Three Injured in **Campbellsport Teen** Separate Accidents on CTH S **Killed in Car Accident**

TOWN OF AUBURN- A 19 year old Campbellsport man lost his life in a two-car traffic vehicle accident that occurred on Friday, July 22, at 12:43 a.m. on CTH V one tenth mile north of Century Dr. in the Town of Auburn, just south of the Campbellsport village limits

According to the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department, Michael J. Bartoli, of rural Campbellsport, driving a Plymouth Horizon, was southbound on CTH V.

Bartoli attempted to turn eastbound into his driveway from CTH V. As he made the turn he was sideswiped by a Chevrolet pick-up truck driven by Patrick G. Lindsley of Campbellsport. Lindsley was attempting to pass Bartoli in the northbound lane. The vehicles collided and came to rest in the east ditch.

Heather M. Mitchell, 23, of Kewaskum, was a passenger in the Lindsley vehicle.

It is alleged alcohol may have been a contributing factor in the accident in regards to the Lindsley vehicle.

Bartoli passed away approximately 30 minutes after the accident, following extrication from his vehicle.

Lindsley and Mitchell were transported to St. Agnes Hospital, in Fond du Lac, were they were treated and released.

According to a representative of the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department, they are not searching for a third vehicle rumored to be involved in the crash.

The crash is still under investigation.

TOWN OF AUBURN- A 17year-old Campbellsport youth was injured in a two-car traffic accident that occurred on Thursday, July 30, at 4:25 p.m. on CTH S at Earl Ct. in the Town of Auburn, just north of the Kewaskum village limits.

According to a Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department report, Kristina N. Settingsgaard, of rural Campbellsport, driving a Pontiac Grand Am, was southbound on CTH S.

Settingsgaard rear-ended a southbound dump truck driven by Frank E. Flasch, 42, of Campbellsport as he was mak-

ing a left hand turn onto Earl

Settingsgaard was attempting to pass the dump truck, but, noticed Flasch was making a left hand turn, she veared back to the right striking Flasch. Settingsgaard's vehicle came to rest in the ditch east of the roadway.

There were no passengers in either vehicle.

Settingsgaard was transported to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend by Kewaskum Rescue Squad, where she was treated and released.


MESQUITE GRILLED CHICKEN WITH HONEY HORSERADISH SAUCE

- 6 chicken breasts, boneless and skinless, 4 oz. each 1 large onion, sliced in
- rings 6 tablespoons prepared
- horseradish 2 tablespoons
- Worcestershire sauce
- 1 1/2 teaspoons white pepper 3/4 cup honey
- 3/4 cup dijon-style mustard

Grill chicken breasts using mesquite chips. While chicken cooks, prepare sauce: saute onion in large skillet on low heat until translucent. Add Worcestershire sauce and cook onions until completely done. Add all other ingredients and cook an additional 12 minutes. When chicken is done, remove from grill, add directly to the sauce and coat well. Serve on a bed of rice garnished with chopped parsley and lemon slice.


This was the temporary location of the Yoost Butcher Shop while the new building was being erected.



As most residents of the Kewaskum School District already know, there will be a referendum concerning the building of a new KES, additions and improve-ments to FES and WES, improvements to the KHS and a new administration building. The total cost of these projects would not exceed \$12,000,000.00. The way it has been set up by the school board, it would have an impact on your property taxes of \$35.00 on home assessed at \$100,000, \$52.00 on a home assessed at \$150,000 or \$70 on a home assessed at \$200,000 per year. I think the school board has done an exceptional job of keeping the cost minimal.

There are some people in the district that believe they have a grievance about the Beechwood issue and perhaps rightfully so, but the schools in this district have been operating as is for 12 years and have had few problems. 



St. Bridget's parishioners, their families and friends, gathered after the closing Mass for an outdoor breakfast.







ATV Accidents On the Rise Following Years of Decline

The death July 21 of a six-year-old boy who was injured three days earlier in an all-terrain vehicle accident that killed his mother has brought to four the number of people killed in all-terrain vehicle (ATV) accidents in July, as many as died in all of 1997.

This somber start to the busiest time of the ATV season is spurring Warden Doug Bilgo to caution operators of the recreation machines to slow down and to wear their helmets.

The boy who became the latest fatality was a passenger on the ATV his mother was driving in Oconto County when she lost control of the machine as it struck the shoulder along the side of the route. The ATV hit a tree head-on; the woman died at the scene and her son was hospitalized with head injuries and died on July 21. Neither was wearing a helmet.

Two other Wisconsin residents were killed in ATV accidents in the last two weeks; a 14-year-old boy died July 11 when his ATV struck a car head-on on a gravel road in Marathon County, and a 21-year-old man died July 17 when his ATV struck an obstruction on a trail in Racine County and he was thrown 100 feet.

A 23-year-old man was killed May 31 when his ATV struck a log. The man had a blood alcohol level of .145, over the legal limit of .10.

The five deaths recorded thus far in 1998 reverse what had been a trend of declining fatalities even as the number of people owning ATVs has swelled to more than 90,000, nearly double the number of a decade ago. The fatality rate has dropped from nearly 25 fatalities per 100,000 machines in 1990 to 4.46 fatalities per 100,000 last year. Last year's death toll of four people was the lowest since the DNR began tracking ATV accidents.

Historically, most accidents have involved ATV rollovers or the machines striking a fixed object such as a tree. ATVs have high ground clearance and short, narrow wheel bases, which, combined with seating that straddles the top of the machine and the traction of the wide knobby tires, causes the machines to roll rather than to skid in curves and on hillsides. Wisconsin law does not set a specific speed limit for ATVs on trails, but states that no operator may travel "at a rate of speed that is unreasonable or improper under the circumstances. People need to drive at a speed that is appropriate to the terrain, their familiarity with the terrain, and their skill level and experience, Bilgo says, but warns veteran drivers not to get overconfident of their skills.

of the accidents involved people who had more than 100 hours of experience on their ATVs.

People particularly need to slow down when they are changing surfaces, especially from a road to gravel, Bilgo says. People also can lessen their chances of accidents by taking a safety course and by knowing ATV laws, particularly those regarding operation on or near highways.

Other tips include:

Never carry a passenger. ATVs are designed for one operator only.

* ATVs are for off-road use only. Never operate an ATV on paved surfaces or public roads unless it is a designated route.

Always wear an approved motorcycle helmet, eye protection, boots, gloves, long pants and a long sleeved shirt or jacket.

* Never consume alcohol or drugs before or during ATV operation.

Avoid excessive speeds. Travel at a speed appropriate for the terrain, visibility conditions, and your experience.

Do not attempt wheelies, jumps or other stunts. These can have disastrous results.
