Area Wagon Train All Set for State Sesquicentennial

Many local equine enthusiasts will be bringing a touch of their own historic flavor to Wisconsin's Sesquicentennial celebration as a part of "Wagons of Wis-

After several years of preparation, a 16 day "authentic" wagon train will head out from Prairie Springs Park in Kenosha on May 29, closely following the northern route of an old military road, also known as the Green Bay Ethnic Trail, that snaked along the state's eastern border. The group's destination - the town of Luxemburg in Kewaunee County - by June

Wagon Masters Jim Wiedmeyer, Bill Zahn and Bud Endries will be leading an assemblage of 25 horsedrawn covered wagons, carriages, buckboards, "goin' to Sunday meeting" buggies, doctor buggies, outriders and an 1800 pound cannon once used in the Mexican War.

Various communities and organizations along the way have planned celebrations for the wagon train's arrival, including old fashioned picnics, music and dancing, games and historic displays. Eating breaks, rest stops, and sleep-overs have been carefully planned during this one of a kind

wagon train celebration.

Each of the four wagon masters have specialized skills, from organizing wagon trains to shoeing horses to driving mules to farm work with their teams. President of W.O.W. Jim Wiedmeyer hails from Lomira, and has been busy working and training two Belgians for the big event. "I've met many new friends this year, one has been a great help in restoring my grain wagon," which is none other than Matt Harvey of Campbellsport. Well known for his forge work, Matt has shaped and fitted some of the hardware for the wooden wheeled wagon, and will be a welcome participant in the event.

"We never in our wildest dreams imagined it would get this big," said Trail Boss Rick Welch of Kewaskum. He has enjoyed many hours over the past year and a half working with communities to ensure both a safe and historic trip, securing routes and accommodations. Joined by his wife, Ellen, who works on the wagon train registrations, Rick relates his life is on hold right now, "til the smoke settles and daily total messages on the answering machine total '0'." Even the Governor of Wisconsin, Tommy Thompson, has announced his intention to spend two days with the traveling proces-

Horse, mule and oxen will be brought together from many different parts of the state, ready to transport their owners through this historic journey, painstakingly recreated to resemble, as closely as possible, the authentic life of the pioneers in 1848. Travel is expected to range between 18 and 25 miles per day, a typical day for a wagon train, which once carried women and children, and plenty of chores waiting at each day's end. And it would be amiss not to mention wooden wagon wheels and the extra bumpy ride that left travelers vibrating for awhile after.

All wagons brought into the wagon train must be an authentic, wooden-wheeled vehicle. Horse tack must consist of the old-time style; no signs, banners, flags, farm or family names or advertising will be allowed in the event. Walkers and riders who join in, (and everyone is invited to do so as the train travels through various towns) must also be attired in period clothing, or they will be asked to step back and enjoy being a spec-

Helping with costuming and local 4-H groups are Candy and Roger Reysen of Kewaskum. The W.O.W. requires period dress prior to 1910, (no western wear), and Candy has been sharing her ideas and costume supply sources with those who need some help with their attire. The wagon train will be hosted for breakfast by the state 4-H club at Rochester Park in Sheboygan Falls on June 7.

The wagon train, with its visual moving history, will be lumbering down the many highways, streets and back roads to be viewed by all. At selected sites, with help from local communities and historical societies, campfires will be gathering places to hear stories, learn folk art, home and trail skills, and ethnic history. Teachers, historians, ethnic groups and history buffs have been invited to participate in W.O.W.'s Campfire Education program, with much of the coordinating having been done by Darcie Salm of Campbellsport. She has also been helping out with the newsletter mailing.

Many other local WOW people have been instrumental in helping to create an event that will be remembered as part of the state's great history. Debbie Kannenberg of New Prospect is serving as the group's treasurer; Judy Fait of West Bend has been in



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

** H.D.P.E. #2 PLASTIC **

3 of 7

TYPE OF PLASTIC: Plastic Bottles, Jugs and Wide Mouth Food Containers. This plastic is normally found in milk, water and detergent bottles and jugs. Wide mouth food containers are normally ice cream, margarine and Cool Whip containers.

HINT: H.D.P.E. bottles, jugs and wide mouth food containers will carry the #2 emblem stamped or molded on the bottom. Some milk and water jugs carry no emblem but they are recyclable.

PREPARATION: REMOVE CAPS, RINGS AND METAL HANDLES AND RINSE CLEAN. This is the most important aspect of a successful recycling program. Bottles that contain liquid residue cannot be recycled. Place #2 plastic bottles in your dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag along with the other recyclable items. Place bin or bag at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be Wednesdays for both solid waste and recyclables. Multi-family dwellings of six or more, remember, your recycling pick up will be the first and third Wednesday of each month.

NOTE: DO NOT place automotive product bottles in the recycling bin or bag.

THE KEY WORD IN PLASTICS: #1 & #2 bottles, jugs and food containers.

