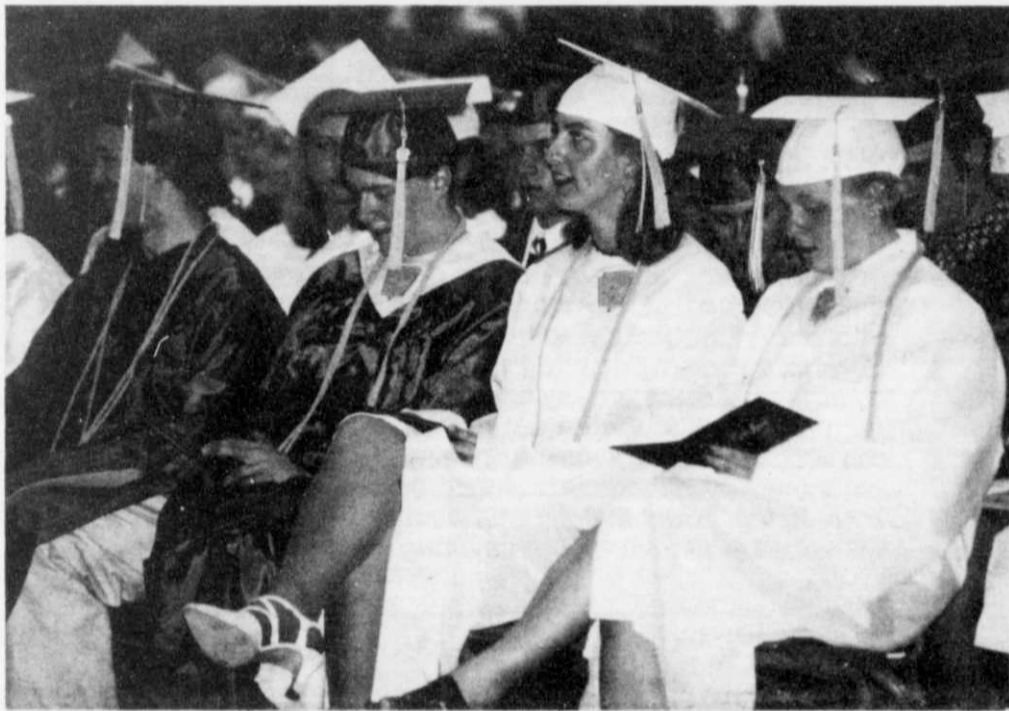

Vandalism at KHS Field House On Graduation Day

Seven Kewaskum High School seniors were excluded from last Friday evening's commencement ceremony due to their involvement in what they considered to be a "graduation prank".

The "prank," which occurred at approximately 1:30 a.m. Friday morning consisted of spreading motor oil, flour and fishing line throughout the stage, bleachers and floor of the field house, where commencement exercises were scheduled to begin at 8 p.m.

Kewaskum Police Officer Mark Steiner, stated he was making a routine building check at the high school when he noticed a door wide open with the lights on in the field house. He investigated and found the defaced field house.

After returning to his squad car he observed a vehicle driving through the area which he immediately

stopped. Therein he found the driver and one occupant. Officer Steiner then radioed for a Washington County squad to remain with the suspect vehicle while he contacted vice principal John Wolfenberg and Police Chief Richard Knoebel.

After a short time, Officer Steiner soon noticed another suspicious vehicle and asked the county squad to stop it. He did so and brought the driver and two occupants back to the field house, where they admitted to the act. The suspects helped clean up and two other individuals were arrested shortly thereafter.

The suspects were issued citations for criminal damage to property with court appearances to be scheduled. They will also be expected to pay restitution to the school district.

Graduation for the rest of the senior class went as planned with a beautiful and classy ceremony in spite of what happened.

Three injured in Hwy 144 accident

TOWN OF FARMINGTON- A two car motor vehicle accident occurred on Memorial Day, May 25, at 9:43 p.m. on STH 144 at CTH H West in the Town of Farmington.

Mabel E. Michalek of Milwaukee, driving a Mercury Topaz, with a passenger James K. Michalek, also of Milwaukee was southbound on STH 144 another vehicle, a Ford Ranger pickup truck operated by Robert W. Birmingham of Wauwatosa was stopped at a stop sign on CTH H, somewhat angled, enabling him to view both north and southbound traffic. He was

preparing to head east.

Michalek stated she thought Birmingham was in her lane of travel, and therefore, swerved to the right to go behind Birmingham. In the process she struck Birmingham broadside on the driver's side of the truck and pushed him onto the passenger's side. The truck then overturned, trapping Birmingham and his passenger, Joyce J. Lubner.

