
Matt Hammen, Kewaskum High School star high jumper, placed third in the Division Two high jump at the WIAA State Track and Field Meet on Saturday, June 6, at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse.

Hammen cleared 6'4" without any misses to give him third place. Three other jumpers also cleared 6'4" each but had misses at earlier heights and therefore placed fourth through sixth.

Scott Berggren of Hortonville won the high jump with a height of 6'8" and Ladell Pope of Monona Grove placed second with a height of 6'5".

"Matt's consistency has been a major reason in his success this season. Clearing 6'4" without a miss was the determining factor in his third place finish. We're all very happy and proud of him," reported coach Jerry Gosa.

High jump coach Keith Amundson remarked that, "Matt's done a great job all season. He handled the pressure at the state meet without a problem. I've really enjoyed working with Matt. He had a great ending to his high school career."

With only a few slight changes, the school district's 1998-99 proposed budget was approved for presentation at the Annual Meeting.

The proposed budget of \$14,684,272.00 in anticipated revenues reflects an increase over last year of 0.11%, and \$14,918,945.00 in proposed expenditures shows a percent change of 0.18%.

Business manager George Allmann discussed the budget with school board members, explaining some of the line items and reasons for the change in dollar figures over last year.

Approximately \$36,500 represents money that will be received from other districts who have students attending Kewaskum district schools, up 104% over lasted year's budgeted figure of \$25,000. In turn, the district has allocated \$121,500.00 to pay the tuition of students who attend other districts under the state's open enrollment program.

Other major changes in expenditures occurred in the following areas: undifferentiated curriculum rose \$145,507.00 or 6.73% from the inclusion of a contingency fund of approximately \$80,000.00. Differentiated curriculum increased due to the addition of an at-risk teacher, a .5 alternative high school instructor, and a .6 reading teacher at Wayne Elementary School. The major increase in both accounts, and in special education funding and co-curricular activities represents salary and fringe benefit increases.


Allmann indicated that there are no plans to allocate any monies from the fund balance at this time. Last year, \$285,000.000 was allocated to blacktop the parking lots and fence in the football field.

As presented and estimating a 3% growth in the equalized value of the district from 1997-98 to 1998-99 (\$584,000,000.00), and utilizing the same general state aid as last year, the estimated tax rate would be \$10.56 per thousand of equalized value, the same as the last two years.

The school district is also planning to ask taxpayers to defease \$500,000 to reduce long term debt. That amount would reflect a 22% drop in debt service revenue, and a 19.58% decrease in expenditures.

"I believe that the entire district has made a concerted effort to hold costs in line, and yet provide the fiscal means whereby all students of the district will receive a quality education," Allmann told the board.

The new budget will be proposed and decided upon by the electors at the annual school district meeting, set for July 27th.

Of Beechwood School

Electorate attending the Kewaskum School District Annual Meeting will decide if Beechwood School should be sold.

School board members voted 6-1 Monday night on a resolution to allow listing the sale of the vacant Beechwood Elementary School as one of the agenda items at the Annual Meeting and Budget Hearing scheduled for July 27th at 7 p.m.

After last month's vote to keep the opening of Beechwood School off future building referendums, the board majority backed a plan that would level the red brick Kewaskum Elementary School to make way for a new school on the same site. With Beechwood out of the picture, school board members thought it fiscally responsible to eliminate the neighborhood school from the district's budget after twelve years of unuse as an elementary school.

"This should have been done twelve years ago," Larry Fechter told other board members. Fechter, who previously backed voter's choice regarding reopening Beechwood school, seconded the motion to let the public vote on selling the building. President Jean Goeden, who served on the school board in 1989, said the sale of the school was voted on at that year's annual meeting, and failed." The public was given a chance to do it," she

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

Village Board Discusses Emergency Situations

The Kewaskum Village Board met last week Monday and swiftly handled matters at hand. Trustee Warren Dums was absent, all other members were present.

Assistant Fire Chief Mark Herriges gave his report for the month of April. Trustee Gary Gavin asked "When the power went out what kind of problems did the fire station have?" (Referring to the storm that hit the area on Sunday, May 31.)

Herriges stated there were none. The generators were used which made some of the lights and all of the garage doors operational.

President Robert Wagner asked why the siren did not go off that morning. Administrator Daniel Schmidt explained that the county did not issue a warning and therefore the siren did not go off. The Village attempted to activate the siren but could not due to loss of power.

