Lynn Wins 1500M, 3200M **Runs at Championships**

Gains Provisional Qualifying Time for Nationals in 3200M Run



VINTAGE MARNI LYNN... Running strong, focused, determined and leading from start to finish, Marni Lynn of Carroll College provisionally qualified for Nationals in the 3000m run with a time of 10:17.59 on Saturday, April 24, at the Wisconsin Private College Championships held at Carthage College in Kenosha.

KENOSHA - Marni fying time so incredible was Lynn, a sophomore at Carroll College and former Kewaskum High School cross country and track standout, won both the 1500m and 3000m runs and placed second in the 800m run, Saturday, April 24, at the Wisconsin Private College Championships at Carthage College.

Lynn's winning time of 10:17.59 (ten minutes, 17.59 seconds) in the 3000m run, also gave her a provisional qualifying time for the NCAA Divisional III National Track and Field Championships to be held at Baldwin-Wallace College in Ohio on May 20-22. (The provisional qualifying time for the 3000m run is 10:19.74 and the automatic qualifying time is 10:10.24.)

What made Lynn's quali-

that it was accomplished in her third race of the afternoon. After finishing second in the 800m run, Lynn ran extemely determined and focused in the 3000m run.

The race was vintage Marni Lynn. She led from start to finish, running very consistent laps of 84-85 seconds until the last 400m when she picked up the pace and sprinted to the finish. Lynn finished approximately 200m ahead of second place. Lynn's time of 10:17.59 also set a meet record, but just missed the Carroll College school record of 10:16.4.

Lynn led the 1500m run, her first race of the afternoon, from start to finish. Lynn won the race fairly

easily with a time of 4:40.72
- approximately six-eight seconds ahead of second place and also set a meet

Lynn also led the first lap of the 800m run, but was passed on the start of the back stretch. Lynn later admitted that the other runner got a little too far ahead of her before she (Lynn) realized that she could beat her. Marni made up a distance of 7-8 meters and almost nipped the other runner at the wire in a very close finish. Lynn's time for the 800m race was 2:17.60.

According to Lynn's coach, Brian Bliese, "today was just supposed to be a 30 point workout, (10 points for each first place), but it ended up only being 28 points." (20 points for the two first places and eight for the second place). In other words, Lynn was training right through this meet and was not peaking

After her competition on Saturday, Lynn offered the following comment, "I felt like I was in high school again running three events (the 1600m, 800m and the 3200m runs) at the big invitationals like the Vanderpan and the conference meet."

The next meet for Lynn and the Carroll College Pioneers is the Badger Classic on Saturday, May 1, at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Lynn will probably run just one or two races against some stiff competition.

The following week at the Midwest Conference Championships on May 7 and 8, at Monmouth, Lynn tentatively will run the 1500m on Friday and the 5000m, 800m and 3000m runs on Saturday. Good luck Marni!








Dear Editor:

The Washington County Humane Society is joining paws with thousands of animal organizations throughout the United States for Pet Adoptathon '99 and Be Kind to Animals Week.

Pet Adoptathon is in its fourth year and is an annual effort to match thousands of homeless animals with loving adopters. The Adoptathon is scheduled for Saturday, May 1, and WCHS will be having extended hours from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Visitors can see the many wonderful animals we have at the shelter, enjoy refreshments and free samples, and perhaps find a lifelong compan-

Be Kind to Animals Week runs from Sunday, May 2, through Saturday, May 8, and is a celebration of the good things we've accomplished for our animal friends. In 1998, WCHS provided shelter for almost 3,000 animals and reunited over 315 families and their pets. In addition, more than 1000 area school children benefited from humane education and 82 classrooms received KIND News. We also temporarily sheltered four animals of abuse victims, provided to dogs to agencies training them for the disabled, and visited 14 nursing homes and hospitals with our Pet-A-Pet Therapy Program.

The community also helped us in return. Over 200 volunteers donated more than 5000 hours for Letter to the Editor: special events, visits to nursing homes, office work and the general care of the shelter animals. And more than 900 families adopted dogs and cats from our shelter, giving them a second chance for a life-long home.

