New \$16,000 Scholarship to Be Awarded KEYS to Administer \$52,700 In Scholarships in May 2000

The Board of Directors of Kewaskum Youth Scholarships, Inc., has announced that 15 scholarships totaling \$52,700 will be awarded to the Kewaskum High School Class of 2000 by KEYS. The following is a list of the amount and number of each kind of scholarship.

One new four-year college scholarship worth a total of \$16,000 (\$4,000 a year for four years) is being offered for the first time in the spring of 2000. Two four-year college scholarships, each worth a total of \$10,000 (\$2,500 a year for four years) are also being administered by KEYS. One of these \$10,000 scholarships is provided by the KEYS scholarship fund, and the other is provided by the Oscar C. and Augusta Schlegel Foundation. A four year KEYS scholarship worth \$4,000 (\$1,000 a year for four years) will be awarded for the third time this spring.

Two \$2,000 KEYS College of Technical College Scholarships (\$1,000 per year for two years) will also be awarded. The Barbara York College Scholarship worth \$1,200 will also be awarded for the seventh time this year.

Five memorial scholarships of \$1,000 each will also be awarded this year: the Ann-Marie Horner Memorial Scholarship will be presented for the 11th time; the Kilian A. Honeck Memorial Scholarship will Gruber Memorial Scholarship will be presented for the eighth time; the Michael H. Strelka Memorial Scholarship that was reestablished in 1999 will be presented for the second time, and the James Andre Memorial Scholarship will be awarded for the first time in the spring of 2000. The Kevin Joseph Neese Memorial Scholarship of \$500 will also be awarded for the second time in the spring of 2000.

A KEYS \$1,000 College or Technical College Scholarship will be presented along with a \$1,000 KEYS Technical College Scholarship.

The \$52,700 in scholarships to be awarded in the spring of 2000, brings the total amount awarded by KEYS to \$323,500 since 1986! The KEYS organization wishes to thank the alumni, businesses, organizations, and community members for their generous donations which make these scholarships possible.

All money contributed to KEYS is used directly for scholarships. The work by the members of KEYS, Inc. is done strictly on a volunteer basis. KEYS, Inc. is a non-profit organization established to accept contributions to provide additional scholarships for Kewaskum High School graduates.

KEYS officials hope that the community senses the pride that is involved in this accomplishment. Even with this kind of success, KEYS realizes that additional funds must be raised to pro-

vide for even more scholarship help. If KEYS is to continue to grow, donations are necessary from the whole community. Past, present and new donors are asked to please contribute to KEYS.



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Y2K News

Take Steps to Minimize Y2K Risks

THIRD IN A SERIES OF **EIGHT ARTICLES**

People can take some important steps to minimize the impacts of the year 2000 bug.

"Individuals and families should first identify the risks they may actually face because of Y2K and then focus their efforts on managing those risks," says David Hinds, University of Wisconsin-Madison/Extension local government specialist.

The first step every family should take is to determine if any household devices are date-sensitive, which means they may malfunction with the year 2000 date change. "Less obvious than computers are items that may be controlled by date-sensitive computer chips, such as portable medical devices, home security systems, and some thermostats and other environmental control systems."

Medical conditions or isolation from neighbors can present additional risks for certain people. The impact on families if they lose important services, such as electricity and water for several days, also should be assessed.

"If you find potential problems with date-sensitive personal or home equipment, take corrective action early to eliminate the problems by contacting local repair people or the manufacturer," Hinds says.

"Because of the possibility of localized loss of services, the unpredictability of where they may occur and the fact that Y2K will arrive in winter, individuals and families should prepare for the year 2000 in the same way they would prepare for a bad winter storm, with several additional pre-

cautions."

These preparations can include:

Create a supply kit to provide basic family supplies for three days. Don't forget the family pets.

Prepare a family emergency plan and make sure all family members are familiar with it.

Have a week's supply of all family members' prescription drugs on hand.

Keep vehicle fuel tanks full, as you would during a normal winter.

* Gather extra blankets in case your home's heating system will not work.

* Have at least one noncordless phone available. A back-up cellular phone is a good idea.

* Contact your county's emergency management director or the local Red Cross chapter ahead of time to locate emergency shelters in your area in case they are needed.

* Y2K failures may cause unexpected power surges. Protect sensitive electrical equipment with surge protectors.

Each and every person can make a difference when it comes to the Campbellsport Public Library.



Supervisory Management Fastrak Program Delivers

First-rate instructors and flexibility.

These are two things that come to Mary Vogl-Rauscher's mind when asked about Moraine Park Technical College's Supervisory Management Fastrak program.

"I believe our instructors are one of the program's biggest assets. They don't talk theory, they talk actual practice," she said. "They bring real life, practical applications to the classroom. The things the students learn in class can be taken directly to their workplaces and implemented.

