


"I am especially happy about his spiritual development," she continued. "Saint Lawrence is a special place. I don't know how to explain it to other parents, but I keep trying."

# CTH B Standoff Holds Officers at Bay for 13 Hours

After a 13 hour stand-off with officers of the Washington County Sheriff's Department and SWAT team, and West Bend and Germantown SWAT teams, 35 year old Jeffrey Meyer surrendered himself from his Town of Kewaskum farmhouse to the custody of

the Sheriff's Dept.

By the end of the turmoil, two officers had been struck by the gunfire of Meyer and two others were fired upon. In excess of 40 rounds of teargas was released into Meyer's home by the days end.

The intense turn of events were iniated when the Sheriff's Department received a call from a biker who was concerned about a loose dog who came running after him while he biked past the farm Meyer was working at.

Deputy Tim Ewing approached Meyer at that farm and Meyer allegedly fired a shot at the retreating Ewing. The shot shattered the passenger-side door window of his

# A Memorial Day Letter

MAY 30, 1999

To the Editor:

Tiny flags on millions of American graves will stir gently in the breeze this Memorial Day as our nation gives thanks to the ultimate sacrifices of its citizen soldiers. They fought and died to keep our nation free. Millions of disabled American veterans, who also greatly sacrificed, will be at cemeteries across America to ensure their fallen brothers and sisters are remembered with honor. But it is deeply saddening and disturbing that these men and women, disabled by war, are not remembered. They are part of lost generations who fought in wars, were severely wounded, but go largely unnoticed except when they turn out to salute their fallen comrades on Memorial Day.

To correct that oversight, legislation is pending in the U.S. Congress to create a national memorial in Washington D.C. to uniquely honor disabled veterans who served and sacrificed for their country. I am very proud to be a part of the effort to create a special memorial to honor the nearly 2.3 million disabled veterans living today. This memorial, to be funded by private contributions, will be the first monument dedicated to disabled veterans who are still living.

To accomplish this noble goal, the Disabled Veterans' LIFE Memorial Foundation was created as a non-profit corporation. It is led by Chairman Lois B. Pope, a philanthropist, and President Arthur H. Wilson, Chief Executive Officer of the million member organization, the Disabled American Veterans. Jesse Brown, former Secretary of the Department of Veterans Affairs, serves as Executive Director. The Foundation looks with great anticipation to cooperation from the Parks Service and Congressional approval of legislation to achieve our goal to honor America's disabled veterans.

This memorial will be symbolic of the soul and spirit of America, it will proudly recognize the power and virtue of sacrifice, and to remember those who have defended our land in war and peace. Above all, the memorial will stand as an important symbol of the cost of freedom, a timeless reminder that the sacrifices of disabled veterans are appreciated, and that Ameria salutes its defendence.

Throughout our history, disabled veterans have paid the price for American freedom and have borne the deepest wounds and scars of wars. They are truly our unsung heroes. Therefore, America has a solemn obligation to assure that these men and women who have served and sacrificed for

this country and the cause of freedom will never be forgotten.

The price of freedom continues to be paid long after the guns fall silent -- lost limbs, disability, blindness, paralysis, and other unique, extensive and debilitating injuries. There are also the costs of lives lost and lives shortened, and lives that are forever changed.

Disabled veterans' lives were traumatized by their military experiences. Many will never know the wonder of a morning run because they have no legs or legs that are paralyzed and useless. Others can never hold their children or grandchildren in their arms because they have no arms. Many will never enjoy the beauty of a sunset or a spring day, because they live in eternal darkness. Burned deep within their memories are the horrors and brutality of war. They pay the price of freedom for a lifetime.