Open House Held at Lost Nation Estates Condominiums

Situated on a parcel that includes wetlands, a forest of mature pines and five acre and one acre spring fed and stocked lakes, Lost Nation offers exclusive lakefront living in both ranch and townhouse condominium units. The first of eight planned buildings is now

completed. Two bedroom units are featured both on and off the lake, ranging in size from 2,025 to 4,050 square feet of living space.

Attractive features enhance spacious interiors, such as the towering granite stone gas fireplace with oak mantel, the highlight of the open living space. Esser Honored

Roy J. Esser was born on July 10, 1929 in Lomira. His father was a blacksmith. In 1937 the family moved to a farm north of Campbellsport. Roy graduated from Campbellsport High School.

His family included a brother, Norman, sisters, Sister Jeanette, a nun, Carol Murphy, a nurse from Eden, and Jane Gurno of Fond du Lac, who is a third grade teacher at Campbellsport; one son, Gary, and his wife, Renee, and two grandchildren, Ellisa and

Roy met and married his wife, Dorothy (nee Bizjak), of Crivitz, Wisconsin, while on his first teaching job at Crivitz. They were married July 17, 1954.

Roy received a B.A. degree in Education and Science from the University of Wisconsin River Falls and his Masters Degree in Agriculture Education and credits as a local vocation coordinator from Stout University.

He received education for Administration and Principalship at U.W.M. Oshkosh. In 1952 he taught in the Crivitz High School in the Ag Dept. He also taught Math and Phy Ed. In 1960, he came to Kewaskum replacing Bernard Murray, who in turn went to Crivitz School as an ag teacher, starting in the shop program there.

Roy has been a member of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club for 40 years, serving as its president three times. He headed the Surplus Food Distribution; received the "Recognition of Conservation" award for the program of farmers participating in conservation practices; organized the Swine Breeders of Washington, Sheboygan and Ozaukee Counties, and received plaques for originally orga-

nizing them.

Roy was a Red Cross volunteer, chairman of the Cancer and Heart Fund of Washington County, worked with the United Way when the Y.M.C.A. was built and was on the organization of the Rescue Squad at Crivitz.

As an active member of Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Kewaskum, he served on its council for many years, also is in charge of distributing Communion to shut-ins, is a member of the K.C.'s and Moose organizations, and a member of Citizens Advocacy. He has also served as vice chairman of Farm Progress Days.

As you can see, Roy was an extremely active man who took the time to assist for many people.


Brooke and her group of five tutors offer grade schoolers one-on-one weekly sessions, and it has grown so popular she is looking for more volunteers.

Dear Editor,

I attended the Kewaskum School Board meeting Monday, April 20, 1998. I was surprised at the behavior of the board members. As an accountant working for non-profit service organizations the past seven years, I have attended many board meetings. However, I have never seen a board behave as unprofessionally as the school board acted. Some members of the board were disrespectful of the speakers and of other board members; they did not look at the person talking or appear to be paying attention to what was being said. There were times when someone was speaking and two board members would be whispering with each other. In high school this type of behavior would have been cause for discipline if there was a speaker or another student speaking, yet this is how our school board acted in public.

Another thing that surprised me was the way the board discussed the issues -especially concerning the possible opening of Beechwood School. I expected to see the board going through a logical decision making process. Being familiar with non-profit organizations I realize that money is an important factor, yet the numbers (money and statistics) must be weighed against what is best for the people the organization is serving. Saving money is not always in the best interest of those being served. However, these issues were not debated.

Supporters of opening Beechwood School asked for sound, logical reasons for opening or not opening the school. What they received was an emotional outburst from one board member, and irrelevant comparisons concerning the opening of Beechwood vs. improving Kewaskum Elementary. These two issues are separate in that the opening of Beechwood would ease crowding at Farmington Elementary, and something will still need to be done at Kewaskum Elementary.

A statement was made by the Facility Study Committee Chairperson, yet the board appeared to have disregarded the findings of the committee. Again dismissing a sound, logical way to approach the problem.

Beechwood When

School was closed in 1986 it was a very emotional issue for many people. However, this is a different time and a different situation. I would hope that those members of the board who have emotional ties to that original situation could put it behind them and look at this in an objective manner, and if they cannot, maybe they should reevaluate their position on the board.

We would like to express concern over things that were stated at the last School Board meeting. We were not aware of any threats or tire slashing occurring over the Beechwood issue. However, statements made at the meeting made it sound as though these were recent events. When we asked Board members about this they stated that yes, threats were made on both sides of the issue and tires were slashed 12 years ago. TWELVE YEARS AGO!

Many of us in the Beechwood area were not even involved in this issue twelve years ago. We don't condone threats and certainly don't want things to get volatile. However, we do not consider attending workshops and raising intelligent questions, hostile behavior. Please tell us how repeatedly bringing up the past and mistakes made then, will help our present situation. It does no one any good to continually open old wounds.