"There is also a nice cross section of instructors," Vogl-Rauscher, lead instructor and program advisor for the Supervisory Management Fastrak program, continued. "Almost all of them are business and industry executives. They represent large employers as well as smaller employers and they come from businesses throughout the Moraine Park District. Most of our instructors have been recommended by the program's advisory committee members, plus we do instructor evaluations in 100 percent of the classes. This gives us constant feedbacks in terms of 'Did the instructor meet your needs?" or 'Are we teaching what you need?' I think that's one of the reasons Supervisory Management is one of the highest rated programs at Moraine Park in terms of student satisfaction."

In addition to the quality instruction, flexibility also ranks high as a program strength. "We're trying to meet our customers' needs in a variety of ways," says Vogl-Rauscher.

One example of that is

the decision made last year to make the program open entry. "Open entry eliminates the need to take the courses sequentially," she explained. "If a student needs to drop out of the sequence for whatever reason, they have the option of picking up (the classes they missed) at another campus."

Moraine Park also began offering Supervisory Management classes on Tuesday mornings from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. in an effort to serve second- and third-shift employees. "There are supervisors who work second and third shift and are unable to come to evening classes, and this timeframe works for them," said Vogl-Rauscher. "To my knowledge, we are the only program in the state trying to target this group of workers.

Starting in January 2000 students will have even more options as the College begins offering day courses via instructional television (ITV). "ITV allows us to offer the program at all three of our campuses, plus it opens up more classes" said Vogl-Rauscher. "We will be offering the ITV classes at Beaver Dam and West Bend on Thursday evenings and we have two traditional sections of the program running at our Fond du Lac Campus on Monday and Tuesday evenings."

Also this spring, two classes -- Supervision and Team Building/Problem Solving - will be piloted in an every other week format. Supervision will meet every other Thursday morning from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. and Team Building/Problem Solving will meet on every other Saturday from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. "We're testing this format out to see if it is something that meets the needs of customers who are interested in the program, but who are unable to commit to one morning or one evening each week," said Vogl-Rauscher. "Each class will still meet a total of six times, but instead of every week for six weeks, it will meet every other week for 12 weeks."

Along with being flexible, another positive about the Supervisory Management program is the student support and networking. "The majority of our students are returning and working adults," explained Vogl-Rauscher. "Approximately 80 percent of them are working full-time and taking the classes in the evenings. The energy that takes place with the people in this program is unbelievable. The students are very supportive of each other and there is a lot of exchanging of ideas. Plus, all of the learning that occurs (in the core courses) is active learning -- it's projects, presentations and papers. It's not a lecturebased program and there are no tests."

Curriculum changes were also made in response to input from the program's advisory committee. "We've responded to the quests of our advisory committee and are very much on top of our curriculum," said Vogl-Rauscher. "In the past 15-18 months, we made major curriculum changes ensuring that it was both current as well as state-of-the-art. We really feel we have taken this program to the next level."

The Supervisory Management Fastrak program is an associate degree program consisting of 11 core classes plus general education classes. The core courses include Ethics in America, Human Resources Management, Leadership Development, Legal Issues, Managerial Budgeting and Finance, Managing Diversity and Change, Managing for Quality, Organizational Development, Safety Awareness, Supervision, and Team Building/Problem Solving. All core courses are three credits and run in four-hour time blocks from either 5:30-9:30 p.m. or 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. for six weeks. When one six-week class is completed, you begin the next one. It takes approximately 20 months to complete the core courses and if students take more than one class at a time they can graduate within a two-year period.

For people looking for something short-term, Moraine Park offers three certificates from the Supervisory Management program including Principles of Management, Human Resources Development and Organizational Development. The certificates, which allow people to focus on a specific area of expertise, range from three to five courses. "Our most popular certificate is the Human Resources Certificate which is made up of three classes - Human Resource Development, Safety Issues and Legal Issues," said Vogl-Rauscher. "We're planning to offer it this spring between our Mayville and Ripon Regional Centers through the College's Corporate and Community Services. It's just another way to give our customers what they want."







Don't Panic, It's Automatic Your Rebate Check is in the Works

Wonder whether you will receive a rebate check?

"Don't panic, it's automatic," said Wisconsin **Revenue Secretary Cate** Zeuske. "If you filed.income tax in Wisconsin this year, you'll get a rebate check."

Sales tax rebate checks should be processed by the first of the year and mailed soon after, Secretary Zeuske said, "in plenty of time to pay off Christmas shopping bills, pay property taxes, or save for the future." For security reasons, the exact mailing dates will not be disclosed beforehand.

