## The Coffee Corner Opens in Landmark Kewaskum Building

The historical building that was once home to The Corner Drug Store (and Kennelly Pharmacy later on), in Kewaskum, has re-opened as The Coffee Corner. It is located at the corner of Highway 45 and Main Street. Long-time Kewaskum resident Cindy Gruber is the owner/operator.

"My daughter and I would often visit coffee shops in other communities," said Cindy. "Once you've tasted the specialty coffee from those places

it becomes what you prefer. We liked the atmosphere in several of them."

Cindy often talked with her husband about how great it would be to have a coffee shop in the Kewaskum area. The Corner Drug Store property, the looks of the building and its' location was perfect for such an idea.

"When the property became for sale last summer I knew it was time for me to follow through with my vision," Cindy said. "I love old buildings and enjoy restoring and

refurbishing them. It was especially fun with this building taking it back to when it was a soda fountain and a business."

The building has history for Kewaskum dating back when it was the American House, a hotel. The corner part of the building was at one time a tavern and later became the Corner Drug Store. In 1946 the Skrentny family purchased the building, with Ray Skrentny as the pharmacist and his family living on the property.

"Mom liked the small town atmosphere of Kewaskum,

instead of Milwaukee," said son Tom Skrentny. "She liked the area and settled here to raise her family. There are six boys. My younger brother Bob and I worked the store in the 1950's and 60's."

It was about that time that people became interested in venturing out and touring the countryside. The Kettle Moraine area, with the lakes and sites to see, became a popular place for a drive. At that time the store had a soda fountain with ice cream served daily. The location was the gateway to the Kettle Moraine area.

"We served ice cream and made sundaes, malts, shakes, sodas and banana splits," Tom said. "Whatever the customer wanted we would serve."

"At one time they were the largest user of Sealtest ice cream in the state," he added. "It was first called Luek Sealtest. The delivery of ice cream was so large that on Monday, Wednesday and Friday they would stop by and deliver the gallons and other products like the bars. On Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday the ice cream delivery would be shipped by Greyhound bus."

It was not unusual for there to be long lines outside the store on Sundays for people waiting to buy ice cream. In those days things were not as convenient as they are now.

"We would have to dish out the ice cream, which was rock hard," said Tom. "The ice cream would be packed in dry ice and every customer would want their cone with a scoop of

this flavor and then one of a different flavor. It was tough to scoop it out and with the long lines it seemed we would never be done."

The soda fountain and ice cream part of the drug store was a popular place for people to gather. It became a meeting place for people to sit and chat.

"They would come in, get their ice cream and sit and visit for hours at the counter," Tom said. "There were nights that we wouldn't get to bed until midnight because dad didn't close until the last customer had left."

The Skrentny family lived on the property for many years. After their father passed away Ray, the oldest son remained living there with his mother until her death. The property was sold to Cindy Gruber last summer and she plans on making some of her own historical moments with the Coffee Corner.

The inside of the building was taken down to the studs and everything including the wiring, plumbing, heating with central air-conditioning is new. The floors, ceilings and the placement of the walls have been carefully planned out to make the new store a welcoming place to visit. The remainder of the building has also been renovated allowing for two apartments.

Cindy has plans of having some of the historical prints on display and hopes to recover some of the old ice cream parlor pieces to use in the store. She has been in contact with

### RECYCLING TIPS



#### \*\* GLASS \*\*

1 of 7

**TYPE OF GLASS:** Bottles and Jars Only. NO window glass, mirror glass, etc.

**COLOR:** Clear, Green and Brown

**PREPARATION:** Remove covers and rings and discard. **RINSE CLEAN.** This is the most important aspect of a successful recycling program. Bottles and jars that are contaminated with food residue cannot be recycled.

**TIP:** Many homeowners place their glass jars in the dishwasher along with their other cooking and eating utensils.

Place bottles and jars in your dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag. Avoid breakage. Place the bin or bag at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be on Wednesdays for both solid waste and recyclables. Multi-family dwellings of six or more, remember, your recycling pickup will be the first and third Wednesday of each month.

# Old Settler's Banquet Held Here





## Lynn Becomes Automatic Qualifier for Nationals

### Smashes Her Carroll College Record in 1500M

Marni Lynn, former Kewaskum High School cross country and track standout, knocked almost eight seconds off her school record in the 1500m run on Saturday, February 20, at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, and in the process became an automatic qualifier for the Nationals.

Lynn led from start to finish with consistent splits and posted an incredible winning time of 4:36.26 (four minutes and 36.26 seconds). The race featured top runners from many of the University of Wisconsin State Schools including Oshkosh, La Crosse, White-water, Eau Claire and runners from private colleges. A time of 4:36 in the 1500m

run converts to approximately 4.56 for the mile.

