Still Time to Be Included In KM Tourism Brochure

The Northern Kettle Moraine Tourism Council in response to several statewide and local requests in gearing up to produce and distribute the year 2000 edition of "Welcome to Kettle Country."

Over the past 1-1/2 years 40,000 copies of the colorful forest area promotional brochure have been distributed through local businesses and tourist information centers throughout Wisconsin and parts of Illinois and Minnesota.

For those not familiar, Welcome to Kettle Country is an ongoing effort to produce a clean, easy to read road map of the Northern Kettle Moraine. The goal is to make navigating our scenic country roads eash and worry-free as well as to provide advertising exposure for the associate membership.

The tourism council is a group of local business owners derived from the Kewaskum and the Campbellsport Chambers of Commerce. Originally formed in 1996, the council has been working at developing unity in area tourism promotions.

Recently, 150 forest area businesses received applications for associate membership in the mail. It is asked that they be returned within the next week in order to be able to go ahead with the next printing. If adequate response is received, distribution of the new addition will begin in March of 2000.

The fee for membership has been increased this year but the level of exposure provided by the council has also increased.

Town of Kewaskum Handles Usual Business

The Town of Kewaskum opened their January meeting Monday evening with a meeting of the town's plan commission.

The commission had discussion on a land division and farm consolidation of the remaining acreage on the Jeffrey Meyer farm located on CTH B, sections 17 & 18 of the township.

Due to a perceived conflict of interest, Chairperson Scott Sager asked that board member Bill Butzlaff Jr. to abstain from voting and seat himself in the audience. Butzlaff took Sager's advice and seated himself in the audience.

Mike Lettow represented Mr. Meyer's interests, and discussion took place on the item. The meeting adjourned with no action.

A meeting of the town board took place and the board approved a conditional use permit for Charles and Beverly Schultz to operate a gravel pit on Badger Road. The permit is filed annually and there were no changes.

Lettow asked if there would be a problem now that the road was new.

Bill Butzlaff reiterated asking if Schultz would be responsible for damages to the road.

Sager said it is worded as such.

Butzlaff made the motion and Lettow seconded.

Treasurer, Dan Stoffel indicated that the balance in the Prime account was \$79,403.11 and \$15,047.36 was in the checking account at the end of the year.





An Open House will be held on Sunday, January 26, from 1 to 4 p.m. in the new Middle School, 1676 Reigle Drive, Kewaskum, and in the Kewaskum Elementary School addition, 1550 Reigle Drive, Kewaskum. This date was approved by the School Board at its meeting Monday evening as a report was made on the building program. No occupancy dates have been set for the new high school addition, the last of the building projects to be completed.

The Wisconsin Jaycees, an organization of young men 18 through 35, which is represented in 230 cities in the State of Wisconsin, has decided to charter a chapter in Kewaskum. The organizational meeting will be held January 16 at Hon-E-Kor Country Club.

upkeep; then in a second collection, everyone would put in \$1.00 or more for the new church. Several years later, a new church was built with no problem.

Then at the entrance to the stadium, the fans can be charged one or two or five dollars entry fee...(the second collection). In this way, the people that use the facilities will finance the remodeling of the old or the building of the new football complex, by paying an entrance fee.

The Packer players and staff, themselves, are users of the Packer facilities. Each player should be charged a user fee of \$25.00 or more to play in each game. Since they get paid big wages, each player can well afford to contribute their share to the stadium fund. They certainly can afford it, better than Senior Citizens or some of the other citizens of the community and state.



'Last Puff' Smoking Cessation **Class Adds Exercise Option**

St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend is offering "The Last Puff" sixweek smoking cessation program for smokers who want to break the habit. For the first time, a new optional exercise component has been added. "The Last Puff" will be held Tuesdays, February 1 through March 7 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in the hospital's conference room A

The optional exercise component will begin a half hour before the program, and includes two additional optional exercise opportunities each week.

Exercise is an important part of quitting, because it substitutes a good habit for a bad habit, and it elimi-nates stress," said Al Ludin, registered respiratory therapist at St. Joseph's who conducts "The Last Puff." "I quiz past participants about why they smoke, and many of them say it's to relieve stress. Exercise is one of the things we talk about in the class -- it's the number one stress reliever." The supportive six-week program provides smokers with the skills they need to stop smoking. The social, physical and psychological attachment to smoking is explored. Participants also receive information on weight control, stress management and coping techniques. Gary M. Herdrich, M.D., a family practice physician, will be a guest speaker for the smoking cessation program. Craig Feiter, exercise physiologist at St. Joseph's, will conduct the optional

half-hour exercise session in the hospital's rehabilitation services department. Participants will work at their own pace and will be able to use aerobic equipment including treadmills, stationary bikes, stair-steppers and other equipment. Participants may return twice again that week, at times convenient for them, to exercise in conjunction with ongoing rehab classes.





