## Class Ring Found After 22 Years Conditional Use Permit Issued

The last time Randy Seefeldt saw his Kewaskum High School class ring was in KHS welding class a few weeks before his 1978 graduation.

"It disappeared right after class," Seefeldt remembers, "we ripped the place apart." But he never found

Until last month, that is, when he got a call from Kewaskum School District Director of Building and Grounds Dale Wedde.

"I asked him if he was missing something from twenty-two years ago," said Wedde.

As it happens, while clearing the school's storm sewer, district custodian Bill Espitia noticed something shiny. It was a 1978 KHS class ring with the initials RWS, which he turned over to Wedde.

"You should have seen the look on (Wedde's) face when I handed it to him," Espitia recalled, "he said, "HOW old is that?"

Wedde then began the task of finding the owner. Consulting the 1978 KHS

yearbook, he found five people with the initials "RS." KHS Secretary Betty Mertzig determined which matched the middle initial as well, and Randy W. Seefeldt was called with the

A request for a conditional use permit which would allow Robert and Alexis Dennis to build a four-bedroom home and a 15-run dog kennel in Section 18 of the Town of Scott stirred up some heated comment during a public hearing on Monday evening. Dennis is considering the purchase of 37,486 acres on the north side of Brazelton Drive, west of Highway 28.

Ms. Dennis, who has 27 years experience as a veterinary technician, described plans for a 15-run board dog kennel with 12 "inside/outside" kennels and two outside kennels. The kennel would be insulated, heated and air conditioned. It would not be used for stray dogs or unlicensed dogs. Dogs using the facility would be "inside" dogs, not hunting dogs.

The major objection to the facility was the fear of continuous barking dogs. Dennis explained that dogs bark because of stress and boredom. She said, "If proper care is given, dogs are quiet when fed and taken

Relating her past experience in the boarding business, Dennis remarked that this is not a new activity for them. She has been taking care of dogs in their Town of Sherman home for many years without a complaint from neighbors. She explained that the land purchase is contingent on obtaining the use permit.

Neighbors who live across the road from the property said that they anticipate barking dogs and devaluation of their property if the kennel is to become a reality. Another individual felt that putting a commercial property at this location would set a precedent and such establishments could spring up anywhere.

The planning commission recommended the following conditions: a privacy fence would need to be constructed, a tree berm planted, an 8 p.m. curfew observed for dogs being outside, and the permit reviewed on a two year sched-

Following the hearing, on a voice vote, board members voted four to one (Weber voting no) to issue the use permits for the house and business, with the conditions as stated

An agreement currently held with the Batavia First Responders was amended to change the purchase year for a Responder vehicle from year 2000 to 2002. An equipment van purchase is planned for 2001.

## Dr. Sami Saad Scholarship Being Established at UWWC

WEST BEND -- Dr. Joel Rodney, Dean and CEO of the University of Wisconsin-Washington County, recently announced that the school, together with the Washington County Campus Foundation, is seeking donations to establish a "Professor Sami Saad Scholarship," for botany students. Saad died unexpectedly July 31, 1999, at his home in Elm Grove.

Rodney said the scholarship was being established to continue Saad's longstanding tradition of helping deserving students, and in response to inquiries from former students in the community. "During the years that Sami Saad was here, he served as teacher, mentor, coach and friend to the many, many students that he came into contact with on a daily basis," Rodney said. "He touched a lot of lives while here, and this is an excellent way to continue that long tradition he established of giving."

Saad, a professor of botany and microbiology at the University of Wisconsin-Washington County since 1971 and renowned as an expert on mushrooms and other fungi, was born in Beirut, Lebanon. He was educated at the city's premier schools, including the International College (a high school run by the American University) and the American University of Beirut.

After receiving bachelor's and master's degrees with distinction in Agriculture and Agronomy, respectively in Beirut, he followed his interest in plant pathology to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he

obtained his Ph.D degree in 1969. He was a postdoctoral fellow in plant pathology and bacteriology from 1969 to 1971.

Saad also worked extensively with the University Extension, teaching and lecturing as an agronomy expert to local farmers and agri-business. Also as part of the Outreach Program, Saad would delight in taking informal groups of students on nature walks, picking edible mushrooms and teaching the hungry crowds many Middle Eastern recipes using mushrooms. 'His students called him. 'Mr. Shroom," said Rodney.