The price of freedom has a long history. Today, there are two widows and 15 children of Civil War veterans who receive compensation for the veterans' service-connected deaths. There are 13 An er can veterans still living day who were disabled in the Mexican Border War against Pancho Villa. There are nearly 779 disabled veterans who suffered from the gas attacks and barrages of World War I. Nearly 798,000 veterans who were disabled during World War II continue their service to America today as part of what Tom Brokaw has

called, "America's greatest generation." Nearly 273,000 Americans disabled during the Korean War are preparing to memorialize the 50th Anniversary of that conflict. Contributing to making our nation great are 815,000 disabled veterans who served during the Vietnam Era. And 231,000 veterans disabled during the Persian Gulf War will be part of the American landscape far into the 21st century.

The nearly 2.3 million disabled veterans in America today continue to make significant contributions to our nation's spirit and vitality. And sadly, that number will continue to grow, because the world is still a dangerous place.

On this Memorial Day, we will give thanks to the approximately 1,000 veterans who die each day. Most of them are World War II veterans, and many of them have died or will die from the complications of wounds suffered during combat. They go with the thanks of a grateful nation. Let us as a people also give thanks to disabled veterans who continue to serve, to contribute, and to do all they can to make this nation secure and prosperous. They, too, should be honored by the nation they served so faithfully.







#### RED BEANS AND RICE

14 oz. smoked turkey sausage, thinly sliced

1 c. chopped onion 1 clove garlic, minced

3 (16 oz.) cans red beans, drained

1 (14 1/2 oz) can stewed tomatoes (undrained), chopped 1 1/2 c. water

4 c. cooked long-grain rice 1 (6 oz.) can tomato paste 1/4 tsp. dried oregano

1/4 tsp. dried thyme 1 baby leaf





squad car. Ewing sustained minor injuries to the face from the shattered glass. After being shot at Ewing called in for assistance.

The deputy returned fire but Meyer had escaped to his own farm about a mile north where a shotgun and two rifles were available to him. The two rifles were never used according to Sheriff Jack Theusch.

Deputy. Ewing was treated and returned to his post later in the afternoon.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department and West Bend SWAT teams responded to the scene after it was apparent that Meyer was not coming out of his home, Members then encompassed a square-mile radius of the house.

Deputies attempted to reach Meyer by phone but he refused to answer repeated calls.

Meyer's mother was brought to the scene. She made repeated pleas to her son to relinquish himself from the house

With all options exhausted it was decided the only way to bring a halt to the situation was by exposing Meyer's surroundings with tear gas.

Numerous rounds were fired, but the mission was unsuccessful. Meyer remained inside his refuge.

The situation dragged on throughout the afternoon. Travis Vickney, a member of the West Bend SWAT team sustained a gunshot wound in his leg shortly after 12:30 pm. He was transported to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend by Kewaskum Rescue Squad. He was treated and released from the hospital and returned to again take up his position on the scene.

Sgt. Jeff Gonzalez escaped death when a bullet which was fired at him hit his shield destroying it.

At that point sharpshooters were authorized to return fire upon Meyer if necessary.

Meyer's girlfriend was also brought on to the scene to try and coax him from the house. She was also unsuccessful.

Sheriff Jack Thuesch stated he called the Kenosha County Sheriff's Department for use of their armored personnel carrier. It arrived on the scene at 8 pm. Several more rounds of the tear gas were released into the home. At that point a bright flash was seen and smoke bellowed out of the home's broken windows indicating a fire had erupted.

Minutes later Mever, came to the back door, shotgun in his left hand and a towel covering his right hand. Detective Mike Reibe assured Meyer everything would be fine and to drop his weapon and move slowly out the door. He did so. Moments later he picked up his shotgun, dropping it to the ground one final time. He moved several feet from his refuge and was taken into custody. Flames came bursting through the window of the house as Meyer was arrested.

Meyer was transported to St. Joseph's Community Hospital by Kewaskum Rescue Squad where he was treated for smoke inhalation.

Kewaskum Fire Department responded and put out the fire.

Theusch stated that his department has had problems with Meyer in the past, and that it was believed he was on medication. He further indicated some of the confrontations had been violent but never this dramatic after which he had always been referred to the proper medical officials.

