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


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## **Prize-Winning Floats**

## Tips for Storing Water, Food For Short-Term Emergencies

FIFTH IN A SERIES OF EIGHT ARTICLES

Will the Y2K bug cause disruptions in the systems that distribute food and water? Many people are considering storing extra food and water the way they would in preparing for a major winter storm.

Most people can live only a few days without water," says Barbara Ingham, University of Wisconsin-Madison/ Extension Food Science specialist.

How much water do you

"Store a total of at least one gallon per person, per day," Ingham says. "This is a good estimate, although children, nursing women and people who are sick will need more water. Additional water would be needed for food preparation and hygiene.

When preparing for an emergency, storing water and learning how to purify contaminated water should be among your top priorities," explains Ingham.

Plastic, glass, fiberglass or enamel-lined metal containers are suitable for storing water supplies. Never use a container that has held toxic substances. "No matter how well you clean these containers, tiny amounts of toxic substances may remain in the container's pores," Ingham says.

Intact, durable plastic containers, such as soft drink bottles or those you purchase water in, are best. Food-grade plastic buckets or larger containers also

work well. "Milk jugs and other containers that previously held food items are almost impossible to adequately clean," warns Ingham.

Before storing water, treat it with a preservative, such as chlorine bleach, to prevent the growth of microorganisms. Use liquid household chlorine bleach that contains 5.25% sodium hypochlorite and no soap. Do not use scented or color safe bleach.

'Add one-fourth teaspoon bleach per gallon. Two-liter soft drink bottles are about one-half gallon and require one-eighth teaspoon of bleach," says Ingham. "Mix the water and bleach thoroughly and let stand for at least 30 minutes before using the water."

To store water, seal your water containers tightly, label them "Purified Drinking Water," date and store

them in a cool, dark place. "Water can be stored in the freezer," advises Ingham. "This will keep the water at an acceptable quality for a longer period of time and will help keep any

food in the freezer from thawing in the event that the power goes out.'

Ingham says, "Planning ahead for situations when you may need an emergency food supply is a good idea.

How much and which foods to store will depend on the members of your household, your preferences, special health considerations, ability to use the food in an emergency, space for storage and how far you live from a market.

Planning for short-term emergency food needs may be as simple as increasing the quantities of some staple foods and non-perishable foods that you normally have on hand. "A threeday emergency food supply should be sufficient for most situations," Ingham says. 'In addition to your shortterm food and water supply, store personal hygiene items, flashlights, blankets and other supplies for emergency use.

Food should be non-perishable that requires no refrigeration, minimal or no preparation and little or no water. These foods could include:

\* Ready-to-eat canned meats, fruits and vegeta-

\* Soups, canned or dried soups in a cup.

\* Smoked or dried meat like beef jerky. \* Dried fruit.

\* Juices, canned or pow-\* Milk, powdered, canned



as peanut butter, jelly, nuts, trail mix and granola bars.

Cookies, candy and other snacks.

\* Foods for infants, senior citizens or those with special dietary needs.

Avoid stocking foods high in salt that will increase thirst," Ingham adds. "And don't forget to store pet food for pets.

Store emergency food and supplies where they will be safe from insect and rodent pests and possible flooding, Ingham advises.


#### Moraine Park Offers Quilting Course At Kewaskum

## County Drug Enforcement Task Force Awarded \$495,351

Governor Thompson this week announced the award of \$95,351 to the Washington County Anti-Drug Task Force. The award will help the multi-jurisdictional unit to continue its efforts to reduce the availability and use of illegal drugs and to reduce the levels of violent crime throughout Washington County.

Governor Thompson awarded more than \$5.3 million to 32 Drug Enforcement Task Forces that operate throughout Wisconsin. These multi-jurisdictional units represent 71 counties and nearly 300 local governmental units around the

"The increased availability of illegal drugs entering the state requires an increase in cooperation and collaboration among these multi-jurisdictional drug units and prosecutors, Governor Thompson said. "The involvement of street gangs has added another dimension to concerns over drug trafficking as has the increase in juveniles arrested for their involvement in the sale and distribution of illegal drugs.

Thompson continued,
"The citizens of Wisconsin
deserve to have those individuals and organizations
that bring illegal drugs into
the state or who manufacture and distribute these
dangerous substances within our borders removed
from the streets."

"We are grateful to these anti-drug units and all the law enforcement officers throughout the state for their dedication and service to the community," Thompson concluded.

The task forces made over 6,400 arrests in 1998 alone, according to statistics from the Office of Justice Assistance. Outside of Milwaukee County, the multijurisdictional units made about 80% of all drug trafficking arrests recorded in the state.

This is the 13th year of funding for the task force programs, which are formed through the cooperation and collaboration of local sheriffs' departments, police departments and district attorneys. Seventy-five percent of the funds awarded are made available to the state through the Federal Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Program and is administered by the Office of Justice Assistance.

#### Interest Rate for Escrow Accounts Set for 2000

MADISON -- The Department of Financial Institutions (DFI) has announced that it has set the interest rate that will be paid by Wisconsin's financial institutions for money held in an escrow account for real estate.

By law, the Department is required to calculate the escrow rate based on the average interest rate paid by Wisconsin depository institutions on passbook savings account.

Escrow accounts, in connection with mortgage loans, are used commonly to hold deposits made by the home-owner to pay real property taxes or insurance payments, or both. The interest rate required to be paid on escrow accounts under s. 138-052(5) will be set at 2.51% per year. The rate will become effective January 1, 2000 and be effective through 2000. The 2000 rate is down from the 1998 rate of 2.74% per year.
