Master Chef Norman Henry Opens Salt H₂O Cafe Here

A building that has been a landmark in the history of Kewaskum has opened, once again, as a restaurant.

Master Chef Norman Henry has re-opened the restaurant and named it 'The Salt H20 Café.' Norman, a Michigan native, chose the name because of the extensive salt-water seafood the menu offers, its' catchy, easy to remember title and because it is a fun name. He is leasing the building from Gary and Linda Gavin with the option to buy

The Salt H2O Café is locat-

ed at the corner of Fond du Lac Avenue (Highway 45) and Main Street (Highway 28) in Kewaskum. The restaurant will be open daily starting with the lunch menu and remaining open until the last hungry customer has been fed.

Many of the local people wonder why a Master Chef would open a restaurant in Kewaskum. "Kewaskum is a small growing community," said Norman. "It is a short distance from Milwaukee, West Bend or Fond du Lac for a good meal."

"I want my café to be a place that is fun," he added. "I like serving people and believe that

when you go out to eat it should be enjoyable. I can provide my customers with a variety of choices at reasonable prices.'

The building was once listed as one of six hotels in the village of Kewaskum in 1881. Then named, 'S. Witzig's Hotel', it was a thriving business that served the community as well as many tradesmen and travelers. The hotel was a popular place to gather, and the best place for the latest news

At the turn of the century it became the Republican House. In the 1930's Mr. and Mrs. William Schultz owned it. Mrs.

Schultz was an outstanding cook that served early meals to get people off to work. Her cooking was so well liked that people would travel to Kewaskum on Sundays, from as far away as Chicago, just to enjoy her family style chicken dinner with all of the fixings, including homemade rolls and desserts.

Times changed and eventually the hotel part of the business ended and the space was converted into rental units. Each new owner of the building added his or her own personal touch. In 1960 Marge and Willard Lynn changed the

More Records; **Wins Four Titles** Co-MVP of Meet Marni Lynn, former Kewaskum High School cross country and track standout,

Lynn Sets Three

helped the Carroll College women's indoor track and field team win the Midwest Conference Indoor Track and Field championship title this past weekend at Knox College in Illinois.

The women's team was predicted to finish third at the meet with Lynn a favorite in the distance races. Lynn led the team to the championship when she won both the 3,000m and 1500m races Friday night and ran a leg on the winning medley relay and won the 800m race on Saturday.

In the 3,000m race, Lynn ran to win and to conserve energy for the three other races to follow that weekend. "It felt a little different not going out and trying to run my fastest," commented Lynn Sunday evening by phone. "I ran steady but held back," reported Lynn. Yet Lynn's winning time

was just two seconds off the conference indoor record. In the 1500m run, Lynn picked up the pace a little and easily won her second conference title that evening.

Saturday, Lynn anchored the medley relay with a strong 1600 meters. Lynn and her teammates established the conference record and their school record for this new event. In her last race of the meet, coach Brian Bliese told Lynn that it was okay to give it everything she had, and she did.

In the 800m race, Lynn ran a career best time of 2:16.21 and established a new conference and Carroll College school record. Lynn's time also automatically qualified her in the 800m race for Nationals.

Lynn and her coach have opted to have her run in the 1500m race at Nationals. Both the 800m and 1500m will have preliminary heats and Lynn will put all her energy into the 1500m race where she was ranked number one last week for Division III athletes.

At the conclusion of the meet, Lynn was named the co-MVP of the meet.



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

VIRGINIA BEACH, VA -- The sun never sets on the men and women of the world's finest Navy. From F-14s enforcing the no-fly zone over the skies of Iraq to submarines patrolling the waters of the North Atlantic, our Navy is everywhere and ready for any-

To maintain this mobility it takes the most advanced equipment in the world. To operate this equipment, it takes the best trained personnel found anywhere.

Many sailors like Jeremy J. Korneli, son of Mike and Deb Korneli of Kewaskum, receive their training at the Naval Air Maintenance Training Group in Virginia Beach, Virginia.

At the school, students gain the knowledge they need to keep the Navy's state-of-the-art fighter aircraft in the air.

Korneli is an aviation electrician's mate and is here to learn about the F-14. When finished with school, he'll transfer to the Naval Air Station in Patuxent River, Maryland.

Later on the building was purchased by Bill and Violet Edwards who installed archery lanes and then remodeled the building for use as a dance hall. 



Dear Editor,

The April election is around the corner and the ballot will include the Kewaskum School District referendum which will be more complicated and include more questions than usual.

