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Beechwood School Reopening Will Be Hot Topic on Monday's Agenda

School board members should expect a larger than usual turnout at their upcoming meeting scheduled for April 20th. Reopening Beechwood school is a hot topic on the agenda, which calls for discussion and possible approval of a future referendum.

The small neighborhood school was closed in May 1986, by a 5-2 vote by the school board, without a public referendum. The district's sixth graders were transferred to Kewaskum Middle School, despite pleas from some parents and local residents to consider future growth, overcrowding at Farmington Elementary school, and possible adverse affects on the sixth grade. A petition containing 811 signatures voicing disapproval was presented to the board. Because of declining enrollments at that time, the Department of Public Instruction had also recommended the closing of Wayne Elementary School, which did not take place.

Rankled taxpayers represented the other side of the coin, and sided with administration to shut down Beechwood School and alleviate an ever growing school district budget. In an effort to control spending, they voted down the proposed budget at the annual meeting, forcing teacher lay-offs and program

Since then, the school district has paid annually to maintain the Beechwood building and grounds, although through the years recommendations have been made by various groups to sell the property. Past boards and administration felt the school was worth more to the district than what they would be able to sell it for.

Yet Beechwood School has not stood idle and vacant for twelve years. The two baseball diamonds are used in the summertime for team practice and youth league tournaments. The Beechwood parade originates at the school grounds, and the fire department occasionally uses it for fire drills and practicing roof climbing. For years, a local group played weekly basketball in the gym. Since before it was closed up to the present, a library program offers preschool storytime from September to May, and summer library in June and July, directed by Carolyn Beimborn and Sue Buechel, It still remains a part of the community.

Beginning in 1996, under the direction of former administrator Charles Johnson, the board initiated the process of broad based strategic planning.Included in the plan was the formation of a Facilities Study Group, that worked to formulate a variety of facilities options aimed at alleviating overcrowding at district schools and accommodating future growth.

Using a guideline of commitment to community schools (per a community-wide survey), a proposed 15 year district capital improvement plan included in its Phase I reopening Beechwood School by August, 1997. Starting out as a K-4 model, grade schools would have been gradually phased to K-6 by the 1997-98 school year. The school board was bombarded with information faster than they could process it, with plans leading to the year 2013, and some members requested reins be drawn in on the entire scheme so more in depth studies could

Two years later, with a new administrator, a new Facilities Study group, and several facility options away from the original "eight different models," board members are now being asked to make some concrete decisions before overcrowding at the elementary level reaches a crisis point. Recommendations from the second study group were divided into strong Beechwood supporters and those who needed more accurate cost estimates and ade-

County Treasurer Seefeldt Announces Retirement Plans

WEST BEND -- Fredric A. Seefeldt, Washington County Treasurer, has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election this fall.

Seefeldt, who has served as county treasurer since September 21, 1979, plans to retire at the end of his current two year term.

Appointed by the County Board of Supervisors to fill a vacancy in the office, Seefeldt was elected to a full term in 1980 and reelected for eight consecutive

Seefeldt's length of service as county treasurer will be the second longest in the history of Washington County. His more than 19 years of service will be exceeded only by the late Paul L. Justman who served a total of 12 two year terms as county treasurer.

Seefeldt, who holds a Master of Divinity degree, said that his retirement would give him more time to devote to ministry development at his church. Seefeldt is currently serving in his fifth year as president of St. Luke Lutheran Church, Slinger.

The long-time treasurer observed that, as Washington County has grown, the responsibilities of the treasurer's office have grown in volume and complexity.

Major developments during his tenure include the production of tax bills for 19 of the county's 20 local governments, development and testing of tax software, administering the lottery tax credit, bidding out ing services, introducing a local tax receipting program and the design and introduction of a new tax bill format.

These accomplishments would not have been possible without the support of a very competent and conscientious staff. Specifically, Janice Gettelman, assistant to the treasurer, has demonstrated outstanding managerial and technical ability throughout many of these projects. I hope that she will consider running for county treasurer," Seefeldt commented.

"When we took over tax bill production from an outside vendor, it was not just a matter of additional work, but my office was deeply involved in the development and testing of the necessary software to do the job. We went directly from development and testing to the production of the 1989 tax rolls with no significant problems," Seefeldt said.

