



Van vs. Train Accident Claims Woman's Life

TOWN OF WAYNE-A Hartford woman tragically lost her life Monday evening at approximately 6:49 p.m. on Commercial Lane south of CTH D. The woman and her husband were traveling in their full size van when it was hit by a northbound CSX Railroad freight train. According to a report issued by the Washington County Sheriff's Department, the driver of the van was Steven L. Friday, 57, of the Town of Hartford. With him was his wife, Joan M. Friday, 57, also of the Town of Hartford sitting in the front right passenger's seat of the van. She was killed instantly and pronounced dead at the scene by the Washington County Coroner. The driver was flighted from the scene by Flight for Life to Froedtert Lutheran Memorial Hospital in Milwaukee with serious internal injuries. His condition was unavailable but he remains in ICU.


Melissa Rohrer Honored At Carleton College






St. Joseph's Hospital Expands Scope of Construction Project

The board of directors of St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend has approved expanding the scope of the hospital's current building project from \$28.5 million to \$36.8 million.

The expansion and redevelopment project was redefined over the past several months in recognition of increasing community need for emergency and intensive care services, and in-patient beds. Acting on a recommendation from an ad hoc review committee composed of board members, community physicians, building committee members, hospital managers and administration, the hospital board decided on Wednesday, May 19, to approve a recommendation to:

* Increase the size of the overall expansion and redevelopment project from \$28.5 million to \$36.8 million. The overall project includes the approximately \$7 million Cancer Care Center now under construction, as well as the new facility on the northwest portion of the hospital campus, which represents the bulk of the costs. The \$36.8 million also includes the cost of equipment and furnishings for the new facili-

* Redevelop the emergency department. The emergency department will nearly double in size to cover 11,000 square feet. The emergency department will include beds and reclining units for longer-term observation of emergency



patients.

* Create a new 10-bed, 8.200 square foot intensive care unit on the same level as a new surgery department and almost directly above the expanded emergency department. The current six-bed intensive care unit will be available to address the medical and surgical needs of patients.

* Partially complete or 'shell in" a floor above the new surgery department that can be finished at a later time, when required to meet increasing bed needs. Basic mechanical needs will be initially installed.

Create a centralized radiology department. CT and fluoroscopy services will be located immediately adjacent to the emergency and intensive care areas.

* The "footprint" or outline of the building expansion on the northwest portion of the hospital is basically unchanged. Elements of the project that have not been significantly changed include the new inpatient and outpatient surgical area, new main entrance on Silverbrook Drive, new central reprocessing and materials management areas, new gift shop and community resource center, a mobile services dock, and expansion of the rehabilitation services department into what is now the visitors lobby. The outpatient area has been reduced in size.

The board decided not to proceed with plans for a new kitchen/cafeteria and new community meeting room space. However, the new plans anticipate future locations for those services.

"Washington County has been growing by leaps and bounds, and St. Joseph's Community Hospital and the doctors in the community are addressing current and future needs. The expansion of the emergency department, along with the increase in beds in our intensive care unit are a necessity," said Tom Kieckhafer, president and chairman of St. Joseph's Community Hospital. "People living in our community are fortunate that we have this

level of health care right in our own backyard.

"We're pleased with the revised plan," said Charles Geiger, M.D., a member of the review committee and an internal medicine physician at the General Clinic. "I was pleased that this special committee, and the cooperation between physicians in the community, the hospital and administration, resulted in a revised plan that will meet the needs of inpatient and emergency care for years to come.

We truly feel confident that the doctors, hospital staff and the hospital board reached a consensus on what's best for patient care," said Gary Herdrich, M.D., a family practice physician with the West Bend Clinic. He said the redevelopment and expansion of critical care areas and the close proximity of the departments that are involved represent greater benefits for patients now and in the future.

There is a lot of enthusiasm from both doctors and hospital managers," said Atty. Elaine Shanebrook, a board member and member of the review committee. "The expanded building project was a product of collaboration between the hospital, West Bend Clinic (Advanced Healthcare), and the General Clinic (Aurora Health Care). There's definitely a need to increase hospital emergency room capacity and bed capacity to serve the growing population.

She said the renovations will help assure the best quality of care to the community and the ability to add new technologies as they become available.

Construction will begin on the project in October of this year, with completion forecast for October 2001. The Cancer Care Center now underway is expected to be completed in February 2000.


Vanessa Current



Little Folks School House Teams Up with Easter Seals

If you were to ask any of the little folks what the word "disability" means, they would tell you that a disabililty is something that makes walking, talking, hearing, seeing or touching harder for some people.

One of the younger children might respond that it's when part of the body doesn't work.

The teachers at The Little Folks School House have spent the last few weeks teaching about disability awareness. Their goal is to encourage a better understanding and acceptance of people with disabilities

The tendency to fear or avoid someone who is different is normal for both children and adults. Education about the causes of disabilities and how people adapt to them can lead to a better understanding which then builds attitudes and behaviors which are positive and accepting.

The unit was designed to help children understand that all people have similarities and differences and that people with disabilities may be different from us in one way but are like us in most ways.

To gain a deeper understanding of what it's like to have a disability, the children were introduced to special aids such as pediatric wheelchairs, walkers and crutches. They also got a feel for what it is like to be blind or deaf. Each child had the opportunity to experiment and attempt to perform tasks while pretending they were disabled. The main event of the disability awareness unit was a "Hop-n-ing." The Hop-n-ing is an educational fundraiser made possible by Easter Seals Wisconsin and sponsored by Oshkosh B'Gosh. The event helps raise money for nearly 18,000 people who receive Easter Seals services. Prior to the Hop-n-ing, the children asked parents, friends, neighbors and relatives for pledges for hops made during a three minute period. All of the little folks who participated will receive an

official award certificate.



the university awarded this month, including nine to Kewaskum area students, represent genuine achievements.