First and foremost on the program is the question of the ever present solution to the fate of the Beechwood School. You probably will hear much mumbo-jumbo about why the school should be reopened but there has not been one legitimate reason given to date and I doubt is there is one.

It would be costly to open and it would not solve the bussing problem which has been so often used as a reason to open, but in reality would complicate and increase bussing. It would also require a \$250,000.00 recurring referendum to operate and even if it were to open, renovations and increases in capacity of the Farmington and Wayne Schools would have to be done. This problem must be determined by a resounding no vote by all of the district's voters.

There will also be a question as to whether a pool should be included in any new building in Kewaskum. This question should be delayed until the present debt on the high school is paid but a new building should be built with the idea of a pool being included in the future.

name to 'The Glacier Inn,' because of the natural terrain the Kettle Moraine Forest is famous for.

The Gavins purchased the building in February of 1997 from Bob and Marlene Nagel. They, along with Scott and Annette Erickson, reopened the restaurant as the 'Gateway Supper Club.' Improvements were made, including making the restaurant handicapped accessible on the south side.

Norman was impressed with the rich oak woodwork; the warm feeling of the fireplace in the dining room, the location and the changes that had already taken place. He, along with his wife, Jacqueline, had been passing through town and stopped in at The Gateway Supper Club to eat. They noticed the 'For Sale' sign and decided it was a great place for them to open their own café. The couple hopes to see the return of people traveling to Kewaskum to enjoy good food.

He has been interested in the food industry all of his life. "I was born with a love for food," said Norman. "At the age of seven I was already preparing meals. By fourteen I was cookgourmet food. I am just a food freak."

Norman has worked all facets of the food industry. As the saying goes he has paid his dues. He washed dishes, as a teen, for 50 cents an hour. Through his college years he worked full-time cooking at a local country club. Norman has helped set up restaurants, authored several food columns in various newspapers and has appeared as guest chef on TV shows. He has made an infomercial and served as a private caterer.

"I think that starting from scratch and learning and working all aspects of the industry has helped me to understand the business and art of food," said Norman. "It also taught me how much I enjoyed helping and serving people.'

For four years he was the Food Director at Boyne Mountain Lodge, a five star four-season resort in Michigan. It is the largest privately run resort of its kind in the country.

In the late 1970's he sold his restaurant ideas to Days Inn of America. He acquired two Days Inn hotels, which he owned and operated. After great prosperity Norman decided it was time to sell and spend less time working and more time with his two daughters. He sold the hotels and retired, spending some time doing food consulting and traveling.

The time off had helped him explore other avenues pertaining to food. He dabbled in writing a cookbook, but never finished it. Time was spent trying out new recipes, checking out other restaurants and looking into what was available on the market. When his daughters reached the college years, Norman decided it was time to go back to work. He became the Master Chef for the Law Offices of Carlson & Meissner in Clearwater, Florida.

"It was a fulfilling job," said Norman. "I would go to the market and pick out fresh produce, seafood and flowers. There was nothing short of thirteen piece place settings I had no budget to stay within and was serving great lawyers and Supreme Court judges. It was a wonderful experience and I had fun working.'

"We thoroughly enjoyed Norm when he was at our firm," said Suzie Lemberg, Director of Marketing at the Law Offices of Carlson & Meissner. "He brought classic gourmet dishes to the luncheon table and charmed corporate guests with his recitations of the history of each of the things he prepared. Any community will benefit not only from his cooking talent, but from his enthusiasm and charm."

Norman continued to be diverse and went on to become the Executive Chef and the Food and Beverage Director at the Lake City Country Club in Florida. He was back to working long days planning menus,

working the food markets, preparing mouth-watering meals and loving every minute

"I've had many titles, but they don't mean anything,' said Norman. "I learned many things from others and had chefs study from me. The important thing is to use what I've learned and make people happy. My kitchen will never close if I have a hungry customer waiting to eat, even if it means that I serve 'eight' days a week," he added.

On the first day of spring in 1997 Norman married his wife Jacqueline. She is French and was born and raised on the island Reunion, located in the Indian Ocean in Southern Africa. He met her at a country club in Florida. In her country, your last name becomes your middle name upon marriage. She is now Jacqueline Techer Henry.

After their marriage they traveled in Europe, spending time studying the food and culture in Paris and many other places. In Europe a chef is considered a prestigious position, much like a physician or lawyer would be here. They made a visit to the island 'Reunion' so Norman could meet Jacqueline's' family. About a year and a half ago Norman and his wife decided to move north. They settled in the Milwaukee area, where he had friends.