We were hit again with major software development and testing when the State Legislature presented us with the lottery tax credit program. We were responsible for administering the program for Washington

"In 1991, the County Board of Supervisors made the decision to bid out the county's banking services. As treasurer, I was given the responsibility for developing all the bid documents. I also assisted the Board in evaluating the proposals. The process was repeated in 1994," Seefeldt stated.

Rotary International Student, Jill Pamperin, Shares Experiences in The Netherlands

Kewaskum Statesman:

I'm still alive!

Being a foreign exchange student is mostly hard work! I was prepared to work before I left. I knew it wouldn't be easy, but I didn't realize how hard it would be. You are busy all day working with the language, going to school, making friends, getting to know your family, and making plans for your free time. Still it is a lot of fun.

I still go to school every day, but now I am beginning to understand it. I always enjoy going because I get to talk to other kids my age. The breaks are especially fun. Gym class has been dangerous for me the last grading period -- we were doing gymnastics. Not only am I bad at that, but I haven't tried jumping over a pommel horse and doing somersaults in about six years. The worst was working with rings and trapeze! Generally, swing is fun, but we were supposed to jump off a platform and swing on the trapeze. Needless to say, I had to get hurt sometime. I didn't hold the trapeze well enough and fell face-first on the ground. I have learned that I will never be a gymnast (though I really do admire the people that can!)

After school, I bike the 10 minutes home. That isn't much in comparison to the people who bike one hour. I am very glad I don't have to do that! This whole week the wind has been blowing really strong and with rain. It is one of the most miserable experiences to wake up and realize you have to bike to school totally against a very strong wind and you will get drenched doing it. I praise the inventor of rainpants! It is also good exercise to burn off extra calories from eating too much nutritious food. But, I can always look forward to going home with the wind-very fast!!

Then there is 4:30 tea time. That is a whole ceremony. Family tea time is taken very seriously. You don't miss it if you want to live. You get tea with one cookie. Then the cookies go back into the cabinet, never to be seen until the next tea. Logic would be to get another cookie with the second cup of tea that everyone drinks. No - not allowed. Tea time is used as family time to discuss everything from politics, to school, to the weather. The Dutch are crazy about meetings and discussions, so talking over a cup of tea is special to

Because I told you the cookies get put away, you are probably wondering about snacking. Sorry - not allowed. After school tea and one cookie. Also, tea after dinner with possibly no cookie because you just ate. Tea is your snack or the closest thing to one that you get. (Now you would think that because I don't get to snack, I would lose weight -unfortunately, it hasn't happened that way.

Tea time also plays an important part after dinner. That is the time you have friends over. You give them a cup of tea and talk, that is classic Dutch hospitality. If you are really enjoying talking to the people you offer them hard liquor or wine after the second cup of tea. Otherwise, after the tea is gone, it is your cue to go home. All hospitality is centered over whether or not you are offered more to drink here -- if they like you, you get more to drink, if not, you leave. On a weekend night at tea time by friends, you get glass of liquid an hour. This isn't as much as it seems because it is normal for people to drink a lot of water here. My only comment is that the bathrooms are also much busier here for a good reason!

Another typical Dutch activity is meetings. Dutch are very punctual people and especially for meetings. If they say 8 p.m. they mean it. Not 8:05 p.m. either. There are a lot of teacher meetings in school. Every time there is a meeting, your class gets cancelled so you are free to go home. Normally, you have 2-4 classes in a week that you are free from. In these meetings everyone gets to say their own opinion for as long as they like. There seems to be a rule that you can't reach a conclusion after the first meeting, so everyone takes out their day-planners and makes another. I guess I should be glad to be free so much. I found a pin that says, "I'm not opinionated, I just Dutch!" and I have found that to be the total truth!

These are some of the differences between Dutch culture and the US, but they are similar in a lot of ways. Living in a different country really opens up your mind. To go from a 'farmer girl" to Europe is really a big change! The biggest difference is that I have learned to accept and enjoy a different culture and a different way of thinking (as demonstrated

with the "crazy" things that Dutch do as I described ear-

A short time ago I moved to my last family. Rotary likes to move students because there is no "typical Dutch family" and you get more experiences this way. It was a big job to try to get all my stuff into my two suitcases that were stuffed before I arrived at my second family. Because of all the things I have col-

lected, of course, it didn't work. I moved with two suitcases, another bag, a box, a schoolbag, and two plastic shopping bags stuffed full. Then I saw my new room -- a nice small one! Lucky for me there are bookcases along the walls. Otherwise, I wouldn't have found space for all the artwork that people give me.

