



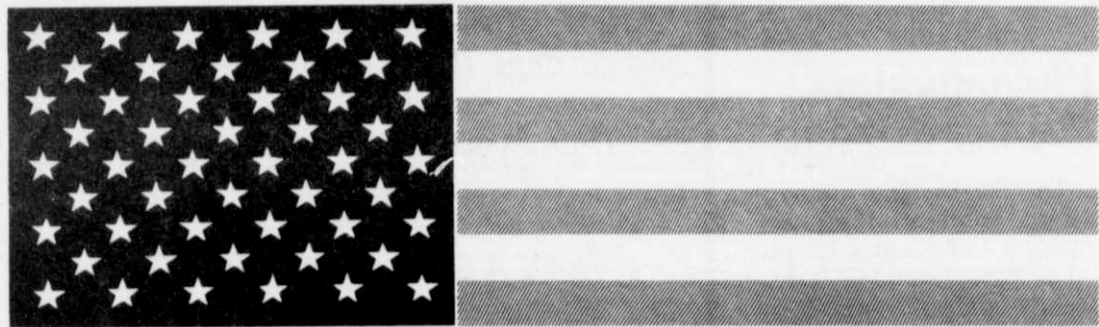

Memorial Day Parade And Program Here



On Monday, May 29, the Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384 of the American Legion will hold their annual Memorial Day Parade and ceremonial program.

The parade to honor those who gave their lives will be held at 9 a.m. beginning at the Kewaskum High School and proceeding to the American Legion on Fond du Lac Avenue in Kewaskum. A short memorial service will be held there.

All Legionnaires, fire department members, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H and youth groups, civic organizations, etc. are invited to march in the parade honoring our war dead. Participants are asked to meet in front of the high school at 8:45 p.m.

The parade route is from the high school to Third Street, south along Parkview, to Main Street, west on Main Street to Fond du Lac Avenue and north to the Legion grounds where the ceremony will then be held.

In case of rain, the program will be held in the high school auditorium at 9:30 a.m. Marching groups will assemble in the halls and march into the auditorium.

The Memorial Day address will be delivered by Air Force Staff Sergeant Joseph Ringold Jr. S Sgt. Joseph Ringold, Jr. is a Liaison Noncommissioned Officer at the Military Entrance Processing Station in Milwaukee.

He has been in the Air Force for 17 years. He is a native of Bowie, MD. When he first enlisted in the US Air Force, he was trained as a computer specialist.

During that time he was

stationed in several locations to include MS, TX, OK, Clark Air Base, Philippines and Osan AB, South Korea. Then he became a Non-Prior Service recruiter which took him to Oxnard, California, where he earned the Commander's Special Achievement Award.

After that he moved on to be an Officer Accessions Recruiter in River City, Illinois, for 2-1/2 years. While in this assignment, he received numerous awards such as Top OA Recruiter and MVP OA Recruiter.

He has received other awards and medals during his active duty career to include the Kuwait Liberation Medal, Southwest Asia Service Medal with Three Stars, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Air Force Achievement Medal and the Air Force Commendation Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster.

Student Arrested for Vandalism to High School

Eric Anderson, 17, A junior at Kewaskum High School was arrested Wednesday in connection with a random act of violence that took place at the school Monday May 15.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel said Wednesday that his department is still investigating the possibility of others involved. Evidence has now been sent to a crime lab in Milwaukee to gain additional evidence to prosecute others involved.

Vandals had got into the school sometime between 9 pm Sunday and 5:30 am Monday. The vandals allegedly gained access through a door in the field house that was left unlocked after open gym Sunday night.

A school official has stated that damage figures are now at over \$10,000.

Anderson has been charged with burglary and criminal damage to property.

An expulsion hearing is

scheduled for Anderson.

Acting principal John Wolfenberg refused to comment on Anderson.

