
Various high schools were contacted this past winter and asked to select several of their top players to help create a United States rugby team to play against New Zealand and Fiji this summer.

Going back to 1893 there were four passenger trains and three freights in each direction through Kewaskum. In 1917 there were nine daily passenger trains going north and eight daily passenger trains going south. The 1940's brought the diesel powered green and yellow streamliners through town. In 1942 there were seven northbound and six southbound passenger trains. This

schedule remained the same until the 50's. There were extra passenger and freight trains not shown in timetables that ran as business warranted. These were troop trains, camp trains, circus trains, and special trains carrying political candidates. the famous trains that and Fond du Lac to Kewaskum. The hundreds of people that rode the trains went to Northside Park located east of the tracks and the river. (Regal Ware was built on this land) The trains were parked in the sidings in town until the picnickers returned to board at

line to be shut down for three days.

In the early 1900's the railroad installed signals. These signals were mounted high on a mast. They had a semaphore arm that moved. The position of the arm indicated if the track was clear ahead and if all the switches were lined and locked for the main track. There were colored lights in the arm for nighttime viewing. The top speed in 1939 was 60 mph for passenger trains and 45 mph for freights. In 1942 it was 80 mph for Streamliner Diesel trains, 70 mph for regular passenger trains, and 50 mph for freights. The train Dispatcher was located in Chicago, later Milwaukee. He would talk to an operator in each station along the way by the telegraph key or the company phone line, which was strung along the poles next to the track. He could change the schedule of a train in the event of another train being late. The dispatcher would give the message to the (Continued on Page 3)

A Historical View from Jim Yanke

The line from Milwaukee to Fond du Lac was constructed in 1872 and 1873 where it met the original line from Chicago to Green Bay. It was built as the North Western Union Railway. It passed through Granville, Rockfield, Jackson, Bend, West Barton, Kewaskum, Campbellsport, and Eden. It soon became the Chicago and North Western's principle route between passed through Kewaskum were the Iron and Copper Country Express and the northbound Peninsula 400, both to Ishpeming, MI. Also the southbound Flambeau 400 and the Ashland Limited between Ashland, WI and Chicago passed through town. All the passenger trains stopped at West Bend but only a few at Kewaskum. Train #149 from Chicago to Green Bay was the last passenger train to stop at Kewaskum in the mid-1960's. After this train ceased to stop here, the depot was razed.

In the early 1900's, The Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineer's Union held their family picnics in Kewaskum. Special picnic trains came from Milwaukee the station.

For many years train #125 ran between Chicago and Appleton Junction. This was a mail and express train that did not carry passengers. On August 3rd and 4th of 1924 there was a heavy rainstorm Washington throughout County. Number 125 departed Kewaskum on the 4th at 5:00am, went about a half a mile, hit a washout and derailed in the mud just north of the Highway 45 bridge. Two railroad bridges in Kewaskum washed away shortly after the derailment. The line was closed for several days until the bridges were replaced and the wrecker train could get to the derailment. 


The Indian girls' team learned a lot and matured a great deal in this game.

station operator. The operator would copy the message and repeat it word for word to the dispatcher. Then he would set the 'order board', a special signal at the station, to 'stop.' The arm of the signal would go to a horizontal position. An approaching train would see the signal and stop. The operator would hand the message to the train crew and they would in turn follow the instructions. The operator also sold tickets. Besides the operator, some stations had an agent. He would handle the business of the railroad: charging customers for shipping or receiving, making sure the U.S. Mail was picked up or dropped off, or any other transactions concerning the railroad.

Some of the customers that were serviced by the railroad were Rosenheimer Malt and Grain, Kewaskum Aluminum, later Regal Ware, J. H. Lay Lumber Company, the Kewaskum Creamery, and three bulk oil stations. There was a 'team track' along the depot where rail cars were parked and shipments were made to customers that did not have rail access. South of Main Street on the east side of the tracks was a stockyard used for holding cattle for shipment. On the west side of the tracks at the same location was a huge water tank that stored water for steam engines. The water tank came down in the late 20's as the steam engines got bigger and could go from West Bend to Fond du Lac without taking water. In 1956 the railroad was allowed to take off several passenger trains in Wisconsin. Freight #296 was then scheduled to run from Fond du Lac to Milwaukee on the line

through Kewaskum. Then there were four daily passenger trains each way, two main freights, and the wayfreight.