"I liked the area, " said Norman. "It is like a grown up Grand Rapids, Michigan. The climate is much like what I grew up in."

He wasn't having any luck getting back into the food industry in an area where he could be paid for his expertise and help and serve people. He worked other jobs, using his people skills, but it wasn't the same as being directly involved with food.

"I wasn't able to find my place so the option was to create my own," he said. "Kewaskum is in a good location, easily accessible, where the word of mouth advertising

will bring people here. I found the community friendly and decided to settle here.'

Norman is a very particular type of chef. He intends to have all of the seafood flown in fresh from Florida. The beef will be prime cuts of certified Angus, dry aged in a controlled environment for a minimum of 21-28 days. The result is good quality meat with great texture and better taste. The beef will be pan fried in an iron skillet. There will be the famous Friday night fish fries; Sunday southern fried chicken and much more.

The Salt H2O Café will have a family style Cajun deep fried turkey. Reservations will be required so enough fresh turkeys are available to meet the demand. The turkey will be injected with seasonings and will feed a family of up to ten for \$40, including all of the fixings. Any leftovers will be sent home with the family. All of the potatoes are real mashed potatoes and the biscuits are homemade.

'The first time I heard of fried turkey I had no idea how good it would taste," said Norman. "It is not spicy, just full of flavor. It will be like having Thanksgiving dinner year round at the café. Any leftover turkey will become sandwiches for the next day, just like making it at home, but without the work to prepare it yourself.'

Norman Henry has a flare for having good taste in art as well. The restaurant has a watercolor print on the menu and he owns several wonderful prints of his own. It has been said that creative people tend to have good taste in many areas. He hopes that becomes true in the café.

The menu boasts appetizers from chips and salsa, fried green tomatoes, shrimp, clam strips and mussels to Cajun crawfish. There is soups and side orders like good old-fashioned French fries and salads such as Chicken Caesar and Walnut Chicken to a fresh fruit

Sandwiches listed under the beach favorites include a sirloin burger, breast of chicken or a soft-shell crab served with onion roll, chips and pickle. Catering to Wisconsin there are also the Badger favorites like Braunschweiger on rye, brats and the Reuben. A wet burrito is sure to satisfy many

The Salt H₂0 Café will have the same menu for lunch and dinner, adding specials for each daily. The house special is the Florida Mix Grill, which includes shrimp, scallops, grouper, and frog legs served on a bed of rice for \$7.50. Other entrees include New York Strip steak, fried shrimp, baked Canadian whitefish; pan fried frog legs and barbecued baby back ribs to name a few.

Desserts will include Key Lime cheesecake, Mississippi Mud Pie, Southern Pecan Pie, Peanut Butter Pie and ice cream. The café will have free refills on soda, tea and coffee. Many choices and daily specials will have something for everyone.

As the weather warms, Norman has plans of putting back in the old entrance and adding outdoor seating for spring, summer and fall. The handicapped accessible entrance will also remain.

"I plan on bringing to Kewaskum the same as I expect from myself when I dine out," said Norman. "I like a clean kitchen, good food at reasonable prices, with friendly service in a timely fashion."


Norman knows there are some challenges along the way. Like any new business things have to get organized and everyone has to learn their job. Good work ethic and loyalty are the base for all types of businesses.

"It will take a little time for everything to be organized and the new employees to learn their part of the café, "he said. "It takes teamwork to make a restaurant work. Any new business needs start-up time to make things flow smoothly. I am sure it will be a combined effort of success.'

History just might be able to repeat itself. Kewaskum may soon see travelers, coming from near and far, to explore the area and dine in the historical building on the corner. The Salt H2O Café has a friendly atmosphere, reasonable prices and good food that will be prepared by our own Master Chef, Norman Henry.







TYPE OF PLASTIC: Plastic Bottles, Jugs and Wide Mouth Food Containers. This plastic is normally found in milk, water and detergent bottles and jugs. Wide mouth food containers are normally ice cream, margarine and cool whip containers.

HINT: H.D.P.E. bottles, jugs and wide mouth food containers will carry the #2 emblem stamped or molded on the bottom. Some milk and water jugs carry no emblem but they are recyclable.