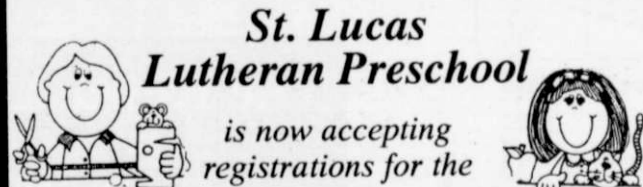

Clark Wins High Jump as Girls Team Takes Third at Frosh/Soph Meet

TWO RIVERS -- The Sheboygan Falls girls' team easily won the Frosh/Soph Eastern Wisconsin Conference Meet on Monday, May 15, at Two Rivers Washington High School.

The Sheboygan Falls Falcons scored 123 points to 79 points for runner-up Kiel. The Kewaskum girls were just three points behind with 76 points. Two Rivers finished fourth with 67.5 points, followed by Campbellsport with 58 points for fifth. New Holstein finished sixth with 49.5 points, Manitowoc Roncalli finished seventh with 48 points and Plymouth finished eighth with 44 points.

The Kewaskum girls won two events. Jolene Clark returned to form and jumped 4'10" to tie for first place with an athlete from Sheboygan Falls. In the jump off each athlete was given another chance at 5'0" and both missed.

The bar was then lowered one inch and each athlete was given one more attempt. Since both athletes missed, the bar was lowered one more inch and the process was repeated. Eventually Clark won the competition when she cleared 4'8" in the jump off and the other athlete missed. The highest height reached, 4'10", was recorded as the winning height.

The other first place was won by the Kewaskum 4x400m relay team. Becky Herriges joined the 4x400m relay team that included Breyan Donath, Heather Meyer, and Jessi Graham, which four days earlier had placed third in the 4x400m varsity conference meet. The four Kewaskum freshmen won the 4x400m relay with a time of 4:33.3 (four minutes and 33.3 seconds), over 10 seconds ahead of second place Kiel.

"The win is especially impressive since it was done with four freshmen. There is a lot of potential in that relay team," commented Coach Gosa.

Two of the members of

the 4x400m relay team, Breyan Donath and Jessi Graham, placed second and third individually in the 400m dash with times of 66.5 seconds and 66.6 seconds respectively earlier in the meet.

Jenna Roecker, another freshman, placed second in the 100m high hurdles with a time of 18.3 seconds and third in the 300m low hurdles with a time of 53.5 seconds. "Jenna has really made progress the last couple of meets. At the varsity conference meet last week she placed fourth in the highs and fifth in the lows," reported Coach Gosa.

The Kewaskum 4x100m relay team of Betsy Marx, Breyan Donath, Kayla Brock and Stacy Muckerheide placed second with a time of 58.24 seconds.

The Kewaskum 4x200m relay team of Betsy Marx, Heather Meyer, Jenna Roecker and Becky Herriges placed third with a time of 1:59.6. Herriges also placed third in the 200m dash with a time of 30.9 seconds and fourth in the long jump with a jump of 13'1".

Heather Meyer placed fifth in the 800m run with a time of 2:51.0, Stacy Muckerheide placed fifth in the 100m dash with a time of 14.9 seconds, and Betsy Marx also placed fifth in the pole vault with a height of 5'6".

The annual Frosh/Soph Eastern Wisconsin Conference Meet completes the track season for the freshmen and sophomores that do not compete on the varsity team.

More Than Just Effigy Mound

The Friends of the Kettle Moraine Saturday Evening Event begins with "More Than Just Effigy Mounds." The program will be held on Saturday, May 27, from 7:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. at the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center. The Ice Age Visitor Center is located off of Hwy 67 1/2 mile west of Dundee. The program is free, but donations are always gratefully accepted.

Effigy mounds and mound groups were once common in Wisconsin, but now almost 80% or more have them have been destroyed. One effigy mound group near Horicon Marsh has been known for years. The site was mapped in the early 1950's by amateur archeologist, Dr. E. G. Bruder. This particular mound group had been disturbed more than once by road work and until six years ago, was almost completely hidden from view by tall grass and brush. What the site really needed was an old-time prairie fire to reveal what was hidden in all the growth. Then came Lester "Bud" Cook and his John Deere lawn tractor. Once Mr. Cook cleared the site, some truly amazing discoveries were made. Yes, there were effigies, but not all earthen ones!

