After-Hours Drop Slot Installed At Village Municipal Building

The historical hotel, in the village of Kewaskum, has become home to Woody's Steakhouse & Pub. The business is located at the corner of Fond du Lac Avenue (Highway 45) and Main Street (Highway 28).

Todd Kleinhans, better known as Woody, dreamed of owning his own business, and one-day a supper club. The steakhouse is part of that goal. He is no stranger to the food industry or owning his own businesses. Woody graduated from Campbellsport High School and pursued and received a degree in business management.

"I've worked several jobs in the food industry over the last fifteen years," he said. "I own and operate Woody's Xtra Innings (a bar and grill) and Woody's On the Pond, both in Campbellsport. Another bar and grill, Rookies, was located just down the street here in Kewaskum."

The decision to open the steakhouse was a matter of circumstances. Rookies offered no more room to expand the dining facility, the building on the corner was available and ready to accommodate his goals and most importantly Woody was ready to pursue the supper club dream.

"Our goal at the steakhouse is to serve generous portions, from a variety of selections, at reasonable prices," Todd Kleinhans.

We closed Rookies, where we had served a lot of pizzas and prepared foods," he said. "Many of those customers have stopped here to eat and visit. I would like them to know I appreciate their business and hope all of our customers bear with us as we get organized in the steakhouse." A lot of thought went into the planning of the new business. Woody's experience prepared him somewhat with many of the decisions that needed to be made. Things like what to offer on the menu, who and where the suppliers would

be, hiring employees, working out schedules, getting brochures and menus made and many other details that go into such a huge undertaking. Fortunately Woody was able to bring valuable employees from Rookies and Woody's Xtra Innings, like Angie Donath, Nikki Thompson and Scott Rohlinger, as well as acquiring Karie Martin to be the waitstaff manager also family, friends, and his parents, Forest (also known as Woody) and Lila also offered their expertise.

"Like any new business it takes the right mix of people to operate smoothly," said Woody. "Although many of our employees are experienced in their jobs, the building itself and the new business is new to all of us. We are using a team effort and working out the details of what needs to be done as we go along."

Woody offers a wide variety of selections on the menu. Some of the appetizers include haystack onion rings, potato skins, sour cream and chive fries, sautéed mushrooms and a homemade recipe for the breaded ones to name just a few. The mushrooms are locally grown by Gourmet's Delight Mushrooms.

Everything is prepared homemade, including the soups, salad and fresh desserts daily. Beef selections include Prime Rib, Porterhouse, Top Sirloin and Chef Buzz's (Buzz Knaub) Special Filet. They specialize in secretly seasoned char-grilled steaks cooked to perfection. Only the best hand selected USDA choice steaks, aged for tenderness are served.

There are charbroiled pork chops, BBQ Pork Back Ribs, a variety of chicken selections, Roast Duck, a mouth-watering seafood selection and sandwiches. A specially prepared Vegetarian Dinner is also available.

Village residents can now take advantage of a new after-hours drop slot installed in front of the Kewaskum Municipal Building this past Monday. According to Administrative Assistant Betty Bakken, the drop slot can actually be used anytime during the day or evening for payment of parking tickets, water bills or property taxes. "We started off with limited lunch hours and now it is plainly obvious that in order to accomodate all of our customers we need to be open for lunch Sunday through Friday" Monday through Friday lunch is served from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Dinner hour is 4:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday, ending at 10 p.m. on Friday, Saturday and Sunday the entire menu is available (Continued on Page 4)

Education... It's Everyone's Business

What's different about today, August 31, 2000, and August 31, 1999? I'll give you a hint: If your're driving between 7 and 8 a.m. or between 3 and 4:30 p.m. in other school districts, you may be stopped by large yellow vehicles with red flashing lights.

The difference is that students in the Kewaskum Public Schools have not started school, so the red flashing lights of school busses aren't part of the early morning or afternoon driving routines yet because the remodeling of the Farmington and Wayne Elementary Schools was very influential in the School Board's decision to begin school after Labor Day here in Kewaskum.