The injured of both vehicles were transported to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend by the Kewaskum Rescue Squad for injuries sustained in the accident.

VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM-A motor vehicle struck a sending unit for the Wisconsin Gas Company on Thursday May 28, at 7:30 a.m. on Second Street at Railroad Street in the Village of Kewaskum.

The sending unit measured gas pressure in Kewaskum and sends it back to Milwaukee.

Amanda L. Schoofs of rural Kewaskum, was driving a Chevrolet van owned by Thomas S. Schoofs, also of rural Kewaskum. According to Kewaskum Police Dept. Officer Thomas Bauer, the accident took place as Schoofs was allegedly eastbound on Second Street. Her vehicle hit a large water puddle in the road, causing her to hydroplane into a pole and the gas line.

Schoofs was not carrying any passengers and was not injured.

Village DPW workers closed off the street while the police department notified Wisconsin Gas and evacuated area residents. Wisconsin Gas in turn came and sealed off the gas line.

Hilltop Mass At Ashford On June 7

Halfway to Heaven... that's how some folks describe the Hilltop Mass at St. Martin's Church, Ashford, which is scheduled for Sunday, June 7 at 10:30 a.m.

People of all faiths join members of the parish at the Hilltop Cross, south of Highway 67, the site where the first cross was erected by pioneers in 1886. In the 60's, the tradition was renewed when a larger cross was again erected.

Today's cross stands 43 feet high with cross pieces about 14 feet. Enjoy the beauty of the rolling countryside while observing the Solemnity of the Holy Mass.

St. Martin's Church is located on Hwy. 67 between Lomira and Campbellsport. Drive your vehicle to the hilltop (follow signs), or park it on the church parking lot and ride free on the shuttle bus, courtesy of Johnson Bus Service. This site is available through the generosity of four land-owners.

The outdoor Mass, celebrated by the Rev. Wayne Barta, will open with a Knights of Columbus Color Guard followed by the VFW and the Lomira Bintzler-Waehler American Legion Post 347 posting the colors. A special parking area for the handicapped is reserved, so that Holy Communion can be brought to the cars.

Following Mass, everyone is invited to family fun at the parish grounds for games, crafts, a bake sale, refreshments, brats, hamburgers, a white elephant sale and a fish pond for the children.

In a recent audit of Medicare, federal investigators revealed that Medicare overpaid health care providers last year by \$23 billion, or 14 percent of all the money spent in the standard Medicare program.

DISPOSING OF LATEX AND OIL-BASED PAINT

GENERAL INFORMATION

Paint stays in good condition for a long time; oil-based paint for up to 15 years and latex paint for 10 years. As a general rule, paint that mixes smoothly when stirred can still be used. If latex paint has been frozen, brush it on a newspaper. If there are no lumps, it hasn't been damaged and can be used.

Disposal of leftover paint through a household hazardous waste program is expensive.

The best thing to do with usable paint is to use it up! If you can't use your leftover paint, give it to someone who can. Give your paint to:

- * friends and neighbors
- * recreation departments
- * park departments
- * theater groups
- * housing assistance organizations

Latex Paint and Mercury

Some latex paint contains mercury, a toxic metal. New federal regulations prohibit the use of mercury in interior latex paint manufactured after August 20, 1990. Be sure to use proper ventilation when applying paint indoors. Use outdoor paints for outdoor use only!

Disposal: When you can't use it up

Proper disposal depends on whether the paint is latex or oil-based. Oil-based paint contains solvents, container labels state "combustible," and the instructions on the can recommend cleanup with mineral spirits or other solvents. Latex paint contains water and the instructions recommend cleanup with water.

Disposal: Oil-Based Paint

The fumes from oil-based paint are a health and fire hazard. Large amounts of oil-based paint should not be disposed of at home.

Disposal: Latex and Small Amounts of Oil-Based Paint

Dry out latex paint and small quantities of oil-based paint according to the following directions:

Step One: Find an outside work area away from children, pets and rain. Locked screen porches and storage sheds work well. Because oil-based paint contains solvents and some latex paint contains mercury, it's important to dry out paint outdoors in a safe place.

Step Two: Dry it out! Choose one of the drying methods described later on in this notice. Paint will take between several days and several months to dry - it depends on the type and quantity of paint that you have.

Step Three: Throw the dried paint, cans and other materials in the trash. Leave the lids off the paint cans so trash collectors will see the paint is dry and accept them.

