

# YOUR FINANCIAL FUTURE Countdown to Retirement: You'll Live Long, So Save... (Now!)

Since President Clinton and a battery of delegates made it a national goal for the media to educate the public about retirement savings at the June 1998 Retirement Summit, a lot of attention has been focused on Social Security's inability to finance Americans' retirement. One message was clear: Americans must save more today if they are to realize the dream of a financially secure retirement tomorrow.

According to the Summit report, Social Security was never intended to serve as the sole source of income for retirees. For instance, a person who earned \$15,000 a year and retired in 1998 at

age 65 can expect Social Security to replace just one-half of his or her pre-retirement income. The replacement rate drops as the income bracket increases. For example, an individual who earned \$68,400 before retirement will receive the maximum benefit of \$1,248 per month. That's equal to less than one-quarter of his or her pre-retirement income!

Another factor to consider in planning for retirement is life expectancy. In 1935, the year that Social Security was created, the life expectancy of someone entering the workforce at age 20 is 77.4 years. And the life expectancy for both men and women is increasing (Social Security Administration, 1999). Investors who retire at age 65 may live 20 years or more and

thus will be able to maintain their lifestyles by keeping up with inflation.

As needs have changed, so too have some of the philosophies behind how to prepare for retirement. Until recently, the conventional wisdom maintained that investors should begin to move an increasingly larger portion of their portfolios into conservative vehicles as they near retirement age. Some rules of thumb even called for an investor's portfolio to contain a percentage of fixed income equal to his or her age; in other words, a 65year-old man should have 65% fixed income. But the demise of Social Security, the rise of inflation and longer life expectancies have changed this thinking somewhat.

Whether you are develop-

ing a retirement plan or refinishing one, you should consider the following strategies:

\* Don't shorten your time horizon -- When you were 30 years old, you invested with the understanding that over a 20 or 30 year span it would be beneficial to follow an aggressive strategy because your portfolio would have time to recover from a bad year or two. Well, at 65 you may still be looking at investing over a 20-30 year period.

\* Don't get too conservative -- Often, investors develop an investment plan which carries them through age 65, the typical age for retirement. But it is prudent to consider maintaining an active portfolio well past retirement age in order to combat the bite of inflation.

\* Get a broad picture of your assets -- Before sitting down to develop a new retirement plan, you should try to determine what you have accomplished already. Check your holdings in your IRA. 401 (K) plans, mutual funds, and other invest-

ments. Call social security to determine your projected benefits level. Review company plan documents that show accrued retirement benefits, including pension fund holdings, vested percentage, and payment regulations.

\* Review all insurance policies -- read life insurance policies to determine any potential payouts.

\* Speak with a Financial Advisor -- Once you have identified all your assets, you can reevaluate the allocations in your investment portfolio and devise a plan that will help you reach your retirment goals.

The realities of retirement planning -- inflation, life expectancy, social security -- can shock the uninitiated. But with the right plan, every American can work towards achieving his or her retirement goals.



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## Grothman Says Now is the Time to Kill Light Rail Once and For All

By Rep. Glenn Grothman

Last week the Legislature's Joint Finance Committee took up the state's transportation budget. The gas tax and car and truck registration fee pays for this budget almost exclusively. One area of spending that has clearly outstripped inflation is state subsidies to mass transit -- primarily busses.

This subsidy has gone from \$45 million in 1989 to \$83 million in 1998. The state together with the federal government picks up 45% of the operating expenses of the Madison and Milwaukee bus systems and 60% of smaller bus systems such as Sheboygan or Waukesha. If you ever wonder why you see so many empty busses this is why... local units of government which vote to continue and expand this system pay very little for their operation. Bus systems are exempt from the gas tax as well.

A recent example of shoddy management practices encouraged by the state doing the funding and the locals doing the spending came to light in Madison. It turns out that due to excessive absenteeism that one Madison bus driver has collected so much overtime he made over \$110,000 a year. Of course, this never would have happened if the state wasn't picking up 45% of the tab.

It has recently become apparent that we are in danger of an entirely new mass transit system. To a large extent with federal money, Milwaukee County may build a light rail system. In other areas of the country these systems are extraordinarily expensive and underused. To a certain extent, the average speed of 16 miles per hour assures they will never catch on.

Furthermore, unless you happen to work and live near a transit stop, they are somewhat useless. Studies done by the Wisconsin Policy Research Institute indicate that in other cities after light rail is introduced, most of their new ridership only left the government subsidized bus system to go to the government subsidized rail system. Total trips taken by transit actually declined.

Oddly ridership was so low that energy units expended per mile was greater than in cars. Fatalities per mile were also greater than automobiles, primarily, because of pedestrian deaths.

I am introducing legislation to remove the current requirement in state law mandating state coverage of light rail. I have been informed by Department of Transportation bureaucrats that the plan is for the state

to say that they will not pay for construction of light rail, but because of current law the state will pay for operating expenses. We should also look at the state requirement to pay for 60% of small bus systems that just encourages wasteful spending.







Fees for additional children in the same family are \$15 and \$25 respectively. We are limited to the first 32 children who register.