Now I have a host brother, Ben, who is a year older than me (18) and a sister, Romanie, who is two months older than me (17). They are both in their "exam year" and are supposed to be studying alot so they can get their "high school" diploma. Of course, for kids that age, they aren't really enthusiastic. Part of the reason is that in order to get into college, it is on a pass/fail basis. They will not get into a "better' college because of better grades and they will not get more scholarship money for better grades because there are no scholarships.

All the Dutch colleges are pretty evenly ranked and are priced somewhat less than the UW colleges for tuition. Room and board isn't a consideration because Dutch colleges have no dorms. You either live at home or figure out housing arrangements for yourself. The first night Ben told me all the things his father had done to try to stop them from watching so much TV. Proudly, he also told me how easily he had overcome these challenges -- just like any normal kid in the US. They are a really nice family with a lot of joking and Making it Beautiful.



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

Board Accepts '97 Village Audit

John Knepel of the accounting firm of Conley McDonald Certified Public Accountants was present at last Monday evening's village board meeting to review and answer questions on the 1997 audit prepared for the Village of Kewaskum.

Knepel explained the accounting firm was hired to give a "clean, unqualified opinion" of the audit which is what is needed for issuing debt and for bondholders of existing debt. They need that assurance that the Village's records are fairly stated so they can rely on the financial statements to make their investment decisions.

Knepel summarized, stating the village had "exceeded your revenue expectations by about \$18,000. That's just a little bit more than a 1% variance." Expenditures were under authorized appropriations by less than a 10% variance.

Knepel said this demonstrates to the readers of financial statements that the village of Kewaskum has "a conservative methodology to your budgeting practices. You don't shoot for the moon on your revenues and you demonstrate the ability to live within your appropriations. So that's good sound financial reporting of your activities."

Trustee Gary Gavin asked where the approximately \$150,000 that was not used go to. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated the monies get moved into a restricted fund.

Knepel further explained, "The village has a long standing practice of transferring any unspent monies, particularly that are appropriated for capital items, to a designated fund, a restricted fund, to carry over to future years, and specific for projects, such as Hwy. 45."

He added by doing this it allows the village to keep its outstanding debt requirements at a lower level, which is a very common practice for villages and cities. Basically that provides funding prior to the project as opposed to having to borrow the entire cost of the project at the time it is approved.

Knepel summarized the sewer utility stating it "has a good fund balance, but you'll probably be using some of that for these projects that are coming down the road."

He added the water utility had a good year, but it was still a little bit below what was authorized.

Knepel explained the tax levy has been tracking up just like everyone elses throughout the state. He added growth had alot to do with it and also partly because the Village's TIF

District had been dissolved.
Trustee Gavin asked,
"What do you see with
towns that have no growth?
How are they sustaining

Knepel answered,
"They're struggling, they're
absolutely struggling.
They're scratching their
heads trying to figure out

Gavin asked, "So if Kewaskum would have stayed at the '93-'94, where basically there was no housing, no growth in Kewaskum what would we be looking at today?"

Knepel said he could not project that information, however, Administrator Schmidt stated, "A drop in services and a raise in taxes, substantially."

Knepel referred to a small village that was just about fully developed and was fighting to contract services out for police service, fire services, and garbage pickup. After that, Knepel explained, people are faced with fighting the battle of increasing their tax levy or dropping garbage collection and having residents pay for that on their own.

Gavin inquired, "What type of growth do you have to have per year to keep a budget somewhat in rhythm?"

Knepel answered, "Generally speaking it has to be in excess of what your growth in expenditures is. If your expenditures are growing at 3 or 4% your valuation need to grow better than that."

Under expenditures and outstanding debt, he stated, "You haven't really borrowed much. Most of the borrowing you've had are being paid by the utilities. Very little is being paid by taxpayer, under the tax rate."

In conclusion, Knepel added, "the audit went very well this year and we appreciate all the help Dan and Janet do. It makes our job go alot simpler."

The board then voted unanimously to accept the audit report for the year ending December 31, 1997.

quate student populations before making a decision. Administrator Clark Pearson has been vocal about his support for the reopening.

