# **Christmas Parade, Tree Lighting Here on Sunday**



They've made all their lists and they've checked them all twice and all is in readiness for jolly old Santa Claus who will be making his annual appearance to check if all the area children have been naughty or nice during Sunday's annual Christmas Parade at 5 p.m.

The parade will follow its usual route, beginning at the rear of the Kewaskum Fire Station. It will progress along Fond du Lac Avenue to Main Street, turn east on Main Street to

Parkview Drive, turn north on Parkview to First Street, turn west on First Street and end in front of the Kewaskum Municipal building. The annual A.A.L. tree lighting ceremony will be then held in front of the building where the tall evergreen has been specially decorated for the lighting. Christmas carols will also be sung by local choral groups. The Aid Association for Lutherans (A.A.L.) will graciously be serving cookies and hot chocolate in the community room for all who care to join in the festivities.

It is hoped the entire community will participate in one way or another and strive to make this year's parade a most memorable one for all. All schools, businesses, churches and civic organizations are urged to participate in the parade and are encouraged to decorate and add a festive touch to the community for the holidays.

With the support of the entire community, the parade can continue to be a source of inspiration to all involved, as well as to all the spectators, who have marked Sunday's date on their calendar weeks ago.

Cash prizes of \$150, \$100, \$75, \$50 and \$25 will be awarded for the first five places selected by a special group of judges.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt and his wife, Phyllis, have been chosen as this year's parade marshalls.

The Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the annual parade, and Kewaskum High School will again take part in the annual Food Sharing Program to be held in conjunction with the parade. All residents are encouraged to bring nonperishable food items to the parade where Santa's elves will gladly assist in picking them up. Let's be sure we remember the true meaning of Christmas by donating our small share to help everyone in the area have a truly happy holiday season.

Once again, the Chamber is arranging to have Fond du Lac Avenue and Main Street adorned with Christmas trees in which area community groups and

schools have donated their time and efforts to decorate, adding a beautiful festive touch along the parade route. The trees will be decorated this week just in time for all to admire before the parade.

All decorating participants will be competing for a chance to win first through third place. Trees will be judged and the winners will be announced in the Statesman in the upcoming weeks before the holiday.

Many businesses will also be featuring special sales and celebrations, encouraging you to spend the day in Kewaskum's Winter Wonderland. Why travel somewhere else to attack that Christmas list when there is so much being offered right here in Kewaskum if you simply take the time to look around your own community.

# Board Approves Slight Increase in '99 Budget

The Kewaskum Village Board met Monday, Nov. 23 and opened their meeting by addressing a public hearing on the proposed general budget \$9,180,400 or 7.19% and assessed value for 1998 increased \$4,511,100 or 3.8%. Overall growth has slowed within the village, The equalized value was \$2,066,300 or 2.5% less than last year.

Total tax will be \$5.99 per

Following the close of the public hearing, the winter parking ban was brought up. Trustee Gary Gavin told the board he thought it was ridiculous to have people rut up their lawn by parking on it when the ground has not frozen over yet.

## One Car Accident Claims Area Man

TOWN OF AUBURN- A 37 year old Campbellsport man tragically lost his life as a result of a one-car motor vehicle accident shortly before midnight Saturday evening, Nov. 28.

Robert H. Johnson Jr. was driving northbound on CTH G, a half mile south of STH 67 (near Dundee), and allegedly left the roadway on the west side. He apparently lost control of the vehicle as it started rotating in a clockwise motion, leaving the roadway on the east side and striking a tree with the rear of the vehicle.

Johnson was taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend by Kewaskum Rescue Squad.

On Monday, he was pronounced dead at the hospital.

It was noted that Johnson was not wearing a seatbelt.

Before opening the public hearing, President Robert Wagner apologized for everyone who was inconvenienced by the board not having a quorum at the last meeting.

rum at the last meeting. In the hearing, Village Administrator Daniel Schmidt said the general budget has increased \$39,733 or 2.28%. The property tax levy to be collected will be reflecting an increase, due to a drop in the ratio equalized value verses assessed value, a loss of inter governmental revenue of \$79,533 or 12.7% and a slight increase in the budget. Looking at the entire picture, the tax levy will reflect an increase of \$52,605 or 7.6%. The Village Property Tax Rate will also reflect an increase of 21.4¢ or 3.7% in comparison with 1997/1998. The Equalized value for 1998 increased

\$1,000 of assessed value.

The net tax rate will be \$22. This is up 3.58% from 1997.

