

PEANUT CAKE BARS by Bernice Brenner

1 pkg. (18 1/4 oz) chocolate cake mix

1 1/2 cups water

1/3 cup butter or margarine, softened

1 egg

Topping: 3 cups miniature marshmal-

lows 1 pkg. (10 oz.) peanut butter chips

2/3 cup light corn syrup 1/4 cup butter or margarine 2 tsp. vanilla extract 2 cups salted peanuts 2 cups crisp rice cereal

In a bowl, combine dry cake mix, water, butter & eggs until blended. Press into a greased 15" x 10" x 1" baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 13-16 minutes or until toothpick inserted comes out clean. Sprinkle on marshmallows, bake 2 minutes longer. Cool. In a saucepan, combine peanut butter chips, syrup, butter and vanilla. Cook over low heat until melted. Stir smooth. Remove from heat, stir in peanuts and cereal. Spoon over the marshmallows, cool before cutting. Yield - about 3 dozen.

EDUCATION... It's Everyone's Business

Since last week's article came out, I have received a number of telephone calls from readers and I sincerely want to thank them for their interest and their questions. The callers, in one way or another, questioned how the tax rate could remain unchanged for 20 years. I think that it's critical for me to clarify earlier statements by offering the following clarifications.

The school district's tax rate is actually made up of two tax rates, one for operations and one for debt service. When I stated that the tax rate would remain unchanged, my intent was to refer to the debt service tax rate, not the operating tax rate. It would be extremely difficult, if not impossible, to keep the operating school tax rate unchanged for a period of 20 years. There are far too many variables, including student enrollment, revenue limits, inflation, changes in equalized property values, changes in state law, how long the state will remain committed to funding two-thirds of the cost of public school education, etc., all affecting and influencing the operating school tax rate.

The point I need to make clear is that the repayment of the bonds issued for this referendum will be structured so that the <u>debt ser-</u> <u>vice tax rate</u> is held constant over the life of the bonds, meaning that there will be no increase in the debt service tax rate. I hope this clarifies this critical point and again wish to thank the interested readers for calling and asking the question.

While having your attention, I would like to mention that a caller also questioned the statement regarding how the state would pay the school district for the referendum. After re-reading my earlier article, I realized that the statement could be misinterpreted due to my use of the word, "pay" vs. "reimburse."

When I said that you are helping pay for other school districts' referendums through your tax dollars, that is true. By saying that through the state aid formula, as it's currently written, the state will be helping Kewaskum residents pay for the \$11,700,000 referendum for the elementary program, that is also accurate.

The point I wish to clarify, and the point the caller seemed to question, is that I said in the article the state would pay approximately 50-55% of our referendum. The point I need to clarify, so it is not misconstrued, is that the state does not pay the district, it reimburses us through the state aid formula. That reimbursement is about 50-55% of the costs incurred by the school district, including debt service costs.

I hope that those who have gotten to know me over the past couple of months know that it was never my intent to give misinformation or to mislead anybody. I truly appreciated the telephone calls and questions from people because it showed a genuine interest in the referendum process.

I will continue to do my best to answer questions and provide explanations in an honest and forthright manner. In return I hope people continue to read all information provided and ask good questions.



The boards will be picked up at those places on Saturday night and then the only place you will be able to vote will be in the park at Kettle Kountry Kolors.



The varsity girls golf team advanced to sectional play with their third place finish at Rolling Meadows Golf Course in Fond du Lac this week despite the strong winds.




The golfers were sched-








The Indians #30 David Lettow eludes a Campbellsport tackler as he tries to gain more yardage.

The First Annual Kettle Moraine Bowl was all that it was expected to be as the third ranked Campbellsport Cougars came to do battle with the Kewaskum Indians.