At a board worksession held last week, attended by approximately 30 school district residents, the subject was tossed back and forth until a 4-3 consensus vote directed the fate of Beechwood School onto the taxpayer. Larry Fechter, Jon Downs, Lisa Maul and Mary Andera gave support to drafting a referendum that would give voters the chance to decide if the district should fund reopening Beechwood School. The official vote will take place at the April 20th board meeting.

Clearly defined reopening costs would help both board members and residents make informed decision. Currently, \$11,000 of the yearly budget goes toward simply maintaining Beechwood. According to business manager George Allmann, it would take \$250,000 to get the school up and running again, and equipped with a computer network. "When the building was closed, they basically gutted it," he points out." We could cut these costs down if people would volunteer to help paint and things like that." Supporting the community school concept, he says test scores at Wayne and Farmington compared to KES are proof of the education outcome.

Staffing the school, including maintenance, office help, and bringing in a teacher from both Farmington and KES, is estimated at \$120,000 per year, but would reduce the budget of the two latter schools. Student enrollment is expected to be near 124.

The board will also be deciding if they should offer opening the school remodeled, with an additional 2,000 sq. ft. of space, an art room, IMC, more classrooms, and HVAC, for a \$600,000 total. That will be worked out Monday night.

The proposed referendum would be scheduled for June 9th, offering first an advisory referendum to open Beechwood School and a binding question to exceed revenue caps.

A Stroll Up Fond du Lac Avenue



Backtracking a bit off Fond du Lac Avenue, the building behind the Val Peters Harness Shop, was home to the Kewaskum Creamery, According to Kewaskum Then and Now the Creamery was started in 1903 by Moritz and Adolph Rosenheimer. A Mr. Limbeck of Denmark was the first buttermaker and he introduced the process of butter churning to the village. A total of five wagons were on the road each day buying milk from area farmers up until the creamery was sold to S.C. Wollensak and H.J. Grell of Johnson Creek in 1904. The building was damaged by fire on July 18, 1911 but was soon repaired and fireproofed. Mr. Wollensak became the sole owner of the business in August, 1916 when he bought out Mr. Grell and operated it successfully until April, 1923 when he, in turn, sold it to William B. Wells of Chicago. Mr. Wells died in June, 1931 and the creamery was incorporated in March, 1933 by Arthur Barlass of Chicago, who died in September, 1936. Shortly afterward, the name was changed to The Kewaskum Creamery Company with Henry Quade as president and general manager. After his death in 1940, the business was managed by members of his family until April 1951 when it was sold to Heinemann Creameries, Inc. Marigold Foods later purchased the business and eventually merged with Kemps. The company moved their operations to Cedarburg in 1995. The building is now owned and occupied by Engelhardt and Sons. 



personal computer based tax receipting program for use by local treasurers. This eliminated much tedious and time consuming handwork and enabled the treasurers to receipt and balance their tax collections with greater efficiency and accuracy. At the county level, we now download their data from diskettes into the master file eliminating many hours of manual data entry," Seefeldt explained.

"In 1996, my staff and I designed and introduced a one page laser printed tax bill with payment coupons. The majority of our local governments are now using the new form with excellent results. A lot of paper handling has been eliminated. We are pleased to note that counties across the state are using it as a prototype," Seefeldt reported.

"Throughout my service as county treasurer, I have been designated as the county's cash manager and investment officer. Since taking over as treasurer, I have been able to report at least \$1 million in revenue each year. The last two years revenues have exceeded \$2 million. Each dollar of revenue has meant one less dollar that had to be raised by the county tax levy," Seefeldt observed.

Seefeldt served as president of the Wisconsin Cunty Treasurers' Association for the 1991-92 term. He is also a past president of the Volunteer Center of Washington County. He has served as a director of the West Bend Chapter of the American Red Cross. He is a member of the West Bend Noon Rotary Club and county, state and national Republican organizations.

Seefeldt, a native of Washington County, grew up in the Town of Kewaskum, is a graduate of the Kewaskum Public Schools, earned a Bachelor of Arts degree cum laude at Lakeland College, and is a 1965 graduate of the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago.