Schmidt also explained that "there is only one location where it may be possible to hook the siren up and have it be here at the municipal building."

Police Chief Richard Knoebel stated it is being looked into at this time. Schmidt reiterated that the generator may not be large enough to handle the siren.

Another point brought up by President Wagner, was the fact that all the gas pumps in the village are run by electricity and in the case of a power outage, fuel may be inaccessible to police officers on duty. Chief Knoebel answered, " as soon as we found that out, I called the Sheriff's Department. They said we could fill up down there and they'd keep a car in the area."

He went on to say in this situation "The Sheriff's Department was going to provide us with gas."

President Wagner asked Department of Public Works Director Jerry Gilles "what would it take to have the pumps wired up at the village garage?" He answered, "The village garage does not have any auxiliary power. I've been looking into this. I asked Lakeview Electric for the different costs (of doing this). It is an expense to get emergency power into the building," Gilles concluded.

Chief Knoebel reported that the 1996 Ford Crown Victoria was sold at an auction for \$7,200. "We realized about a \$1,000 more selling through the auction." Knoebel also introduced the board to the new speedboard purchased by the village. The board is set on the back of a squad car and monitors speed of oncoming traffic. He also indicated that if residents would like the sign put in their neighborhood they should call the station.Trustee Gavin applauded the speed board saying "I think it's nice.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles gave his bi-weekly report. He indicated the generator purchased last winter at the number two pump house worked very well. In general there were no real problems. "I'm happy we weathered the storm as well as we did," he concluded. Chipping has also been going well he stated.

Administrator Schmidt added that mutual aid was given to Lomira and Campbellsport with portable generation and the brush chipper. With that Gilles said he was impressed with the command center and communications they had at Lomira and hoped maybe the village would want to purchase a high-band radio for the department of public works to keep communications open between everyone in case of an emergency situation.

Knoebel agreed, stating "one of our problems we have is the DPW is on low-band. They are the only ones on low-band in the whole area, and that's a problem with the radio system."

Knoebel continued by saying, "I don't know how long your (radio) system is going to last. Eventually

you might want to think about switching to high-band." Schmidt finished the conversation by saying it is listed on the capital improvements for next year.

Administrator Schmidt informed the board of 18 operators licenses for 1998/99 and they were approved. He also indicated that the final order for fireworks were placed. "We ordered an additional \$700 worth (of fireworks) from donations we received through Lana (Kuehl) at the Statesman office in the containers she's been manning" as well as other donations.

Trustee Gavin summarized his earlier public works committee meeting stating four areas of unfit storm sewers are being looked at . "Two are being tabled and the remaining two are being sent back to (DPW director) Jerry (Gilles) to check into having a fifty-fifty split with the property owners."

Trustee John Kenworthy gave an update on the tree planting occurring on Fond du Lac Avenue in front of the Kewaskum Mall and Timblin Property Management Building. Administrator Schmidt stated "Bill Geidel from the Sentry store is not happy with them (the trees), and he would ask we not put any more trees in. He says they are going to be a detriment to his customers, a safety hazard and so forth."

Trustee Gavin asked how Mr. Geidel felt it was going to be a detriment.

Schmidt answered that, Geidel said, "It' is going to block vision, it's going to block the view from the road, from the store." The board then was informed that three trees were pending being planted.

Gavin reiterated, "We're not planting them cause he (Geidel) didn't want 'em."

Gilles added, "We're not planting them pending a board meeting."

"He wanted us to talk about it tonight and that's why those three were not planted." said Wagner.

Trustee Gavin said, "We can solve the problem, if three years down the road it's a problem, cut 'em down. I mean it's not that big of a deal."

President Wagner asked Gilles if he talked to Kewaskum Mall owner Tom Timblin. He said yes, that there were not any problems brought to him so far from Mr. Timblin. After further discussion, Trustee Gavin, with a sigh said, "plant the trees."

Trustee Kenworthy summarized his meeting with the library board saying, "Circulation again was up. One thing that was not good is the circulation for within the county outside the village limits is still down."

He also informed the board of an officer's election. Frank Beesten is now the president, Clark Pearson is Vice President, newcomer Margaret McFadden is Secretary and Cheryl Ammel will remain as treasurer. Concluding his summary; he stated that the summer help is now in full force, shelving the books.

The board finished up discussion on financing options for the relief sewer, sanitary sewer, storm sewer, water main and street improvemnts and will be financing \$750,000.