In the early 1960's, freight trains #297 and #298 ran between Proviso (Chicago) and Green Bay via Kewaskum. In the 1970's freight trains #281 and #282 were added between Chicago and Ashland. At this time on the line, the wayfreight was running as far as Eden six days a week, and freights #281, #282, #295, #296, #297, #298, were running through Kewaskum daily.

I started working for the Chicago & North Western in July 1960 as a brakeman. I worked between Milwaukee and Chicago, and Milwaukee and Fond du Lac. In 1970 I was promoted to a conductor. A crew stationed at Butler worked the wayfreight. Crews stationed at Chicago worked #281, #282, #295, #296, #297, and #298. The crew on the

known as Buffy's Restaurant. Some of the jobs I remember working on the line through Kewaskum were work trains spreading ballast or ties, Ringling Brother's Circus train, C & N W executive trains, wrecker trains, snowplow extras, and Sperry Company rail detector cars that went slowly along the tracks and detected flaws in the rails.

One snowy night in the winter of 1978 we left Butler with train #297. We had two 3,000 horsepower engines and about 80 cars. We stalled in the snow on the hill coming into Campbellsport. I cut off the engines and plowed a path through Campbellsport. Then coupled back on the train for another try. We stalled again. Then the Dispatcher had us back down the hill almost into Kewaskum and try again. We did not succeed this time either. We ran out of time with the twelve-hour law. The next morning the Dispatcher sent a crew out of Fond du Lac with three engines to couple on to our train. They towed us to Fond du Lac. That was my longest trip on the Butler/Fond du Lac line, seventeen and one-half hours.

As traffic got lighter on the Ashland Division, freights #281 and #282 were taken off. Later as business from the north declined, #297 and #298 no longer ran. The signals were removed in December of 1984 between Granville and Fond du Lac. Freights #295 and # 296 lasted until the Fond du Lac, Oshkosh, Neenah, and Appleton traffic was routed north to Green Bay and then brought down the Shoreline route through Manitowoc and Sheboygan. The wayfreight ran between Butler and Fond du Lac six days a week until the line was sold to the Fox River Valley Railroad in December of 1988. Several years later the Fox River Valley Railroad was sold to the Wisconsin Central. In 1995 the Chicago & North Western was merged with the Union Pacific Railroad. I still work at the rail yard in Butler but I am now employed by the Union Pacific. And, I still know the friendly waitresses that once worked in the restaurant. The Wisconsin Central now has a train that comes out of North Fond du Lac to Eden to switch the Quarry and the Canning Company. A Waukesha based Wisconsin Central crew runs a train on the Wisconsin and Southern Railroad from Rugby Junction to Germantown, and then runs north to West Bend to service the remaining customers.

I have a 'Web site' that features some of the photos that I have collected of the line running through Kewaskum. My web site address is http://www.hnet.net/~rrjim/ or you can go to a 'search engine,' put in Kewaskum, Wisconsin, and get the Village web site. Go to 'History,' and then Railroad History. There is a 'link' to my web site. Today when I cross the right away on Main Street in Kewaskum, it is easy to remember riding freight locomotives and cabooses at 50 miles per hour or riding in a passenger train at 80 miles per hour.



KSS-02 Launch May 24

The students in Mr. Drexler's Aerospace Technology class are getting ready for a simulated launch of their space shuttle.

KSS stands for the Kewaskum Shuttle Simulator and this is going to be the second simulated launch. The students have been preparing for this flight throughout the semester by studying the history of flight since man's first attempts at flying. Students built and flew hot air balloons, kites, gliders and rubber band powered airplanes. Presently the students are working on rocket designs and will be testing the rockets soon.

The simulation consists of a daylong affair, beginning in the morning with the launching of the shuttle and ending the end of the school day with the reentry. While the crew is in the shuttle simulator, they will be performing various scientific experiments and recording medical information.

The medical tests will include such things as taking resting pulse rate, exercising pulse rate, and recov-ery pulse rate. This information would then be relayed back to mission control via computer to be charted. Mission control will be working with the shuttle crew by monitoring the shuttle's progress via the internet using a real time program from NASA and relaying current weather conditions from emergency landing locations around the world.