Theusch also stated he was concerned with the TV helicopters that were present for most of the day's events. At one point he said he radioed for them to "back-off" and they did, but it was a problem later in the evening, making communications with Meyer difficult. He further stated that Meyer had made contact with him to get rid of the helicopters, that was the only direct contact they had with him the entire day.

Meyer made an initial court appearance the following day. A cash bail of \$200,000 was

He was charged with four counts of attempted first degree homicide and one count of refusing to comply with a lawful order in Washington County Circuit Court.

A psychiatric exam was ordered for Meyer at the Winnebago State Hospital in Oshkosh. Meyer's attorney ordered the examination.

# Lynn Wins 3000m Run at Nationals

Earns All-American Status in Both 3000m and 1500m Runs

BEREA, OHIO -- Kewaskum's Marni Lynn of Carroll College won the 3,000m run at the NCAA Division III Women's 1999 Outdoor Track and Field Championships on Friday, May 21.

Lynn, only a sophomore, won the race in vintage Lynn style, by leading from start to finish. Lynn posted an excellent personal best time of 9:48.84 to win the 3,000m event by over six seconds.

This is the second national championship for Lynn who won the indoor NCAA 1500m title back on March 13 with a time of 4:32.73 at Ohion Northern University at Ada,Ohio.

Then on Saturday afternoon at 1 p.m. Lynn lined up for the start of the 1500m event with less than 18 hours to recover from her previous race. Lynn had the fastest time in the preliminaries which were held on Thursday night and also the number one ranking in the nation for the 1500m distance. Lynn led the first two laps, but didn't quite have the strength to separate herself from the pack of 12 runners.

On the third lap two runners and later two more runners passed her. Lynn worked hard and stayed

with them, but was unable to pass them by the end of the race. Lynn finished fifth with a time of 4:33.96. Jayna Mathiew of St. Olaf College in Minnesota won with a time of 4:30.55.

"I did what I came here to do. Win one (the 3,000m race) and become an All-American in the other," responded Lynn when questioned later after the race.

"How can we be disappointed? Marni is a national champion again and a three time All American. Her time of 9:48.84 is a personal best and a Carroll College school record. She ran really awesome in the 3000m race," commented head coach Brian Bliese.

Lynn ran very consistent splits of 79 seconds per lap until the second last lap where she recorded a 77 second split and then finished with a 73 second split for her last lap according to her coach. "She ran very, very smart; and to run a 2:30 half at the end of the race is excellent," beamed a happy and proud coach Bliese. "You should have seen those guys jumping around after I won the 3,000m race," reported Marni.

When asked how it feels to coach an athlete like Marni Linn, Coach Bliese responded, "It's fun and exciting. She is the school's first and now second national champion. She had a great weekend. We debated about doubling her at nationals with the idea that if she wins one -- fantastic and that she could be All-American in both."

"It is exciting to see the program develop. Both the mens' and womens' teams won the indoor and outdoor conference titles," stated Coach Bliese.

In summary, Coach Bliese offered the following, "Marni had a fantastic weekend. Our goal for the two races was to be All-American in both, and if we won -- great, and if we won both, we're selfish. We accomplished our goals. All-American in two events and a national champion. A tremendous compliment to Marni."

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





# **Boys Third at Frosh/Soph Conference Track Meet**

SHEBOYGAN FALLS -- In one of their highest finishes in seven or eight years, the Kewaskum freshmen and sophomore members of the boys track team surprised themselves and the Eastern Wisconsin Conference with a third place finish on Monday, May 17, at Sheboygan Falls High School.

Sophomore Charlie Sparks, as expected, led the team with two individual first places and anchored the winning 4x100m relay

team.

Sparks, the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Champion in the discus just four days earlier with a winning throw of 153', entered the Freshmen/Sophomore Conference meet as the obvious number one seed.

Opposing coaches predicted that Sparks would break the Freshmen/Sophomore Conference meet record of 135' and he didn't disappoint them as he won the event with a good throw of 149'3". Sparks also won the shot put with a throw of 41'11", three and one-half feet off his season best.