The board ran through granting licenses and permits for summer functions and gatherings and then moved to setting one meeting for July instead of two because of the holiday.

Before members called for adjournment, Trustee Gavin commented on the recent vandalism done at the High School Field He commended House. Superintendent Clark Pearson on his moving speech and also class speaker Joshua Dieringer. Gavin stated "I was disappointed in the vandalism that occurred at the school the night before. When I say vandalism, that wasn't to me a hoax or something funny! I think it was a shame what happened and I think the village should recommend something to the school system that these kids don't spend any jail time or something like that, but, along with their sentencing, they should have to do some type of community service to show these other kids in the school that this isn't something that should be taken lightly. They're all real good kids and if they weren't caught that night, who knows who they would have been going after, there might have been a

stated. "We have a right to lease it if it isn't sold (this time around); lease it or board it up and close it down completely. They (the town residents) can use Farmington's (summer) library."

If voters fail to approve the sale, the district does have the option of leasing the building to a group or organization. Board member Jon Downs said he hoped that consideration would be given to offering the building and land to the Town of Scott, an option that would allow Beechwood residents a chance to put the building to a community use, if voters approve the sale.

Casting the one vote against the resolution, John Schulte said he was concerned with the fact referendums have not yet

been passed, so deciding the fate of Beechwood was premature. "I think the (building) plan we have right now is a poor plan. I think the public distrusts us and a new approach has to be taken. The board was narrowly split (on the Beechwood referendum), there was a lot of public sup-

board was narrowly split (on the Beechwood referendum), there was a lot of public support, and I think this will have an affect," Schulte pointed out, regarding future support of a building referendum.

District Administrator Clark Pearson admitted it was still an emotional issue for constituents in the Beechwood area. Putting it to a vote at the annual meeting would let school district residents decide to keep it or get rid of it. The resolution passed on a 6-1 vote.

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New Child Care and Preschool Opens Here

At Dream a Little Dream Child Care and Preschool, the children spontaneously present visitors with pictures they've drawn on raggedly cut out bits of paper. It could amount to a squiggle of brown across a paper scrap, but nonetheless it's a genuine creation, much encouraged at Kewaskum's newest child care facility.

Located at the home of teacher and caregiver Julianna Colson, the business opened on Park Place, approximately four weeks ago. The Colson family moved here from Menomonee when Julianna's husband Michael decided to take a new job as a computer programmer at Dairyland Seed. Given the opportunity, and after nine years as a child care provider, Julianna says she is happy to be able to pursue her career choice in their new home town.

"A lot of people don't see family child care as a business. This is a profession that goes unrecognized as a career, but we are not just babysitters," Julianna points out, "We have a set curriculum that focuses on quality time and specialized attention." Her list of credentials define the high level of devotion and dedication Julianna sets for herself and her business. Participating in a program sponsored by the National Association for Family Child Care Providers, she is currently in the process of earning national validation granted to child care providers that meet stringent criteria. To be granted accreditation, the provider has to be licensed for a certain number of years, earn points through six hours of evaluation by a validator, and meet with another six hours of evaluation by a parent validator. These assessments are then sent to a national board for final grading and accreditation. "In this town, as far as I'm aware of, I'm the only one who has achieved this," Colson explains. "In large group centers they experience too much of a turnover to be able to evaluate caregivers. You have to work at one place for a certain number

of years."

Julianna's career in child care began when she chose to say home when her son Kyle was born, and later chose to home school both her children. She is certified by the state to teach preschool, and attends 120 hours each year of continuing education, seminars and workshops. (State laws discourage unlicensed childcare providers, limiting them to caring for no more than three children in their home).

"Kids feel at home here, and they are treated like my own children," Julianna confirms, pointing out bulletin boards in the entry way that inform parents of the weekly meal schedule, a dental hygiene program, and the basic philosophies that guide Dream A Little Dream. "Children really blossom when we read and sing to them. There's no television here, it's hands on learning. We use the computer for a half hour each day for educational purposes."

An outdoor play area provides an opportunity to explore science, like bubble making, and a nature trail leads from the backyard through a wooded area, to Kewaskum's Kiwanis Park.

"It's important for them to be able to interact with nature,



lot of hardship. The whole ceremony might have been interrupted. I don't think this should be taken lightly; it shouldn't be brushed under the rug. My feeling is they should do community service, and I'm talking, if it means going up to the high school and cutting the grass during the summer or whatever it might be."