Gov. Tommy G. Thompson signed into law the state's largest rebate in history. His "Trust the People" tax relief will return \$700 million to 2.5 million households. Check amounts will range from \$184 to \$267 for single filers and \$360 to \$534 for married couples filing jointly. The average check will be for \$271. Because the check is a rebate on sales taxes paid, it is not taxable by the state; nor is it by the federal government, based on past precedent. Everyone who filed a state income tax return this year (as late as October 15) or who filed for a Homestead Credit will receive a rebate check. Unlike Minnesota's rebate checks, the elderly and others who did not file income tax this year are still eligible to apply for a rebate check. In the coming weeks, the Department of Revenue will roll out a simple, one page form.

Everyone who filed a state income tax return or filed for a Homestead Credit by October 15 of this year will receive a rebate check automatically.

* If you moved since filing, please file a change of address form with your post office.

* Checks will be processed by the first of the year -- in time to help pay your holiday bills and property taxes.

Even elderly who don't file income taxes can get a rebate check (we will get you a simple form to fill

out)







The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

Trustee Andy Pesch, the Plan Commission Board Representative, reported on the meeting of October 26, 1999. It was noted the Commission sent the request for a conditional use permit for the placement of antennas on the water tower for a cellular phone system to the Village Board for public hearing with a favorable recommendation.

It was also noted Rick Kania from SEWRPC was in attendance to review Section 5.00 "Modifications" and Section 15.00 "Definitions". A substantial amount of discussion took place.

Trustee John Kenworthy the Library Board representative reported that discussion is still taking place regarding the T1 line and proposed budget figures for 2000.

Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, the Mid-Moraine Municipal Association Representative, reported that the social was held for October 27, 1999, with no significant outcome.

Administrator Daniel Schmidt reviewed some 1999 tax facts with the Board and also where the funds were coming from to balance the budget under the revenue accounts refund from prior year and prebud-





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Lynn Places 38th at N.C.A.A. Cross Country Meet

Winneconne - Marni Lynn, a junior at Carroll College in Waukesha, ran her best cross country race of her life on Saturday at the III Division National Collegiate Athletic Association Women's 5K Cross Country Championships. UW-Oshkosh hosted the championships at the Lake Breeze Golf Course in Winneconne, Wisconsin. Lynn ran an outstanding time of 17 minutes and 42.6 seconds (17.42.6), almost 36 seconds better than her previous best of 18:18 that she had run at the midwest Regional Championships just one week earlier. Lynn placed 38th out of over 213 runners, and just missed earning All-American recognition by three places or two seconds. Places 1-15 earn N.C.A.A. All-American honors and 16-35 earn All-American recognition by the coaches association.

"Marni has been running constantly around 18:20. She popped a real good one today. She has an outstanding work ethic, does what she is supposed to do and really sets a good example for her teammates," commented Lynn's distance coach Dave Williams. Lynn has increased her mileage to 45 miles a week this season and has been doing less cross training. Williams, in his first year of coaching, has a lot of running experience and recently clocked a two hour twenty-five minute

at the Chicago Marathon in October. "This is obviously Marni's most successful cross country season, but she still has room for improvement. Marni is so dedicated and focused that we sometimes have to hold her back I have to remind her sometimes that it's okay to take time off," commented coach Williams.

"At the start of the season Marni's individual goal was to be the conference champion and advance to nationals. And that's exactly what happened. Our team's goal was to be conference champions and we ended up second. Marni's time today as phenomenal," commented an obviously very happy and pleased head coach Brian Bliese. Lynn's time of 17:42.6 for the 5 K cross country race is the fastest time in Carroll College school history.

Peak Hunter, Holiday Traffic Expected Sunday

The combination of deer hunters and Thanksgiving holiday travelers returning home is expected to pack Wisconsin's highways on Sunday, November 28. The Sunday after Thanksgiving is typically one of the busiest travel days of the year, according to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

Motorists will find all lanes of traffic open, as most construction projects will have been completed by then. Crews working on long-term projects ceased operations about noon on Wednesday, November 24, and won't resume operations until 6 a.m. on Monday, November 29. However, all lanes of traffic will be open. No lane restrictions are expected on any highways during the holiday weekend.

State Patrol Superintendent David Schumacher reminded drivers to be especially alert during this busy travel time. "Driving defensively, wearing your safety belt, watching out for deer darting into traffic, and avoiding driving while intoxicated or drowsy will make this a safe weekend," he said.

The State Patrol will be among several law enforcement agencies participating in the nationwide cam-paign: "Operation ABC -American Buckles Up Children." It's a special emphasis program sponsored by the U.S. Department of Transportation to raise awareness about child safety restraints. State Patrol and other law enforcement officers will be checking motorists for appropriate safety restraint use through November 28. A similar campaign was conducted over the Memorial Day weekend.

Increased enforcement and Operation ABC are efforts to reduce the number of fatal crashes during the Thanksgiving holiday period. Crashes during the four-day Thanksgiving holiday period claimed the lives of 12 people last year, which was four above the five-year average. 
Freshman ReNae works as hard as anyone on the team, but is not afraid to interject a little humor into the routing to keep everyone at ease.


