## Wedde Named New District Building, Grounds Supervisor

A new supervisor of the school district's buildings and grounds was approved by the board, after a  $4 \ 1/2$  month vacancy in the position.

Dale Wedde of Jackson was hired in house, replacing Chad Kyle, who broke his two year contract to return to his former employer in California. Kyle resigned on January 2nd of this year, after serving the district for only sixteen months.

Originally from Milwaukee, Wedde moved to Jackson five years ago. His previous experience in the field includes his role as assistant maintenance supervisor for Aurora Health Systems. In April, 1997, he was hired to fill the position of Maintenance Technician for the Kewaskum School district, overseeing repairs, HVAC, plumbing, and electrical service for all the schools. Wedde has been working closely with business manager George Allmann since January, acting as a fill-in and assistant to Allmann to try to get the job done. He was chosen from a list of 30 candidates, narrowed down to five interviewed finalists. Wedde was the only one from within the district. When asked about the direction facility maintenance will take in the future, Dale admits to knowledge of past problems with upkeep. "I don't

dwell on the past, I'm eager to move forward," he points out. "We'll be working on getting all the buildings up to date, and maintaining them to high standards. I think it can be done - I have a positive attitude."

One of the keys to turning things around, as Wedde sees it, will be the restructuring of custodial personnel, changing some positions, and building a stronger work crew.

Annual starting salary is \$45,000 for the 1998-99 school year.

## Fire Destroys Barn in Town Of Barton

Fire destroyed a barn at 7708 Salisbury Road in the Town of Barton on Tuesday morning, May 19. The fire was discovered by a passerby around 7:18 a.m.

Washington County deputies arrived on the scene within minutes and found the barn fully engulfed in flames. The West Bend Fire Department responded and was given assistance by the Kewaskum, Boltonville and Kohlsville fire departments.

A property value was not immediately available for the 40x80 foot barn, which was owned by Todd Watzig. Also lost in the structure fire were two cars and two trailers with a combined value of \$18,000. Four chickens and two rabbits also perished in the fire.

No one was injured in the blaze, and the cause has not as yet been determined but foul play is not suspected.

# Memories...

In honor of the Wayne Sesquicentennial, a resident requested this obit be reprinted from May, 1919

#### FRIEDOLIN BAUMGARTNER

Nearing the century mark, Friedolin Baumgartner, one of the few remaining old pioneers of this county, passed into the Great Beyond at his home in the Town of Wayne on Sunday morning May 18, 1919. He probably was the oldest man in the county, but in spite of this he was hale and hearty, mentally alert and cheerful until March of this year, when he fell very unfortunately and had to remain in bed since on account of injuries which brought on the end, at the age of 97 years, 4 months and 12 days. Deceased was born in Germany on January 6, 1822, and in his native land he married Miss Barbara Brugger. The family came to America in 1846 and settled in the Town of Jackson. In the following year bis wife died, leaving him with three little children. In 1849 he married Mrs. Katherine Kehrein, and the family then moved to the Town of Wayne. He had two sons of the second union. His second wife pre-deceased him in 1871. Of the five children he only leaves one son, Frederick, of the Town of Wayne. He also leaves 18 grandchildren and 46 great-grandchildren. Three generations were brought up on the old homestead in the Town of Wayne.

Deceased led one of those harmonious and wholesome lives that are felt like a blessing and comfort by others. He never was sick in all his many years until the accident befell him, and that even could not curb his humor. A life of this sort is felt as a loss when it ends, at any age. The memory of a gentle, useful and honorable personality will remain of him.

The funeral was held last Wednesday afternoon with services in St. Peter's Lutheran Church in the Town of Addison, Rev. William Weber officiating. Six grandsons of the deceased were the pallbearers. The remains found their last resting place in the cemetery of that congregation.

