

# Victory at Last

When politicians talk about tax cuts, the public has a right to be skeptical.

As pointed out previously in this column, combined income sales, and property taxes have gone up 78% in the last ten years, while inflation has gone up 33%. The primary culprit was the personal income tax collections that went up by 102% -- more than double.

In early May the Legislature voted to bring back the property tax rent credit for up to \$300 per return. When this credit was taken away on the 1999 return, it was largely offset by lower tax rates. Therefore, reinstating the credit was a pure tax cut. State income tax collections are estimated to be 5.8 billion dollars in the fiscal year which includes April 15, 2000 and 5.1 billion dollars in the fiscal year which includes April 15, 2001, a 12% decrease despite the fact that income continues

Most people are not aware of their total state income tax bill because it is withheld from each paycheck. However, you might want to compare your next total income tax on next April's return to the total income tax on last April's return to see the dramatic cut. Most of this is due to the reduction in marginal tax rate for most Wisconsites from 6.93% to 6.55%. The marriage penalty is also being phased out, the standard deduction increased and the homestead credit increased.

The Legislature was able to do this largely with a surplus left from the last budget -- not by cutting spend-

ing. We will have to make sure that in next year's budget the Legislature does hold down spending and does not play a shell game by cutting aids to local governments and letting property taxes rise. There will also be attempts to remove property tax exemptions, increase fees for government services such as university or technical school tuition and efforts made to give counties or cities new sales tax options which must be opposed.

The restoration of the property rent credit was passed with 131 legislators voting for and only one voting against. This is misleading. Behind the scenes, big spenders fought to prevent the credit from being restored, only to vote for it once they had to go on public record. As someone who had received the national taxpayers' award for fighting for this last December, I felt this was the highlight of this two-year's legislative session. In an era of politicians bragging about tax cuts which appear illusory upon closer examination, this may be a true victory for Wisconsin taxpayers.







the places, the people, the disease, it made me terribly sick to think that the person standing in front of me went through it all and witnessed first hand some of the worst conditions ever known.

You were right when you said that America is the greatest country in the world, and yet we don't appreciate it. Like they say, you only appreciate the well when it's gone dry.

I think that you spreading the message about the Holocaust is the best thing to happen. By doing this my generation realizes what a terrible mistake the world has made over and over again. By telling us about the terrible discrimination you experienced we can now learn from other people's mistakes. Every person is different and we should not judge them on where they came from, or what their religion is, but by their character.

Thank you for coming to speak to us about the Holocaust. I have looked at the world differently ever since you came to talk to us. Continue to spread your message; it is important that as many people as possible hear your story.

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



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

# Coach Faces Challenges As BB Season Gets Underway



# Sparks, Gosa, 400m Relay Team Headed for State Track Meet

MAYVILLE -- Charlie Sparks and Colleen Gosa won the discus competition, and the boys 400m relay team placed second at the WIAA Sectional Track and Field Meet at Mayville High School on Thursday, May

The top two individuals and top two relay teams advance to the WIAA State Track and Field Championships at UW-La Crosse on Friday and Saturday, June 2 and 3

Sparks, a junior, threw 161 feet and 11 inches (161'11") to win the discus competition by over seven feet. Dusty Keppen of Palmyra-Eagle placed second with a throw of 154'2". Sparks has emerged this season to be one of the dominant throwers in the state. Sparks has the number one seed in the Boys' Division Two discus competition for the state meet.

The Kewaskum 400m (4x100m) relay team of Jim Thelen, Chris Canter, Tony Fitts and Sparks placed second with an excellent time of 44.0 seconds to Whitewater. Kewaskum's time broke the school record of 44.4 seconds that the four-some set just three days earlier at the Lomira regional.

The Kewaskum school record had stood at 45.2 seconds since 1992 until Monday. The Kewaskum 400m relay team has the number six seed in Division Two at the state meet just 0.3 seconds behind the lead-

Breyan Donath, who had run extremely well in the 200m dash at regionals, joined the 880m relay team to help advance the relay team to state. The plan almost worked except a poor handoff between two other Kewaskum runners cost the team precious time. Whitewater won the 800m relay with a time of 1:50.4.

The Kewaskum 400m relay team of Becky Herriges, Stacy Muckerheide, Kristin Schiller, and Tina Lindgren placed eighth with a season best time of 54.5 seconds. Greendale won the 400m relay with an impressive time of 51.5 seconds.

Emmy Foerster placed fourth in the finals of the 100m high hurdles with a career best time of 16.6 seconds and Jenna Roecker ran a time of 17.3 seconds in the 100m high hurdles -just 0.1 second off her best time of the season.

Jolene Clark placed seventh in the high jump with a season best jump of 5'0". Angie Kolanko of Shorewood cleared 5'7" to win the high jump competition.

Jessi Graham ran a per-

sonal best of 1:05.9 in the 400m dash for eighth place.


### KHS Girls Soccer Team Defeated By Ozaukee
