The Crucifixion

A medical doctor provides a physical description: The cross is placed on the ground and the exhausted man is quickly thrown backwards with his shoulders against the wood. The legionnaire feels for the depression at the front of the wrist. He drives a heavy, square wrought iron nail through the wrist deep into the wood. Quickly, he moves to the other side and repeats the action, being careful not to pull the arms too tightly, but to allow some flex and movement. The cross is then lifted into place. The left foot is pressed backward against the right foot, and with both feet extended, toes down, a nail is driven through the arch of each, leaving the knees flexed. The victim is now crucified. As he slowly sags down with more weight on the nails in the wrists, excruciating fiery pain shoots along the fingers and up the arms to explode in the brain - the nails in the wrists are putting pressure on the median nerves. As he pushes himself upward to avoid this stretching torment, he places the full weight on the nail through his feet. Again he feels the searing agony of the nail tearing through the nerves between the bones of his feet. As the arms fatigue, cramps sweep through his muscles, knotting them deep relentless, throbbing pain. With these cramps comes the inability to push himself upward to breathe. Air can be drawn into the lungs but not exhaled. He fights to raise himself in order to get even one small breath. Finally, carbon dioxide builds up in the lungs and in the

blood stream, and the cramps partially subsided. Spasmodically, he is able to push himself upward to exhale and bring in life-giving oxygen.

Hours of limitless pain, cycles of twisting, joint wrenching cramps, intermittent partial asphyxiation, searing pain as tissue is torn from his lacerated back as he moves up and down against rough timber. Then another agony begins: a deep, crushing pain deep in the chest as the pericardium slowly fills with serum and begins to compress the heart. It is now almost over. The loss of tissue fluids has reached a critical level - the compressed heart is struggling to pump heavy, thick, sluggish blood into the tissues and the tortured lungs are making frantic effort to gasp in small gulps of air. He can feel the chill of death creeping through his tissues.

Finally, he can allow his body to die. All this the Bible records with the simple words, "and they crucified Him", (Mark 15:24).

What wondrous love is this? Many people don't know that pain and suffering our Lord, Jesus Christ went through for us... Because of the brutality, crucifixion was given a sentence to only its worst offenders of the law. Thieves, murderers, and rapists would be the types of creeps who got crucified. Yet, here Jesus is being crucified between two hardened criminals... What did Jesus do? Did he murder anyone? Did he steal anything? The answer as we all know is NO!! Jesus did nothing to deserve this type of death, yet he went willing to die, in between two thieves, so that we might be saved. And there, in between the sinners, was our slain savior for our sins.

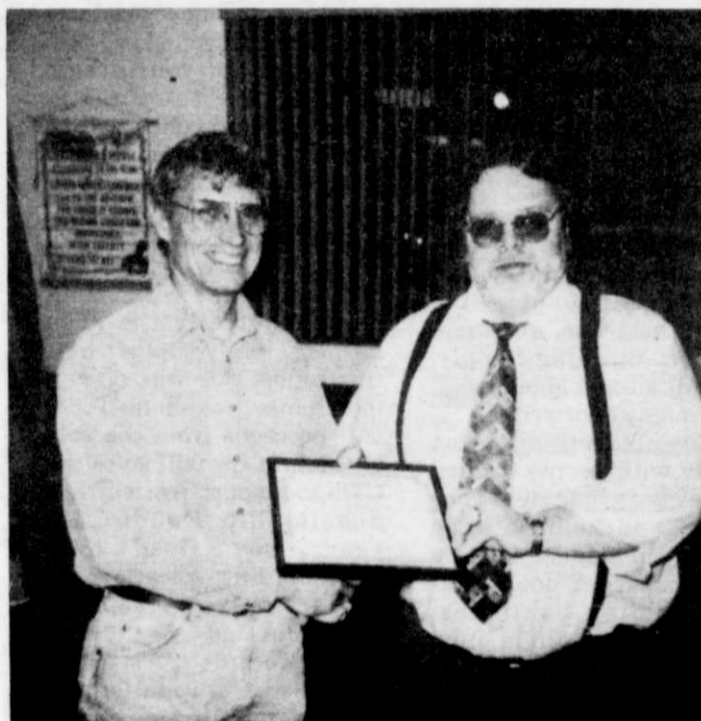

Included with this elite group of runners were Kewaskum High School graduates Mary Kempf, Ric Stefanovic, and Joe Swanson.