PAINT DRYING TECHNIQUES

For small amounts (Oil-based and Latex):

Remove the lid and let the paint dry in the can. Stir the paint occasionally to speed drying. Or, brush paint in layers on newspaper or cardboard.

For larger amounts of latex:

Pour one-inch layers of paint into a cardboard box lined with plastic. Allow paint to dry one layer at a time-time layers will speed up the drying process. Or, mix paint with cat litter, sawdust or sand in a cardboard box lined with plastic and let it dry.

For latex paint that has separated:

Pour the clear liquid on top into a cardboard box lined with plastic. Mix the liquid with an equal amount of cat litter or other absorbent material and let it dry. Let the leftover paint in the bottom of the can dry out, using one of the above techniques.

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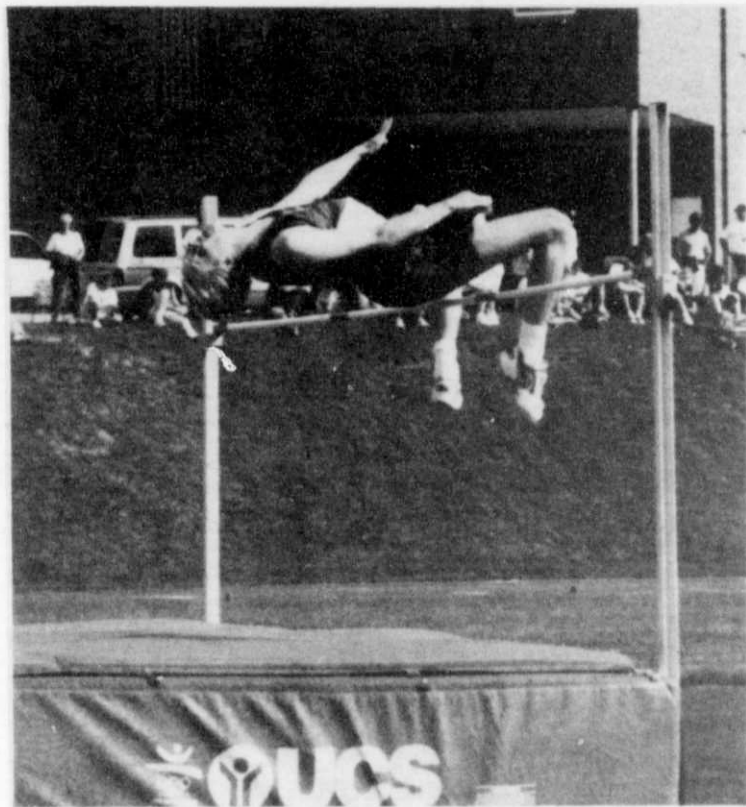


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Hammen Qualifies for State Wins High Jump at Sectional

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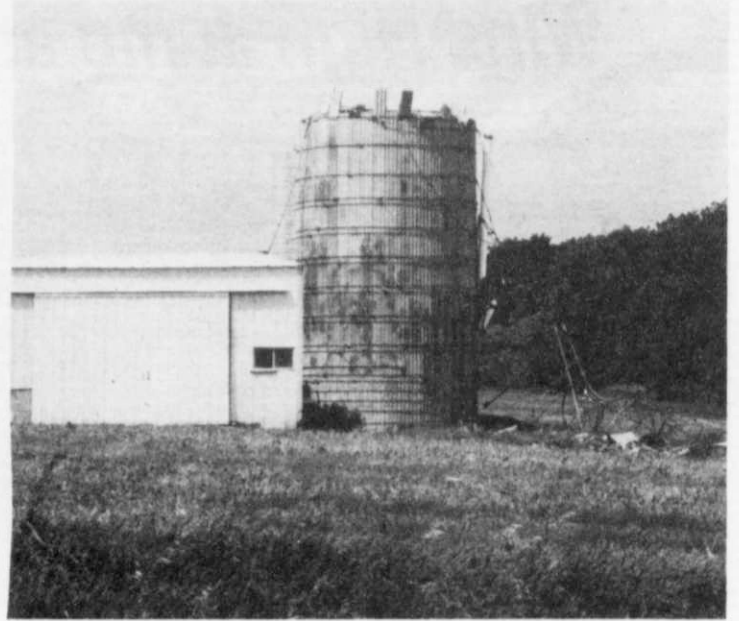
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Violent Storm Wreaks Widespread Damage

Hidden by darkness, violent storms, which meteorologists described as "micro-bursts" and "straight line winds" literally ripped through this area early Sunday morning at approximately 2:55 a.m., causing extensive damage and widespread power outages.