PREPARATION: REMOVE CAPS, RINGS AND METAL HANDLES AND RINSE CLEAN. This is the most important aspect of a successful recycling program. Bottles that contain liquid residue cannot be recycled. Place #2 plastic bottles in your dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag along with the other recyclable items. Place bin or bag at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be Wednesdays for both solid waste and recyclables. Multi-family dwellings of six or more, remember, your recycling pickup will be the first and third Wednesday of each month.

NOTE: DO NOT place automotive product bottles in the recycling bin or bag.



Players must live in or attend a private or parochial school in the Kewaskum School District to participate in the program. Players are responsible for helping to raise the funds needed to operate the club.







ORDINANCE NO. 99-1

ORDINANCE CREATING ARTICLE VIII. SECTION 2-511 ETC. OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE ESTABLISHING AN ETHICS CODE

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin creates Section 2-511 etc. of the Municipal Code which reads as follows:

ARTICLE VIII. ETHICS CODE

2-511 Declaration of Policy 2-512 Responsibility of Public Office

2-513 Dedicated Service

2-514 Fair and Equal Treatment 2-515 Conflicts of Interest

2-516 Contracts with the Village

2-517 Disclosure in Interest in Legislation 2-518 Campaign Contributions

2-519 Ethics Board

2-520 Duties of Ethics Board

2-521 Applicability of Code

2-522 Severability

Sec. 2-511 Declaration of Policy.

The proper operation of democratic government requires that public officials and employees be independent, impartial and responsible to the people; that government decisions and policy be made in proper channels of governmental structure; that public office not be used for personal gain; and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its government. In recognition of these goals, there is hereby established a code of ethics for all of the Village of Kewaskum officials and employees, whether elected or appointed, paid or unpaid, including members of boards, committees and commissions of the Village. The purpose of this Code is to establish guidelines for ethical standards of conduct for all such officials and employees by setting forth those acts or actions that are incompatible with the best interests of the Village of Kewaskum and by directing disclosure by such officials and employees of private financial or other interests in matters affecting the Village. The provisions and purpose of this Code and such rules and regulations as may be established are hereby declared to be in the best interests of the Village of Kewaskum.

Sec. 2-512 Responsibility of Public Office

Public officials and employees are agents of public purpose and hold office for the benefit of the public. They are bound to uphold the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State and carry out impartially the laws of the nation, state and Village and to observe in their official acts the highest standards of integrity and to discharge faithfully the duties of their office regardless of personal considerations, recognizing that the public interest must be their prime concern. Their conduct in both their official and private affairs should be above reproach so as to foster respect for all govenment.

Sec. 2-213 Dedicated Service.

(a) All officials and employees of the Village of Kewaskum should be loyal to the objectives expressed by the electorate and the programs developed to attain these objectives. Appointive officials and employees should adhere to the rules of work performance established as the standard for their position by the appropriate authority.

(b) Officials and employees should not exceed their authority or breach the law or ask others to do so, and they should work in full cooperation with other public officials and employees unless prohibited from so doing by law or officially recognized confidentiality of their work.

Sec. 2-514 Fair and Equal Treatment

(a) Use of Public Property. No official or employee shall request or permit the use of Village-owned vehicles, equipment, materials or property for personal convenience or profit without previously receiving authorization from the Village Board.

(b) Obligations to Citizens. No official or employee shall grant any special consideration, treatment or advantage to any citizen beyond that which is available to every other citizen.

Sec. 2-515 Conflicts of Interests.

(a) Interest Prohibited. No official or employee, whether paid or unpaid, shall engage in any business or transaction or shall act in regard to financial or other personal interest, direct or indirect, which is incompatible with the proper discharge of their official duties in the public interest contrary to the provisions of this Chapter or would tend to impair their independence of judgement or action in the performance of their official duties. (b) Definitions.

(1) Financial Interest. Any interest which shall yield, directly or indirectly, a monetary or other material benefit to the officer or employee or to any person employing or retaining the services of the officer or employee.

(2) Personal Interest. Any interest arising from blood or marriage relationships or from close business or political associations, whether or not any financial interest is involved.

(3) Person. Any person, corporation, partnership, joint venture, association, company, firm, enterprise trust or other legal entity.

(c) Specific Conflicts Enumerated.