Mary Kempf, 39, sponsored locally by Wiseguys, finished 2,850th in her division with an official time of 4:17:32. She was 4,108th for the women and 12,830th overall. The winner of the women's race was Catherine Ndereba of Kenya in a

time of 2:26:11.

Ric Stefanovic, 37, of Milwaukee, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Stefanovic of Kewaskum, finished 76th in his division with an official time of 2:37:46. He was 89th in the men's division and 104th overall.

Joe Swanson, 38, of West Bend, son of Roy and Midge Swanson of Kewaskum, finished

2,934th in his division with an official time of 3:32:46. He was 5,437th for the men and 6,237th overall.

The winner of the men's race was Elijah Lagat of Kenya in 2:09:47.

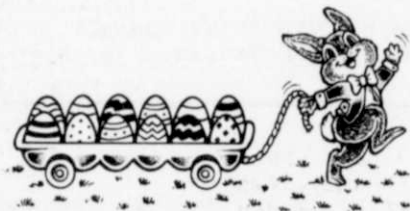

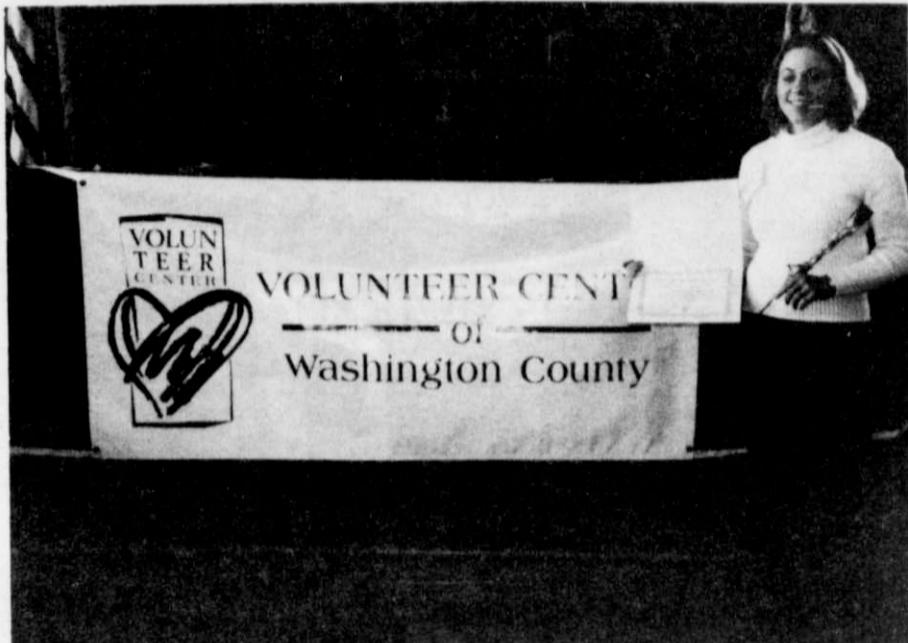

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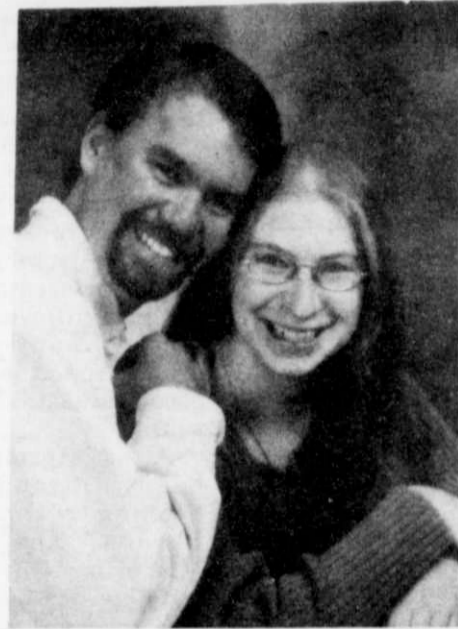
Golden Wedding Celebrated

RECYCLING TIPS

H.D.P.E. #2 PLASTIC

3 of 7

TYPE OF PLASTIC: Plastic Bottles, Jugs and Wide Mouth Food Containers. This plastic is normally found in milk, water and detergent bottles and jugs. Wide mouth food containers are normally ice cream, margarine and cool whip containers.