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

National Trails Day Event in **Kettle Moraine State Forest**

The Washington County Chapter of the Ice Age Park and Trail Foundation will hold a National Trails Day event on Saturday, June 5, in the Kettle Moraine State Forest. National Trails Day is an annual nationwide event sponsored by the American Hiking Society to promote awareness of and volunteer participation in trails.

The chapter project this year is to complete the changeover of 31 miles of trail markers from blue to yellow in the forest. This is the last phase of a three year project which will make markers on the Ice Age Trail uniform throughout the state.


Volunteers should arrive at Mauthe Lake and check in by 8:45 a.m. The Mauthe Lake Recreation Area is on County Highway GGG in the forest. 

Senior Jackie Michaels, who qualified in three individual events, found the going awful tough in both the 100m high hurdles and the 300m low hurdles. Michaels ran a time of 17.5 seconds in the highs, but did not make the finals.


Her time of 51.3 seconds from regionals put her in the first heat of the 300m low hurdle competition at sectionals. Michaels ran a personal best time of 50.2 seconds, but did not earn the right to advance to the state meet. An athlete needed to place first or second in an event to automatically earn the right to advance to state.

Amanda Weihert of Columbus ran a time of 46.2 seconds in the 300m low hurdles at their regional. "Jackie ran very well tonight. Her goal was to run a career best time and she achieved that goal," reported Coach Joe Kinney.

Michaels made the finals in the long jump, but only was allowed to take one of her three jumps instead of the usual three. Michaels was gone warming up for the 300m low hurdles and was not present when the long jump official started the finals. Due to a mixup, the call for the start of the finals of the long jump had not been made over the public address system.

Jackie was supposed to be the first one to jump in finals and wasn't there and therefore lost her first two attempts. Michaels placed eighth in the long jump with a jump of 14'10". "Jackie Michaels jumped extremely well considering the fact that she hadn't long jumped since her freshman year," commented Coach Jill Wichtoski.

Freshman Jolene Clark had a super day in the high jump by leaping 5'0", four inches higher than her previous personal best. Clark's five foot effort placed her fourth, one of the higher finishes for a Kewaskum athlete at the sectional competition. Jolene came within two inches of the school record in the high jump. When I asked high jump coach Jessie Repovsch if Jolene could jump five feet at sectionals, Jessie said that without a doubt she could go five feet easily," commented Coach Kinney. Sophomore teammate Jody Wichtoski equaled her regional height with a jump of 4'6" in the high jump. Wichtoski jumped 30' 3/4" in the triple jump, but did not make the finals. "Jody probably had a 31 foot jump tonight, but her take-off

"I'm very proud of all the girls that competed at sectionals. They had great performances. Plus we had two freshmen, Jolene Clark and Nicole Herrmann, and two sophomores, Colleen Gosa and Jody Wichtoski, make it to sectionals. This gives us a lot of hope for the future. We still need more athletes, however, and we will need to work harder in the future," concluded Coach Kinney.



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

Sparks Third in Discus at Sectional

COLUMBUS -- Sophomore Charlie Sparks placed third in the discus at the WIAA Sectional Track and Field meet Thursday, May 27, at Columbus High School and just missed earning the right to advance to state competition.

Only the top two finishers in each event of the four sectional meets throughout the state, qualify for the state track meet at the University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse on June 4 and 5.

Sparks struggled all night as he had to come from behind to even make the finals. His first two throws of 126'9" and 126'4" left him almost nine feet short of being in the top eight of the preliminaries. On his third throw he needed at least 135' to make it into the top eight and he responded by throwing 137'3" to earn three more throws in the finals.

Spark's first two throws of 140'4" and 140'1" did not move him up much into the competition. His last throw of 147'7", however, temporarily moved him up to second place in the competition behind Dusty Keppen of Palmyra-Eagle's throw of 148'1".

Lee Dreikosen of Lomira, however, had three throws left in the discus competition and threw 149'1" on his last throw to win the competition and bump Sparks down into third place. "I don't think Charlie was at his best tonight. He was trying hard, but it wasn't his day. I have a lot of confidence that he will be back next year starting where he left off this season. His 153' personal best is a great place to start next year.

He'll be good," praised Coach Dave Rizzardi, Kewaskum throwing coach.

Freshman Chris Canter was the other Kewaskum boys representative competing in the long jump at sectionals. Canter's best jump of 19'9-1/4" was not among the top eight best jumps, so Canter did not make the finals in his event. Ken Fleming of Bigfoot won the long jump with a jump of over 23 feet.

"I think Chris had an excellent season. He placed third at the conference meet as a freshman. I expect him to jump over 20 feet next season. I definitely feel that he has that kind of potential," commented jumping coach Jill Wichtoszki

Grafton won the sectional title with 92 points and Slinger finished second with 68 points.

The Kewaskum Athletics split a pair of high scoring games over the Memorial Day weekend. They came up on the short end of a 24-8 score on Saturday when they traveled to Hustisford to take on the Astros. The A's rebounded with a vengeance on Sunday as they pummeled the Horicon Honkers, 37-3.

Saturday's game was a match-up of two teams tied for first place and undefeated. Kewaskum started quickly, scoring three runs in each of the first two innings.