The 4x100m relay team of freshmen Chris Canter, Tony Fitts, Tom Ogi and sophomore Sparks, won with a good time of 47.2 seconds.

Chris Canter, third place finisher at the conference meet in the long jump, the previous Thursday, won his specialty with a good leap of 18'10". Canter also placed fourth in the 100m dash with a time of 12.5 seconds.

Sophomore Brian Wall

continues to impress in the pole vault with a winning jump of 11'0". Walls has now jumped 11' consistently in the last three track meets. One of the biggest surprises for Kewaskum was not the second place finish of freshman Tom Ogi in the pole vault, but the fact he cleared a personal best of 11'. Ogi has made great improvement in his first season of pole vaulting in the last few weeks.

His second place vault of 11'0" was two and one-half feet better than his previous best in a meet. Wall made 11' on his second attempt and Ogi on his third attempt, and thus Wall placed first and Ogi second. Pole vault coach Rick Robinson continues to praise the jumping of Brian Wall and Tom Ogi. "Both of these guys are doing a real good job. Brian has established himself as a very consistent vaulter and Tom has really made a lot of progress as a freshman vaulter," commented Coach Robinson.



## KHS Girls' Track Sixth At Conference Relays

KEWASKUM -- The Kewaskum girls' track team finished sixth at the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Relays on Thursday, May 20. Conference champion Chilton won six events and scored 88 points, edging Manitowoc Roncalli by 10

Sheboygan Falls finished third with 73 points, followed by Two Rivers with 59 points. New Holstein scored 51 points for fifth and Kewaskum tallied 46 points for sixth place. Plymouth finished seventh with 44 points, and Kiel scored 32 points for eighth place.

The host Kewaskum girls' team highest finish was a pair of second places by the discus relay team and the 900m low hurdle composite team.

Kewaskum's three discus throwers, Colleen Gosa, Nicole "Coco" Herrmann, and Becca Gundrum's best throws totaled 263 feet and two inches (263'2"), enough for the runner-up spot. Chilton's relay team won the event with a combined total of 311'2".

Sophomore Colleen Gosa led the Kewaskum team with a personal best throw of 113'3" in the discus. Herrmann threw 76'10" and Gundrum recorded a throw of 73'1"

"Great efforts as individuals and as a team," commented Coach Joe Kinney. The same threesome placed sixth in the shot put with a combined total of 83'10". Chilton clobbered the opposition with a combined total of 102'10".

In the 900m low hurdle composite, senior Jackie Michaels, sophomore Emmy Foerster, and freshman Emily Shulka ran individual times of 51.4, 54.2 and 57.6 seconds respectively for a combined time of 2:43.2 to place second. "I'm very proud of their efforts." replied Coach Kinney.

The Kewaskum high jump team of Michelle Zingsheim, Jolene Clark and Jodi Wichtoski placed fourth with a combined total of 13'6". Both Wichtoski and Clark cleared 4'8".

The 1600m medley relay team of Beth Degner (400m), Heather Rieder (200m), Stacy Muckerheide (200m) and Carol Neumann (800m) finished fourth with a time of 4:43.5. Two Rivers won the medley relay with a time of 4:29.3.

The long jump team of Jodi Wichtoski, Heather Rieder, and Jackie Michaels combined for a total distance of 40'4", also for fourth place. Michaels had a jump of 13'10-1/4" to lead the Kewaskum jumpers. The Chilton threesome totaled 40'11-1/4" for first place. Only 12 inches sepa-

rated first through sixth places.

The triple jump team of Melissa Lark, Lauren Steinhardt, and Jodi Wichtoski finished fifth with a combined total of 85'1-1/2" counting each of their best jumps. Wichtoski's jump of 29'9" was the best for Kewaskum. Two Rivers won with a total of 93'4-1/4".

The 4x100m relay team of Jenny Fettig, Lynn Wiesner, Kristin Schiller and Tina Lindgren finished fifth with a time of 55.7 seconds. The unit placed sixth in the 4x200m relay with a time of 1:58.3. Coach Kinney praised the 4x100m relay team for getting one of their best performances this season.