As expected, it was a defensive battle which is often the case when two good teams go head to head. The Indians won the toss and received the ball. Three plays later quarterback Chris Koth fumbled when 235 pound linebacker Clint Beck put a big hit on the the middle of the Cougar defense. The Indians moved the ball 65 yards to the Cougar five yard line and with five seconds left in the half, Chris Koth kicked a 26 yard field goal to make the half time score 6-3 in favor of Campbellsport.

The second half saw both defenses playing hard-nosed defense as the Indians swarmed to the ball and gang tackled on a regular basis. Field position like the week before turned against the Indians in the second half and made it difficult for the offense to get the lead. In the third quarter, the Cougars came up with the play of the game as quarterback Ziegler connected with Mueller for a 47 yard pass to the Indians four yard line. Clint Beck scored shortly afterwards with a one yard run to make the score, 12-3 (the extra point was no good) with 19 seconds left in the third period. The fourth quarter found the Indians throwing more but with the Cougar defense attacking at the line of scrimmage, there was little time to throw the ball which resulted in some scrambling by Koth and some interceptions. 

Odekirks Were Original Buckskinners At Kettle Kountry Kolors Festival

Kettle Kountry Kolors offers a great way to turn back time, visit the past and preserve the historical days of the "Rendezvous." The word rendezvous is French, meaning a meeting place or a place to gather. Kewaskum's Kettle Kountry Kolors includes a Buckskinners Encampment as part of the annual event.

John, better known as "Jack" Odekirk and his wife, Millie, became interested in the Rendezvous in the early 1980's when Millie was working on genealogy. They attended events around the state and became hooked on the reliving of the pioneer days.

Jack and I enjoyed the new found friends that quickly became our pioneer families," said Millie. "We met people from all over and learned about the history of days of cooking over an

open fire, trading for goods and the attire that was worn. Jack and I met people who were our like-minded friends.'

wagon train.

In visits with their friend, Richard Thiemer, a local barber, they discovered that he too had visited some of the Rendezvous and enjoyed them. Together they organized and brought the Buckskinners Rendezvous to Kewaskum.

Buckskinner is a term used to describe a group of people who enjoy reliving the North American Fur Trade era. They are also known for the many adventurous tales they tell.

In the early 1800's few roads existed in Wisconsin. The rivers were the superhighways of travel. Fur traders and trappers would transport their heavy bundles in dugouts and birch bark canoes to a rendezvous. Farmers and settlers soon began to join Paris and London.

The Odekirks begin their season with an indoor rendezvous in Oshkosh. From there they had a schedule of the season's events. An average year would include about 11 events ending the season with the Kettle Kountry Kolors Family Fun Festival in Kewaskum each October.

"In the beginning Jack and I slowly started to acquire clothing of the pioneer era," said Millie. "Jack even wore a loin cloth when it was hot years back. We each had a capote, which is a French trader's long hooded coat, sometimes made out of an Indian blanket. We'd wear it during the day and use it as a blanket at night.

Jack was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease and Millie also faced some health problems, slowing them down in the their ability to attend more events. In 1997 they passed their duties of overseing the Buckskinners and their behavior to friends Willie and Betty Wilhelme.

Rendezvous are held all over the state with each one having its own unique activ-

ities. Most have a preacher or minister, a blacksmith for the necessary fire pit needs, crafters who sell and demonstrate their craft, many lodges, Buckskinners dressed in pioneer clothing, music with at least one bagpipe player, contests and demonstrations.

"Every event holds excitement, anticipation and something different to look forward to," said Millie. "Some have canoe races, muzzle loading shoots, black powder shooting, knife throwing and toma-hawk "Hawk" throw contests, basket weaving, pie eating contests, fry pan throws, spear tossing, wood carving and much more. Many of the events we have attended also have someone popping popcorn over an open fire and have the aromas of many other homecooked meals.'

Millie was no stranger to competition. At an event in Prairie du Chien, she once took first place in the knife throw and second in the "Hawk" throw.