Earlier this indoor season, Lynn's time of 4:44 in the 1500 m run had broken the Carroll College school mark of 4:50 and had given her a provisional qualifying time for Nationals. Her new time easily moved her from being a provisional qualifier in the 1500m run to an automatic qualifier for the NCAA Division III Track and Field Indoor Championships to be held on March 12 and 13 at Ohio Northern University. (The automatic qualifying time in the 1500m run is 4:41).

Running in racing flats for the first time in her career, Lynn was surprised to hear her time at the end of the race. "My coach didn't

tell me my time at the end of the race. He pretended that I hadn't run that fast, but others were quick to tell me how good my time was," reported Lynn.

Next up on the schedule for Carroll College is a meet at UW-Oshkosh on Saturday, February 27 and then back to Knox College in Illinois for the Conference Championships on March 5 and 6. Lynn is tentatively scheduled to run the 3,000m and 1500m runs on Friday and a 1600m leg on the distance medley relay team and 800m run on Saturday for their Conference Championships.





## Irish Dance Troupe to Entertain at UWWC

WEST BEND -- Below, their feet move in a rhythmic blur; tapping, kicking, jumping straight up into the air and hanging there. But above, the dancers of the Cashel-Dennehy School of Irish Dance keep their upper bodies seemingly immobile, their arms held rigidly by their sides.

Cashel-Dennehy spokeswoman Marnie Starr said Irish Dance reveals a lot about Irish history. During the centuries of occupation by Britain, she said, Irish language and dance were forbidden. Thus, keeping hands and arms still allowed the Irish to dance behind walls, she said.

"Above the wall, all they could see was our heads, but below the wall, our feet were going a mile-a-minute," she explained, laughing. "I must admit, there's more than a little Blarney in that explanation."

Members of the Milwaukee-based Irish dance troupe will reveal other facets of Irish history in a combined lecture/dance recital, now set for 7:30 p.m. on March 12, at the Univer-

sity of Wisconsin-Washington County. The school is located at 400 University Dr., West Bend.

Starr said that Irish dance is, perhaps, best known for the astounding vertical leaps of the dancers, some of which would rival the jump-shots of basketball star Michael Jordan. "The dancers refer to their 'hang-time,'" she said. "It's incredible what some of them can do. They just seem to defy gravity."

Aside from its gravity-defying high jumps and kicks, Irish dance also is known for the intricate patterns the dancers weave about each other onstage in dances, such as the jig, reel, slip-jig, hornpipe and treble jig. Starr explained that Irish dancers spend much of their dancing time perched on the very tips of their toes, but unlike ballerinas, Irish dancers' shoes have neither hardened toes nor lambs-wool padding.

"Irish dance takes a lot of strength," she said. "Plus, you've got to have a good sense of balance. It takes a great deal of control and a

lot of practice."

Starr said that Irish dance, which had lain in relative obscurity for years, has undergone a genuine renaissance in this country, since the overwhelming Broadway success of shows like Michael Flatley's "Riverdance" and "Lord of the Dance."

"In our school, we now have 300 students," Starr said. "Ten years ago, we only had about 30. Since Michael Flatley has been around, now everybody knows what Irish dance is."

And she added that the Cashel-Dennehy school has a special connection to Flatley. "He was trained by our original dance teacher, Dennis Denehy," she said.



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## Computer-Automated Fishing and Hunting License Sales Begin March 10

MADISON -- The sale of Wisconsin hunting and fishing licenses will zoom into the computer age beginning Wednesday, March 10, when the 1999 license sales season begins. On that day, the state Department of Natural Resources is launching its new Automated License Issuance System (ALIS), which is designed to make license purchases more convenient for customers and more streamlined for license sales agents.

"Automating the sale of fishing and hunting licenses is one of the important customer services the department has been working hard to modernize and improve in recent years for the public's benefit," said Craig Karr, administrator of the DNR Division of Customer Assistance and External Relations at the agency's headquarters in Madison. "The automated sales system will make license-buying quicker and more convenient for the more than two million residents and non-residents who buy Wisconsin hunting and fishing licenses each year."

Wisconsin's 1,100 DNR-authorized sales sites will be equipped with small, counter-top terminals similar to those that scan credit cards. The computerized terminals enable license agents to push a few buttons and quickly sell a license to a customer.

Customers buying a license under ALIS for the first time will need to provide the sales agent their

name and address from a driver's license or other form of identification along with their Social Security number. The sales agent's ALIS computer terminal assigns the customer a unique DNR identification number, which the customer can use in the future any time he or she wishes to purchase a new license, get a duplicate or file a change of address. The customer ID number will be printed on each license.

The sales agent's computer terminal downloads and stores transaction information in an instant over a phone line. A small printer issues a customer receipt along with the license, which is printed on a sturdy, flexible, water-proof material sized to fit in a wallet.