The 3x1600m relay team of Colleen Gosa, Heather

Hackbarth and Elizabeth Rammer also finished fifth with a time of 19:09.5. Gosa led the trio with a time of 5:52 for her 1600m leg.

The 4x800m relay team of Emily Rinzel, Heather Hackbarth, Kelly Darmody and Lauren Steinhardt also placed fifth with a season best time of 11:09.4. Chilton won the event with a time of 10:26.9.

The 4x400m relay team of Lauren Schultz, Brooke Zanow, Michelle Zingsheim, and Emmy Foerster placed fifth with a time of 4:36.5.

# Boys Track Sixth at Conference Relays

KEWASKUM -- The New Holstein boys' track team as expected, dominated the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Relays on Thursday, May 20.

New Holstein, winners of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Championships and the Freshmen/Sophomore Conference Championships, amassed 123 points to easily beat Plymouth, who finished second with 83.5 points.

Two Rivers finished third with 77 points, Chilton fourth with 63 points, and Roncalli fifth with 45.5 points. Kewaskum totaled 43 points for sixth, Kiel 37 points for seventh and Sheboygan Falls tallied 31 points.

Kewaskum, without a lot of team depth, had difficulty being competitive in a relay meet of this type. The Kewaskum boys team did manage, however, to win the team pole vault competition and the 4x200m relay.

Pole vaulters Brian Wall, Chris Koth and Dan wall set a new KHS school relay meet record of 34' with their combined heights. Sophomore Brian Wall improved six inches by clearing a personal best height of 11'6". Junior Chris Koth also went 11'6" and Brian's brother, senior Dan Wall, cleared a personal best of 11'. The previous record had been 33'. Coach Rick Robinson said, "their hard work has really paid off for these three vaulters.'

The 4x200m relay team of Jim Thelen, Chris Canter, Jason Strobel and Charlie Sparks served notice that they will be ready for this event next season when they won with a time of 1:36.6 (The boys 4x200m relay will be regular event next season. The girls will add the pole vault event and then boys and girls will both each participate in 18 events).

Sophomore Sparks ran a good anchor leg that left no doubt that Kewaskum was going to win the event. Plymouth finished a full second behind Kewaskum.

"Thelen ran very well at the conference meet in the 100m dash and we decided to let him start both the 4x100m and the 4x200m relays. He did very well," commented Coach Jerry

The same sprinters placed third in the 4x100m relay with a season best equaling time of 46.2 seconds. "I know that they want to break 46 seconds, but they might have to wait until next year. They will need to lift weights and work real hard at this next year to develop the strength and quickness to achieve this goal," predicted Coach Gosa.

The three Kewaskum long jumpers, Chris Canter, Andy Christophersen and Josh Rieder, combined their individual best jumps of the night to place third with a combined total of 50'5". Freshman Chris Canter's jump of 18'5-1/2" was the best distance of the three Kewaskum long jumpers.

While Kewaskum finished last in both the threeman combined total distance discus and shot put teams, sophomore Charlie Sparks had respectable throws of 142'9" in the discus and 43'1" in the shot put. "Charlie needs to be ready for regional competition on Monday, May 24," commented Coach Gosa.

Josh Rieder, Scott Mueller, and Justin Weninger totaled 102'11-3/4" to place fifth in the triple jump. Rieder jumped 35'11-1/4" to lead the Kewaskum jumpers

The 4x800m relay team of Justin Weninger, Troy Kedroske, Josh Repovsch, and Bryan Kraft finished sixth with a time of 10:02.7. Two Rivers blew everyone off the track with a winning time of 8:21.1, over 26 seconds ahead of second place Sheboygan Falls.

The Kewaskum 1600m

medley relay of Chad Will (400m), Darrell Woebbeking (200m), Tom Ogi (200m), and Scott Mueller (800m) also finished sixth with a time of 4:06.1. Plymouth finished first with a time of 3:44.7.