HINT: H.D.P.E. bottles, jugs and wide mouth food containers will carry the #2 emblem stamped or molded on the bottom. Some milk and water jugs carry no emblem but they are recyclable.

PREPARATION: REMOVE CAPS, RINGS AND METAL HANDLES AND RINSE CLEAN. This is the most important aspect of a successful recycling program. Bottles that contain liquid residue cannot be recycled. Place #2 plastic bottles in your dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag along with the other recyclable items. Place bin or bag at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be Wednesdays for both solid waste and recyclables. Multi-family dwellings of six or more, remember, your recycling pickup will be the first and third Wednesday of each month.

NOTE: DO NOT place automotive product bottles in the recycling bin or bag.

ELEMENTARY BUILDING UPDATE

Time to address the rumor mill: It is NOT true that the Farmington Elementary School has less classrooms or the square footage of the building is less than the approved referendum plans called for!

Now that I hopefully have your attention, let me explain. I have heard from some community members and parents that FES has been downsized. When I was approached I was happy to say that this is not fact. The same number of classrooms proposed in the referendum will be built in the new addition!

The square footage of the FES remodeling is the same (maybe just a bit larger) as the square footage presented in the referendum plans last April! Everyone should know that the architects

returned plans that increased the overall square footage of the building, and this exceeded our budget for FES. As a result the increases had to be scaled back to meet what we had originally asked for.

For example, the existing classrooms at FES are about 900 square feet. The architects presented drawings for new classrooms well over 900 square feet. They also provided a gym plan larger than what we proposed. This would be great news to us if it also came in under the budget the school board an electorate approved.

However, when the cost estimates came in from the general contractor they exceeded our referendum totals by about \$500,000.

What we did at that point was change the plans to reflect what was originally proposed in the referendum. This meant the new classrooms are now being built so that the square footage in each is the same as the existing classrooms.

No classrooms were eliminated in the plans, or ever contemplated as we moved through the process. In the case of the gym, we needed to return to the original sized gym called for in the referendum, which we did. Hopefully, this will clear up any misperceptions. I also hope that in the future, if any questions come up, people will take the time to call me at the district office (626-8427, Ext. 8006).

In that manner misinformation or rumors have little chance to gain a foothold as

we move through the construction and remodeling phases of all three elementary buildings. Your cooperation and interest is always encouraged.

The FES remodeling began on April 3 with excavating for the foundation and the pouring of the footings for the foundation walls. During the Spring Break (April 24-28) the contractors will close off the building to remove tiles, some of which contain asbestos.

When classes resume on May 1 parents need to know that certain sections of the building will have bare concrete and not tile floors. If you've ever remodeled a home you can appreciate the accommodations we will need to make as we finish the school year and help the contractor remain on schedule to open in time for the first day of school next fall. While we are scheduled to be in the newly remodeled building next fall, the gym will not be completed until November 1.

The WES is still awaiting a septic system approval from the state. We expect this to come shortly and construction to begin on or near May 1. We still anticipate being in the new school by the first day of school next fall. Since we are now building an entirely new gym (converting the old

gym into a large group instruction room and an art/music room) occupancy of the NEW GYM will occur on or about November 1. Since we were able to "sharpen the pencil" a bit, we were able to actually increase the square footage of the WES and add two unfinished classrooms on the north side of the building.

The school board approved the budget for the new KES at its last meeting. Construction should begin on or after June 18. The timeline remains the same. We should be ready for student occupancy on the first day of school in the 2001-02 school year. The demolition of the current KES should occur around June 2001. The administration building and community meeting room will be in the final phase of construction and scheduled for occupancy around November of 2001.