The storm claimed the life of a Town of Erin woman, Margaret M. Bopp, 48, who was killed when winds, clocked as high as 99 miles per hour, toppled a tree onto her home causing structural damage while she slept.

The storms seemed to originate in South Dakota where a severe tornado leveled the town of Spencer. The tornado was associated with the storms that then spread through Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan and

onward to the east coast.

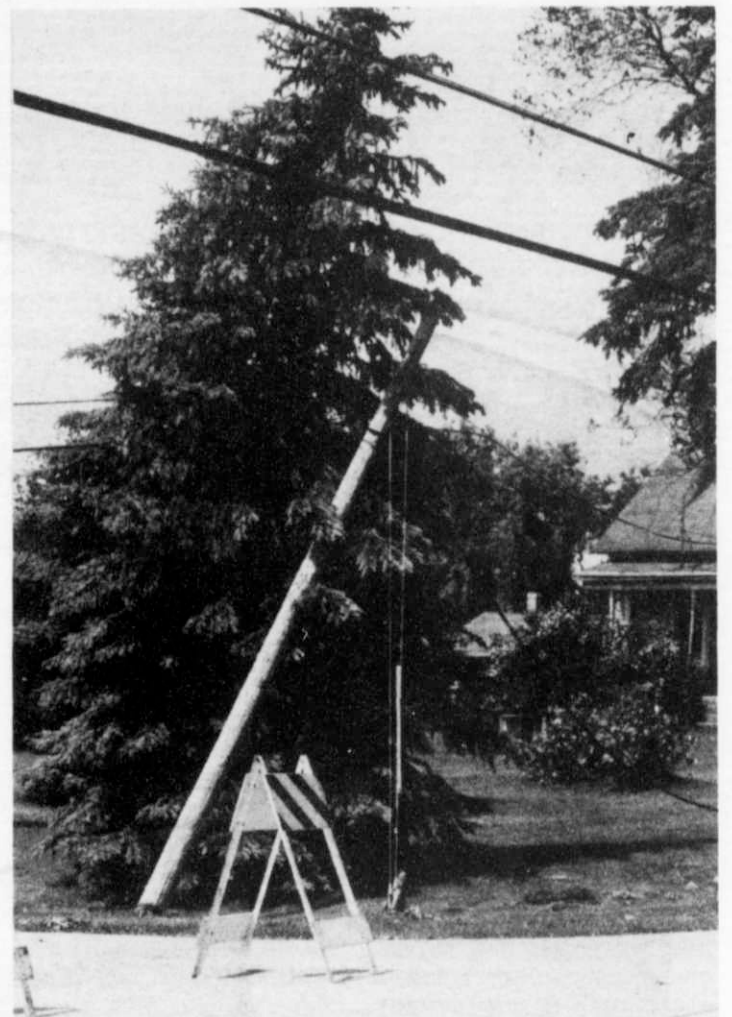
The severe storms seemed to spurn the most damage in this area near the Lomira, Elmore, and New Fane areas where trees were uprooted, electrical wires were torn apart, roofs were blown off and several barns were leveled. Communities to the south of Kewaskum in the West Bend and Milwaukee areas were also hit hard by the storm's fury.

An unconfirmed tornado was spotted northeast of Kewaskum, but it was not able to be verified. However, many residents claimed to hear the loud roar of an oncoming train commonly associated with a tornado's occurrence.

Kewaskum was without electrical power until 9:30 a.m. but neighboring com-

munities were not as lucky as some were still without power as late as Wednesday. The power outages alone wreaked havoc as many closings and cancellations occurred due to lack of electricity.

Most of the storm's damage has since been cleaned up and life goes back to normal, however, many tense moments have been recorded in the memory of many, but as commonly found in tragedy and crises all pitched in to help with cleanup and the old theory of "neighbor helping neighbor" again shone through.

KHS Boys Tie for Fifth at Frosh/Soph Conference Meet Sparks Double Winner

The Kewaskum boys' track and field team finished tied for fifth place at the Eastern Wisconsin Frosh/Soph Conference meet with 64 points on Monday, May 18th, at Plymouth High School. New Holstein dominated the competition by scoring 123.5 points to claim the title. Chilton finished an impressive second with 95 points. Two Rivers finished third with 90 points, host Plymouth placed fourth with 88 points, and Sheboygan Falls tied with Kewaskum for fifth place. Kiel finished seventh with 62 points and Manitowoc Roncalli finished eighth with 56.5 points.