Several recreational privileges can be printed on each ALIS license, reducing the need for customers to carry multiple licenses. Special stamps that are required over and above basic licenses for outdoor sports such as inland trout fishing or turkey hunting will no longer need to be attached to a paper license. Instead, the stamp privilege will be printed right on the ALIS license.

People who wish to collect the actual stamps as wildlife art or souvenirs may present their license showing the stamp privilege at any DNR Service Center in order to receive a stamp. Other license sales sites will not have stamps available.

Stamps are also available through the mail from DNR

headquarters in Madison for an additional \$3 fee. Customers using this alternative will need to submit their expired license showing the stamp privilege they purchased to the DNR Bureau of Customer Service and Licensing in Madison.

Establishing ALIS enables customers to buy a Wisconsin hunting or fishing license via a toll-free telephone call for the first time. For a \$3 fee, customers may order their license over the phone and charge it to their Visa or MasterCard. The toll-free phone number -- 1-877-945-4236 -- will be activated March 10 and can accept calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Each customer will be issued an authorization number over the telephone, which allows the license buyer to immediately enjoy most outdoor recreational privileges (exceptions include activities requiring a back tag or carcass tag) while waiting to receive their license in the mail.

"We expect the toll-free phone sales of outdoor licenses to be especially popular with out-of-state visitors planning vacations in Wisconsin," Karr said. "And if you forget to order your license before you head to Wisconsin, you can call from your resort the day you arrive and buy your fishing license over the telephone."

For the many customers who prefer to buy a license in person while visiting their local bait shop, sporting goods store or DNR ser-

vice center, ALIS offers additional conveniences not available in the past. Thanks to the move from paper-based license sales to computer-based sales, license sales agents will no longer run out of popular licenses, and all sales outlets, rather than just DNR sales offices, will be able to offer duplicate licenses and conservation patron licenses.

Last but not least, Wisconsin state park stickers can also be purchased from any ALIS-equipped license sales agent. At non-DNR license sales locations, you'll be issued a receipt, which you should redeem for a vehicle window decal at the first state park you visit.

The DNR spent more than six years planning and designing ALIS, which is being operated with the assistance of a contractor, Central Bank of Jefferson City, Missouri. About 50 sales agents piloted the new system beginning last autumn to make sure automation would work as planned, Karr said.

"I've always loved the building and its central placement in the community," Cindy said. "I want to enhance that by adding landscaping and a deck with outdoor seating as soon as the weather warms up. It is all a long process, but it has been worth it. We opened for business on Jan. 9."

Cindy has spent many years working in the health care field. She is able to use many of the skills, such as working with people that she has learned, in the Coffee Corner. Her husband runs Gruber Tool and Die in West Bend. The family business gave her some insight as to what to expect with being a business owner herself.

"The biggest challenge was getting the building plans in order and waiting for State approval," Cindy said. "Once all of the code requirements were met, which is a long process, we were able to put

our plans to work. I am very pleased at how everything turned out."

The actual donation of a pint of blood takes approximately seven minutes. Plan 20 minutes prior to the donation to give medical history and to have your temperature and blood pressure taken and 10-15 minutes after the donation for some refreshments.

Please seriously consider donating with a special appeal for first time donors. You may help a total stranger or someone here in our community. Reserve an hour on Wednesday, March 3rd. Those you help will be grateful you took the time and gave such a generous gift.



The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Andy Pesch and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the January 18, 1998 meeting were approved as printed.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel presented the January 1999 monthly reports:

Fire Chief Groeschel requested permission of the Board to allow for the negotiating of the purchase of a pumper/apparatus. This piece of equipment will replace the 1963 FWD. On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee Andy Pesch and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized negotiating the purchase of a pumper truck from two companies and to bring the recommendation to purchase back to the Board.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel asked for permission to sell the 1997 squad car and 1984 Ford pickup. On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Andy Pesch and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the sale of said vehicles in the same manner as last year - that being by public auction at the auto auction sales.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles informed the Board that since our last meeting we have had one water main break. The results of the EPA stockholder meeting have been released in draft form indicating the requirement for chlorination will be lightened. Also the Federal reporting on the water utility will be implemented this summer.

Overall, the residential class permits were down by 10 or 6.9%. No new mercantile or multi-family building took place and the total number of permits was down by 4. Looking at the overall grand totals for permits for the year of 1998 were down by 14 or 8.9%.

The ratio of single family residence increased slightly by .1%. The number of units as to garbage and recycling pick up were also reviewed.