This new scholarship is planned for annual award to UWWC graduates with high academic standing, who plan to major in Plant Biology (Botany) at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. "Sami's experiences as a student at UW-Madison were very positive and memorable," said Rose Saad, Sami's widow. "He

was very impressed with the high academic standards and made many longlasting friendships there. I know he'd approve of this scholarship."



#### Veterinarians Team Up For 'Spay Day USA'

The sixth annual "Spay Day USA," a national campaign to reduce pet overpop-ulation, will take place on Tuesday, February 29, 2000. The Washington County Humane Society (WCHS) in partnership with Hartford Animal Clinic and Hartford Animal Doctors will be among the hundreds of participants joining together to spay and neuter as many dogs and cats as possible for the national event. During Spay Day USA's first five years, over 350,000 animals have been altered.

"The numbers are staggering," says Marnie Brown, Executive Director of the Humane Society. "In our community alone, we took in nearly 3,000 animals - and that's just the tip of the iceberg - many animals don't even reach our shelter."

Brown contends that fighting pet overpopulation is just one of the many benefits to spaying and neutering. Many behavior problems such as roaming, marking territory, inappropriate house soiling, and aggression can be eliminated by the procedure, and the risk of certain types of cancers can also be reduced or eliminated, depending on the age at which the surgery is performed.

Brown reports that one female cat and her offspring can produce 420,000 cats in seven years, and a dog and her offspring can produce 87,000 dogs in six years. "For most people, those are just numbers. Our shelter, unfortunately, sees the direct result of unaltered animals, and has to deal with them on a daily basis."

During the week of February 27th, Hartford Animal Clinic will alter three shelter animals for

WCHS at no cost? In addition, Hartford Animal Doctors will hold a drawing for anyone having their pet altered at their clinic during the week of Spay Day, USA. Whoever is picked as the winner for the drawing will have their spay/neuter charges waived, and Animal Doctors and WCHS will share the cost between

WCHS employees will also wear keys attached to blue ribbons during the week signifying that spaying/neutering is the key to end pet overpopulation.

"We are so grateful to both Hartford practices for their participation in this effort. We'r working toward ending pet overpopulation one pet at a time," says Brown.

Anyone can participate in Spay Day USA by having their own pet - or a shelter pet awaiting adoption altered. If anyone is interested in donating the cost of having a shelter animal altered, they should call The Washington County Humane Society at 677-4388.

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
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
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


## Little Folks School House Learns About Dental Care

## Income Tax Implications Should Be Part of Farm Transfer Planning

MADISON -- Taxes are one of the so-called two certainties of life, but they're one of those things we'd all like to avoid. However, it's a mistake to put off looking at the income tax implication of a farm transfer.

It's important to structure the farm transfer to reduce the tax liability as much as possible, either through the timing of the transfer or in the reporting method. These decisions are critical, because some will subject the transaction to immediate taxation, while others allow for the taxation

to be deferred.

"Tax planning cannot be done solely on the basis of the impact the farm transfer has on one's taxes," said Jeanne Meier, director of the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection's Farm Center. "All too often, the economic feasibility or other concerns may be overlooked for the sole purpose of obtaining a tax deduction.'

"The income tax consequences of a farm transfer are an important part of the transfer plan and must be considered," she added. "But they are just one of several important factors that must be taken into account when putting together the transfer plan."

Exiting farmers have always been considered "land rich and cash poor" so it's essential for them to get the best price possible for everything they have in order to put away a nest egg for retirement. Many retiring farmers sell all their assets at once to get the best price, but that practice can have an adverse tax impact on the intended nest

Several methods can be used to minimize the income taxes that must be paid on the sale of the farm, and they can be used in a variety of combinations. Adverse tax consequences generally stem from the bunching of income in the year of the sale, resulting in higher income that's taxed at a higher rate.

simple method to reduce income taxes is to spread the sale of assets over more than one year, moving some of the income from higher tax brackets into lower ones. The buyer can use the installment method to pay for the assets, and the seller reports the income from the sale as the payments are received, spreading the income out over several years.

The tax rules, however, require the parties to an installment sale to report a minimum amount of interest on the sale. The seller reports the interest as income, and the buyer can claim it as a deduction.

The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 allows that a \$250,000 gain on the sale of a residence (\$500,000 for a married couple) is not income and not taxed, as long as the residence was owned and used as the taxpayer's home for at least two of the last five years. Taxpayers can use this provision as often as every two years, but to take advantage of it, the sale price of the personal residence must be separately identified when the farm is sold.