We have two school board candidates running for two open seats in April. Lisa Maul, incumbent, and Gordie Dickman will be on the April 4 ballot. Special recognition needs to go out to Jean Goeden. Jean made the difficult decision not to seek re-election for personal reasons. Her service and commitment to the children and the people of the district will be missed next year so I am sure I can say, on behalf of everyone, "Thank You Jean Goeden, for your 19 years of service!"

The referendum is over, yet the work has continued over the past two months. Many meetings with the architects, teachers, support staff, Buildings and Grounds, administrators, etc., have been held to develop interior schematic building designs for all three elementary schools.

These plans were formally presented to the full school board for approval at the January 10 meeting. Elsewhere in this issue of the <u>Statesman</u> you can see the approved interior design for the Kewaskum Elementary School building. In future editions this month, plans of the schematic drawings for both the Farmington and Wayne Elementary buildings will be printed. You are certainly welcome to stop in at the District office to view a larger set of plans and ask questions. From the schematic plans, blueprints will be drawn up and cost estimates developed by the general contractor. It is an exciting time for all of us. As we move through the construction phases we hopefully will offer opportunities for community visits on site to see the progress being made. Once completed, we will most certainly have Community Open Houses at FES and WES in the fall of 2000 and in the fall of 2001 when both the KES and the administration buildings are completed. at the opening of the 2000-2001 school year. The Farmington gym is scheduled for opening in October or early November of 2000. The Kewaskum Elementary School is scheduled to be completed and ready for occupancy at the start of the 2001-2002 school year. The administration building will complete the entire project, being tentatively scheduled for occupancy in November of 2001.

Each month at its regular meeting on the second Monday of the month, a report is given to update the full school board regarding progress being made on the projects. Community members are encouraged to attend these meetings and keep updated on the construction and remodeling of your schools.

When supplies ran low, each crewmember would receive a chunk of skin in lieu of a slice of meat. A rind, or skin, was tough and unpalatable. But the layer of fat attached to it was better than nothing. So sailors chewed off the fat. Casual talk was a natural accompaniment of chewing on rinds. These shipboard chat sessions were so common that an expression was adopted by landlubbers: To indulge in idle talk, became known as "chewing the fat").

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

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

Tractor Safety Course Required For All Young Farm Workers

Does your son or daughter work on a farm during the summer? Do you hire youth to work for you dur-ing the year? Do these young people have adequate safety training?

Accidents cause more deaths to individuals between the ages of 15 and 24 than all other causes combined. On the farm, the major cause of accidents is working with tractors and farm machinery. Most accidents happen when the operator does not know how to operate the tractor or machinery correctly or is unaware of the dangers involved.

To help reduce accidents, a Farm Tractor Safety Course is being sponsored by area High School Vocational Agriculture Departments and the University of Wisconsin Extension in Washington County.

The course will be held on four Saturdays, February 19, February 26, March 11 and March 18 from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. On Saturday, February 19 and February 26, the course will be held in Room 1020 and 1026 at the Courthouse, 432 E. Washington Street, West Bend. The March 11 session will be held at the Slinger High School in Room 205. The March 18 session will be held at the Addison Town Hall in Allenton. March 25 has been set aside for a snow date.

The course includes instructions on understanding how to operate a tractor, with emphasis on safety. To

complete the course, youth must attend all four sessions and pass a written and a driving exam. The course must be 24 hours to comply with federal and

state requirements. Federal law requires that youth under the age of 16 must be certified before being hired to work with tractors and tractor machinery. Effective May 1, 1996, state law mandated that no person may direct or permit a youth under 16 years of age to operate a farm tractor or self-propelled implement on a public road unless the youth has been certified as successfully completing a tractor and machinery certification course.

Prior to the new law, only youth 14 or 15 years of age who operated tractors and equipment on a farm not owned by their parent or guardian were required to complete the safety course. Youth who drive a tractor for their parents may still do so without the formal training program as long as they do not operate a tractor on a public road. The law also does not apply to situations where a youth is driving a tractor and implement directly across (perpendicular to) a public road.