Having little knowledge of the facts, I proceeded to hit the phones and get a thorough update on the issues. As I understood it: A) Kewaskum Elementary and Farmington Elementary are at or over capacity and are in need of expansion; B) Beechwood School is situated just Northeast of the center of Sheboygan County region of the district and was closed approximately 11 years ago. The school district map supports the fact that Beechwood School would have approximately 124 students K-5 if opened. Approximately the same size as Wayne Elementary School. This would eliminate the immediate problem.

I'm a bit confused. Beechwood Elementary was closed in the spring of 1986 without a referendum! The Kewaskum District residents never had a chance to reject this decision! (Just last week in Elroy, Wisconsin, taxpayers had a referendum on the closing of two Elementary Schools and they rejected it!) We never had the choice in 1986, the Board just closed it! Now our present School Board is in the process of writing a referendum for June to reopen Beechwood. Why do we need a referendum now? The Board President was on the School Board then and she is on it now again. Can she explain why a referendum is needed now?

Our present administration, Mr. Pearson and Mr. Allmann, both have over 25 years experience in our District. Both they and the Elementary Principals see the overcrowding issue at the elementary level and agree with many District residents that once again utilizing B.E.S. would be common sense.

The Board is so concerned about so called "Boundary Lines." Other districts move the so called "lines" to accommodate each school as needed. Why such an issue in the Kewaskum District?

The West Bend News quoted that when B.E.S. was closed, they were transporting students to keep it running. The only ones transported were 10 kindergartners. The total enrollment was 98 K-6 in 1986. In 1985 it was 91 students with no one transported in.

There are so many unanswered questions and misquotes in the papers that the public must be made aware of. I've attended almost all of the Facility Committee Meetings and the public was not allowed to speak and ask questions. At Board meetings, the President allows only a minimal amount of time. It's very discouraging.

Mr. Fechter said at one of the first meetings he was on the Board that, "Politics should be left outside the school door." Is the Board

doing that? I don't think so.

Remember residents,
we added on to the High
School and Middle School

we added on to the High School and Middle School about two years ago, which was to be sufficient for at least 15 years. It's at the elementary level where it's badly needed now. With all the special programs that are required now by the State and increasing enrollments, we have no choice but to expand and use the buildings we have.

At last week's meeting, Mr. Schulte was the only Board member that spoke about concerns for the children. Neighborhood schools, smaller class sizes, shorter bus routes and more parent participation etc...



WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 647 reduces local land use planning to control by master plan, rendering communities powerless to control urban sprawl or to consider development proposals on their own merits; and

WHEREAS, the Mid-Moraine Municipal Association is disturbed by recurring efforts in the Legislature to substitute State control for the local control of land use and zoning decisions; and

WHEREAS, land use planning and zoning decisions are best made by local officials who have the best understanding of the community's needs and wants, and are most easily held accountable for such decisions by the electorate.

RESOLUTION NO. 98-10

A RESOLUTION OPPOSING A PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION FOR COMPUTER EQUIPMENT

WHEREAS, the Governor's budget adjustment bill would exempt computers and related equipment from all property taxes, but fails to define computer related equipment; and

WHEREAS, any legislation that reduces or eliminates the personal property tax results in an adverse fiscal impact on local communities, and it is estimated that exemption of computers and related equipment would result in the loss of \$80 to \$133 million in tax base to the member communities of the Mid-Moraine Municipal Association, and;

WHEREAS, the bill proposes that an aid payment be made each May to offset the loss of tax base, but future Legislatures cannot be required to continue this aid; and

WHEREAS, the proposed aid payment provides no recovery for the loss of taxes on the value of future equipment, which could be just as great over time as the current value, but freezes it at the January, 1998 value and tax rate; and

WHEREAS, the value of computer related equipment is frequently greatest in newly developed business parks, and the loss of this tax base will have a major impact on a community's ability to recover its costs on a Tax Incremental Finance District basis.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum that it hereby urges the Governor and its State Legislators to oppose any action that would provide a tax exemption for computer related equipment.





One year ago at the Rockford Speedway, one could not see the other side of this high banked quarter mile track, because the heavy snow showers and strong winds. This year with the sun shining and mild winds the Annual Spring Classic for the three divisions of competition was a success with over 4000 people attending the event.

