

Plan Commission Gives Favorable Vote For 24 Unit Senior Citizen Complex Here

Plan Commission met Tuesday evening to meet with Mr. Callan Schulz of Keystone Development, LLC.

Take Second in National Stock Market Competition

Jim Thelen and Todd Wright, two seniors at Kewaskum High School, won second place in a national stock market competition called "Main Exchange."

The competition involved hundreds of teams of students from across the nation. Wright and Thelen managed to turn \$100,000 into almost \$300,000 in just ten weeks by investing in the stock market.

The "Main Exchange" competition takes place over the internet and the prices and companies exactly mirror real life stocks exchanged on the market. The stu-

dents are able to take \$100,000 and invest it in whatever stocks they choose to make it grow over the course of ten weeks.

Thelen and Wright took part in the competition as part of their economics course at the high school taught by Dave Rockhill. Both students will receive jackets and KHS will receive \$1,400 in new computer equipment for winning second place.

The grand prize for first place in the competition was an all expense paid trip to New York and the New York Stock Exchange. Schulz presented his plan to erect Hickory Terrace Senior Apartments, a 24 unit senior apartment complex to the commission.

The property will consist of one building on the two acre parcel containing one and two bedroom apartments.

This property is designed exclusively for senior citizens. It incorporates many design features and amenities for individuals 55 years or older. Some of the amenities include: security entrances with intercom, community room, fitness room, library, planned activities, on-site management, garages and private patios or balconies.

The property will be restricted to seniors whose income is at or below 60% of the county median income.

Construction of the buildings is that of wood frame with brick and vinyl siding. The building will feature a pitched roof with asphalt shingles.

The interior will consist of all kitchens having factory finished wood cabinets, laminate counter tops, and stainless steel sinks. Each apartment will be equipped with an electric self-cleaning oven, a range hood with fan, garbage disposal, dishwasher and frost free refrigerator. The bathrooms will have combination shower/tub and vanity cabinets. All

windows will be double-glazed with screens. Floors will be covered with carpeting in all areas except the kitchen and bathrooms.

Hwy. 45 Resurfacing Project to Be Discussed at Meeting Here

Mike O'Brien, communications manager for the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's southeast district, will discuss the upcoming US Highway 45 resurfacing project at a meeting with the Kewaskum area community on Wednesday, February 16 at 7 p.m.

All residents, especially those who commute to the Milwaukee area, and anyone else with interest, are encouraged to attend.

The meeting, sponsored by the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, will be held at the Community Room. A 15 minute video presentation will be shown prior to a question and answer period. Also included will be discussion on the best route revision for commuters to use.

The 15-mile US 45 project, from the Washington/ Waukesha County Line (County Q) to Lincoln Avenue in West Allis, will impact thousands of commuters, truckers, tourists and other travelers. The corridor is used by up to 150,000 vehicles per day.

Starting April 9, one southbound lane will be closed between 6 a.m. and 8 p.m., and two lanes will be closed at night. The work will involve resurfacing, bridge repairs and ramp improvements.

Southbound construction is scheduled through September, 2000. Work in the northbound lanes is scheduled in 2001.

Culinary Arts Program Earns Five Year ACF Accreditation

"A feather in its cap," is what the Culinary Arts Program at Moraine Park Technical College was given when it received a five-year Grant of Accreditation from the American Culinary Federation, Inc. (ACF).

"Becoming accredited by the ACF's Accrediting Commission is a mark of quality in the Hospitality Industry," said Donna Leet, dean for Moraine Park's Culinary Arts program. "It assures prospective employers that a student has been through rigorous and thorough educational preparation and that they can be expected to perform at a high level of competance in the workplace."

Leet also expectes to see an increase in the number of students enrolling in Moraine Park's two-year program. "Students can look at the accreditation and know it is a guarantee of a high-quality program," she said. "They can be sure the education and culinary arts training they receive at Moraine Park is of the highest quality and will benefit them when they enter the workplace."

Culinary Arts The Program received its accreditation in July 1999 and will remain accredited through June 20, 2004. Although the normal grant of initial accreditation is for three years, according to the approval letter Moraine Park received from ACF Chairman Jerry Vincent, C.C.E., A.A.C., Moraine Park received a five-year grant because "the commission was very impressed with the exceptional program, documentation and


Baseball Informational Meeting Feb. 16

Sarah is the daughter of Paul and Marie Ritger, 5774 Beaver Dam Road, West Bend. She is a senior, Social Work major.

The CA/RA serves in a dual role capacity for the Office of Residence Life. CA's are paraprofessionals selected and trained by the Office of Residence Life and the Student Services Division. All applicants must have served as a resident assistant for a minimum of one year and possess extensive leadership skills.

CA's must maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.40, be junior standing, carry a full-time credit load, have lived on campus at least four semesters, and possess knowledge of the University services and resources, as well as a willingness to help others.

Community Advisors are undergraduate students, and are responsible for carrying out the mission and philosophy of Residence

CA's perform the normal duties of RA's including serving as a community facilitator, referral agent, peer advisor, and programmers. They also uphold the University and Residence Life policies, and help to maintain an environment conducive to living and learning.