The field events again provided the highlights for the young Kewaskum team. Freshman Charlie Sparks, fresh off his second place finish in the discus at the eastern Wisconsin Conference Championships easily won the event with a solid 126' 11" effort. In the shot put, Sparks threw a personal best of 41' 11 1/2", almost three feet better than his previous best for first place. Sparks also placed fifth in the 100m dash with a time of 12.5 seconds and anchored the 400m relay team to a sixth place finish.

KHS pole vaulters swept the top three places in the pole vault competition. Sophomore and first year vaulter Chris Koth cleared a personal best of 11' 6" to win the event. Joel Hermann, also a sophomore, cleared 10' for second place and freshman, Josh Parrent cleared 9' 6" for third place. While attempting to clear 10' 0" Josh Parrent tumbled off the back of the pit and was taken to the hospital where he required stitches for a cut to his head. "Josh's injury gave everyone a scare. We were upset that something like this happened due to a lack of padding and ill placed railroad ties behind the pit underneath the pole vault weather cover. This should not have happened. We were obviously glad that everything turned out alright for Josh," reported a concerned coach Jerry Gosa. (Josh Parrent had cleared 11' 6" to win the Manitowoc Freshmen meet two weeks earlier.) Kewaskum's Brian Wall would have also placed in the pole vault, but each school was limited in the number of entries for the meet.

Chris Koth also placed third in the 300m intermediate hurdles with a season best time of 47.0 seconds. Teammate Matt Janish finished eighth in the event with a time of 52.5 seconds.

Freshman Paul Mertz, the second seed in the high jump at 5' 8", finished fifth in the event with a jump of 5' 2".

The 400m relay team of Chris Koth, Matt Janisch, Paul Mertz and Charlie Sparks finished sixth with a time of 50.4 seconds. The 1600m relay team of Matt Janisch, Jake Peterson, Troy Kedroske, and Brian Wall finished seventh in 4:21.7.

Joel Hermann placed seventh in the long jump with a jump of 15' 7".

Kewaskum did not score any points in eight events. In four events, the 200m and 400m dash, the 800m run and the triple jump, Kewaskum athletes did not place. In the other four events, the 3200m relay, the 1600m and 3200m runs, and the 110m high hurdles, the Kewaskum boys team did not have any athletes to enter.

"The freshmen and sophomores did a good job this season. The team has some talented individuals in the pole vault, shot put and the discus. We need to attract more athletes, however, to improve our placing in the other field events and the running events. This is a good start to build on, but we definitely need more athletes to compete at a higher level in our conference," concluded coach Gosa.

2) In 10.8 the levels for electrical and radioactivity disturbances should be noted in some format or at least reference to some state or federal rule or policy.

3) In 11.0 the Plan Commission felt there may be a few points

of overkill and that discretion should be used as well as common sense. It was further noted that the requirement to seed some dirt piles, if they weren't leveled within seven days, was not practical.

4) In section 11.4(1), existing site mapping requirements appear to be overkill.

5) In 12.9 the language "beyond a reasonable doubt" should be removed and the new language should be "by preponderance of evidence."

On a motion by Richard Schmidt, seconded by Michael Kimble and carried majority roll call vote, the Commission adjourned the meeting. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 1 "Absent."

ORDINANCE NO. 98-4

AN ORDINANCE TO AMENDING CHAPTER 78 UTILITIES

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN WISH TO CREATE/AMEND CHAPTER 78 - SOLID WASTE AND ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

78-1 Storage of junk, etc., discarded property regulated.

(a) No person shall store junked or discarded property including, without limitation, automobiles, automobile parts, trucks, tractors, refrigerators, furnaces, washing machines, stoves, machinery or machinery parts, wood, bricks, cement blocks or other unsightly debris, except in an enclosure/building which houses such property from public view, or upon permit issued by the Village Board.

(b) The Building Inspector may require by a written order any premises violating this section to be put in compliance within the time specified in such order, and if the order is not complied with, may issue a citation for such violation of this section or proceed to abate the nuisance pursuant to Section 58-6, 7 & 8 of this code, or both.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law.

1999 Fund Distribution Process Underway for United Way

Imagine spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in just 90 days. Sound easy? And, imagine that those funds are not yours, but have been entrusted to you by thousands of donors in Washington County.

No, it's not a raffle or lottery winning disbursement, but the annual Fund Distribution process of the United Way of Washington County. And for the next few weeks, approximately 42 volunteers are involved in reviewing 1999 funding requests from twenty-four human service nonprofit agencies serving county residents.

An important and often overlooked function of United Way is the distribution and monitoring of funds to local agencies.

