A fire engine "wet down" is a tradition that has been carried out for many years on the east and west coasts. It is a procedure only done on pumper trunks.

Goeden also enjoyed being active in the Booster Club, serving as president. She remembers working many mornings at 5 am for the wrestlers to weigh in and then "let's eat."

In 1987 Goeden lost the election "I believe it was because of the closing of the Beechwood school. I didn't like to do it either but, bussing, children around to keep the school open was not a good family situation. It was the low point in my school board career," she stated.

Goden continued, "Little did I know, God had other plans for me, my husband, Willie had a critical stock car accident that year. My family and business had to come first. Thanks to my husband's courage and strength he has worked hard and come a long way.'

A few years later she became involved again helping Janet Wolfenberg win on the school board as a write-in.

In 1991 Jeanne decided she would try to regain a seat on the board.

"I ran as a write-in in less than two weeks before the election and won by seven votes!" says Jeanne

"We now have a low student count in the classrooms. It is something the board has tried to maintain even before the state demanded it!" she said.

During the next few years Jeanne states the school board went through a power struggle that "plagued" the board. "Changes in administrators and changes in philosophy caused problems.'

"I always enjoyed visiting the schools and working with the teachers when they wanted to show me a new program be one of the things I will miss," Jeanne said.

At the reception, school board president Larry Fechter asked that Jeanne preside over her last meeting which followed her reception.





Area Chamber of Commerce Offers Welcome Bags


The Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce has prepared Welcome Bags for residents who are new or who have recently moved into the area.







Choosing a College: Making The Most of the Weekend Visit

Kenneth Zahorski, Ph.D., Professor of English St. Norbert College

You can't tell a book by its cover, or a college or university by its catalog alone. So, if you're trying to make a decision about a particular institution, you'll want to visit the campus to see what it's really like.

Starting in September, many colleges invite high school students to spend a few days on campus. It's one of the best ways to get the inside scoop on a school.

Classroom visits can tell a lot about teaching and the learning process. Choose courses dealing with the subject you like. Look at classes you might have to take as a freshman, as well as more advanced offerings.

Don't be afraid to ask questions. Who are some of the most admired professors on campus and why? Ask students if they get help from professors when they need it, and if tutoring is available.

See if the classes are small enough to regularly permit student participation. Are class discussions relaxed and lively? Do students seem comfortable expressing their views, or do they seem to be saying what

the professor wants to hear? Does the instructor challenge students with problem solving skills and critical thinking exercises? Is teamwork stressed?

Does the professor seem to know the students on an individual basis? Does he or she take a genuine interest in what students have to say? You should get the feeling that students, their work, and their ideas, count!

If you visit a large lecture class, watch the students around you. They should be listening intently and taking notes. Do students look bored? If so, they probably are. Professors who are truly excited about what they're teaching are lively and animated, even passionate.

See if students approach the professor after class. That's a sign that students are interested in what they're learning -- and that professors are involved with their classes. Professors should also be accessible through generous office hours.

How closely do students and professors work together? At some colleges, students and faculty collaborate on research, curricular, and artistic projects.Look for schools that encourage and nurture faculty-student learning partnerships.

Students, too, should work together. They may work on group projects, study together for exams, or help one another after class.

Learning should also extend outside the classroom. Students who are really engaged in learning will talk about classes in the cafeteria and the residence halls.

While you're on campus, pick up as many school publications as you can. The student newspaper and student-produced magazines give a good sense of who the students are and what's important to them.

If you ask enough questions, it won't be hard to discover how students really feel about their school. You're exactly where they were a year or two ago, and they'll want to help.

TYPE OF PLASTIC: Plastic Bottles - Normally used in 2 liter soda bottles. P.E.T. bottles will carry the #1 emblem stamped or molded on the bottom.