The day would not have been complete without the Deery Family (owners of the Rockford Speedway) giving some commendable statements in memory of the legendary short track Champion Joe Shear of Clinton. Joe passed away in early March after a battle with cancer. The name of Joe Shear is sinonimous with the Rockford Speedway. Joe was a regular competitor at the speedway and also competed in many race series, such as, ARTGO and the Red, White and Blue series at the International Wisconsin Raceway in Kaukauna. After the pre-race festivities and a moment of silence, the Legend cars took to the track for their feature event. With 26 little old styled typed modifieds were a beautiful sight. All the cars were painted bright and colorful with numbers large enough for everyone to see in the grandstands. This organization of Legends travel all over the Midwest and plan to be at the Slinger Super Speedway this summer.

The up and coming drivers of Mid American division were on hand to show off their talents and well prepared vehicles. This division could be calssified as a step up before investing in a late model. The 50 lap Spring Classic for the Mid American Cars started with Jim Pritzel of Hales Corners blowing his engine on the third lap and causing a 7 car pile up in the third turn. 

Wiesner Third, Neumann Seventh And Eighth at Oshkosh Invitational

The Kewaskum High School girls track and field team was led by Carrie Wiesner and Carol Neuman at the Oshkosh Indoor Invitational on Tuesday, April

Senior Carrie Wiesner just missed placing second in the 55M high hurdles with a time of 9.413. The finish was so close that the video and the fully automated timing system (FAT) had to go out to the thousandths place, to decide between second place and Wiesner's third place finish.

Junior Carol Neumann placed seventh in the 800M run with her fastest time of the season, clocking a 2:35.76. Neumann, facing an extremely tough field in the 1600M run, placed eighth with a season best time of 5:38.55. Last year's Eastern Wisconsin Conference champion in the 1600M run, Brianna Dahm of Two Rivers won the 1600M run in 5:28.5 outsprinting Amber Arthur of Sheboygan Falls. Both Dahm and Arthur qualified for the state track meet last year.

A pleased Coach Kinney praised both Carrie Wiesner's third in the 55M hurdles and Carol Neumann's seventh in the 800M run and eighth in the 1600M run. "These were definitely the highlights of the meet for Kewaskum. Carol ran well in two difficult races against some of the best competition in the state," remarked Coach Kinney.

The 800M relay team of senior JoAnne Thull, freshman Tina Lindgren, junior Jackie Michaels and senior Carrie Wiesner came very close to placing in the top eight, but wound up finishing 12th out of 34 teams in 1:58.74 for Kewaskum. Conference foes Sheboygan Falls finished 11th in 1:58.63 and Chilton finished 10th in 1:58.53. Kewaskum did not run in the same heat as either school, but, Coach Kinney commented, "This was the first time this team worked together and they did very well. If we keep working hard and improving, I think we can beat them later in the sea-

Another bright spot for the Kewaskum Indians was the 12th place finish of the 3200m relay team of freshmen Emily Rinzel and Colleen Gosa, junior Crystal Heberer, and sophomore Lauren Steinhardt in 11:05.8. Both Emily Rinzel and Colleen Gosa ran very well with 2:42.8 and 2:41.2 times for their 800M splits respectively in the 3200m

The 1600M relay team also saw improvement with Jessie Repovsch, Anna Waehler, freshmen Emily Foerster, and Lauren Steinhardt posting a time of 4:49.

Emily Rinzel continued to run well by dropping 24 seconds off her time of 13:40 in the 3200M run. Colleen Gosa won her heat in the 800m run in 2:44.48, but also did not place in the top eight.

Another freshman, Amber Averill, filled in very capably for injured Heather Rieder in the 400m dash. Averill ran an impressive 1:07.97 in the 400 meters.

Senior JoAnne Thull also ran the 55M high hurdles (10:05) but hit a hurdle and missed qualifying for the



Head coach Kinney commented, "The KHS girls team got a good dose of Eastern Wisconsin reality. Other teams from our conference were making the finals, scoring points and we weren't. The results show that we belong to a very tough conference.

'We didn't challenge the leaders of the meet, but we did improve in most of the events, and this meet gave our younger athletes good experience that they will need later in the season,' concluded Coach Kinney.

The Kewaskum girls' next track meet will be the Fourth Annual Crusader Classic Invitational on Saturday, April 18. The meet is hosted by Waukesha Catholic Memorial High School and will be held in Muskego with a 9 a.m.