"Right now, our community volunteers are hard at work reviewing agency programs and funding requests, and asking questions on effectiveness," said Kevin Steiner of West Bend Mutual Insurance

Company. Steiner is the United Way Board Vice President and volunteer Chairperson of the 1999 fund distribution process. "Ultimately, funds that are needed for our member agencies, combined with United Way's operating budget, help us determine our goal for the 1988 Campaign."

It is an effective and efficient way to review what the needs are, and how well United Way dollars were spent in the past year," he said.

"In addition to reviewing agency budgets, the United

Way Board of Directors is committed to making sure our local United Way maximizes its operating budget through the use of volunteers and donations where possible. 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Kewaskum's 'Bohn Boys' to Fish in Tourney

Merc National Fishing Families Experience Sibling Revelry

Like the Bohn Boys of Kewaskum and Fond du Lac, who combine for two father/son teams and one team of brothers. The Bohns, bottom row, left to right, Clancy, Jeremy and Gary, and top, Chad, Al and Ed, admit that while they strive to finish better than their relatives, the main goal is fun.

FOND DU LAC -- Family is an important part of the Mercury National Walleye Tournament being held this year on Saturday and Sunday, June 13 and 14. So much so, that the city of Fond du Lac built the Walleye Weekend Family Festival (June 12-14) around the event. But nothing reflects the family nature of the event like the commonality of surnames on the team roster.

Included among the 30 teams of brothers and 31 father/son teams are the "Bohn Boys," a family of anglers that started fishing the Merc National in 1985, and promises to keep fielding teams for decades to come. Al and Gary of Kewaskum fish as a team. Their brothers, Ed and Clancy, each fish with a son, Jeremy and Chad, respectively; brother against brother, cousin against cousin, uncle against nephew. And, if humor, bravado and fun counted at the scales, the Bohn Boys would finish 1, 2, 3.

"Don't get us wrong," says Ed, "winning would be very nice." "But what really matters is finishing higher than (my brothers)," Clancy interjects. "We take it seri-

ously, but we have fun," he adds. "Of course," counters Ed, "if you don't weigh fish, you're in deep trouble." Talking with the Bohn Boys is a lot like watching a tennis match.

The Bohn women support the effort, cheering on their men at the weigh-in. "The wives have even come to the blast-off a few years," Al says proudly, prompting Gary to admit, "Not my wife. She'd rather have me home working around the house." But the entire Bohn clan -- about 40 in all -- gather for a family fish fry after the final day. "Walleye Weekend is set aside for the entire family. It's one of the few times we all get together outside the holidays," Gary says.

The Bohn Boys started fishing the Merc National when family patriarch, Clarence, Sr., became ill and Al needed a new partner. "(Al) was the only one brave enough to fish with pop," says Clancy. "We just decided we'd all do it." The brothers Bohn fish some other local tournaments, allowing them the opportunity to involve their other children as well as their wives; sister Hope even fished the Merc with Jeremy last year when their

dad had to attend a wedding.

As for the offspring, Chad and Jeremy say there is no pressure fishing with their fathers. "They need us... badly," says Chad, with Jeremy quick to add, "They just don't listen to us very much," proving that the apple doesn't fall far from the tree.

Chad and Albert both have two-year-old children, who they say already love to fish. Gary's 16 year old son can barely wait to turn 18 and start fishing the Merc with his dad.

Turkey Hunters Report High Success Rates for Spring Season

MADISON -- The last of Wisconsin's six spring turkey hunting periods ended Sunday, May 24, bringing to a close a successful and safe season for hunters.

"Harvest figures won't be available until mid-June, but I think the final total will indicate that we had another excellent spring turkey hunting season in 1998," says Keith Warnke, Department of Natural Resources statewide upland wildlife ecologist.

Anecdotal information from wildlife managers and regional wildlife experts suggests above-average success rates statewide. More than 92,000 hunters had received more than 100,000 permits, the highest number available since turkey hunting started again in 1983.

"Overall, weather conditions for successful turkey hunting were great," Warnke said. "Although foliage greened up early this year and there were a few days of rain, there were good weather conditions in every period."

The spring 1998 turkey hunt was a safe one as well,

according to Tim Lawhern, administrator of the hunter education program. "Last spring we had a record high number of accidents, but this year we only had one, and that was typical of the hunting accidents that occur in Wisconsin -- the victim was mistaken for game."

That accident occurred in Green County on Saturday, the second to last day of the season. A hunter was mistaken for a turkey by another hunter in his party, and was struck in the face, shoulders and chest with 13 pellets. Lawhern did not have any other details about the accident.

There were three accidents during the spring 1997 turkey hunting season and four during the fall 1997 turkey hunting season. Typically, a total of one accident is reported from both turkey hunting seasons.