With the school year beginning on September 5 this year, district residents should realize that next year's start date is yet to be determined. In fact, some people still may not fully understand the new law.


Beginning with the 2000-01 school year, Wisconsin Statute 118.045 prohibited a public school from starting the school term until September 1. If it's the law, then why did so many surrounding districts begin as early as August 23? As usual, the law contains an exception. To begin school prior to September 1, a School Board "may" hold a public hearing, but within the same school year, and adopt a resolution to begin that school year prior to September 1. This public hearing, if held, allows for community input and gives residents the opportunity to present information to the Board before a final decision is reached. Why is this so important? Because now is the time parents, students, teachers, community members, business owners, board members, etc., are experiencing and observing students not being in the classroom in August. I ask you: Are you and the children enjoying it? Is the summer break too long? Is this later start date helpful to local merchants and students who require student employees or who are still working?

Are your children bored, especially in these final two weeks? Did you squeeze in another vacation that you otherwise couldn't have gone on? In other words, I ask you to jot down your feelings and impressions while you are experiencing the lengthened summer vacation right now. Write them down so as next year's start date is being considered, or is being determined, you will be able to re-read your comments, refresh your memory, and recall the feelings/opinions you have today. With this information recorded, should the school board call for a public hearing on a start date for next year, you can make an informed decision based on fact, and feelings

We are excited to announce the school district's web site. By accessing www.ksd.k12.wi.us, you will have a wealth of information available to you. Things like the school calendar, school board minutes/agendas, staff directories, schedules for athletic events, school menus, etc. Currently it is "Under Construction" but many pages are open for you to visit. Try it. Like the commercial says, "You'll Like It!'

Building Construction Update: It has been a short summer for construction workers of C.D. Smith. They promised that we would be in both Wayne Elementary and Farmington Elementary Schools in time for the first day of school.... September 5. They will be meeting that deadline as our maintenance and custodial crews have been in the buildings since August 21, preparing them for occupancy.

The only minor delay we ran into was humidity. New concrete poured in both buildings may not be cured enough to lay tile down but carpeting has been laid. For the first few weeks some small portions of some classrooms and some hallways will be concrete but other than that teachers

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will be in their rooms on the first In-Service day of August 31.



Local Student Stands Out At Career Forum in Boston

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Joshua Lawrence of West Bend, attended the National Youth Leadership Forum on Medicine (NYLF/MED) from July 16 through 26, 2000 in Massachusetts. Boston, Having demonstrated academic achievement and an interest in a career related to science and health, Lawrence joined more than 400 outstanding high school juniors and seniors from across the United States at the conference. Students learned first-hand about medical ethics, the global effects of infectious disease, genetic research, public health and many other subjects relevant to the field.

Josh is the son of Dr. John and Renee Lawrence, and will be a junior at Kewaskum High School.

"The National Youth Leadership Forum on Medicine gives students like Joshua Lawrence an early opportunity to explore in depth what it takes to reach their career goals," said Donna Weldin, executive director of the NYLF. "Many students arrive knowing they want to pursue a career in medicine. We provide some of the essential resources for these young people to determine where, inside the medical universe, they wish to land."

Dr. Tim Johnson, medical editor for ABC News

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welcomed the students to Boston and discussed the sometimes - tenuous relationship between the media and medicine. Dr. Johnson noted, "Over the past 20 years, the media has had a tremendous impact on the health of the United States based on the information that they make available to the public." He also cautioned, "while meteorologists must be educated in meteorology, medical editors are not necessarily required to have any medical training. This may increase the chance of misinformation, so be sure to consider your source."

During the conference, NYLF/MED students had the opportunity to visit some of the best institutions of medical learning in the country, including: Boston School University of Medicine, Harvard Medical School, Tufts School of Medicine and others. Not only did students visit these renowned places, they also interacted with doctors, nurses, scientists and professors to gather a greater understanding of medical history, standards and trends.

Throughout the program, Lawrence and fellow students explored the realms of public health and problembased learning in a series of intense and stimulating

simulations. NYLF/MED culminated in a simulation explored medical that ethics, allowing students to apply what they learned throughout the course of the Forum.