## Town of Wayne Sesquicentennial Book Available





Ned Sengpiel and June Knowlton Sengpiel's little Munsterlanders have done it again. The German field dogs have gained the Kewaskum couple national notoriety and earned them NAVHDA's

Breeders award for 1997. During this year's annual meeting held in Sioux Falls, S.D. of the North American Versatile Hunting Dog Association, 25 breeder awards were announced, two of which were for Ned and June's 1996 litters. They were

the only breeders in NAVHDA to receive this distinction for Small Munsterlander Pointers, out of a 2700 member association with 23 different breeds.

The couple imported two of these dogs from Germany several years ago to start a kennel line of their own. "Fero" and "Catja" went on to produce four litters and helped establish this hardy breed in the United States and Canada.

Known for versatility as an all around hunting breed and gun dog, the Munsterlander excels in the retrieval of wounded game. Spaniel-like in appearance, the medium size dog is chestnut or roan and white in color, with areas of brown flecking. Quickly adaptable to a variety of terrain or quarry, the breed is becoming a popular and much sought after hunting companion.

Strict requirements for breeding and registering the dog include hip certification, and both parents should have qualified in a NAVHDA Natural Ability Field Test or its equivalent. A breed warden oversees all potential matings in this country.

Ned and June have a reputation for breeding and selling only the best, with a waiting list of people from all over the country hoping for a Munsterlander puppy. From 1965 through 1997, 51 of these dogs were tested in utility, 32 of which came from the Kewaskum kennels. In 1997 alone, eight out of eleven tested were Ned's dogs. "Although I've recently retired to let June take over the breeding,I'm still involved in it all," Ned insists. Their dog Fritz

was the only Munsterlander to makes him a little harder to earn a Prize 1 in the utility test train!" under NAVHDA.

The NAVHDA Breeder's Award is one of the most sought after in the program, and follows a strict list of criteria. At least four pups from one litter must qualify with a minimum point total of 360 points in NAVHDA Natural Ability Tests. With Fritz and Barney as stud dogs for the two recognized litters, Ned and June are ready to try for a Utility Breeder's Award next time around, which requires three littermates earn a minimum of 180 points and a Prize II in NAVHDA Utility tests.

Quoting from the Small Munsterlander newsletter, "Ned and June Sengpiel, without question the top breeders in North America, are a perfect example (of integrity and ethics in breeding). They should be looked at by the rest of S.M. owners as the example. There is a role model for us all!"

Presently, their trainer Mike Kindler of Sandhill Kennels in Brownsville is working with two year old Buddy Boy, Fritz's son. "He's in the process of training right now for a Prize 1 Utility," June explains as Buddy bounds back and forth from owner to trainer. "You can see how he loves him. That's an important bond between a trainer and a dog." The dog has both a Prize 1 in Natural Ability and a Prize 3 Utility, put on him by previous trainer, Dennis Brath of Caden Kennels in Campbellsport. The Sengpiel's hope Buddy Boy will follow in his father's footsteps "He's a very strong dog, and that



The beautiful new monument is of white Vermont granite to match the granite of the Doughboy World War I monument. The bronze



# School Board Approves All-Day Kindergarten

#### By Sharon Callaway Roznik

Beginning in fall, parents of kindergartners attending school in the Kewaskum School District will be able to choose from an all-day or half-day program.

The school board voted 6-1 to approve a new all day, full-time kindergarten program that would reduce bussing costs and increase the amount of state aid the district receives. Lisa Maul voted against the motion.

Full-time kindergarten will be offered at all three elementary schools, with one half-time morning session available only at Kewaskum Elementary.

Children attending the half-day session will be picked up and dropped off at home by the district's shuttle bus. "We're sending out surveys this week to see what the parents' preference is," stated business manager George Allmann.

When approached with the program last year, the board voted against the proposal after listening to a group of parents who felt children at that age were not ready for a full day of school. Lack of space was also a factor in the decision.

At this month's board meeting President Jean Goeden said kindergarten enrollment dropped by approximately 40 students for the 1998-99 school year, freeing up additional classroom space.

Allmann said the oneyear pilot program would generate a net fiscal benefit of around \$40,000, with a \$38,000 increase in state aid for the addition of full time students.