If you intend to hire any youth on your farm, make sure that they enroll in this course for your protection as well as theirs. There are penalties for not complying with the law. Also, some insurance companies have indicated that, technically, they can't cover an accident to an untrained youth.

Protect your child or the young person who works for you... enroll them in the Farm Tractor Safety Course. A new state law mandates youth registered for the course must be the minimum age of 12 by the first session of the Tractor Safety Course.

Kewaskum 4-H Club News





Exercise Can Help

Many smokers say smoking relieves stress. But health experts at St. Joseph's Community Hospital want people to know that exercise is a great stress-buster, and a healthy one

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That's why they've added an exercise option to the hospital's on going "The Last Puff" smoking cessation class. The new segment, for those who choose it, adds a half-hour formal exercise program before each weekly class, and two additional optional opportunities to exercise during the week in the hospital's rehabilitation services department.

Studies have found that exercise works as an aid for smoking cessation, can improve exercise capacity, and can delay weight gain after a person has stopped smoking, according to Maggie Seideman, R.N., monary programs at St. other. Joseph's.

"We often talk about the importance of exercise in relation to smoking cessation. This is just another opportunity to do it," Seideman said of the optional exercise segment in "The Last Puff" program.

"Exercise substitutes a good habit for a bad habit, and it eliminates stress," said Al Ludin, registered respiratory therapist at St. Joseph's who conducts "The Last Puff."

Past participants in his program have told him one of the main reasons they smoke is to relieve stress. So reducing stress, he said, is important for those who want to quit.


Seideman listed the benefits of exercise when combined with smoking cessation:

· Exercise substitutes a positive coping strategy for a negative coping strategy (smoking).

· Exercise results in the release of endorphins in the bloodstream - the body's "morphine-like" natural substance.

Exercise reduces weight gain when a person stops smoking.

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Want to Quit Smoking? Teens Face New Driving Requirements

Nearly 2.5 million American teenagers graduate from high school every year. Now an increasing number of Wisconsin teens will soon face another kind of graduation.

The Graduated Driver License (GDL), was written into law as part of Wisconsin's 1999-2001 biennial budget. GDL provides novice drivers an opportunity to gain knowledge and driving time under the supervision of an experienced mentor. The requirement to have 30 additional hours of driving practice will take effect on February 1, 2000, with full implementation of the law after September 1, 2000. New requirements include increased practice time, 10 hours of night driving, point doubling for offenses, passenger and night driving restrictions (midnight to 5 a.m.)

"This is a great step forward to help teen drivers gain safe driving experience while learning to operate an automobile," said Charles Thompson, secretary, Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT). "Many young drivers demonstrate the maturity and skill to negotiate our

streets and highways safely. Unfortunately, a disproportionate number may underestimate the tremendous responsibilities and risks that come with a driver's license."

Drivers between the age of 16 and 19 are more likely to be in a motor vehicle crash than any other age group. WisDOT's "1998 Wisconsin Traffic Crash Facts" lists teens as only 6.3% of all licensed drivers but indicates this age group accounts for nearly 14% of all driver crashes.

Brought to the Legislature by concerned parents and citizens, GDL, as of September 1, 2000, will also limit passengers who ride with teens. "Instead of allowing 16 and 17-yearolds to drive anywhere, anytime with whomever they choose, graduated licensing provides a series of steps for teens to acquire safe driving habits and adequate practice time before driving with peers," said John Evans, director, WisDOT's Bureau of Transportation Safety.

Recently eight other states, including California, Delaware, Georgia, Indiana, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New Mexico and Oregon joined Wisconsin in passing GDL legislation. Nearly 35 states have adopted one or more elements of graduated licensing in an effort to save lives and reduce teen crashes. According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, Maryland, California, Oregon, Florida, Kentucky, Michigan and North Carolina have evaluation studies underway. Preliminary information from these studies estimate that 38% fewer fatalities would be expected, and nearly 275 lives saved, if teens with learner's permits or probationary licenses didn't ride with teens.

By now, most Wisconsin taxpayers will have received their rebate checks from the State of Wisconsin. In all, more than 2.5-million people will share in the \$700dollars million being returned directly to the people. That, combined with income and property tax cuts from the 1999-2001 budget, will save the average Wisconsin family \$661 this year.

Governor Thompson and I heard over and over again from the people of Wisconsin that they wanted a rebate check, putting their money back in their pockets to spend or invest as they see fit. Getting this done was a top priority. Additionally, the hardworking people of this state will be seeing more money in their paychecks because of permanent income tax cuts.