Join Herman Bender, a geologist, amateur astronomer and historian, as he explains the significance of the site and the recent discoveries. Mr. Bender has been internationally published in the fields of archaeoastronomy and applied geophysics. He is currently the president of the Mid-American Geographic Foundation, Inc., a not-for-profit preservation and educational organization. This organization hosted the 1999 International Rock Art Conference at Ripon College at which 40 nations were represented by hundreds of delegates.

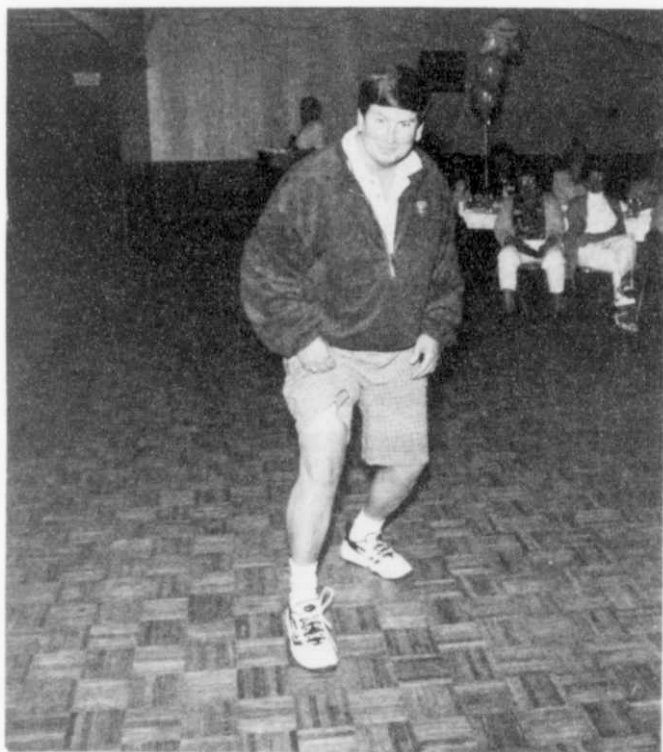

Alfalfa Scissors Cutting Program

Proper timing of the cutting of first crop alfalfa hay can have an impact on forage quality and the profitability of dairy and livestock operations. The alfalfa scissors cutting project will be held in Washington county again this year to help you monitor the developing maturity of alfalfa.

The project involves taking a weekly sample cutting from the Gary Schladweiler farm in the northern part of the county and the Dan Neuburg farm in the southern part of the county. This year we will also have samples taken by Hilltop Agronomics from other areas. Samples will be taken starting on Monday, May 15th and on the following Mondays until the crop is ready for harvest. Samples will be tested and information will be available to producers on a 24 hour basis through your touch tone telephone. Weekly information will be placed on the Infosource system by Wednesday noon each week.

This system is accessed by calling the toll free number 1-800-441-4636. A computer message will lead you through the process. When the message asks, "To select a topic from the Infosource brochure touch 1" do so. It will then ask for you to enter a three-digit code to listen to a message. At that time enter 713 for the message.

Information will also be available on the Internet for those that have Internet access. The web site is <http://www.uwex.edu/ces/cty/washington/scissors.html>

If you do not have a touch-tone phone you can get the information by calling Farmers Inc. at 629-5026 or 629-4126 or Hilltop Agronomics at 629-5564. Results are also available at the Washington county UW-Extension office by calling 335-4477 or 342-2929.

The goal is to harvest alfalfa with an average relative feed value of 150. This means that harvest should start at higher levels to obtain this average. We also find that scissors cutting samples usually test 15 to 20 points higher than forage tested coming out of storage. Producers may wish to start their harvest season when RFV levels are in the 170 to 180 ranges. This may depend on the number of acres to harvest and expected days to complete harvesting the first cutting.