All-State Scholar Recipient Honored


Margaret Rodenkirch Radtke

TYPE OF OIL: Automotive and small engine oil only; NO ANTI FREEZE


PREPARATION: Used crankcase oil should be free from water, rags or other foreign materials. Any cost incurred for handling and managing any contaminated oil will be charged to the person disposing of the oil. Place oil in a clear plastic container with a cover and take it to the disposal site. Roger and Dan's Auto Service at 891 Fond du Lac Ave. is the disposal site for Village residents. Use a container that can be used again since disposal of containers becomes a problem. A "Waste Oil Permit Slip" must first be filled out prior to disposing of the waste oil. These slips are available at the Village Hall at 204 First Street .

TYPE OF BATTERIES: Automotive type batteries which are of the lead acid type. No flashlight or lantern type batteries are allowed.

PREPARATION: Automotive batteries should be placed adjacent to the recycling bin at the curb for pick up. Place the batteries curbside on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be on Wednesday for both solid waste and recyclable items. Multi-family dwellings of six or more, remember, your recycling pick up will be the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month.

Falling rain and wet conditions for the first half of the meet made it very difficult for the competitors to equal their best or establish season best efforts in their respective events. The discus circle was slippery enough to cause Colleen Gosa to actually fall on one of her initial attempts in the trials. 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Open House Sunday Vince Lombardi Cancer Center to Open in West Bend

Four years ago Virginia and George Hall moved to West Bend from Chicago. The lifetime residents of Illinois found a warm people, beautiful surroundings, and now, when Virginia needs it, a new Cancer Care Clinic in her adopted hometown.

Virginia is a patient of Dr. Jonathan Treisman, a leading cancer specialist who will begin caring for her, and other patients, at the Vince Lombardi Cancer Clinic that will soon be opening in the newly constructed Cancer Care Center of St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend.

The new 4, 000 square foot Vince Lombardi Cancer Center includes a large reception area, rooms for exams, treatments, and private infusions, a pharmacy and lab/draw room, a children's room, offices and a kitchen. For the first time in Washington County, radiation therapy will be also available in the adjoining Cancer Care Center.

For people living with cancer, local access to standout physicians, radiation therapy and the latest in cancer treatments means convenience, comfort and peace of mind. Virginia Hall, 76, and her husband George, 79, spend part of almost every day traveling to either the VLCC in Slinger or to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend to have tests that check on the progress of her ovarian cancer. The new VLCC and Cancer Treatment Center will make their lives a lot easier. "West Bend will be a lot more convenient for us," says Hall.

Another person living with cancer, Lorrell Eastman of West Bend is also looking forward to the opening of the new VLCC. Explains Eastman, "For about a year, the VLCC in Slinger was my second home." In February of 1999 she was diagnosed with ovarian cancer. She has had multiple surgeries and months of chemotherapy. Now she will be going to the new VLCC for her threemonth check ups and CT scans. Eastman and her husband Tom live west of Big Cedar Lake in West Bend and the drive to Slinger was not much of a problem. But, there were times when even going to Slinger was hard. "I was so physically weak, really tired," she explains.

The new VLCC will have some of the same staff as the VLCC in SLinger. Both Hall and Eastman are especially happy about that. "We were so terrified at first," remembers Eastman. But she adds that the medical staff at the VLCC was sensitive and caring and professional. She has even referred a friend to Dr. Treisman because, as she puts it "he takes his time with everyone."

Dr. Treisman and his partner Dr. John Hanson, will see patients in West Bend. Both physicians have trained and worked at such nationally-recognized cancer centers such as the Sloan Kettering Institute in New York and the National Cancer Institute in Maryland. They are part of the St. Luke's Medical Center Cancer Services Team and also see patients at other Vince Lombardi **Cancer** Clinics

The physicians work together with a staff of specially trained nurses. Both Hall and Eastman are great fans of the VLCC nurses. They praise the genuine caring and warmth of the staff which has made them feel like they are part of a fami-

ly. "They always gave me a big hug when I go in," says Eastman.

The newest VLCC in West Bend is the second site for Aurora Health Care's cancer services in Washington County. Another VLCC is located at the Aurora Health Center on Hwy 60 in Slinger. According to Patty Abella, Aurora regional manager of outpatient oncology, Aurora is enthusiastic about the new clinic, "It is our mission to offer cancer care services in our own communities," she says.

The public will have a chance to tour the new VLCC and Cancer Care Center at an open house on Sunday May 21 from 1-2 pm. For more information call the VLCC in Slinger at 644-2960.