Pet Adoptathon and Be Kind to Animals Week allow us to celebrate the companionship, friendship and love animals bring to our lives. They also bring attention to the little extra things we can do to show kindness from putting up a bird feeder in the backyard, to spending a little extra time with our own pets. As we begin this year's celebration, we are further reminded of our responsibilities to our animal friends: that we need to spay and neuter our pets, that some animals need is to provide care and companionship, and that others need us to respect and maintain their habitats

All in all, it will be a week with a significant message -- there are hundreds of thousands of abandoned pets who need loving, caring, permanent homes. As citizen members of the Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Task Force in Washington County, we are writing to express our concern over the reduction in Community Aids funding due to the Federal Social Service Block Grant cuts. Within the area of substance abuse, this reduction in funding will affect the number of days available to individuals for treatment in a halfway house setting, the number of hours available for cases management, the amount of community resources available to the public and the availability of treatment in a clinic setting for those individuals without other means to pay. While we at the County level will do what we can to prevent disruption of service to individuals in need, we are also asking for assistance at the State level.

It is our understanding the current Budget Bill does not include any funding to reduce the impact at the County level of the Block Grant cut. On behalf of those individuals who are least able to ask for themselves, we are requesting the Joint Finance Committee include additional monies in the 1999-2001 Budget Bill to offset this loss of Federal dollars. We are asking the State to consider the negative impact of provid-

ing less to individuals who have identified abuse issues and are in need of treatment. We ask that the State continue to provide an equitable partnership in funding services for substance abuse prevention and treat-



Thunderstorms are classfied as single-cell, multi-cell, or super-cell. Each "cell" contains an "inflow" updraft region and an "outflow' downdraft region. Updraft regions consist of moist, unstable, buoyant air rising upwards at speeds of 30 to 90 mph. Downdraft regions can consist of heavy rains, hail, poor visibilities and sometimes strong, damaging downburst winds of 100 mph or more. 

An average of 21 tornadoes occur in Wisconsin each year, but some counties can have many tornado-free years in a row. An average of one person dies each year in Wisconsin from tornadorelated injuries. Tornadoes have a circulation (rotating column of air) touching the ground. However, funnel clouds are defined as not touching the ground.



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Game Fish Season Opens May 1

MADISON - Anglers who are looking forward to the start of Wisconsin's general inland game fish season on Saturday, May 1, should find open waters in the north and excellent populations of walleye, bass and trout in many state lakes and rivers again this year, according to state fisheries biologists.

"The top story has to be walleye," says Mike Staggs, who directs the Department of Natural Resources Fisheries Habitat and Protection Bureau. "We have had several strong year classes since 1996 in many waters across the state which is now resulting in excellent walleye fishing."

Fisheries biologists are reporting that walleye populations are outstanding in the Mississippi and Wisconsin Rivers, the Lake Winnebago system, Green Bay and the Fox River, and many larger natural walleye lakes and flowages.

Anglers in the north must check for reduced daily bag limits on specific waters in the ceded territory due to Chippewa spearfishing declarations. The total daily bag limit for walleye statewide is five, whether taken on one lake or multiple lakes. Anglers are reminded to remove all fish from their boats before fishing subsequent lakes with restricted walleye bag limits.

Certain inland waters have special fishing regulations in place that differ from the statewide rules, so anglers should always check the regulation pamphlet for specific regulations.

BASS FORECAST STRONG

Bass anglers should also find excellent fishing opportunities during the coming season, most likely in response to the statewide minimum size limits enacted in 1989. Smallmouth are doing very well, particularly in larger rivers and Sturgeon Bay while largemouth populations seem to be doing well wherever there is good habitat, Staggs says. While the populations are

good, opening day fishing success will depend on how the weather cooperates.

In the southern zone, the season opens May 1 for largemouth and small-mouth bass with a 14-inch minimum size limit and a daily bag limit of five in total.

In the northern zone, the bass season opens for catch and release only on May 1. The harvest season for bass opens June 19 with a minimum size limit of 14 inches with a daily bag limit of five in total for largemouth and smallmouth bass.

Beginning this year, the minimum length limit for largemouth and smallmouth bass will also be 14 inches for Lake Michigan, Green Bay and their tributaries, with a daily bag limit of five in total. The season here also opens on May 1.

LOW WATER LEVELS PRODUCE TROUT PROSPECTS

Trout anglers may begin keeping fish on May 1, marking the end of the early catch-and-release trout season that opened statewide on March 1.