This project is a cooperative effort of Washington County UW-Extension, Farmers Inc., Hilltop Agronomics, and Rock River Labs.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Robert Wagner called the meeting. All other Trustee members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Larry Ammel, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the April 17, 2000 were approved as printed.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel asked to be excused and was absent.

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel presented the following:

1) Informed the Board that none of those candidates appearing on the eligibility list were interested in the police officer positions and that applications are now being taken. Hopefully interviews will take place in June and the hiring will take place in July or August.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles reported as follows:

1) The Spring Clean - Up was very successful Saturday, April 29, 2000. 2) The tree planting for program for 200 is almost completed with all trees being placed.

3) Woodscapes completed the beach deck which turned out better than expected.

4) Hydrant flushing started early on the 1st of May and will be completed after 4 days.

5) The lawn and garden waste bin will be open to the public starting May 6, 2000 from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.

6) The process of railroad track removal has begun eliminating any future train traffic.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the following with the Board:

1) Review of Taxpayer and League Bulletins.

2) The Board of Review is scheduled for May 15, 2000 from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. and the open Book is scheduled for May 9, 2000 from 2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

3) Review of budget control sheet for period ending March 31, 2000.

4) Shared a letter sent to SEWR-PC on the Smart Growth Law as directed by the Board.

5) Shared a letter sent to the DNR regarding the malt house demolition. (2nd letter)

6) Announced an EDAC meeting scheduled for May 8, 2000 at 4:00 p.m. and informed Board that the EDAC would be at the next Board meeting to report committee accomplishments for the last year.

7) Review of correspondence.

On a motion by Trustee Andy Pesch, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the payment of bills as recommended by the Administrative Committee. The totals of all claims as recommended are as follows:

Trustee John Kenworthy, Chairman of the Park & Recreation Committee indicated the minutes from the meeting of April 17, 2000 were on the desk.

Trustee Andy Pesch the Plan Commission Representative informed the Board that a meeting

was held on April 26, 2000 and that Rick Kania was present and reviewed the second draft of Section 5.00 and the proposed draft of Section 8.00 The Plan Commission sent favorable recommendations to the Board on the next two agenda items; the lot division and the outside storage of retail landscaping materials.

Mr. David Gruber and Mr. Robert Beisbier were present to discuss the division of the lot know by tax key no. V4-0115 into two parcels by Certified Survey Map as sent to the Board from the Plan Commission. It was noted the Commission asked that a 3 foot side yard be designated to the north of the block shed instead of 1 foot. It was further noted the red brick building would be torn down shortly after the transaction takes place and that this project should improve the ingress and egress off of Fond du Lac Avenue. The green space to be included in the zoning ordinance was also shared with the parties and they were both receptive to the addition. On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and unanimously carried by voice vote the Board authorized the signing of the CSM as recommended by the Plan Commission.

Mrs. Maria McDaniel was present to ask the Board to allow the outside storage of retail landscaping material at 1031 Fond du Lac Avenue, as well as allow for the placement of a temporary office type trailer at that location to start said retail business immediately.

On a motion by Trustee John Kenworthy, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the outside storage of materials for retail sale of landscape materials at 1031 Fond du Lac Avenue.

On a motion by Trustee John Kenworthy, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board granted permission to place a temporary office type trailer at the aforementioned location for a period not to exceed 18 months.

Trustee John Kenworthy, the Library Board Representative, raised a concern as to the timing of electing Library Board Officers and the Village's appointment timing. Administrator Daniel Schmidt indicated the process is correct and so stated in the Municipal Code in Chapter 50-1 and under Wisc. Stats. 43.54(1)(c) & (2). It was further noted the election process in the Municipal Code was incorrect but asked for by the Library Board because they did not meet in June and July normally. It was suggested that be corrected, especially since they currently meet year round. The Administrator indicated he would bring an ordinance amendment to the Board.

The Library Board also asked the Village Board to move \$6,000 of fund balance reserves into a restricted future Library Fund. On a motion by Trustee Larry Ammel, seconded by Trustee Mathew Heiser and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the Library Board's request.

Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, the Mid-Moraine Municipal Assoc. Legislative Committee Member, informed the Board that a meeting is scheduled for May 10, 2000 at 7:00 p.m. in West Bend.

The Board was informed that the asphalt bids will be received and reviewed at the meeting of May 15, 2000.

On a motion by Trustee Andy Pesch, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the signing of the Five (5) Year extension of the agreement with Superior Services - Horicon as negotiated and agreed to.

The Committee, Boards and Commission appointments by President Robert Wagner were reviewed. On a motion by Trustee



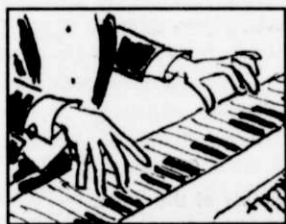

A RESOLUTION FOR MUTUAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT UNDER THE NATIONAL AFFORDABLE HOUSING ACT FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR 2001 - 2003

This Agreement is entered into between Waukesha County, a political subdivision of the State of Wisconsin and the, Village of Kewaskum in Washington County, municipal corporations of the State of Wisconsin (hereinafter, parties).

WHEREAS, the National Affordable Housing Act of 1990, as amended, allows units of general local government to enter into a mutual cooperation agreement to form a Consortium to obtain federal funds as a participating jurisdiction under the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (hereinafter, HOME Program) and,

WHEREAS, the parties have mutually developed a Consolidated Housing and Community Development Plan, and

WHEREAS, the parties have determined that obtaining funds under the HOME Program will increase their ability to provide affordable housing;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties do agree and covenant as follows:

SECTION 1 - DEFINITIONS

a. "Member" means a unit of local government which signs this agreement, and therefore is a member of the Consortium organized to carry out eligible activities under the HOME Program. Each participating County shall have not less than a two person representation on the Consortium Board consisting of one County Official and one member appointed by the County Executive or County Board Chairman.

b. "Representative Member" means the unit of local government which acts as a representative of all members for the purposes of this Agreement. The representative member shall assume responsibility for ensuring that the Consortium's HOME Program is carried out in compliance with the requirements of 24 CFR Part 92 and 91, the requirements of 24 CFR 92.350(a)(5), and for the requirements of the Consolidated Housing and Community Development Plan.

SECTION 2 - FUNDING

Funds for the Consortium will be distributed as follows:

a. Not more than 25% of the funds allocated to the Consortium shall be reserved for specific member activities or Consortium-wide projects to be determined by the Consortium Board.

b. Not less than 75% of the funds shall be distributed among MEMBERS based on the percentage of population of the respective County's participating in the HOME program Consortium.

c. Each member shall be responsible for providing required match funds or credit based upon the amount of its allocation and its use of funds. If a match cannot be provided by a County, it shall be the responsibility of the Consortium, as a whole, to provide match funds.

SECTION 3 - ACTIVITIES

a. Each member shall cooperate in undertaking, or assist in undertaking, eligible HOME Program activities in compliance with the regulations as 24 CFR Part 92.

b. Each member shall take affirmative action to further fair housing in their jurisdictions. Such actions may include planning, education and outreach, and enforcement components.

SECTION 4 - ADMINISTRATION

a. Waukesha County shall be the representative member and shall carry out necessary overall responsibilities for the Consortium, with the cooperation of all members, consistent with the HOME Program regulations.

b. Each member shall submit in a timely manner to the representative member all information necessary for participation in the Consortium. This includes, but is not limited to, all information necessary for the Consolidated Plan, the program description and certifications (24 CFR 92.150), written agreements executed with subrecipients and performance reports.

c. Each member of the Consortium shall start its Community Development Block Grant and HOME Program years on January 1.