In addition, CA's supervise three to four residence halls or campus apartments, housing 180 to 240 residents, assist with staff development, assume special assignments, supervise and evaluate RA performance, conduct weekly staff meetings, monitor discipline reports, contribute to monthly campus newsletters, plan community-wide programs, submit weekly reports, monitor records and program efforts, and collaborate with area coordinators and other professional staff to complete formal reviews.



cluded in a child's leisure time activities. Because television-watching competes with reading, parents need to make an extra effort to encourge kids to read. Here are some ways to do

READING AND STORYTELLING AS A FAMILY ACTIVITY

Reading aloud to your children and storytelling may be better competition for TV than having children read on their own. Set aside an hour or two each week for family reading or storytelling sessions.

Parents and children can be involved in selecting and reading the stories. Books or long stories can be read in installments. You can establish rituals such as telling ghost stories on

rainy nights. Make reading aloud as exciting as possible. Use different voices for dialogue and add comments about what has happened or what will happen next. With fidgety young listeners, skip over long descriptive passages and remember that toddlers have short attention spans. While you read, cuddle little children on

They will then associate good feelings with reading. Although you may want to tape a few stories to be played when you are not available, this can never substitute for cozy, in-person reading.

TEACHING THROUGH STORIES

Storytelling is an ancient way of teaching lessons, morals and ideals. Children will listen to and learn more from a story than with a finger pointed at them. For example, a story about a little beaver who got lost because he strayed from his mother, can teach a lesson.

Family storytelling entertains and teaches children at the same time and because it requires nothing but your imagination, it can be done in any setting at any time.

SET A GOOD EXAMPLE

It's one thing to tell children that you want them to

Reading should be in- read, but if kids don't see you reading they won't become readers either. To encourage them, have books around the house and give them as gifts. You can also read interesting items aloud to your children from magazines and newspapers.

DON'T TURN LEISURE READING INTO A CHORE

One of the reasons children don't like to read is that it may seem too much like homework. It's up to parents to expose children to reading for pleasure. Discuss books and stories with your children. Ask how they feel about a character or why they like a particular scene, rather than quizzing them on facts or

LIMIT YOUR CHILD'S TV TIME

The average American child spends three to four hours a day in front of the TV. Try to limit TV time to one hour a day with exceptions for special programs. The other hours can be spent reading or doing other constructive activities.

Never use TV as a punishment or reward because it makes it seem too important. Instead, make reading a special privilege. Let your child stay up half an hour later than usual if the time is spent reading.

The Threshold receives used disposable cameras from CSL. Over 35 different styles of disposable cameras are received from sources nationwide at CSL. "Partnering with CSL in this niche industry has proven beneficial to both our organizations," said Tom Executive Bergerud, Director of The Threshold. 'Our employees enjoy refurbishing disposable cameras. It's another way cameras bring smiles to people's faces," said Bergerud.

"The Threshold partners with businesses to reduce costs and provide on-going support of key parts of their manufacturing process," said Jim Gumm, Director of Manufacturing at The Threshold.

"We are the first stage in series of quality checks for CSL," according to Gumm. "Our employees verify that the lens, viewfinder and flash are intact and that the integrity of the camera is not compromised," said Gumm. The Threshold also tests and puts thousands of AA batteries for the cameras into boxes.

The raw materials. empty disposable cameras and batteries, are sent back to CSL for the next stage of the process. The disposable cameras are cleaned, refilled with batteries and film. The cameras with a flash are tested. The units are replaced with private and commercial labels, then sent to corporations for consumers, private promotions or special events including weddings, golf outings, and insurance promotions.

"We feel great about this entire process," said Terry White, Owner of CSL. "We restore life to a product otherwise sent to a landfill, create employment opportunities for people with varying abilities and help people with disabilities at The Threshold feel good about themselves," said White.

"This partnership with CSL empowers the people we serve at The Threshold. People of all walks of life, including people with cognitive or physical disabilities, need to feel worthwhile. Everyone needs self-esteem, a sense of personal value that they are important and can make a difference. The work we do with area businesses allows our clients an opportunity to have income and thus reduce the subsidy they receive from the government," said Bergerud.

This is a win-win-win situation. The person with a disability gets increased self-confidence and a paycheck. The business The Threshold partners with receives cost effective, ongoing support in manufacturing. And government taxation to subsidize people with disabilities is reduced.

The Threshold is a private, nonprofit agency serving the rehabilitation needs of people in Washington County. Its mission is to support and represent individuals by creating opportunities that enable them to lead self-determining lives.


that if anyone has a question they should bring it up as soon as possible.

The Kewaskum Indian ladies lost on Parent's Night to Random Lake by a score of 64-55. The Indians only scored three free throws in the opening quarter and then had to play catch up for the rest of the game.

Kewaskum did tie the game at 19 all in the second quarter, but then found themselves down by eight points at halftime.

Heather Rieder and Jenny Kraft had the hot hands in the second half as they scored 15 and 11 points respectively. Rieder, a junior, continues to improve with each passing game. Kewaskum's downfall was that they only went to the free throw line 10 times, versus the Ram's 28 visits.