The state tax credit for 1998 will be \$1.83 per \$1,000 of assessed value, which reflects a 1.1% percent increase. This means the net tax rate is \$22, an increase of 76¢ or 3.6%. The state will also be distributing a lottery credit to all tax bill recipients equaling \$48.59.



Everyone who attends should bring six cookies for exchange and one food item to be donated to the Full Shelf Food Pantry of West Bend. Anyone may join in to help the community.





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# Strelka Memorial Scholarship New in 1999 KEYS to Award \$35,200 in Scholarships

The Board of Directors of Kewaskum Youth Scholarships, Inc. has announced that 12 scholarships totaling \$35,200 will be awarded to the Kewaskum High School Class of 1999. The following is a listing of the amount and number of each kind of scholarship.

Two four-year college scholarships, each worth a total of \$10,000 (\$2,500 a year for four years) are being offered. One of these \$10,000 scholarships is provided by the KEYS scholarship fund, and the other is provided by the Oscar C. and Augusta Schlegel Foundation.

A four year KEYS scholarship worth \$4,000 (\$1,000 a year for four years) will be awarded for the second time this spring. Two \$2,000 **KEYS** College or Technical College Scholarships (\$1,000 per year for two years) will also be awarded. The Barbara York College Scholarship worth \$1,200 will also be awarded for the sixth time this year.

Four Memorial scholarships of \$1,000 each will also be awarded this year: The Ann-Marie Horner Memorial Scholarship will be presented for the tenth time; the Kilian A. Honeck Memorial Scholarship will be presented for the eighth time; the Evelyn Joyce Gruber Memorial Scholarship will be presented for the seventh time, and a new Michael H. Strelka Memorial Scholarship will be presented for the first time.

A KEYS \$1,000 College

Technical College or Scholarship will be presented along with a \$1,000 **KEYS** Technical College Scholarship.

The \$35,200 in scholarships to be awarded in the spring of 1999, brings the total amount awarded by KEYS to \$269,900 since 1986! The KEYS organization wishes to thank the alumni, businesses, organizations, and community members for their generous donations which make these scholarships possible.

## WINTER PARKING

The Winter Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions go into effect at mid-night (12:00 a.m.) on December 8, 1998.

Municipal Code Section 7.04(3) <u>Night Parking</u> <u>Restrictions</u>, reads as follows: Signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wisconsin Statutes, no person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December 8, to April 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions vehicles may be parked a period of time not longer than 3 minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner violated thereby.

The fine for violating the ordinance is:

\$5.00 if paid within three (3) days of the issuance of the parking citation.


\$10.00 if paid after ten (10) days but before 28 days.


After 28 days, the amount is \$25.00 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend any and all vehicle registrations held by the owner and refuse renewals of the same until the citation is satisfied.

An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation whether or not he or she was the operator.

Municipal Code Section 7.04 (4) <u>Removal of Illegally</u> <u>Parked Vehicles</u>. This section covers the issuance of citations to and possible removal of such vehicles in violation of this ordinance. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 7.04(6) of this code, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of the towing and storage.





## Kewaskum Blacksmith Executive Producer of Film 'Forged Elegance'

From the late 19th Century through 1958, Milwaukee master blacksmith Cyril Colnik crafted a living with fire and iron, making the functional beautiful.

Forged Elegance: The Life Work of Cyril Colnik, a new documentary exploring Colnik's life, art and influence, premieres at 9 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 16, on Wisconsin Public Television.

Colnik's story is not just the tale of a man who sculpted iron that worked well and looked beautiful. His journey from German immigrant to pacifist Milwaukee craftsman parallels the growth of his chosen home, says writer-producer Dan Banda. "He's a key figure in an era when Milwaukee went from being a city of immigrants to an American city," Banda says.

With the current resurgence of hand-skilled decorative arts, many collectors seek out Colnik's works, and artists look to his legacy for clues to recapture skills that had nearly disappeared. Forged Elegance, through archival photos, views of Colnik's work in modern Milwaukee, interviews and more, answers the question: Who is this artisan inspiring such intense interest?

Cyril Colnik came from a German family that saw its share of tragedy. The only survivors of ten immediate family members, he wandered Europe as a young man and apprenticed with the blacksmith

He came to the United States to work, most likely with his teacher, on iron pieces for the German exhibit at the Columbian Exposition, Chicago's World's Fair in 1893. Colnik's contributions to what was called the Exposition's finest example of iron work started his reputation in the U.S., and he was a key figure in the late 19th Century resurgence of decorative arts.

Colnik then made his way to Milwaukee, "the German Athens," where his work found favor with the city's beer barons. In the right place at the right time, his work brought character to mansions and public buildings, and Colnik married and prospered.