SECTION 5 - DURATION OF THIS AGREEMENT

a. This Agreement, entered into this 15th day of May, 2000, is in force for the time necessary to complete HOME Program activities funded from federal fiscal years 2001, 2002, 2003. It shall terminate when all HOME Program funds are expended, or are permanently withdrawn by HUD. The members shall remain in the Consortium and not end their participation in it until the time of termination.

b. This Agreement in accordance with federal regulations provides for an automatic renewal for each successive three year qualification period provided that the Consortium lead agent notifies each participating unit of general local government in writing of its right not to participate for the successive three year qualification period.

c. The automatic renewal provision requires a stipulation that requires the Consortium to adopt any amendment to the Agreement incorporating the changes necessary to meet the requirements for the Cooperation Agreements. Failure to adopt, execute and submit amendment requirements will void the automatic renewal provision.

d. The lead agent with the approval of the HOME Board is authorized to amend the Consortium Agreement on behalf of the entire Consortium to add new members to the Consortium.

This Agreement is executed by the respective parties as members of a HOME Consortium partnership. Attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement are Agreements executed by other HOME participating municipalities and governing bodies. In so doing, all existing municipalities and governing bodies are agreeing to participate under the terms of the HOME Consortium partnership with any other municipality or governing body which has joined or subsequently joins the partnership.

I hereby find that the terms and provisions of this Agreement are fully authorized under state and local law and that the Agreement provides full legal authority for the signatory parties to undertake or assist in undertaking HOME Consortium activities.

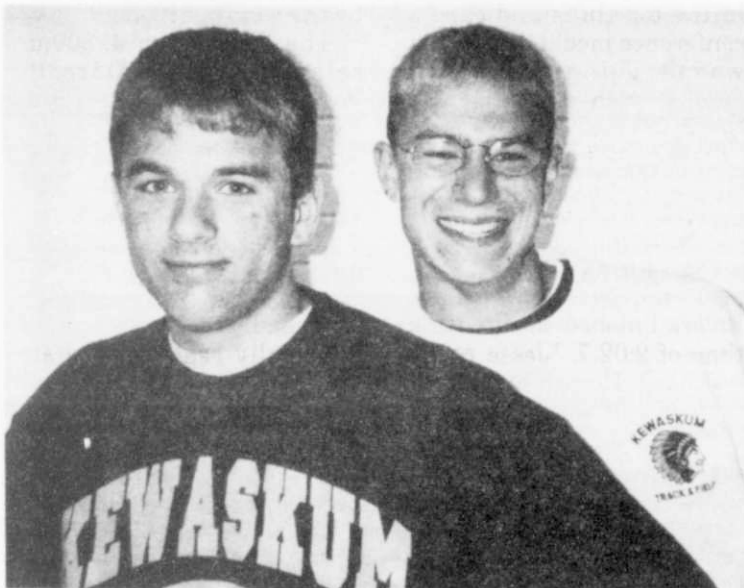

PLYMOUTH -- The Kewaskum High School boys' track and field team scored 89 points and finished fifth at the Eastern Wisconsin Track and Field Championships on Thursday, May 11, at Plymouth High School.

The Two Rivers track team won the boys' title by scoring 137.5 points, Plymouth finished second by scoring 110.25 points, and New Holstein finished third just 0.75 points back with 109.5 points. Sheboygan Falls finished fourth with 102.25 points, followed by Kewaskum's 89 points, and Campbellsport finished sixth with 66.25 points. Kiel finished seventh with 43 points and Manitowoc Roncalli finished eighth with 33.25 points.

The rain and wet conditions hampered best efforts and made conditions on the runways, throwing circles and the asphalt track slip-

pery. Once the rain stopped after the first events, the track remained slippery long into the meet.

The Kewaskum boys' track team won an impressive five events; the pole vault, 4x200m relay, 4x100m relay, long jump and the discus, more wins than anyone else. In the pole vault and the long jump Kewaskum won the top two places.

Josh Parrent and Brian Wall went 1-2 in the pole vault by clearing 11'6" and 11'0" respectively. The rain that started early in the day continued past the start of the meet and definitely affected the field events earlier in the meet. Teammate Tom Ogi had trouble on the runway slipping and only cleared 9'6" after consistently clearing 11' all season, but still placed sixth.