It doesn't matter whether you win or lose, but how you play the game.

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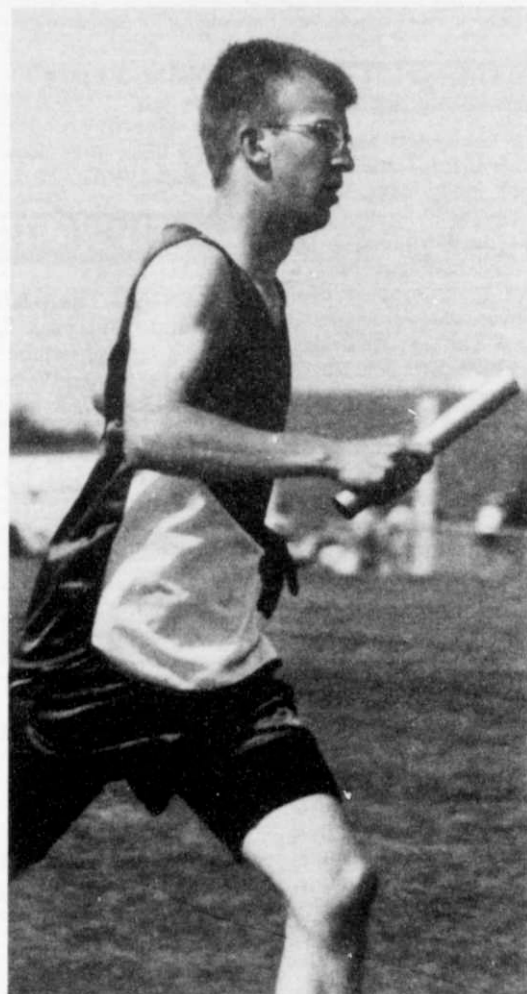

The Kewaskum High School Boys track and field team finished seventh at the WIAA Regional track meet hosted by Kewaskum on Tuesday, May 26th. Grafton won the title by scoring 149 points behind five firsts, three seconds, and eight third place finishes. Eastern Wisconsin Conference champion, New Holstein, finished second with 122 points and Slinger finished third with 109 points. Random Lake finished in fourth place with 76 points, Campbellsport finished fifth with 57 points, Kiel finished sixth with 56 points and Kewaskum finished seventh with 55 points. Sheboygan Falls finished eighth with 38 points.

The highlights for Kewaskum include the advancement of Matt Hammen, Matt Gundrum, and Chris Koth to sectional competition on Thursday, May 28th, at East Troy.

Matt Hammen easily won the high jump by clearing a personal best of 6'5" - even inches ahead of second place. "Matt has worked very hard and has maintained his focus throughout the season," commented boys head coach Jerry Gosa. Hammen is just one inch off the school record of 6'6" set by Travis Jacak in 1995.

Sophomore Chris Koth placed second in the pole vault with a jump of 11'6". The coaches weren't surprised that Koth cleared 11'6", but were surprised when Brad Hermann only cleared 11'6" and then only after almost going out at 11'. A total of four athletes cleared 11'6", but based on number of misses on cleared heights, Koth finished second and Hermann finished fourth. "Chris did an excellent job of clearing each height on his first attempt. That was the difference between placing in the top three and advancing to sectionals. We were obviously very happy for Chris, but disappointed for Brad who is a senior. 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KHS Girls Track Second At Kewaskum Regional

Five Individuals, Relay Team Advance

The Kewaskum High School girls track and field team placed second at the WIAA Regional track and field meet held at Kewaskum on Tuesday, May 26th. Slinger, the Washington County Outdoor champions, won the regional title by scoring 131 points to 102 points for Kewaskum. Slinger scored six firsts, three seconds, and three third places. Kewaskum had one first place, three seconds, and two third place finishes. The top three individuals and top relays advance to sectional competition on Thursday, May 28, at East Troy.

The highlights for Kewaskum include one first place finish by MacKenzie Downs in the triple jump with a season best distance of 32' 5 1/4". "MacKenzie did well in the triple jump. She will have to knock out a 34-35' jump to get to state. She usually does well in big meets so we are hoping she will step up to the challenge and jump a personal record," reported coach Joe Kinney.

Carol Neumann finished second in the 1600m run with a time of 5:40.3, just two seconds behind Amber Arthur of Sheboygan Falls. "Carol has the times needed to make it to state, but she will have to push it because it is a tough group of runners at the sectional meet," commented coach Kinney on Neumann's chances on Thursday.

