

Quadruple Fatality in Crash on Highway 41

TOWN OF ADDISON- A tragic mid-evening crash killed four people Sunday night. Two of the four men were Appleton natives, the other two from West Allis.

According to reports from the Washington County Sheriff's Department the crash occurred around 7:78 p.m. when they were notified of a three car accident in the southbound lanes of USH 41 south of STH 33.

Trao Lor, 20, from Appleton was driving an Accura northbound accompanied by Xiong Pha, 21, also of Appleton,

when his vehicle swerved off the road-way fish-tailing into the median. He continued into the southbound lane of traffic striking a Lexus driven by Reinhold L. Schrafstetter, 45, of West Allis almost head-on. His father, Reinhold S. Schrafstetter, 77 also of West Allis was a passenger. All four are now dead.

Another vehicle, a Ford Expedition driven by Robert E. Cleveland, 40 was also involved after being unable to avoid the crash. Cleveland was accompanied by his wife, Susan, 40 and their two children William, 13 and Jonathan, 9. The family is from Colgate. All four were treated and

released from area hospitals.

The seriousness of the crash caused officials to close down a portion of USH 41 between STH 33 and CTH K for several hours. One northbound lane was also closed.

Allenton Fire and Rescue responded to the scene. They were later assisted by West Bend Rescue, West Bend Intercept, St. Lawrence First Responders, Burg Ambulance and Flight for Life. The Wisconsin State Patrol and Slinger Police Department assisted the Washington County Sheriff's Department.

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


Introduction **To Solar Hot** Water Systems





There will be games for children, bakery goods, crafts and music in a tent. The whole community is invited to share in this event. The festival ends at 5:00 p.m.



The event was a two-day affair starting with a dinner at the Linden Inn, Big Cedar Lake. A program followed with invited guests telling their memories of the honored guests.





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

As I was burrowing through my office last week, trying to make myself comfortable amidst the massive amount of files that have accumulated here over the years, I came upon a stained and yellowed ledger book. On page thirty-five, in the kind of rolling cursive that isn't seen much today, the word "Minutes" is scrawled. Beneath that, in the same hand is written "Dec. 13-1915.--". I sat and stared at the ledger for a moment, pondering its travels, its movement through time, its strange, forward motion beyond two World Wars, a walk on the moon, disco, the Beatles, the wall in Berlin, the internet, to sit quietly on a metal filing cabinet in my office. I'm not usually very sentimental, but in that moment, the ledger became a mystical object to me. It was like a mantle handed down from those librarians of the past, connecting me not only to the librarians former in Kewaskum. even or Wisconsin, but also to those ancient collectors in London, Athens, and Alexandria. The electric chirp of the phone interrupted my thoughts and suddenly pulled me back to the present. I looked around me, trying to connect what I was doing with the accomplishments of those early librarians. What were the motivations of those pioneers? Were they historians? Educators? Collectors? I realized sitting there in my office that, while they may have been any one of those things, their main purpose was to be what that ledger was to me: a connection to something outside myself. The community library is not just a collection of knowledge, it is a connection to other worlds, other times, other people. We may be here, balancing on the county-line in the middle of Wisconsin, surrounded by farm fields and forests, but in the library, we can reach

we take the time to sit and think about the connections we make, we can find where our own stories fit into the intricately plotted novel that is humanity.


Pro Arte will perform at the University of Wisconsin Washington County on Friday, September 29, at 7:30 p.m. in the University Theatre.

Heidi Heberlein of Kiel won the girl's four kilometer race in 15:42, finishing ahead of almost a 200 person field.



Darrell Woebbeking left, and Andy Lickel work together as they establish their race positions.






Adolescent Support Group Available

Simple Steps Can Help Hunters Avoid Falls From Tree Stands

MADISON - The tree stands that hunters - bow hunters especially- use to increase their chances of bagging a deer could instead bring a trip to the emergency room if hunters are careless or the stands are improperly installed, Wisconsin hunter safety officials say.

"Research shows that one out of three hunters will fall from a tree stand sometime during his or her hunting career," says Tim Lawhern, hunter education administrator for the Department of Natural Resources. "Two-thirds of the hunters who fall from tree stands do so while they're climbing into or out of a tree stand, so it's particularly important to use caution during those times."

Lawhern recommends that hunters always maintain three points of contact two hands and one foot, or one hand and two feet - on the ladder when climbing into or out of the stand. "Often people start climbing up the ladder, and at one point, they only have one hand and one foot connecting - that isn't good," Lawhern says. "Three points of contact give you greater stability and balance."

Falls also occur for a variety of other reasons, including a weakness in the stand's structure, incorrect installation of a tree stand, failure to use a safety harness, and hunters dozing off while on the stand, he says. Tree stands also factor into other hunting accidents,

such as when hunters are shot when their guns discharge while they are climbing into tree stands, or when bow hunters fall on their arrows.

Tree stands became popular in the late 1960s because hunters believe they help improve the hunters' visibility and decrease the chance their scent will spook their prey. Lawhern reminds hunters that if they are hunting on public land, they must be careful not to damage any trees. It is illegal to use screw-in stands or steps, or cut branches to make shooting lanes. In addition, you must completely remove your stand from the property at the end of each hunting day

* Check permanent tree stands every year before hunting from them, and replace any worn or weak lumber before it breaks.

* Read, understand, and follow the factory recommended practices and procedures when installing commercial stands.

Bonus Antlerless Permits On Sale

MADISON - Remaining bonus antlerless harvest permits for the 2000 deer hunting seasons are now on sale. Hunters may purchase bonus antlerless permits at any license sales outlet, Department of Natural Resources service center, or over the telephone by dialing toll-free, 1-877-945-4236. Telephone customers may pay the permit cost plus \$3 handling fee with Mastercard or Visa.

Hunters will find ample bonus permits available for nearly every deer management unit in the state, says Bill Mytton, deer and bear ecologist for the Department Natural Resources. of Wildlife managers currently estimate Wisconsin's whitetailed deer population is at about 1.7 million animals, with deer populations above established goals in most of the state's 132 deer management units. The sale of bonus permits is part of the state's management efforts to bring deer populations closer to established goals.

Bonus permits must be used in the unit for which they are issued and may be filled during any open deer hunting season. Hunters are also receiving two free Zone T antlerless permits when they purchase their hunting licenses. The free Zone T antlerless permits may be used in any Zone T unit in any open deer hunting season. Hunters may use their permits in any order: they do not need to fill their regular back tag before using bonus or Zone T antlerless permits, or fill bonus or Zone T antlerless permits before using their regular back tag.

Hunters will be available to purchase bonus permits at a rate of two permits per day. The cost is \$12 per permit for residents and \$20 for nonresidents. All funds generated through the sale of the bonus permits are allocated to the state's wildlife damage program, and are used only for wildlife damage abatement projects, paying wildlife damage claims, and paying counties for the cost of administering the program.




Kurt Cochran was again outstanding at sweeper. Kurt's counter attacks sent the Kohler defense scurrying to defend their goal.
