Donald Harmon of Kewaskum will make an appearance on the Lottery Money Game TV show this weekend with a chance to win in excess of \$50,000.

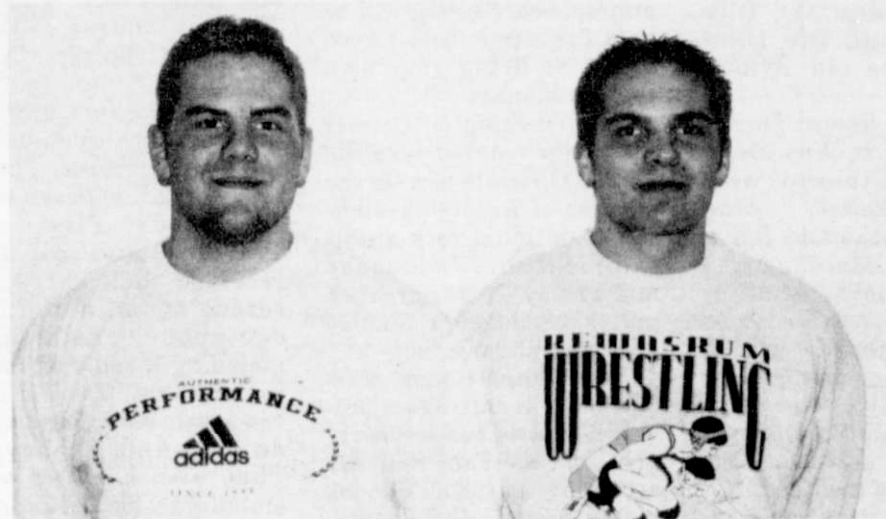

Pam Tillis Will Appear at Washington County Fair 25 Years Ago

February 21, 1975

Pam Tillis, 1994 Country Music Association's "Female Vocalist of the Year," is scheduled to perform on the Main Stage at the Washington County Fair Park on Saturday, July 29, according to Sandy Lang, Washington County Fair Manager.

Born in Plant City, Florida, Pam started her on stage singing career at the age of eight with her father, songwriter/singer Mel Tillis on the Grand Ole Opry stage at the old Ryman Auditorium.

Pam, best known for her hit, "Maybe It Was Memphis," has toured with George Strait, Alan Jackson, Brooks and Dunn, Vince Gill, Alabama and Patty Loveless. Another great hit is "All The Good Ones Are Gone," which helped her be nominated for two Grammy's, the CMA Single, Female Vocalist and video honors as well as the ACM "Song of the Year."

Other hits include, "Shake the Sugar Tree," "Let That Pony Ride," "Cleopatra Queen of Denial," and "Mi Vida Loca."

The Pam Tillis performance will be included with general admission to the Washington County Fair. Admission prices for the

2000 Fair will be as follows:

Daily Adult - \$5 (after 4 p.m.) \$7; Youth (9-15 years) \$3; Eight and Under - Free.

Season passes (five-day admission) will be offered at \$12.00 for youth and \$20 for adults. Season passes must be purchased prior to June 30, 2000. Parking on the grounds is free.

There will be no reserved seating, as the concert will be held in an amphitheater atmosphere. Seating will be on a first-come, first-served basis, so bring your own chair or blanket.

The Washington County Fair is scheduled for July 26-30. Officials are in the process of finalizing additional national rock entertainment for Wednesday and Friday. A tractor/truck pull is scheduled for Sunday afternoon and evening.

Washington County Fair officials will once again provide a shuttle bus service to and from the Fair. Shuttles are being set up at various high schools in the County. A charge of \$1 per person will be charged for the round trip.

25 Years Ago

Currently there are 18 members of the 45-member Kewaskum Fire Department on the rescue squad. Five members of the squad have completed the Emergency Medical Training and received their licenses at the department's recent banquet held at Hon-E-Kor Country Club. They are Lieutenant Don Ehnert, squad leader; Mike Kierke, Paul Behring, Oscar Knoeck and Andy Pesch. This is a 22-week course with no chance of being absent. Presently, Ronald Sarauer, Larry Williams and Jim Staehler are also enrolled in the E.M.T. course. The ten remaining men have taken Advanced First Aid Training and all have received their cards. The rescue squad had a fully equipped ambulance, including a radio-telephone communication with three hospitals, West Bend, Fond du Lac and Sheboygan. They also have an older ambulance for backup. The rescue squad has been in existence since 1949.