If you hear rumors or have a question, don't hesitate to call or stop in at the district office. We are located next door to the current KES building. You can ask for our business manager, Mr. Reichert, or me.

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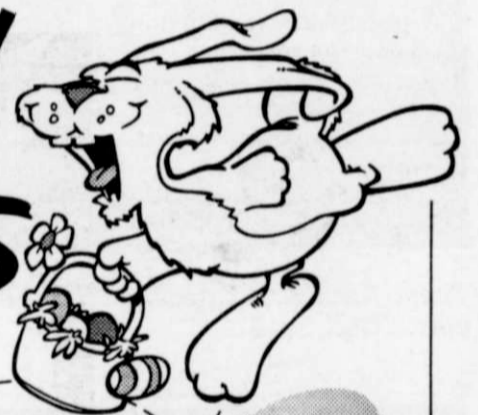

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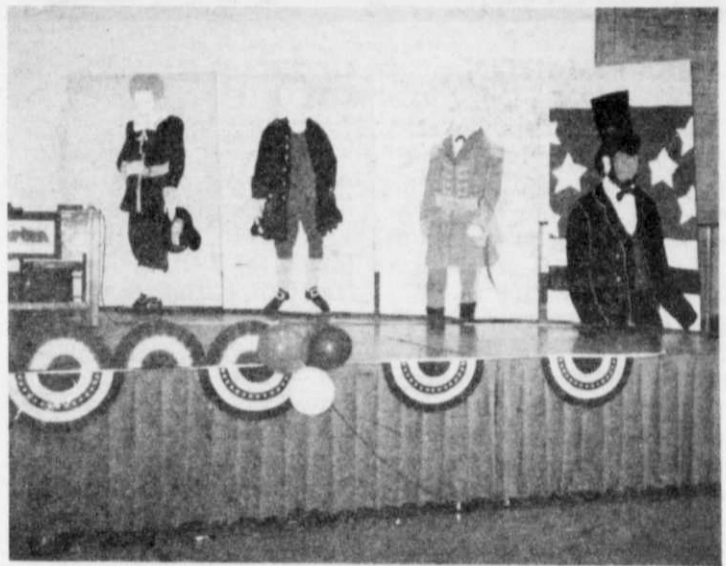

St. Joseph's OT staff includes registered occupational therapists (OTR) and certified occupational therapy assistants (COTA). They are Joan Gauger, COTA; Donna Gifford, OTR; Lori Grahl, OTR; Jilayne Reszel, COTA; and Pat Waters, OTR. Pro-staff members include Sheri Hall, OTR; Tiffany Larson, OTR; Anne Sharpe, OTR; Lauretta Shears, OTR, and Kathy Sullivan, COTA.

Staff members have various specialized interests and expertise in working

with different age groups and different physical deficits. The department has announced that Pat Waters, who has been with the hospital for nine years, will be attending a certified course in reducing lymphedema, a common and serious condition that is the accumulation of protein rich fluid in the superficial tissues. Lymphedema is often caused by injury, scarring, excision and/or radiation therapy of the lymph nodes.

Occupational therapy helps people regain, develop, and build skills that are important for independent functioning, health, well being, security and happiness. Occupational therapy practitioners work with people of all ages who, because of illness, injury, or other impairment, need specialized assistance in learning skills to enable them to lead independent, productive, and satisfying lives.

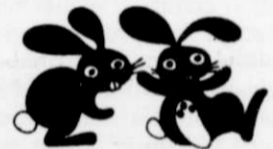
Cardiac Rehab Support Group

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KHS Boys' Spring Golf Starts Season With High Numbers and Expectations

The coaching staff at Kewaskum High School have reason to believe that the local linksters are capable of achieving success this spring due to the high number of participants on the golf team, many with junior varsity and varsity experience.

Every night should prove to be a battle for spots on both the varsity and junior varsity teams throughout the season. Therefore, the coaches anticipate a very competitive team, season and post season.

The Indian varsity should have a great opportunity to compete with some of the traditional powerhouses in the conference and the area with 80% of the varsity team returning and almost all of last year's reserves as well.

Almost 50 student-athletes have joined this year's teams creating some serious competition for the right to represent KHS in varsity, junior varsity and reserve

matches.