He continued by saying he attended two graduation parties and many of the kids felt they (the vandals) should not just be slapped on the wrists and let go. That would be very unjust.

Knoebel stated they were being charged with criminal damage to property and restitution, "it could reach into thousands of dollars." Knoebel also stated he did not know if our court has a community service option.

Gavin recommended the village send a letter to the judge asking for this option.

Knoebel also stated, "it is not being swept under the carpet." Gavin interrupted "I said I DON'T want it swept under the carpet, I didn't say it WAS being swept under the carpet. If they (the vandals) weren't caught that night, they would have went after totally different kids than these kids. These kids would have been on the bottom of the totem pole. It would have interrupted these other kids' night. Fortunately these kids were caught. There could have been a lot of bad feelings put out on this whole thing- It shouldn't be taken lightly! There is no reason to send these kids to jail or anything else, but on the same token, if their not out there in the public, seeing that they can't get away with this, other than a fine-money... you can make it zero as far as a fine. I'm talking about going up there and letting these other kids see what these kids did. That there is a price to pay for it. "

Gavin again forcefully made his point that something other than a fine should be done. Misunderstanding Gavin, again Knoebel again said it was not being swept under the carpet. Gavin's voice rose as he repeated, "I said I don't want it swept under the carpet! I'm saying let the other kids know this won't be tolerated!"

Trustee Kenworthy jumped in, saying he thought it looked bad for the community and many people outside of the community are saying "Those are A students what are your F students like?"

Gavin then made a motion that a letter be sent to the municipal judge asking that community service be imposed upon these vandals. The motion passed with all voting in favor except Trustee Andrew Pesch.

Marshall H. "Skip" Boyd, 67, loving husband and father, life-long educator, died on Monday, June 1, 1998, of cancer at his home in Portage.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Mid-Monthly Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner asked to be excused and was absent. The Administrator called the meeting to order and took roll. Trustee Harry Roecker asked to be excused and was absent, all other Trustees were present. A quorum was present. 

Welch Leads Sesquicentennial Wagon Train



Kewaskum resident Rick Welch, wagon trail boss of the Wagons of Wisconsin Sesquicentennial wagon train, is shown above using modern communications technology to keep in touch during the historic journey made by over 200 costumed participants re-enacting the travels of early pioneers on the Green Bay corridor.

The corridor, a 200-mile trade route between Kenosha and Kewaunee, eventually paved the way to Wisconsin's statehood on May 29, 1848. Twenty-five authentic covered wagons, pulled by over 70 horses traveling at speeds of less than four miles per hour, made overnight stops in 15 Wisconsin communities during the first two weeks in June.

The train originated May 29 in Pleasant Prairie. Their journey ends Sunday, June 14, at Kewaunee County Fair grounds in Luxemburg.

Welch is vice president of Wagons of Wisconsin, a group of horse enthusiasts who are donating their time and resources to re-enact the event. On another day, another time peace shall return; flowers again will grace the pathway; and the majesty of the trees shall be restored. Indeed, we have faith in Mother Nature.





Boat Away from Shore to Prevent User Conflicts and Accidents

Operating motorboats away from shorelines of lakes can help prevent accidents and reduce conflicts with other lake users and property owners, Conservation Warden Doug Bilgo says.

The closer a boat is to shore, the more congested the waters are with other boats and swimmers, and the greater your likelihood of having a near-miss or an accident, Warden Bilgo says.

For that reason, and to reduce conflicts with lakeshore property owners, and with anglers and canoeists who are fishing or paddling near the shore, people are encouraged to venture farther out.

Wisconsin has 543,034 registered motorized boats and sailboats and attracts another estimated 300,000 boats from out of state. In addition, Wisconsin residents own an estimated 326,000 canoes, kayaks and other nonmotorized boats.

Statewide, motorboats must obey a slow no-wake speed within 100 feet of any dock, swimming raft, pier, or restricted area marked with buoys. Starting August 1, personal watercraft operators are required to operate at slow no wake speeds within 200 feet of the shoreline of lakes.

In addition, motorboats may not be operated at a speed greater than slow no wake on lakes 50 acres or less having public access, except when such lakes serve as thoroughfares between two or more navigable lakes.

Municipal governments are in charge of setting rules on lakes relative to local conditions, such as no wake zones, and hours for water-skiing. Some municipalities in the state have expanded no-wake zones in recent years as the number of boaters has increased and



governments have sought to better protect swimmers and reduce noise complaints from shoreline property owners.