PREPARATION: REMOVE CAPS AND RINGS AND RINSE CLEAN. This is the most important aspect of a successful recycling program. Bottles that contain liquid residue cannot be recycled. Bring Them Back Governor

By Rep. Glenn Grothman

While the legislative session did not end last week, the only bills the Legislature can take up on its own are bills, which passed both houses. Legislation to be dealt with in May includes the Packer bill, major legislation involving banks and credit unions, election law reform, and bills regarding the future costs of crime.

Unfortunately, the most important fiscal issue was not dealt with -- bringing back the property-rent credit, which used to give Wisconsin families a \$200 to \$350 subtraction from their income tax bill for property taxes they just paid. The only way this issue will now be dealt with is if Governor Thompson calls the Legislature back in Special Session.

It is important to review what is at stake here. In the past 11 years, the combined property, income and sales taxes in the state of Wisconsin have gone up 39% after adjusting for inflation. If one had told someone that we had to expand government by 40% in 1988, one wouldn't have believed that it would have been possible.

In this two-year budget as it now stands, the expected tax increase in real terms will go up another 5%. The only reason it is not higher is the state is collecting an additional \$130 million a year from the tobacco settlement or the increase would be almost 6%.

This at a time when due to the expanding economy, people should need less help from the government than ever before. At current estimates the state will have a \$380 million surplus on June 30, 2001, unless something is done. Normally, these estimates are conservative and if prior estimates are any indication, we may wind up with closer to a 6% increase.

Some people will argue that we should same this money for a rainy day, but having been in Madison for five years, I can safely predict that if we have this money available in the next budget, it will be quickly spent. We have an ill-conceived BadgerCare program

that is replacing private sector insurance and must be changed; we have made commitments to raise teachers' salaries in the next biennium greater than in the past; it is not yet clear how much the corrections budget will increase because of Truth-In-Sentencing; and we have a Governor who apparently believes in more government preschool. State agencies will all ask for their increases as usual it is apparent if money is available, it will be spent.

Governor Thompson came out in favor of reinstituting the property-rent credit in January after he had vetoed it in November. It appeared clear that if the Senate did not pass a Packer bill the Governor would have called the Legislature back for that.

The property-rent credit is more important than the Packer bill. Please Governor Thompson, to prevent a year 2001 spending spree, call us back now. Please let me know that you think on this issue. Contact me here in Madison -- please call 1-888-534-0059.







NEW HOLSTEIN -- Two great individual efforts coupled with great efforts from all the members of the Kewaskum High School boys track teams provided the coaches and the athletes some long awaited satisfaction.

Even though the boys officially finished third out of four Eastern Wisconsin Conference schools, a couple of scoring errors and some great results from the varsity and JV athletes left little doubt that all the hard work the team has been doing in practice is starting to pay off with better performances

Charlie Sparks broke the school record in the discus with a throw of 155'1" and Josh Parrent cleared a personal best of 13' in the pole vault in Kewaskum's first outdoor meet of the season. Host New Holstein dominated the competition by winning eight first places and six second places as they totaled 96 points. Sheboygan Falls finished second with 76 points, followed by Kewaskum's 70.5 points and Manitowoc Roncalli finished with 33.5 points.

Spark's throw of 155'1"

broke the record of 153'4" set by Brian Liegl in 1997. "Charlie has started the season very focused. He has picked up right where he left off last season as a sectional qualifier. I would not be surprised to see Charlie raise the school record even further this season," commented throwing coach Dave Rizzardi. Sparks also anchored both the 400m relay and the 800m relay teams to victory and placed fourth in the shot put with a throw of 41'7-3/4'

Highlights for the Kewaskum girls included the ninth place finish of Emmy Foerster in the 55m hurdles with a time of 9.91 seconds. Foerster just missed the finals as the top eight individual times advanced to the finals. Foerster ran well and should provide help in the hurdles for the Indians.

Colleen Gosa finished 11th out of 44 runners in the 1600m run when she won her heat by knocking almost 23 seconds off her time from the Washington County Indoor. Gosa's official time was 5:59.56 (five minutes and 59.56 seconds). Gosa followed the lead runner for the first seven plus laps, then passed her on the last turn and held off the competitor in a sprint to the finish.


