Area Firefighters Extinquish Campbellsport House Fire

Theisen was allegedly watching TV when he thought a circuit breaker was thrown, he went to the garage and he then noticed flames above his head. 





The basement walls were already in, so half the crew started building the cap while the rest of the crew started building the temporary working platform that the stud walls were built on.



that built all the walls were Mary and Lauren Steinhardt, Sara (Pearson) More, Mandy Will, Mary Schoofs and Karen Kletti.



There Is No Gun Crisis

While watching first Lady Hillary Clinton speak in Los Angeles I noticed she once again attacked the problems caused by guns in our society. She called for more laws and regulations restricting their ownership. I always find the anti-gun message of some major politicians to be both curious and disturbing. Curious, because the right is to keep and bear arms in our Constitution, which these same politicians take an oath to uphold. Distributing, because such talk indicates these politicians don't the Second appreciate Amendment and think guns are incompatible with a free

In 1891, Supreme Court Justice Joseph Story called the right to bear arms "the palladium of the liberties of the republic; since it offers a strong moral check against usurpation and arbitrary power of the rulers. This statement was very prescient as in the twentieth century of all the governments most hostile to liberty, be it Soviet Russia, Red China, Nazi Germany or communist China all were opposed to ownership of guns by private citizens.

Why then this recent attack on gun ownership? Are there more gun related deaths than in the past? The main stream media certainly give prominent attention to any gun accident or murders making it appear as though things are worse than ever. Let's check the

Murders in general in this country have fallen in the last twenty years. The rate peaked at 10.2 homicides per 100,000 people in 1980 and fell to 6.3 homicides per 100,000 people in 1998. During the last twenty-five years the number of gun homicide offenders over age 25 has dropped by 30% despite the increases in ulation while the number of homicides unrelated to gun usage actually grew.

The numbers regarding accidental fire arm deaths are even more favorable. In 1996 there were only .4 accidental deaths per 100,000 people. This has fallen from 3.4 accidental deaths in 1900 and 1.0 in 1970. Accidental deaths among children declined even more dramatically from 600 in 1975 to 138 in most recent year available. These encouraging statistics are in despite an enormous increase in the number of guns owned. Over 65 million gun owners own over 200 million guns. The major factor in the fall in murder rates is probably a large increase in the prison popu-

truly scary. We must pay attention not to vote for them in the fall.

OFFICE OF THE WASHINGTON COUNTY CLERK TO THE ELECTORS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY:

Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary to be held in Washington County on the twelfth day of September, 2000, at which the nominees for the offices named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below, along with the referendum questions, if any, to be submitted to the electors.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot, except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the partisan primary the elector may select the party of his or her choice. Where lever machines are used, depress the lever or button of the party of your choice, and then depress the lever or button next to the candidate's name. Where marksense system is used, fill in the oval next to the party of your choice, and then fill in the oval next to the candidate's name under the party of your choice.

To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, write in the name of the person of your choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. Where lever machines are used, raise the slide above the office and write in the name of the person and party of your choice on the paper exposed. Where a marksense system is used, write the name of the person of your choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. To write in a name for an office that does not appear on the ballot under the party of your choice, fill in the oval in the write-in section on the ballot, and write in the name of the person.

In order to qualify for participation in the Wisconsin Election Campaign Fund, a candidate for legislative office must receive at least 6% of the votes cast on all ballots for the office for which he or she is a candidate, in addition to other requirements.

If an elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election inspector who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to an election inspector, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth, properly deposit the ballot, and promptly leave the polling place.

After an official marksense ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the sleeve (if one is provided) so the marks do not show. The elector shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and return the sleeve.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.







Higher Prices Expected For Winter Heating Bills

MILWAUKEE - Wisconsin Gas and Wisconsin Electric, both Wisconsin Energy companies. announced September 5, that natural gas customers can expect to see higher bills this upcoming heating season due to a significant run-up in the price utilities must pay for natural gas.

Residential customers of the utilities could see their winter heating bills increase by 20 percent over last year or about \$113 for the six month period of November -April. A typical residential customer heating Southeastern Wisconsin spent \$567 to heat their home last heating season. This increase is for gas rates and does not factor in weather which has been warmer-than-normal the past few years. A return to normal weather means customers could pay even more because of increased usage.

"Our utilities do not profit from the higher bills our customers are paying as a result of the increased natural gas prices," said James Schott, senior vice president, gas operations, Wisconsin Gas. "As distribution companies, we pass the cost of natural gas from our suppliers directly on to our customers with no price mark-up."

Gas bills are determined each month by how much

natural gas a customer uses and the price of natural gas during that billing period. While the wholesale price of natural gas has nearly doubled, that does not translate into a doubling of residential customer bills.

Schott added that the cost of gas is the largest portion of the monthly gas bill, typically about 65 to 70 percent of the total. The remaining 30 to 35 percent covers the cost of providing gas service - the underground distribution network, meters, billing and customer systems and other operating expenses. This portion of the bill is regulated and approved by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin.

According to industry experts, the increase in gas costs, which have been at historically high levels all summer, are the result of several nationwide factors, most notably the increased use of natural gas for the generation of electricity, and a decrease in exploration due to depressed prices over the last few years. With the increase in gas prices, exploration activities have resumed and more rigs are drilling for natural gas than at any time during the last 15 years. Typically, it takes from six to 18 months to get fresh supplies of natural gas

"It's important to tell our

customers that there will be ample supplies of natural gas to meet their home heating needs this winter," said Schott. "Natural gas also remains the cleanest and most economical fuel to heat the home."

Other highlights of the day were both the JV and Freshmen teams won all three of their matches.




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
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