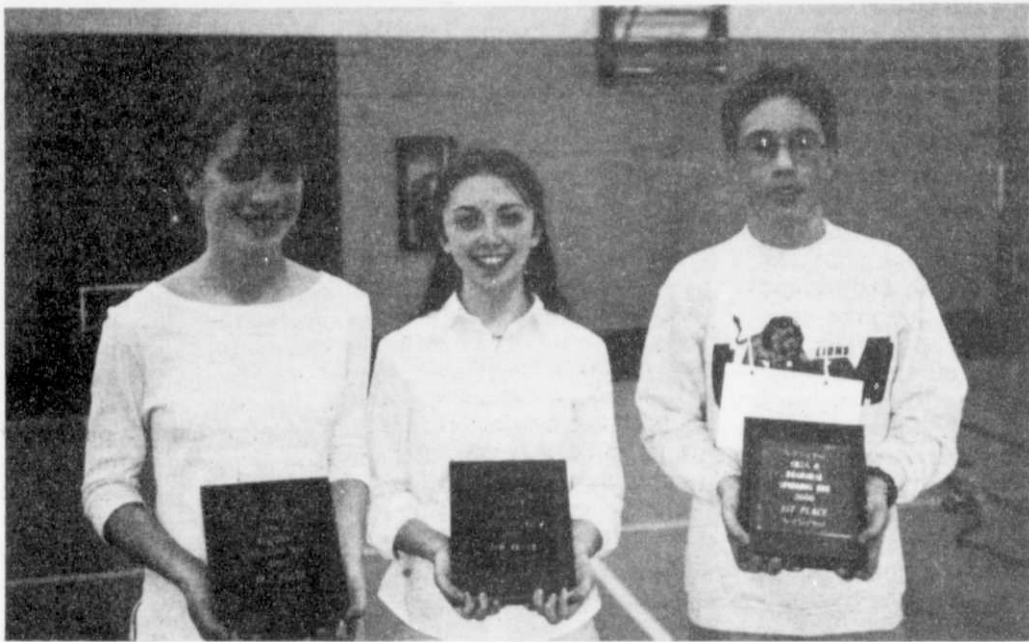

Special Reminders for the Self-Employed

With the income tax filing season upon us, it's a good time to remind self-employed individuals about some special tax tips.

If you're self-employed, you need to know that there are two income tax deductions that reduce your tax liability. These deductions are intended to make sure self-employed people are treated in much the same way as employers and employees for Social Security and income tax purposes.

First, net earnings from self-employment are reduced by an amount equal to half of the person's total Social Security tax. This is similar to the way employees are treated under tax laws because the employer's share of the Social Security tax is not considered income to the employee.

Second, as a self-employed person you can

deduct half of your Social Security tax on the face of the Internal Revenue Service Form 1040. This means the deduction is taken from your gross income in determining your adjusted gross income. It is not considered an itemized deduction and you must not list it on your Schedule C.

UWWC to Present Musical 'The Robber Bridegroom'

WEST BEND - It wasn't the cascades of fake Spanish Moss dripping onto the stage at the University of Wisconsin-Washington County, an ax-murdering wicked stepmother, or the head of a mob member being carried about in a trunk -- but still managing to speak its lines -- that irked some well-intentioned West Bend citizen about the upcoming spring musical, "The Robber Bridegroom."

It was the thought of a "nekkid girl in the woods." UWWC Director Brad Ford says that recent rumors of nudity on stage in the play, which is set to premier February 25, are completely false. "The actress in question wears a full-length body stocking, is hiding behind some bushes onstage, and has her hands decently placed," he said.