Staffing for the kinder-

garten classes will require adding one and a half teachers, to increase the positions at Wayne and KES. "There would be increased specialist time of about 10%," Allmann reported. The increased teacher costs will run about \$53,000. All kindergarten staff and elementary administrators support the proposal.

Before administration re-introduced the idea to the board, a district survey was sent out to parents. The results showed over 80% of the parents of next year's kindergarten students supported full-day school, with 10% indicating they would still send their children to a half-day program.

Kieth Kriewaldt, Director of Elementary Education, said the move was in the right direction. "I think it's a positive step for our kids and community, and a step that has to be taken as a district, to improve test scores and the childrens' overall performance. Money is not one of the reasons I gave for recommending this."

## Village of Kewaskum NEWS NOTES RECYCLING TIPS \*\* CORRUGATED CARDBOARD \*\*

TYPE OF CORRUGATED CARDBOARD: The cardboard that peels apart with two outside layers is corrugated. The middle section not exposed is wavy or corrugated.

COLORS: Some waxed and pressed cardboard may also be recycled.

**PREPARATION:** Flatten boxes and cut into 2' x 2' pieces. Tie in bundles with twine or strong string. Bundles should be limited to 8" in height. Place bundles at the curb next to the dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag. Place the bin or bag at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be Wednesdays for both solid waste and recyclables. Multi-family dwellings of six or more, remember, your recycling pickup will be the first and third Wednesday of each month.

NOTE: If raining on collection day, please hold cardboard until the following week.





#### Michaels Conference Champ KHS Girls' Track Third at Conference Meet

The Kewaskum High School girls track and field team finished third at the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Track and Field Championships on Thursday, May14th, at Chilton High School. The Chilton girls were the defending champions, but this year they had to settle for the runner-up, as the Raiders from Two Rivers totaled 126 points to 118 points for Chilton. Two Rivers had six first place finishes and finished 1-2 in the 100m dash and 2-3 in the 200m to win the conference title. Kewaskum finished a distant third with 78 points, just one point ahead of New Holstein. Last year Kewaskum finished second at the conference meet with 129 points. Roncalli finished fifth with 74 points, Kiel was sixth with 70 points, Sheboygan Falls finished seventh with 61 points and Plymouth finished eighth with 59 points.

The lone first place that Kewaskum captured was the surprising win by Jackie Michaels in the 300m hurdles. Michaels, fresh off her hurdle wins at the Vanderpan Invitational on Friday, May 8th, lead the entire race and withstood a strong second place finish from teammate and defending conference champ, Carrie Wiesner. Michaels time was 49.9 seconds. Wiesner, who had missed the Vanderpan because of Confirmation, was not in top form because of a sore ankle. Wiesner was timed in 50.0 seconds just 0.1 seconds behind Michaels. "Jackie really did a good job. She ran great tonight. She has been patiently waiting for her turn behind the seniors," commented head coach Joe Kinney

Carrie Wiesner also finished second in the 100m high hurdles with a time of 16.1 seconds. Ehrahardt of Kiel finished first with a time of 16.0 seconds. Teammates Jackie Michaels finished fourth in 16.6 seconds and JoAnne Thull finished fifth in 16.7 seconds. "Carrie has been slowed up by an ankle injury, but she will be ready for regionals next week," remarked coach Kinney.

Sara Dedert had a great day in both the discus and shot put were she recorded two personal records. In the discus Dedert threw 110' 10'' for second place, an improvement of over 9 feet. The winning throw in the discus was 124' 9'' by Pingel of Chilton. In the shot put, Dedert's throw of 34' 1 3/4'' placed her fourth. The winning throw was 38' 5 1/4" by Lisowe of Chilton. "Sara had two PRs (personal records) in the shot and the discus. She really stepped it up. She has really emerged into a very good thrower," commented coach Kinney.

MacKenzie Downs finished third in her specialty, the triple jump with a distance of 31' 8 1/2". Bero of Two Rivers won the triple jump with a distance of 32' 11 1/2". Teammate Jill Wichtoski finished fourth in the long jump with a leap of 14' 4". Bero also won the long jump with a distance of 14' 9 3/4".