The 4x1600m relay team of Darrell Woebbeking, Bryan Kraft, Josh Repovsch and Matt Belger finished seventh with a time of 21.38.4, while Plymouth won with a time of 19:21.6.

The Kewaskum 800m sprint relay team of Jason Strobel (200m), Jim Thelen (100m), Chris Canter (100m) and Luke Kehres (400m) finished seventh with a time of 1:46.3. New Holstein won with a time of 1:38.7.

The 4x400m relay team for Kewaskum continued to struggle with a last place finish. "It is going to take some time for these younger athletes to develop the strength and endurance to become more competitive in this event. I think we have made progress, but they will have to continue working hard at this next year," concluded Coach Gosa.

# Indians Wrap Up Runnerup Spot in Eastern Wisconsin Golf

The Kewaskum High School boys varsity golf team traveled to Mishicot to compete for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Golf Championship on Thursday, May 20.

Heading into the conference tournament conducted at Fox Hills, The National Course, the Indians were firmly entrenched in second place upon the completion of their dual meet season. Yet, the KHS linksters hoped to use the conference tournament as a springboard into the upcoming W.I.A.A. tournament series.

The annual conference championships were hosted by Washington High School of Two Rivers at the Fox Hills Resort and Convention Center in Mishicot. Fox Hills has been the site of many (WIAA) sectional and even state championship tournaments over the years.

Fox Hills, The Traditional (27-hole) Course, has served as the home course for the Two Rivers Raiders in recent years and for their Eastern Wisconsin Conference matches.

After all eight-member schools in the EWC completed their dual meet matches, the perennial powerhouse Panthers of Plymouth led the league with an unblemished 7-0 conference record. The inconsistent Indians of Kewaskum held the second spot by virtue of their 5-2 ledger, followed closely by both Chilton and Kiel at 4-3 and Manitowoc Roncalli, all level at 3-3-1.

Therefore, the conference tournament promised to be a very competitive match throughout.

With ten foursomes teeing off on Hole No. 1 between 9 and 10 a.m., the first round of scores were recorded and posted at the turn. Teams started and finished with the fifth through first ranked players in order.

Thus, after the No. 5 thru No. 3 ranked players had tallied their front nine numbers, the Indians led the Plymouth Panthers by one stroke. Unfortunately, this small advantage was short-lived and tentative as

their nine hole scores.

The Panthers demonstrated their prowess by tallying two subpar rounds to recapture the lead in overwhelming fashion. Plymouth's No. two and one golfers recorded a 35 and 34 respectively.

From that point on, all the other conference teams were competing for second-place in a tightly contested battle. Four teams within two strokes of each other (ranging from 169 to 171) were far outdistanced by conference leader, Plymouth's 152.

When all the scores were recorded, posted and tallied, the Indians of Kewaskum took third in the 18-hole championship tournament, trailing both Plymouth and the host Raiders of Two Rivers

However, by virtue of their second place standing in the dual meet season, the Indians finished second overall in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. Their nearest regular season conference competitors, Chilton and Kiel, both finished in the lower half of

only Junior Curt Koth made the All-Conference (Second) Team by recording the tenth lowest total score of the tournament. Although his score was tied by four others, including Shaun Timblin, Curt was awarded the EWC medal for having the lowest score on the hardest hole.

The Indians were very consistently solid by recording scores from 84 through 89. But the top two teams benefitted from at least one

This, the eighth of the season, team tournament gives the Indians a good indication of the type of play required to win and advance through the upcoming W.I.A.A. Series of Tournaments (Regionals, Sectionals and State).

Kewaskum hosted the Division Two Boys Golf Regional Tournament on Wednesday, May 26, at Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country Club. The top three teams and three individuals, not on those teams, advance to next week's June 1st Ripon Sectionals at Lawsonia Links.

The inspired Indians will need to step up their performance in order to continue to advance or they will finish another season as the proverbial also rans.



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