With the enactment of Wisconsin's marital property law in 1986, spouses in Wisconsin qualify for the income tax advantage of marital property. Under the law, the surviving spouse's interest in marital property gets a "stepped up basis" equivalent to the date of death value. This special treatment of marital property essentially eliminates capital gains upon the death of the first spouse.

Transferring machinery from an exiting farmer to a beginning one presents some of the most difficult income tax issues. Both parties should weigh the income tax pros and cons of each alternative before a final agreement is reached. Some of those concerns are:

\* If the machinery is leased to the beginning farmer, the exiting farmer is likely to be subjected to self-employment taxes as well as income taxes on the lease payments;

\* If the beginning farmer has an option to buy the machinery at the end of the lease, the Internal Revenue Service can treat the transaction as an installment sale if the purchase price does not reflect the value of the machinery at the time of purchase;

One method of spread-

ing the machinery sales over several years is for the exiting farmer to sell machinery only as it wears

\* The exiting farmer may give the machinery to the beginning farmer and eliminate the income tax problem for the exiting farmer.

Gifts up to \$10,000 per year to each recipient are not subject to the gift tax rules. An exiting farmer may use this annual exclusion to make gifts of machinery or other farm assets to be transferred to the beginning farmer.

Keeping in mind the needs of the exiting farmer, the beginning farmer can structure a transaction to the advantage of both parties by reducing income fluctuations, which helps reduce the amount of taxes paid. Due to progressive tax rates, income during highincome years is taxed at a higher rate, and taxpayers can't take advantage of individuals exemptions and deductions available on an annual basis if there is no income for them to offset the low-income years.

The options available to a farmer are many and can be quite complex. It's best to review income tax implications with legal counsel or tax experts to see how they apply to your situation and plan your farm transfer accordingly.



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



## New Ice Control Methods Work to Keep Roads Safe

In an attempt to keep roads clear of ice and snow, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, in cooperation with county highway departments, has been experimenting with a number of materials over the last two winters.

These materials have included the use of two liquids, magnesium chloride and a plant-based product, that can be applied before snow, frost, or freezing rain is forecast to begin. The products have been tested to determine how they affect road conditions and if their use can reduce the amount of sodium chloride regular, old-fashioned road salt - that's used.

"We've had encouraging results working with both products," Tom Martinelli of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's Bureau of Highway Operations, said. "Magnesium chloride has been used primarily to treat bridge decks to prevent the formation of frost or ice. It's performed very well in the tests over the past two winters and again early this winter.'

Martinelli noted that, mixed properly and applied to a road or bridge's surface prior to a snowfall or when frost or ice might form, magnesium chloride is effective at preventing roads from becoming slick. County highway crews that have used the product reported that bridge decks remained wet rather than icy after application of the product and resulted in ice-free surfaces with no accidents reported on the treated

Magnesium chloride is a naturally occurring compound found in liquid brine form in Utah's Great Salt Lake. Counties using magnesium chloride said the product easily washes off vehicles and windshields in car washes.

Some 22 Wisconsin counties will be testing the use of magnesium chloride on their bridges and roads this year as either a pre-wetting compound or in an antiicing application.

The plant-based product will be used by 21 counties this winter. It, too, is applied to a road's surface as a liquid prior to the anticipated formation of frost or ice to keep roads safe or as a pre-wetting agent for salt. County highway crews using the product noted that it helped prevent bonding of snow to the pavement and that roads cleaned up faster than roads using standard deicing approaches.

According to Martinelli, pretreatment of pavements with the liquids has assisted with the efficient removal of accumulated snow from roadways. Reapplication during storms also helps improve the ice-melting ability or regular road salt.

The total operational costs of using both products compares favorably to simple applications of basic road salt, although Martinelli said more testing is necessary as some counties had better experiences with the products than others from both a cost and an effectiveness standpoint.

Most counties also use a technique that "pre-wets" regular road salt prior to its application on the highway. Prewetting helps the salt stick to the pavement and helps prevent ice or snow from bonding to the surface. That allows quicker cleanup of roads after a snow or ice storm, Martinelli said.

We're working to make roads safer while also reducing our total reliance on road salt, which can harm the environment if it's overused," Martinelli said. "We'll continue to experiment with products like magnesium chloride to make sure motorists can get home safely while protecting Wisconsin's fragile roadside environments."

While these methods are promising safety measures, Martinelli said the best things to improve your safety in winter driving is to adjust your speed to conditions and wear your safety