"I always did better at the men-type contests than things like speed contests to sew on a button or keeping an entire apple peel in one piece," said Millie. "Mine always broke. I'm not getting any younger and after a couple of falls, I leave the contests to the younger crowd."

The Odekirks traveled mostly within the state but did attend the Midwest Rendezvous held in Illinois in 1983. Other travels included the three biggest events in the state at Prairie Villa Rendezvous in Prairie du Chien, with over 1000 lodges; Cross-Roads Rendezvous in Saukville, and W.B. Place Rendezvous in Hartford.

Other travels include Logjam at Wausau, Sawdust Days in Oshkosh, Smokey Hollow Muzzleloaders event held near Cascade, Skunk Hollow in Sheboygan, Marsh Haven outside of Waupun, Peshtigo, Mayville, Kaukauna, Man-itowoc and Heritage Hill in Green Bay, just to name a few.

Many of the Buckskinners have nicknames like Whip, who gives a whip demonstration and his wife, Honeybear. Cedar Wind is the name of a couple known as Christine Ibach and Al Jewer, who perform and have recorded the music of traditional Native American flutes.

Christine received her first flute at a Mohican pow-wow. The Buckskinners usually include many who show their talents on the harmonica, dulcimer, fiddle and many other instruments.

"Jack and I were known just as Jack and Millie," added Millie. "Sometimes if you did something stupid you'd get tagged with a name like when a lady fell out of the boat into the river in Kewaskum a couple of years ago. She became known as Riverfall."

The rendezvous excursions have added many pleasant memories to the lives of the Odekirk family. Their daughter Kathy and her husband Jon Hughett make and sell silver jewelry at events. They now travel using a tent once used by her parents. Millie speaks highly of another daughter, Shary and her expertise in making fry bread over an open fire.

Many memories of historical rendezvous cover the scrapbooks and photo albums at the Odekirk home. Millie speaks fondly of a beaded dress given to her by a friend that she wears to encampments, weddings that have taken place at Rendezvous, her Zoony Squash Blossom Pattern necklace, the many special friends she has made and treasured.

There was the meeting of Tiny Tim at Logjam in Wausau in 1992 and the many evenings enjoying friends, passing the jug and listening to music by a fire. The last long trip that

The last long trip that Jack and Millie made to a Rendezvous was in 1997 to Peshtigo. In 1998 Parkinson's had confined Jack to a wheelchair, making travel difficult. Millie cared for him at home, but they did manage to get out and see the wagon train as it traveled through the state.


Jack lost his battle with Parkinson's Disease on April 30, 1999. He lived a full life enjoying time with his wife, five children, nine grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. He also liked fishing, hunting, woodworking and winemaking and his 18 years as an avid Buckskinner.

"Jack enjoyed making things," stated Millie. "One of his woodworking projects included a gun cabinet built

to hold 12 guns. As Jack's health began to fail, he passed out 18 of his treasured guns and muzzleloaders to his children so that he was sure they each received what he wanted for them. He made several tables and stepstools used at Rendezvous. Our home on Auburn Lake is part of Jack's family history once owned by his grandfather and father.

At Kettle Kountry Kolors in 1995 Jack and Millie joined friends in a sacred ceremony. One was part Mohican and another part Winnebago Indian. Together they smoked a peace pipe

and drank a swig of rum. Jack Odekirk's death was a celebration of his life. His funeral was unique. He was buried in his buckskin attire. Included in his casket were tokens like a small tomahawk, turkey foot, turkey feather, a package of his favorite tobacco, which he smoked in a homemade pipe and the casket's inside cover had a beautiful photo of a deer.

The burial at St. Matthew's Cemetery in Campbellsport included a encampments.

The idea of a rendezvous started in the early 1800's with fur traders, farmers and settlers meeting to trade their goods. The tradition now continues with the many Buckskinner Rendezvous held and more people becoming interested in the events. Many learning and living the historical times,

This sixth annual event is held in conjunction with the community's Kettle Kountry Kolors weekend of festivities.