Likewise, both Parrent and Wall were well below their best efforts of the season. Parrent had previously

cleared 13' and Wall 12' this season. The big drawback about running the meet on a rainy day like Thursday was the fact that a lot of athletes felt that they didn't perform their best. Even though the Kewaskum vaulters felt they didn't do their best, they scored 21 team points, ten points for first place, eight points for second place and three points for sixth.

Both the Kewaskum boys' 800m relay (4x200m) and the 400m relay (4x100m) teams had the fastest seed times of all the schools for the conference meet. The Kewaskum relay team of Jim Thelen, Chris Canter, Tony Fitts and Charlie Sparks won the 800m relay with a time of 1:36.4, almost four seconds faster than the second place Two Rivers team that finished with a time in 1:40.2.

One of the Two Rivers runners slipped on the second exchange of the baton, but the Two Rivers coach was quick to admit that there was no way they could have ever beaten Kewaskum. Kewaskum's time was just 0.9 seconds off their fastest time of the season ran at the Vanderpan Invitational the previous Friday. Kewaskum was seeded just one second ahead of Two Rivers, but the Kewaskum foursome ran very well.

Two events later the same foursome of Thelen, Canter, Fitts and Sparks again sprinted their way to victory. Kewaskum was again seeded ahead of Two Rivers, but this time by just only 0.1 seconds. Kewaskum again got a lead on the first leg by Thelen. Canter and Fitts held onto the lead and then Sparks turned it on and Kewaskum finished

first by 0.7 seconds.

"They ran great in both relays. They knew they were the team to beat and they were definitely up to the challenge. The handoffs were good and the guys really ran hard and determined. They have been working hard all season and their efforts are being rewarded," reported Coach Gosa.

Coach Gosa removed Chris Canter from the open 400m dash, which he had been running lately, and returned Canter back into the 800m relay. Not having Chris in the 400m dash definitely helped Chris focus and run that much faster. The order of running events is the 800m relay, 400m dash and 400m relay.

Canter, Fitts and Sparks' work was not done for the evening. Both Fitts and Canter reported to the finals of the long jump and found that Cory Nickel of New Holstein had finished

jumping and was leading the competition with a jump of 19'1". Fitts and Canter were the only jumpers left to compete.

Canter was in second place with a jump of 18'10" and Fitts was in fourth place. Fitts, who has only been jumping three or four weeks, jumped a career best of 19'5" on his last jump to move into first place ahead of Nickel of New Holstein who watched in disbelief.

Canter then jumped 20'2-1/2" on his third and last attempt in the finals to move ahead of his teammate. Canter and Fitts, both sophomores, gave Kewaskum an impressive 1-2 finish in the long jump and 18 team points.

"Both Fitts and Canter jumped great -- what competitors," exclaimed Coach Gosa. Fitts, earlier in the competition placed fifth in

Fitts Wins 100m, 200m Dashes

KHS Boys' Track Second at Frosh/Soph Conference Meet

TWO RIVERS - The Kewaskum boys' freshmen and sophomore track and field team finished second at the Frosh/Soph Eastern Wisconsin Conference Track and Field Championships on Monday, May 15 at Two Rivers Washington High School.

Kiel won the team title with 109 points and Kewaskum finished second with 92 points, just one point ahead of Sheboygan Falls. Two Rivers finished fourth with 79 points, Plymouth finished fifth with 76.6 points and New Holstein finished sixth with 43.3 points. Manitowoc Roncalli finished seventh with 36 points and Campbellsport finished eighth with 35

points.

Tony Fitts, a sophomore, won both the 100m and 200m dashes with times of 11.9 seconds and 24.5 seconds respectively. Fitts also placed second in the long jump with a jump of 18'6-1/2". Teammate Chris Canter won the long jump with a jump of 18'9". Fitts also anchored the 4x100m relay team of Chris Canter, Andy Breese and Matt Hartmann to a third place finish. Teammate Mike McKee, a freshman, cleared 10'6" in the pole vault to place third. Tom Ogi also anchored the 4x200m relay team of Andy Breese, Matt Hartmann and Andy Lickel to a fourth place finish with a time of 1:44.7.