Grothman Urges All to Sign Up for National Bone Marrow Registry

Normally, I use this space to talk about issues of interest in the State Legislature. Today, I will discuss something of much more significance, the importance of putting yourself on the National Bone Marrow Registry.

Last weekend, I had the privilege of donating bone marrow to a seven-year-old girl from Virginia. Bone marrow is the substance in one's bones, which creates blood for the body. Every year thousands of people need bone marrow transplants. Over 75% have leukemia, with the rest having anemia, lymphoma, or other blood diseases. With leukemia, all of a person's bone marrow is destroyed through chemotherapy and must be re-generated through marrow from a donor. It is best if the donor has a perfect match in marrow type. One out of every four siblings has identical marrow. If you do not have a sibling with identical marrow, you must find an unrelated donor. Every year, approximately 4,500 people look for a perfect match. Almost four million people are registered as possible donors, but still only 30% will find that match. Less than half of these will survive but almost all of the 70% who do not find a match will die from their disease.

that would give bone marrow to an unrelated party this year. The procedure was done at University Hospital in Madison. I was put under general anesthesia and had a half-pint of bone marrow removed from each hip. The needle was small enough that no stitches were required to close the incision.

While I was kept in the hospital overnight, I still was able to speak at a prolife rally in Madison by noon the next day. I felt somewhat sore for about two days, as if I had exercised too much, but by Monday, I felt fine.

Letter to The Editor

To the Editor,

The West Bend School Board and its teachers recently negotiated a voluntary settlement. The figures of that settlement have been well documented in the local press. In Kewaskum, the teachers have been working the entire 1999-2000 school year without a contract. Unfortunately, a voluntary settlement does not appear imminent as the Kewaskum School Board has broken off negotiations and filed for mediation.

Other districts are showing a willingness to

improve the pay and benefits for their teachers. They understand that in order to hire and keep good young teachers an attractive and competitive salary schedule and benefits package is essential. A gap between the pay and benefits offered to Kewaskum teachers and what is offered to teachers in several surrounding district already exists. This gap is widening rather than narrowing. We are concerned that good, young teachers who begin their careers in Kewaskum will go elsewhere when they have the opportunity to receive better pay and benefits. Morale of veteran teachers will erode also as this gap continues to widen.

A cornerstone of any successful school district is its faculty. A few years ago the Kewaskum School District formulated and adopted a short mission statement. A part of that says: "to create an environment... where teachers want to teach." The district obviously recognized the critical role that teachers play in giving our children an excellent education when it adopted its mission statement, making this an environment where teachers want to teach, it is time to step up negotiations. Or perhaps the district needs to change its mission state-

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ment.



ded 1 (7 1/2 oz.) can crab meat

(you can substitute chicken or tuna)

1 Tbsp. green onion, minced

- 1 tsp. lemon rind, grated 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 2 Tbsp. parsley, minced

1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce 1 tsp. prepared mustard

1/2 tsp. salt







Pole vaulters by rule have to have their top hand at least six inches down from the top of the pole. McKee also ran the 110m high hurdles with a time of 18.9 seconds, but did not place in the top six.

McKee's teammate Kurtis Cochran placed third in the pole vault competition with a season best jump of 9'6". Cochran's best jump had been nine feet. It's nice to see that the younger vaulters are doing so well. The pole vault is one of the varsity's stronger events and we would like to see that trend continue. They have invested a lot of time practicing and they have raised a lot of money to buy poles for this event.



Coach Rizzardi, the throwing coach, was happy with the improvement shown by David. We need three discus throwers next week for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Relays, Thursday, May 18, and David can help out the varsity, expecially if he continues to throw well.

The 4x200m relay team of Mike McKee, Andy Breese, Matt Hartmann, and Andy Lickel placed second with a time of 1:02.1. Hartmann also placed sixth in the 200m dash with a time of 26.4 seconds. Cibulka also threw 32'7-1/2" in the shot put, but did not place.

The 4x400m relay team of Andy Lickel, Joe Rinzel, Bill Thelen and Travis Tiedt placed fifth with a time of 4:04.7. Lickel had the fastest split of the four with a time of 58.8 seconds. Tiedt also placed sixth in the 800m run with a season best time of 2:17.9. Thelen also ran the 400m dash earlier in the meet with a time of 62.1 seconds, but did not place in the top six.

Kurtis Cochran and Keith Boegel long jumped 14'8" and 13' respectively, but did not place. Travis Tiedt also high jumped 4'10", but did not place.




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
