunity to fish close to home before competition from adults limits their chances to catch fish. This is the second year the rule is in effect. Each year the special fishing season will start the second Saturday in March and continue to, but not including, the last Saturday in April.

Later this month, the

DNR will stock trout in most of the designated waters. The bag limit for trout is three a day and for panfish the daily limit is 10 in total. On urban waters there is no size limit for trout or panfish.

All designated urban fishing waters are posted with the special regulations and a list of the designated fishing waters in southeastern Wisconsin is available from your local DNR office.

Designated urban fishing waters in Washington County include the Kewaskum Millpond, Boot Lake, the Hartford Millpond, Homestead Hollow Park Pond, Sandy Knoll Park Pond and Wells Lake.