The musical "Robber Bridegroom" opens in the university's Theatre on the Hill at 7:30 p.m. February 25, 26 and March 3 and 4. The University theater is

located on UWWC's campus, 400 University Drive, West Bend.

Ford said the colorful musical is the adaptation of an old folk-tale about a highwayman, who stalked his rich prey along the Natchez Trail, a trail which ran from New Orleans north in the late 1700s. The bandit, Jamie Lockhart, spots Rosamund, a rich planter's daughter in the woods one day, and decides to steal her rich-looking clothes.

Piece by piece Rosamund hands over her clothes to the villainous bandit, until she is left covering -- but definitely intrigued -- behind a conveniently placed shrub.

But Ford says Lockhart's interest is purely financial. "To him, her clothes look like they're sewn with golden thread," Ford explains. "Jamie Lockhart is kind of an early-American 'Robin Hood' character, except that he steals from the rich and gives to himself."

The girl falls in love with the rugged backwoodsman, but through some cases of double mistaken identity, isn't united with her hero until the play's end.

Complicating the love affair further is the entry of the Harp gang, which consists of gang member Little Harp, who carries around his brother's still-speaking head in a trunk, and Salome, the hard-drinking, ax-murdering stepmother who tries to do in the play's heroine.

Ford said the stylized period costumes and the unique bluegrass music, which includes banjos, fiddles and guitars, of the piece will make it attractive to all area audiences.

"Anyone who likes musical theater, anyone who likes bluegrass music, anyone who likes rugged humor, anyone who likes the theater at all, will enjoy this play," Ford says.

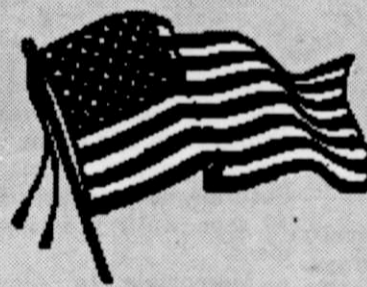

Lake Winnebago Sturgeon Spearing Season Closes After Just Two Days

OSHKOSH -- The sturgeon spearing season on the Winnebago chain of lakes closed at 6 p.m. Sunday, February 13, after spearmen reached a harvest cap established under a new permanent rule in just two days of spearing.

Spearmen took 2,517 sturgeon in the two-day season, the shortest season on record, according to preliminary harvest data compiled by the Department of Natural Resources. Spearmen reached 80% of the harvest cap set under the rule for both juvenile and adult females on the opening day of the season, triggering closure of the season at the end of the next day, explained Ron Bruch, DNR fisheries biologist at Oshkosh.

The new rule is intended to provide greater protection to the system's lake sturgeon population, one of the largest populations of this ancient fish in the world, Bruch said.

In addition to Lake Winnebago, spearing was also open this year on the system's three Upriver Lakes: Butte des Morts, Winneconne and Poygan. The harvest caps -- set at 400 adult females, 400 juvenile females and 2,150 males -- applied to the entire system.

DNR staff conducted counts of spearing shanties and found 2,736 shanties on Lake Winnebago and 2,079 on the Upriver Lakes, Bruch said.

"Despite the high numbers of fish harvested on the Upriver Lakes, the impact of the harvest on the system's adult female sturgeon stock will be minimal as most of the fish harvested there were males," said Bruch. "We did exceed our recommended harvest cap on juvenile females, though. While this has rarely happened in the past, it is a concern and we will sit down with our Citizens Sturgeon Advisory Committee to explore options for

future Upriver Lakes seasons," Bruch added.

Spearmen harvested a preliminary total of 1,878 sturgeon opening day, including 451 juvenile females, 320 adult females, 1,103 males

and 4 unknown sex. The harvest on the Upriver Lakes (Butte des Morts, Winneconne and Poygan) was over 60% males.

The 2000 season was the 69th consecutive season on Lake Winnebago since the first season was held in the winter of 1931-32, and the 17th season held on the Upriver Lakes since the first season was held there in 1952. Since 1971 sturgeon spearing has been allowed on the Upriver Lakes for two days every fifth year, which would have put a season in 2001. However, the two-day season was moved up one year to 2000 to allow biologists to collect harvest and population data critical to safe management of the fishery.