Anglers are likely to find good numbers of trout and most likely excellent fishing conditions.

"We've had good natural reproduction over the past several years, and our stocking levels, which were cut back in 1996-97 due to budget restrictions, have returned to normal," Stagg says.

Anglers should benefit from the low water levels in streams in central and northern Wisconsin as of mid-April because of a lack of rainfall over the past year. "While the low water makes for good fishing condition, anglers need to exercise restraint in catching and harvesting trout since they can be more vulnerable under low water conditions," Stagg says.

MUSKY, NORTHERN PIKE, PANFISH OPPORTUNITIES GOOD, TOO

The muskellunge fishing season also opens May 1 in southern waters (South of U.S. Highway 10) and recent successful stocking efforts should produce excellent fishing in the south. The muskellunge

fishing season opens in northern Wisconsin on May 29.

Northern pike fishing in the southern zone has also been improving since the implementation of the 26inch minimum length limit and two-daily bag limit. Northern pike fishing opens statewide on May 1.

The daily bag limit on panfish, including bluegills, sunfish, crappies, pumpkinseeds and yellow perch on Lake Michigan and Green Bay is 25 fish in total, but the bag limit on yellow perch in Lake Michigan remains at five. This limit has been in place for the past two seasons in response to the population collapse in Lake Michigan, Stagg says. "We've seen evidence that the perch populations are rebounding but it will be several more years before we could contemplate increasing the bag limits.'

Steelhead fishing on Lake Michigan is in better shape and is continuing to improve. Last year was an off year for coho and brown trout -- most fisheries biologists think because of unusual weather conditions, Stagg says, "but if we get a more normal weather pattern this year, we expect

fishing for all species to improve greatly."

Anglers and DNR conservation wardens have already reported an "outstanding" early season fishing for brown trout and good steelhead runs this spring.



Making Use of Your Yard Waste

Composting is perhaps the best way to transfer this summer's yard and garden waste into soil fertilizer for next summer.

Compost is an ideal soil amendment for gardens, flower beds, shrub areas, and potting soil. A variety of lawn, garden and home waste materials will produce excellent compost.

These materials include grass clippings, leaves, manure, straw, hay, sawdust, shredded newspaper, hedge clippings, and plant refuse (if it is not diseased). Wood ashes are not recommended because they act as liming agents in the soil and soils in this area already have a high PH (alkaline). Most home garbage may be used in the compost heap with the exception of grease, fat, meat scraps, and bones. These may attract animals and develop an odor during decomposition.

To begin your compost pile, provide an enclosure to hold the materials in place. Make the bin a workable size and height. A three to five foot circular or rectangular bin which is four to five feet high is best. Chicken wire or snowfence make ideal construction materials since they allow good air circulation through the pile.

If you have the room, build two side-by-side bins. Two bins permit turning compost by moving it from one bin to the other.

The pile may be started directly on the ground if your soil is well drained. Spread a six to ten inch layer of organic matter in the bin, usually putting your coarsest material on the bottom. Moisten, but do not soak, the layers of organic material.

Over the layer of your composting material, sprinkle a complete garden fertilizer such as 10-10-10, about one cup for each 25 square feet of surface area. Mixing fresh grass clippings in with the compost often provides the needed nitrogen.

Next, add a layer of soil one to two inches thick. The soil contains micro-organisms necessary for decomposition. A layer of finished compost from the prior year may be substituted for the soil. Continue alternating these layers until the pile reaches a maximum height of five feet. Moisten each layer as needed.

Proper care of the pile is

essential to insure successful compost. Turning or mixing the pile periodically is necessary. During warm weather, turn every one to two months. In the winter, little decomposition occurs, so turning is not necessary. During excessively heavy rainfall, the pile should be covered with plastic to avoid soaking.

About a month after starting the pile, it should be hot in the center. The temperature should reach between 140 and 160 degrees Fahrenheit. This will kill off many, but not all, weed seeds and plant diseases. The heat indicates decomposition. proper Failure to heat may be a result of too much water, improper aeration, too little nitrogen, or too small of a

The compost will be ready to use in 8-12 months. The pile should shrink to about half of its original height. The finished compost will be dark and



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