(1) Incompatible employment. No official or employee shall engage in or accept private employment or render service for private interest, when such employment or service is incompatible with the proper discharge of their official duties or would tend to impair their independence of judgement or action in the performance of their official duties, unless otherwise permitted by law and unless disclosure is made as hereinafter provided. (2) Disclosure of Confidential Information. No official or employee shall, without proper legal authorization, disclose confidential information concerning the property, government, or affairs of the Village, nor shall they use such information to advance the financial or other private interest of themselves or

(3) Gifts and Favors. No official or employee shall accept any one gift with a value of more than \$25.00, whether in the form of service, loan, thing or promise from any if such person:

a. Has or is seeking to obtain a contractual or other business or financial relationship with the Village or the Board; or

 b. Conducts operations or activities which are regulated by the Village or the Board: or

c. Has interests which may be substantially affected by the Village or the Board.

(4) No official or employee shall accept such gifts having an aggregate value of more than \$100.00 in any calendar year

from any person if such person:

a. Has or is seeking to obtain a contractual or other business or financial relationship with the Village or the Board; or b. Conducts operations or activities which are regulated by the Village or the Board; or

c. Has interests which may be substantially affected by the Village or the Board.

(5) No official or employee shall accept any gift, favor or thing of value that may tend to influence them in the discharge of their duties, or grant in the discharge of their duties any improper favor, service or thing of value

Specific Exemptions. Modest ceremonial events, i.e. ground breaking, grand openings as well as business lunches, outings and conferences shall be exempt, provided that the value does not exceed the value in (4). Mementos such as coffee, coffee cups, candy provided the value is less than the value in (3) and that distribution is of a general nature.

(6) Gifts received under unusual circumstances should be referred to the Ethics Board within ten (10) days for recom-

mended disposition.

(7) Representing Private Interests Before Village Agencies or Courts. No officer or employee shall appear on behalf of any private person, other than himself, his spouse or minor children, before any Village agency or municipal court. However, a member of the Village Board may appear before Village agencies on behalf of their constituents in the course of their duties as a representative of the electorate or in the performance of public or civic obligations.

Sec. 2-516 Contracts with the Village.

No Village official or employee who, in their capacity as such officer or employee participates in making of a contract in which they have a private pecuniary interest, direct or indirect, or performs in regard to that contract some function requiring exercise of discretion on his part, shall enter into any contract with the Village unless, within the confines of Sec. 946.13, Wis. Stats,:

(a) The contract is awarded through a process of public notice and competitive bidding; or

(b) The Ethics Board hereinafter created waives the requirement of this Section after determining that it is in the best interest of the Village to do so.

Sec. 2-517 Disclosure of Interest in Legislation.

(a) Any member of the Village Board who has a financial interest or personal interest in any proposed legislation before the Village Board shall disclose on the records of the Village Board, the nature and extent of

(b) Any other official or employee who has a financial interest in any proposed legislative action of the Village Board and who participates in discussion with or gives an official opinion or recommendation to the Village Board shall disclose on the records of the Village Board the nature and extent of such interest.

Sec. 2-518 Campaign Contributions

Campaign contributions shall be reported by all candidates for Village office in strict conformity with the provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes. Any campaign contribution tendered to or accepted by a candidate subsequent to the final statutory report shall be reported to the Ethics Board.

Sec. 2-519 Ethics Board.

There is hereby created an Ethics Board consisting of three (3) members and one alternate who shall serve without compensation unless the Village Board otherwise provides. The members of the Board of Ethics shall be residents of the Village and shall not be elected officials, full-time appointed officials, Village employees, nor shall they be currently serving on any other Village board or commission. (Exclusion an election poll worker would not be disqualified from serving.) Each member shall be appointed by the Village President and subject to confirmation by the Village Board. The Village Attorney shall furnish the Board of Ethics whatever legal assistance necessary in carrying out its function. Terms of office shall be three (3) years, except that when the initial appointments are made one (1) member shall be appointed for one (1) year, one (1) for two (2) years and one (1) for three (3) years. The alternate shall serve on the Board when one of the members of the Board is unavailable. The term of the alternate shall be for three (3) years. The Ethics Board shall elect its own chairman and vice chairman.

Sec. 2-520 Duties of Ethics Board.

(a) The Ethics Board may adopt and develop written rules which shall be submitted to the Village Board for approval. A copy of such rules shall be on file with the Village Clerk.