At the peak of his career, Colnik and his C. Colnik Manufacturing Co. employed many smiths. His designs were in huge demand, and his lattice work, doorknobs and candelabra found their way into many of the city's finest





## The Myth of Widespread Poverty in America

#### By Rep. Glenn Grothman

A major newspaper last week carried another article which referred to Americans living in poverty.

Whether referring to "women in poverty," or "households living in poverty," one envisions people lacking in food, clothing, and adequate shelter. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 36.5 million Americans or 14% of the population live in poverty.

Since I don't see that many people who are that poor even in the poorest areas of northern Wisconsin or the north side of Milwaukee, I've always questioned that statistic. Well, a recent report by the nonprofit Heritage Foundation sheds some light on what the government considers poor.

Forty-one percent of poor households own their own homes and these homes average three bedrooms and one-and-one-half baths. Seventy percent own a car with 27% of the households owning two or more.

Ninety-seven percent own a color TV, half own two or more TVs, with three quarters owning a VCR. Fifth-three percent own a stereo, 64% a microwave, 66% an air-conditioner, 32% have an answering machine and over 99% have a refrigerator. This doesn't sound like what most people would consider poor.

The average living space per poor person is 440 square feet; this is more than an average person living in Stockholm, Sweden; Munich, Germany; or Paris, France. Even those poor people who rent have more living space per sperson on average than people living in Tel Aviv, Amsterdam, or Athens.

The food intake for poor people is almost identical to that for wealthier people. Poor people have a greater incidence of obesity. This is not because the poor are eating fattier foods -- percent of fat intake is almost identical between poor and wealthy (income three and one-half times poverty level or greater). Average vitamin and other nutrient intake is also virtually identical between rich and poor. This is one reason why even the poorest Americans today are taller and weigh more than the average WWII soldier and two inches taller and 20 pounds heavier than the average American soldier serving in WWI. The underlying reason is that poverty is defined exclusively by cash income and does not include assets, in-kind transfers, gifts or income off the books. Unfortunately, it is in the interest of government bureaucrats and social work professors to exaggerate the amount of true poverty in our country in order to expand government programs. The lesson is to always be careful when reading government statistics about poverty.



# Wisconsin Winter Weather Awareness

### **NWS Notifies the Public**

Winter is a beautiful season in Wisconsin but winter weather can also be dangerous if you're not prepared for the extreme conditions that occur during a typical Wisconsin winter.

Heavy snow, gusty winds, freezing precipitation and bitter cold can all act independently or simultaneously to create life threatening weather conditions to Wisconsin's residents.

The key to enjoying winter and staying safe is being prepared and staying informed of changing weather conditions. Start every day with a weather forecast, either through National Weather Service broadcasts via NOAA Weather Radio, or your local television, radio or newspaper.

If a storm is approaching, check the forecast in the middle of the day for an update. Knowledge is power and winter weather awareness could save your life. The information is out there. Meteorologists work seven days a week to keep forecasts fresh and accurate. National Weather Service (NWS) meteorologists work around the clock every day of the year to notify and warn the public of changing weather conditions.

During the winter months, the NWS will assess the weather and, along with regular forecasts, may issue additional advisories, watches, or warnings. Just like during the summer months, a watch means conditions are favorable for a certain kind of weather, but no immediate action is required.

A warning means dangerous weather is imminent or already occurring and immediate listener response is strongly urged. Note that warning" is a verb or an action word, and the listener needs to take action to ensure their safety. For winter weather though, frequently the best action is stay put and avoid travel while a storm passes through the area. But if you must travel, be prepared and stay abreast of the changing weather situation through NWS products and services. The NWS issues a winter storm watch when severe winter weather conditions such as heavy snow and/or ice are possible within the next 12 to 48 hours. Snowfalls of at least six inches are expected. The NWS issues a winter storm warning when severe winter weather conditions are occurring or expected within a few hours.

combined with frequent wind speeds greater than 35 mph are expected, causing reduced visibilities to less than one-quarter mile.

Advisories are issued by the NWS for conditions which warrant increased public awareness, such as the first frost or freeze, snowfalls greater than three inches, light freezing precipitation events, wind chills below -35 degrees F, or a combination of two or more of these conditions.

Wisconsin's winters are a sparkling jewel in the seasonal beauty of our state. The key to safely enjoying winter's beauty is staying informed of changing weather conditions and being prepared. The National Weather Service wants everyone to have a safe and happy winter season. Remember, winter weather awareness could save your life.