The 400m relay team of Jenny Fettig, Lynn Wiesner, Jody Wichtoski, and Heather Rieder also finished second with a time of 54.8.

Carrie Wiesner, who has been battling an ankle injury the last three weeks, placed second in the 300m low hurdles with a time of 50.4 seconds for the right to advance to sectionals. Teammate Jackie Michaels didn't fare as well and finished fourth with a time of 51.6 seconds.

JoAnne Thull earned a trip to sectionals with a third place finish in the 100m high hurdles with a time of 17.0 seconds. Jackie Michaels finished fourth in 17.3 seconds and Carrie Wiesner finished fifth with a time of 17.6 seconds.

Wiesner qualified and placed seventh in both the 100m high hurdles and the 300m low hurdles at the state meet last year.

Sara Dedert placed third in

the discus with a throw of 105'5" to qualify for sectionals. Dedert threw a personal best of 34' 1 1/2" in the shot put but had to settle for fourth place. The winning throw was 37' 6 3/4". "Sara has done a great job this season. She has continually improved. We cannot ask for more. I would like to see her advance, but she will have to win in a very tough field," sighed coach Kinney.

The Kewaskum 800m relay team of JoAnne Thull, Tina Lindgren, Lynn Wiesner, and Jackie Michaels finished fourth with a time of 1:55.7.

Jessie Repovsch placed fifth in the high jump with a height of 4'8" and Tina Lindgren also placed fifth in the 100m dash in 14.3 seconds.

The Kewaskum 3200m relay team of Emily Rinzel, Crystal Heberer, Lauren Steinhardt, and Colleen Gosa finished sixth with a time of 10:55.1. "Lauren and Colleen ran extremely well. Both ran personal best times of 2:37 and 2:36 respectively for their 800m splits," commented distance coach Jerry Gosa.

Finishing sixth individually were Jenny Fettig in the 100m dash with a time of 14.5 seconds, Carol Neumann in the 800m run with a time of 2:34.5 and Amber Averill in the 400m dash in a personal best of 1:06.9.

The 1600m relay team of Jessie Repovsch, Michelle Zingsheim, Brooke Zanow, and Emmy Foerster finished sixth with a time of 4:37.1.

Lynn Wiesner finished seventh in the 200m dash with a time of 29.8 seconds and teammate Tina Lindgren finished eighth with a time of 30.7 seconds.

Emmy Foerster finished eighth in the 400m dash in 1:07.6 and Colleen Gosa also finished eighth in the discus with a throw of 85'1".

When asked about the meet, coach Kinney responded, "The meet went very well. The team did a great job hosting a big meet. We had some success in the hurdles moving JoAnne and Carrie on to sectionals. Carrie, however, has a severe ankle sprain and will have to rest in order to run on Thursday. Even then I'm not sure she will be at full speed. The ankle prevented her from qualifying in the 100m hurdles, an event she went to State in last year."

KHS Girls Tie for 15th at Sectionals

The track season always begins with a lot of high hopes and dreams of advancing to state competition, but reality sets in as the track athletes advance from regionals to sectionals. Such was the case for the members of the Kewaskum girls track team as none of the sectional qualifiers advanced to state competition. Qualifying for the state meet were the first two finishers in each event. Carol Neumann had the highest finish for the Kewaskum girls track and field team when she finished third in the 1600m run with a time of 5:42.4. "Carol Neumann had our best finish of the night. She had a good time, but 5:42 is not going to make it to state. Carol has run better this season. The high humidity and heat made the times for all the distance people slow," commented coach Joe Kinney.

JoAnne Thull finished fourth in the 100m high hurdles with a career best time of 16.7 seconds and Carrie Wiesner finished sixth in the 300m low hurdles with a time of 50.1 seconds. "JoAnne had the best time of her high school career in the 100m high hurdles (16.1 seconds in the prelims) and ran very well in the finals finishing fourth. "It was a really tough field with two 35' jumpers and two 34' jumpers in the triple jump and the discus was almost unbelievable with four throwers from this sectional qualifying for state. The top two throwers at state are from our sectional. They threw 138'10" and 140'8", reported coach Kinney.

The Kewaskum 400m relay team of Jenny Fettig, Lynn Wiesner, Jody Wichtoski and Heather Rieder ran their fastest time of the season, 54.4 seconds, but finished tenth.

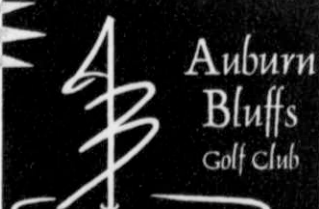