Only five citations were issued during the spearing season, according to Dennis Jones, DNR warden supervisor for the Oshkosh area. They included two citations for hook-and-line fishing through a sturgeon hole and one citation each for illegal transportation of a sturgeon, failure to immediately tag and validate a sturgeon and for using a license of another person.

The 1999 spearing sea-

son, held just on Lake Winnebago, closed after just three days when spearmen reached the harvest cap set under an emergency rule. Spearmen harvested a total of 1,484 sturgeon in 1999.

"Our preliminary concern is maintaining the harvest at or below allowable levels, which our harvest cap system is designed to do," added Bruch.

Lady Indians Finish Season on High Note

The Lady Indians picked the right time to start playing their best basketball of the season, finishing the regular season going 3-1, and with two straight wins heading into regional play.

Kewaskum rolled over Sheboygan Falls, 57-44, and Kiel by a score of 56-43. The Indians now wait for the winner of the Waupun-Campbellsport game. The first regional game for Kewaskum will be on Thursday, February 24, at Waupun beginning at 7 p.m.

On Tuesday, February 15, the team hosted the Sheboygan Falls Falcons on Senior Night. The Indians jumped out to a quick 12-6 lead at the end of one, and finished the first half with a 30-20 lead on the strength of Sarah Schwinn and Jenny Kraft, who each had nine points. The team also pulled down 15 offensive rebounds.

Kewaskum continued to lengthen their lead in the second half, outscoring the Falcons 13-8 in the third quarter. KHS held on to their cushion in the fourth quarter to take the win.

Sarah Schwinn led the Indians with 19 points and 10 rebounds. Jenny Kraft followed with 16 points, including three three-pointers. She also added seven steals and five assists.

Kewaskum traveled to Kiel on Friday, February 18 for their last conference game of the season. It was a tightly played game throughout the first 16 minutes. Kewaskum ended the first half with a slim four point lead at 27-23.

The Indians unveiled a 1-3-1 half-court trap in the third quarter. It worked surprisingly well in holding the Raiders to only two points in the period, while Kewaskum was able to extend their lead to 14 points heading into the fourth quarter. The KHS lead grew to 19 points in the fourth quarter, before a small burst by Kiel cut the lead to the final margin of victory.

The Indians were led by Sarah Schwinn's 15 points. She also added seven steals and six rebounds. Jenny Kraft contributed 12 points, including two three-pointers, and four assists. Laura Schwinn and Dani Nass each chipped in with nine points. Heather Rieder led the team with seven rebounds to go along with her four points.