With seven team members returning with varsity experience, including lettermen seniors Curt Koth and Todd Wright, and junior Jon Boedeker, the varsity lineup will provide a good mix of experience and talent.

Other top prospects include senior Nick Staehler, and juniors Billy Koch, Dustin Melzark, Kevin Miller, Luke Reindl and Josh Stangl. Sophomores competing for varsity positions are Noah Koch, Dan Poppy, Nick Thorn and Tim Voight.

The top two spots will be ably filled with the likes of senior Curt Koth, returning for his fourth year on the varsity and junior Jon Boedeker, competing against the opponents' best for the second consecutive season. Those two, combined to serve as the team medalist eight times in 1999. Likewise, Billy Koch and Todd Wright each earned team honors once last season.

The most notable losses from last season's runnerup team in the conference and regional play are Shaun Timblin and Clint Herrick, who graduated, as well as Jeff Taylor and Ricky Lettow, who chose not to participate due to prior work commitments.

All four contributed to the overall 9-7 varsity record in 1999 while they finished 5-2 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. Shaun led the team in scoring 13 times and missed qualifying for the state tournament by one stroke.

Traditionally, Plymouth, Two Rivers and Kewaskum battle for the top spots in the conference with the Indians taking second place in 1999. Last season the varsity started their season by winning two of the first three tournaments they participated in. However, they were unable to achieve or maintain that level of success late in the season as they finished third in the Conference Tournament, second in the Regionals and fourth at the Sectionals.

The weakest attribute may have been their mental toughness throughout the tournament series. Thus,

they hope to turn their season around by having their successes at the end of the season, not at the start.

If they can maintain their focus on what they need to do fundamentally with their swing rather than worry about the outcome of that swing, then they may take advantage of their respective talents, skills and experiences.

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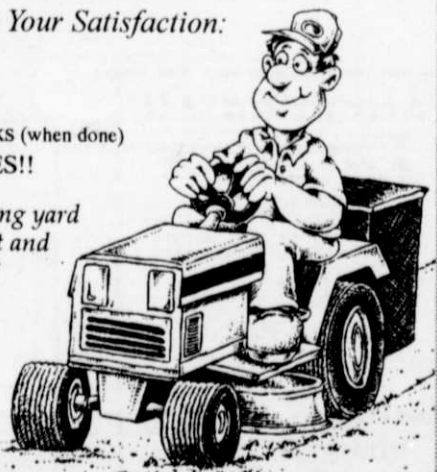
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KHS Boys' Track Team Second at Kiel Triangular

KIEL -- The Kewaskum High School boys' track team finished second with 59 points to Kiel's winning point total of 71.5 points. Sheboygan Lutheran finished third with 38.5 points. Kiel won nine events and Kewaskum five and Sheboygan Lutheran won three events. Despite very cold conditions on Tuesday, April 11, the Kewaskum boys team had some good performances.

Junior Charlie Sparks threw the discus 154'10", just three inches off the school record he set just last week at New Holstein. Sparks also anchored the 800m relay to victory with teammates Jim Thelen, Chris Canter, and Tony Fitts with a time of 1:39.9.

The same foursome came up short to Kiel's winning time of 46.6 seconds in the 400m relay. Kewaskum ran a time of 48.2 seconds. Kewaskum's handoffs in both the 800m relay and 400m relay were not good as needed. In the 800m relay Thelen missed getting the baton in Canter's hand on the first attempt and then when he did complete the handoff he fell onto the track (ouch!).

Tony Fitts and Jim Thelen earlier in the meet finished 1-2 in the 100m dash with times of 12.1 and 12.3 seconds respectively. Sophomore Chris Canter finished second in the 400m dash with a time of 56.9 seconds, while Zorn of Kiel won the 400m dash with a time of 55.9 seconds. Canter also finished second in the long jump with a distance of 18'7-1/2".

Tom Ogi and Paul Mertz both cleared 5'6" in the high jump with the win going to Ogi based on fewer misses.