The issue of opening Beechwood School or not is one that needs to be looked at objectively. It is dangerous to the entire District when one does not look at the needs of all the children in the District. It needs to be looked at as it relates to the District now, not twelve years ago.

It was also stated at the Board meeting that it must be assumed that we feel our children are not getting a satisfactory education at FES. Just to clarify, all the people we have talked to in Beechwood are satisfied. After all, we have been going there twelve years now. However, we have a school practically in our backyard. BES is part of our community and if it is practical, which we feel it is, can you blame us for wanting it open?

In addition, we don't feel opening BES is a threat to KES's needs. BES was brought to the School Board's attention as a feasible and cost effective solution to overcrowding. (This suggestion came from the facilities planning group and administration.) It also allows for future growth. It has been stated before, whether BES is opened or not, KES still needs to be addressed.

We feel Beechwood should be opened for many reasons: decreased overcrowding in FES and KES, decreased bus time for children, smaller class sizes and increased parent involvement. We feel at \$220,000 to open as is OR \$600,000 to open and addon (the same amount estimated to be spent on Wayne) that opening Beechwood School would be an asset to not only Beechwood, but the entire Dis-

We hope that Board Members let go of the past and look at all issues objectively so they can make the appropriate decisions for the entire District.

Lac Lawrann Wild Flower Sale May 9

Lac Lawrann conservancy volunteers are once again, spending long days potting wild flowers and perennials for their 11th annual sale May 9. Sponsored by the Friends of Lac Lawrann the sale will be from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the conservancy, 300 Schmidt Rd., West Bend.

Preparations for the sale began last fall and continued early this spring with the construction of grape vine trellises which will be sold along with the woodland and prairie wild flowers and hardy perennials. New this year will be the introduction of walking sticks made by the volunteers. While none of the wild flowers for the sale are dug at the conservancy, they come from members and friends property, the raw materials for the walking sticks do come from the conservancy.

From its beginning volunteers have been trying to eradicate Buck Thorn from the conservancy. Buck Thorn, although it is still sold at area nurseries, is invading Wisconsin's natural areas and crowding out native vegetation. Because the volunteers are cutting the Buck Thorn from the conservancy, it is fitting to use the wood for the walking sticks.

Among the thousands of plants available at this year's sale are the favorites: Trillium, Jack -in-the-pulpit, Virginia Blue Bell, purple, white and gray headed Cone Flowers, and Back -eyed Susan. Ferns, herbs, ground covers, a few shrubs, vegetables, (such as rhubarb), water garden plants and house plants will also be available. Other items for sale are grapevine baskets and drying racks, and wild flower seeds

Proceeds from the sale will be used for education materials for the conservancy nature programs, land acquisition and for the building of a nature center. Area residents are invited to join the Friends of Lac Lawrann or become volunteers. Students from area schools participate in yearly field trips at the conservancy and programs for families, children and adults are held weekly in the spring and fall. There is no charge for any of these programs.

Flowers for the sale are all

donated by volunteers and friends. Anyone who has plants to donate or an area that will be used as a building site containing plants should contact, Joan Rosenberger, 692-2491 or Loretta Mierniczak, 334-5787. Blood Root sold at this year's sale originally was dug at the site of the ice rink south of West Bend years ago and put in planting beds at the conservancy.

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
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Village Board Meeting Minutes

Regular Meeting April 6, 1998 8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner presided. All other Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee Andy Pesch and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the March 16, 1998 meeting were approved as printed.

Mr. John Knepel of the accounting firm of Conley McDonald LLP, was present to review and answer questions on the latest audit prepared for the Village of Kewaskum for the year ending December 31, 1997. Mr. Knepel explained the entire audit process and financial statements regarding the General and Utility Funds portion of the audit and associated financial statements. The audit revealed the Village to be in a healthy position.

It was further noted the General Fund ended with a positive balance. The Water Utility reflected a balanced rate of return; this rate of return being 5.50%. It was noted that the PSC has authorized the Village Water Utility to have a rate of return of 8.25%. The Auditors suggested possibly looking into the short form PSC rate adjustment process to account for inflation. The Sewer Utility also ended the year with a positive balance. It was noted that a rate increase was just implemented to help cover the cost of the proposed relief sewer projects. The Village's overall debt is at an estimated 14.2% of what the law provides.

A variety of questions were asked of Mr. Knepel which he answered. Mr. Knepel thanked the staff for their assistance and good records. He further indicated the Administrator and Deputy Clerk do an excellent job on maintaining good records and control over spending, etc.

President Robert Wagner also thanked the staff for a job well done and also thanked the auditors.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Andy Pesch and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board suspended the rules to take action on IX. New Business point A, relating to the acceptance of the audit report. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent."


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

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
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Kewaskum Athletics Post Another Win

Last year's Eastern Wisconsin Conference track champion, Chilton, continues to serve notice that they are going to try to repeat as champs this season.



Sophomore Chris Koth took fourth in the 300m hurdles in 45.9 seconds and also went 10' in the junior varsity (JV) pole vault competition.