Nathan Fechter placed fourth in the shot put with a season best throw of 39'3"

and Luke Kehres placed fifth in the 400m dash with a time of 57.2 seconds.

The 4x800m relay team of Keith Boegel, Joe Rinzel, Kurtis Cochran and Travis Tiedt finished fifth with a time of 10:17.5 and Scott Joers finished sixth in the 3200m run with a time of 12:38.

Mike McKee finished seventh in the 110m high hurdles and eighth in the 300m intermediate hurdles but did not place. The 4x400m relay team of Andy Lickel, Mike McKee, Bill Thelen and Travis Tiedt finished seventh with a time of 4:07.3 and also did not place.

The Kewaskum boys placed individuals or relay teams in 11 of the 18 events. The Kewaskum boys' team did not place any individuals in the high hurdles, discus, 1600m run, triple jump, intermediate hurdles, 800m run and the 4x400m relay.

the 100m dash with a time of 12.1 seconds. The fifth place finish by Fitts in the 100m dash is the highest finish of a Kewaskum sprinter in the 100m dash in many years.

Sparks reported to the finals of the discus and proceeded to throw the discus 15'7" to win the discus competition by over 23 feet. J.R. Resploch of Plymouth placed second with a throw of 13'4". "Once again Charlie's consistent ability to throw in the 150's showed through. While he really wanted to set a new conference mark, he truly dominated the competition," remarked throwing coach Dave Rizzardi. Sparks also placed eighth in the shot put with a throw of 42'7-1/2".

Jesse Boegel finished fourth in the 800m run with a career best time of 2:03.7. Boegel had hoped to finish in the top three and earn a conference medal, but it just wasn't going to happen against such strong competition.

Mike Otte of Plymouth won the 800m run with a time of 2:01.5, Nick Martiny of Campbellsport finished second with a time of 2:01.1 and Joe Wilson of Two Rivers finished third with a time of 2:02.7. "Jesse really ran hard. He ran his fastest time of the season in spite of the fact that he had to turn in the second lane for most of the first lap," commented distance coach

Randy Backhaus.

The Kewaskum 4x400m relay team of Darrell Woebeking, Chris Canter, Luke Kehres, and Jesse Boegel finished sixth with a time of 3:42.4. Kehres also placed eighth in the 400m dash with a time of 57.1 seconds.

Paul Mertz placed seventh in the high jump with a jump of 5'2". Mertz's teammate in the high jump, Tom Ogi, did not place. The high jump competition was won at a low height of 5'6". Plymouth has an unusually small take off area. The athletes could not get there usual runs at the bar without taking off from the wet grass outside the takeoff area. Many of the athletes slipped when taking off on their jumping foot on their attempts.

The second place height was 5'4" and then five athletes cleared only 5'2" with places three through seven determined by misses. Most of the jumpers used only five step approaches when high jumping and didn't bother running at all. This was definitely one event that was drastically affected by the wet conditions.

The Kewaskum 4x800m relay team of Darrell Woebeking, Troy Kedroske, Kurtis Cochran and Travis Tiedt finished seventh with a time of 9:51.4.

"We were definitely happy and proud of the efforts of our athletes. We stressed that they were physically ready and that they had to get themselves focused to do their best. They did well in the events that we knew that they should be very competitive in," concluded Coach Gosa.

On Friday, May 19, Kewaskum High School hosted the Eastern Wisconsin Conference boys golf championship tournament at Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country Club.

The KHS varsity boys golf team completed their conference season by competing in the annual 18-hole team stroke play tournament. The local linksters were able to improve upon their league status achieved during the conference dual meet season by their play on Friday.

The EWC championships were cancelled on Thursday, May 18, and delayed on Friday, May 19, due to the torrential rainfall that befell southeastern Wisconsin last week. Hon-E-Kor permitted play to start at 10:30 a.m. with lift, clean and place rule in effect, thereby taking the wet and washed out bunkers out of play.