Carol Neumann of Kewaskum finished fourth in the 800m run with her fastest time of the season in 2:32.7, even though she didn't feel 100% the day of the meet. Competition was tough with Brianna Dahm of Two Rivers finishing first with an excellent time of 2:20.7, exactly eleven seconds ahead of second place. In the 1600m run, Neumann finished fifth with her fastest time of the season in 5:30.9. Again Dahm, a sophomore, of Two Rivers won with a time of 5:18.1, eight seconds ahead of second place.

# Hammen and Gundrum Conference Champions KHS Boys Track Seventh at Conference Meet

The Kewaskum High School boys track and field team finished seventh at the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Track and Field Championships on Thursday, May 14, at Chilton High School. New Holstein won eight events and in two of those events also finished second to amass 149 points, eighteen points ahead of runner-up Two River's 131 points. Plymouth finished third with 99.5 points, Chilton fourth with 76.5 points, Sheboygan Falls fifth with 68.5 points, Kiel sixth with 62 points, Kewaskum seventh with 52.5 points and Roncalli eighth with 24 points.

Kewaskum scored a very respectful 46.5 points in five of the six field events, but only managed 6 points in the 11 running events.

One of the highlights was the surprise 1-2 finish by Matt Gundrum and freshman Charlie Sparks in the discus. Gundrum won the event with a personal best throw of 152'09", over 15 feet better than his previous. Gundrum had the third best seed distance of 137' 1" and throw his career best throw early in the competition. Later when the number one seed, Ty Mueller of Plymouth threw, he scratched all three of his throws in the trials trying to better Gundrum's throw of 152' 9". Mueller did not have a mark in the trials and therefore did not make the finals. In the finals the top eight athletes get an additional three throws. Sparks, who had the ninth best seed going into the conference meet, unleashed a season best throw of 135' 2", over 10 feet better than his previous. "Both Matt and Charlie threw real well today. I think Gundrum's early throw really put some pressure on the rest of the field," responded throwing Dave Rizzardi. coach Gundrum's throw of 152' 9" was just 7 inches away from the school record of 153' 4". Brian Liegl set the record last year at the conference meet that was also at Chilton.

Matt Hammen won the conference title in the high jump with a leap of 6' 4". Hammen

had his coaches more than just a little concerned when he missed his first two attempts at 6' 2". After clearing 6' 2" on his third attempt, Hammen made 6' 4" on his second attempt at that height, while Malek of Roncalli made 6'4" on his third attempt. Both jumpers were unsuccessful at 6' 5" and thus Hammen won first place on the tie breaking procedure based on the number of attempts needed to clear the last height. "I know that Matt's goal was to be conference champ. I think that having gone 6' 4" the last three meets gave him the confidence he needed tonight," reported head coach Jerry Gosa. Sean Cotter finished in a tie for sixth with a season best jump of 5' 8" in the high jump.

As much as it was a surprise to have a 1-2 finish in the conference meet in the discus, senior Brad Hermann must have wanted some of the spotlight too. Hermann, who had cleared 11' 6 " twice this year in a meet, put his past behind him literally when he went 13' 0" in the pole vault Thursday night. Hermann's success was seen and heard by most of the people at the meet. "I think that Brad Hermann, Ric Robinson (the volunteer pole vault coach), myself, and the pole vaulters were confident that he had the ability to jump this high," reported a happy coach Gosa. "He sure picked a great time to jump well." Hermann finished second in the competition because Hoffmann of Two Rivers cleared every height on his first attempt. Both Hermann and Hoffmann were unsuccessful at 13' 6". Teammate Josh Parrent, a freshmen, finished eighth by clearing 10' 6". "I really think that Brad has the ability to go even higher," remarked coach Robinson.

Matt Gundrum placed third in the shot put competition with a heave of 47' 6 1/2". Soucoup of Two Rivers won the event with a distance of 49' 3 3/4". Gundrum third place was the last top three finish for the Kewaskum boys.

Josh Rieder placed eighth in the long jump with a 17' 4" effort. The triple jump was the