(b) Any person to whom this ordinance applies, may apply to the Ethics Board for an advisory opinion and shall be guided by the opinion rendered. Such person shall have the opportunity to present their interpretation of the facts at issue and of the applicability of provisions of the Code before the advisory decision is rendered. The Board's deliberations and action upon such applications shall be in meetings not open to the pu Records of the Board's opinions, opinion requests and investigations of violations shall be closed to public inspection. The Board, however, may make such records public with the consent of the individual requesting the advisory opinion. In the event the Board deems it necessary or appropriate, it may request an advisory opinion from the Village Attorney. (Note:

(c) The Board shall investigate any complaint properly filed with it. (d) The Board shall accept from any person, or make upon its own motion, a verified complaint in writing which shall state the name of the official or employee alleged to have committed a violation of this chapter and which shall set forth the particulars thereof. The Board shall forward within ten (10) days a copy of the complaint to the official or employee who is accused. If no action on the verified complaint is taken by the Board within sixty (60) days of filing with the Board, the complaint shall be

(e) Following the receipt or motion of verified complaint, the Board may make preliminary investigations with respect to alleged violation of this chapter. No preliminary investigation of the activities of any official or employee may be initiated unless such official or employee is notified in writing prior to such investigation. The notice shall state the exact nature and purpose of the investigation, the individual's specific actions or activities to be investigated and a statement of such person's due process

(f) If, after such investigation, the Board finds that probable cause exists for believing the allegations of the complaint, it shall conduct a hearing on the matter which shall be held not more than (30) days after such finding. The Board shall give the accused at least twenty (20) days' notice of the hearing date. Such hearings shall be at open session unless the accused petitions for a hearing closed to the public. The rules of criminal evidence, including certified copies of records and documents which the Board considers, shall be fully offered and made part of the record in the case. Every party shall be afforded adequate opportunity to rebut or offer countervailing evidence. (Continued on page page)

(g) During all stages of any investigation or proceeding conducted under this section, the accused or any persons whose activities are under investigation shall be entitled to be represented by counsel of his own choos-

ing.
(h) The accused or their representative shall have an adequate opportunity to examine all documents and records to be used at the hearing under sub. d. at a reasonable time before the date of the hearing as well as during the hearing, to bring witnesses, to establish all pertinent facts and circumstances, and to question or refute any testimony or evidence, including opportunity to confront and cross-examine adverse witnesses.

(i) The Board shall have the power to compel the attendance of witnesses and to issue subpoenas granted other boards and commissions under Section 885.01(3) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

(j) Determination. Upon conclusion of the hearing the Board shall file its decision within five (5) days in writing signed by all participating Board Members with findings of fact, conclusions of law concerning the propriety of the conduct of the official or employee and if appropriate, refer the matter to Village Board or other proper authority with a recommendation for suspension, removal from office or employment or other disciplinary action.

(k) The affirmative vote of the Board shall be required for any action taken by the Board, with the exception that action taken by the Board pursuant to a hearing conducted under sub. f. shall require a two-thirds vote.

Sec. 2-521 Applicability of Code.

This code shall be operative in all instances covered by provisions except when superceded by an applicable statutory provision and statutory action is mandatory or when the application of statutory action is mandatory or when the application of a statutory provision is discretionary but determined by the Ethics Board to more appropriate or desirable.

Sec. 2-522 Severability.

If any provision of this ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions of application of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as provided by law.



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

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
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County to Hold Informational Forums On Waterbody Classification Project



The Kewaskum boys basketball team hosted the seventh-ranked Campbellsport Cougars (18-3) last Tuesday evening in the opening Regional game of the annual W.I.A.A. state basketball tournament.

The Indians, despite a ferocious third quarter comeback succumbed, 58-49, in the Division II contest. Kewaskum played a very sluggish first half, scoring only 17 points.

"Our slow starts have plagued us all year," Coach Tom Timblin reported, adding, "We were getting good looks, but they wouldn't fall. We shot 6-23 in the first half. 26% from the field isn't going to beat the Little Sisters of the Poor, much less a ranked team."

After some half time adjustments, the Indians, who trailed 26-17, came out with a vengeance. They scored the first seven points of the third quarter and cut the lead to 26-24. After exchanging baskets, the Indian's Andy Christophersen, who scored six points in the quarter, gave KHS their first lead with a slashing layup, 29-28.

The Indian's mad bombers were finding their range as Josh Gaffke swished two long treys. Chris Koth and Shaun Timblin also nailed shots from beyond the arch as the home crowd roared its approval.

The Cougars called timeout to break the Indians momentum. It seemed to work as Campbellsport went on a 9-4 run of their own to retrieve the advantage at the end of the third

frame, 41-37.

The fourth quarter found both teams playing well. The Indians, who were overplaying the Cougar guards with outside ball pressure the entire second half, gave