Senior Jesse Boegel again found himself sprinting to the finish alongside an opponent in the 800m run. Both Spannagle of Kiel and Boegel were timed in 2:10.9 (two minutes 10.9 seconds) with Spannagle winning on the lean at the finish line. "We'll have to teach Jesse how to do that," commented distance coach Backhaus, on how to lean at the finish.

In the 200m dash, Thelen and Fitts reversed their 100m finish and placed third and fourth in the 200m dash with times of 25.0 and 25.1 seconds respectively.

Freshman Mike McKee won the 100m high hurdles

with a time of 20.4 seconds. Stienmetz of Kiel appeared to have the race won with one hurdle to go but tripped and fell hurdling the last hurdle. McKee to his credit, continued hurdling strong and beat his opponent across the finish line. McKee later finished second in the 300m hurdles with a time of 49.6 seconds. Stienmetz won this race with a time of 48.4 seconds.

Sparks also finished second in the shot put with an unusually short throw of 39'10". Teammate Nathan Fechter finished second with a throw of 37'7".

Distance runner Chris Baker finished fourth in the 1600m run with a time of 5:15.3 and finished out of the top four places in the 800m run when he took a hard fall on the backstretch of the first lap. Senior Justin Weninger finished fourth in the triple jump with a jump of 34'10". Hasenstein of Kiel won the triple jump with a distance of 36'11-3/4".

The Kewaskum 4x400m relay was easily beaten by Kiel but found themselves in an exciting race with Sheboygan Lutheran. The Kewaskum foursome lost to Sheboygan Lutheran by 0.4 seconds, but most of the Kewaskum relay runners continue to struggle with running times faster than one minute for their 400m leg. Jesse Boegel's split of 55.6 seconds is the kind of time needed by the other members of the relay team at this time of the season.

The Kewaskum pole vaulters were idle Tuesday night at the Kiel triangular due to the fact that Kiel does not have pole vaulting as an event.

"Good efforts by our team. I think we let the weather get to us sometimes doing the meet, but we have to give credit to Kiel. Kiel has a very good 400m relay time and their distance runners are better than ours. It would have been interesting to throw pole vault points into the meet results, too," concluded coach Jerry Gosa.

The next meet for the Kewaskum varsity is the Washington County Outdoor on Wednesday, April 28, at Germantown and then the Alzheimer Invitational on Friday, April 28, at Pewaukee. The Kewaskum JV have a freshman and sophomore meet only at 3:30 p.m. on Monday, April 24, at Mayville.

Lynn Qualifies for Nationals in 1500m

Marni Lynn, former Kewaskum High School track and cross country standout, now running as a junior for Carroll College in Waukesha, automatically qualified for Nationals in the 1500m run Saturday, April 15, at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater Invitational.

According to Lynn, "I led the whole race and thought I had enough of a lead, but Kara Krumenauer of Whitewater out kicked me" to win the race with a time of 4:37.27 (four minutes and 37.27 seconds). Lynn was clocked just a couple tenths of a second behind Krumenauer's time.

Both Krumenauer and Lynn's times automatically qualify them for Nationals in the 1500m run. The automatic qualifying time in the 1500m run for Nationals is 4:38.74. Earlier this season, Lynn had provisionally

qualified for Nationals with a time of 4:39.54, but now after her race on Saturday, she is all set to again travel to the National Championship outdoor meet. Last year Lynn was the Division III National Indoor Champion in the 1500m run with a time of 4:32.73 and also finished fifth in the 1500m run outdoors with a time of 4:33.96.

Lynn also raced in the 3,000m run on Saturday and reported that evening that she finished fifth with a time of 10:17 less than two seconds off the provisional qualifying time of 10:15.24 needed for Nationals. The time needed to automatically qualify in the 3,000 m run is 10:08.54.

Last year, Lynn ran a time of 9:49 in the 3,000 run to automatically qualify for Nationals when she competed in just the 3,000 run at the Madison Twilight Invitational in May. Lynn then went on and won the

Division III National Outdoor Championship in the 3,000 meters run at the end of May with a time of 9:48.84.

The NCAA Division III National Track and Field Championships will be hosted by North Central College in Naperville, Illinois, May 25-27. Qualifiers for Nationals in Division III Track and Field can be found on the Internet at www.raceberryjam.com.