### RESOLUTION NO. 99-4

#### A RESOLUTION OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN CONSENTING TO THE TRANSFER OF CONTROL OF CABLE TELEVISION FRANCHISE

WHEREAS, Marcus Cable Partners, L.L.C. ("Marcus Cable") is the holder of a franchise (the "Franchise") to provide cable television service in the Village of Kewaskum pursuant to the provisions of a franchise agreement between the Municipality and Marcus Cable (together with any amendments, the "Franchise Agreement") and/or subject to any ordinance of the Municipality pertaining to Cable Television Service ("Cable Ordinance"). The Franchise Agreement and the Cable Ordinance are collectively referred to as the "Franchise Documents"; and

WHEREAS, Marcus Cable Properties, L.L.C. ("Marcus Properties"), which is a parent of Marcus Cable, and Vulcan Cable, Inc. ("Vulcan") jointly submitted to the Municipality their application on Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") Form 394, dated August 28, 1998 (the "Application"), requesting that the Municipality approve the ownership changes involving the transfer of control of Marcus Cable to Vulcan as more fully described therein (the "Franchise Transfer"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the information requests of the Municipality, Vulcan and Marcus Properties supplemented the Application with additional documents and information; and

WHEREAS, various representations have been made in the Application and supplemental information thereto, including that the Franchise Transfer will not result in an increase in cable television service rates or reduce the quality of cable television customer service or the quality of cable television in the Municipality; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality and Vulcan have negotiated an agreement regarding certain conditions of this consent (the "Transfer Agreement"), a copy of which is attached as exhibit A and is incorporated by reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, in reliance upon the representations and information submitted in the Application and supplemental information thereto and subject to the conditions set forth in the Transfer Agreement, hereby consents to the Franchise Transfer as described in the Application and supplemental information thereto; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that following the Franchise Transfer, Vulcan may, at any time within eighteen (18) months after the Franchise Transfer: (i) undergo additional transfers of control, and/or (ii) assign or grant or otherwise convey all or part of its assets, including the Franchise; provided that the transferee of control, assignee, grantee or transferee of the assets or Franchise, is a person or entity in which Paul G. Allen holds majority ownership, which is primarily in the cable communications business and which is affiliated with an operated by, or is managed by Charter Communications pursuant to terms and conditions substantially similar to the management agreement; attached hereto as Exhibit B; and further provided that Vulcan shall remain liable for any breach of the Franchise Documents or this Transfer Agreement, that any such transfer, assignment, grant or other conveyance shall not result in an increase in cable television service rates or reduce the quality of cable television customer service or the quality of cable television service in the Municipality, and that Vulcan shall promptly inform the Municipality in writing of any such change; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that following the Franchise Transfer, the franchise holder may, at any time and from time to time, assign, grant or pledge or otherwise convey one or more liens or security interests in its assets, including its rights, obligations and benefits in and to the Franchise (collectively, "Liens"), to any lender ("Secured Party") providing financing to the franchise holder and that such Secured Party shall have the rights of a secured creditor with respect thereto; provided, however, any such Liens shall be subject to and subordinate to the rights of the Municipality under the Franchise Documents, the Transfer Agreement and applicable laws; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Municipality's consent is subject to Vulcan executing and delivering to the Municipality by no later than March 31, 1999, a Transfer Agreement in the form of the attached exhibit A. If Vulcan fails to do so, the Municipality's consent to the Franchise Transfer shall be null and void and the Application shall be timely denied as of February 28, 1999; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, by this consent, the Municipality does not agree to any renewal or extension of the Franchise. Any pending or future renewal or extension of the Franchise shall be subject to applicable federal, state and local laws, the Franchise Documents, and the Transfer Agreement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Village President is hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Transfer Agreement in substantially the form of the attached Exhibit A, together with such mutually agreed upon changes as the Village President may approve as necessary or desirable, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Transfer Agreement.

## Farmers Get \$30 Million in Tax Relief

Approximately \$30.6 million in direct benefits was distributed to Wisconsin farmers in 1998 through the Farmland Preservation Credit Program and the Farmland Tax Relief Credit Program, State Revenue Secretary Cate Zeuske recently announced.

About 22,000 farmers claimed Farmland Preservation credits amounting to \$19.9 million, and 58,000 farmers received Farmland Tax Relief Credits totaling \$10.7 million. The credits are paid through the state income tax or as a cash refund if the credit exceeds income tax due.

The goals of the Farmland Preservation Credit Program are twofold: to preserve Wisconsin farmland by means of local land use planning and soil conservation practices and

to provide property tax relief to farmland owners. To qualify for the credit, farmland must be 35 acres or more and zoned for exclusive agricultural use or be subject to a preservation agreement between the farmland owner and the state. About 82 percent of the claims are for land under zoning and 18 percent are for land covered by agreements. In addition, participants must comply with soil and water conservation standards set by the state Land Conservation Board.

Credits averaged \$907 per claimant, equal to 26 percent of claimants' average property tax bills. Approximately 38 percent of farm owners with 35 acres or more claimed Farmland Preservation credits in 1998.

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




Sophomore FFA member Matt Propson has been active in the Dairy Placement Project area. Last year Matt received a Silver State Proficiency for Dairy Placement.

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

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