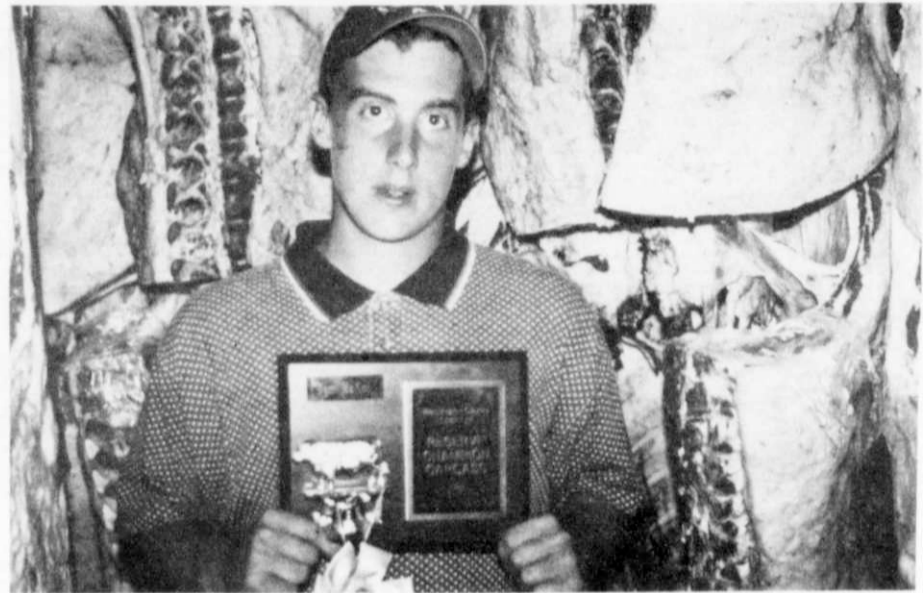

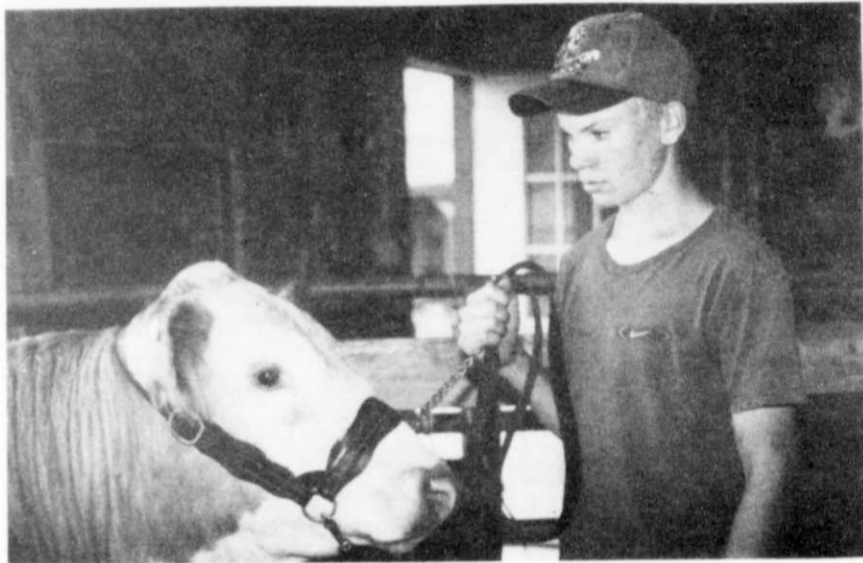

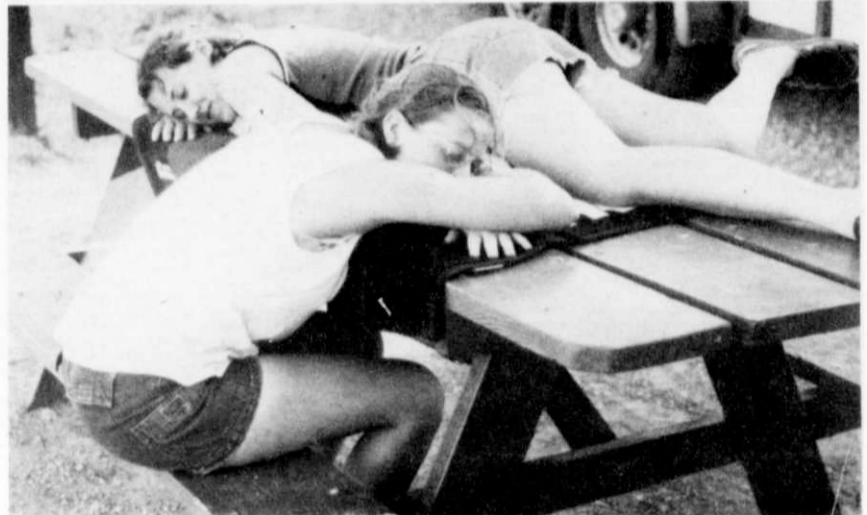

Our annual banquet will be held in May. A delicious meal will be followed with reports, awards and scholarships.

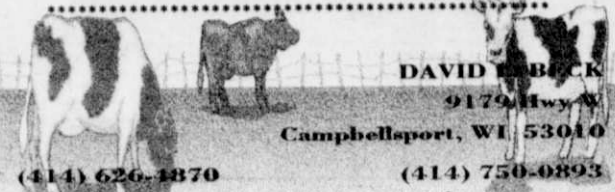
