

Landslide Victory for Bush/Cheney in County, But Presidency is Still Undecided Nationwide

History is in the making with this year's presidential election in a race that has been the closest since the Nixon/Kennedy contest. As of late morning Wednesday it was undecided who will lead our county into the 21st century.

With discrepancies in Florida, it is still undecided if Republican Texas Governor George W. Bush has won the U.S. Presidency against Democrat Vice President Albert Gore.

The state has promised a very fast recount of votes cast during Tuesday's election. It is expected to be completed by the close of business on Thursday, according to a statement by the Division of confusion was caused by making type on the ballots larger so voters could read them.

Early Wednesday morning it was believed that Gore was the unofficial winner in Wisconsin, taking all 11 electoral votes from Wisconsin and bringing him up 260 electoral votes nationwide.

Gore received a total of 1,240,417 Wisconsin votes while Bush grabbed 1,234,155, giving both of them 48 percent of the votes here.

Out of 70,553 Washington County registered voters 61,542 turned out countywide in this election, a county record.

History was also made in the Village of Kewaskum. According to a village official 1,533 of 1,632 registered voters turned out to vote, so many that copies of the ballots had to be made and thus were counted by hand until 10:30 p.m. Many voters were standing in line even before the polls were open. High numbers were also attributed to a large number of new voters. In the race for United States Senator John Gillespie (R) was the local favorite receiving 790 VOK votes and 32,992 or 54.71% in the county. Incumbent Herb Kohl (D) gained 693 in the village and 26,645 throughout the county.

When all was said and done Gillespie gave incumbent Herb Kohl (D) his seat back, only receiving 920,398 votes statewide. Kohl received an unsurprising 61.7% of the vote, or 1,530,983 votes.

Also receiving votes under different tickets were Eugene Hem (I)- four VOK votes/153 county/8,183 state; Tim Peterson (L)-14/405/18,590; Robert R. Raymond (C)-five/94/3,756

In the race for Congressional representative in the ninth district incumbent F. James Sensenbrenner (R) will again keep his seat snagging in 236,235 votes, 74.1% statewide. His opponent Mike Clawson (D) received 82,710 votes. Sensenbrenner was also the local favorite in the Village of Kewaskum. He received 1,098 votes and 45,094 county votes. His opponent (D) Mike Clawson received 387 votes in the village and 14,104 votes countywide. votes. In the county race he received 11,615 votes.

Representative Glenn Grothmann (R) received 1,173 votes in the village. Throughout the county he received 14,856 votes. In the village there were numerous write-in votes for the seat. Among them were: John Kenworthy and John Stephani both of Kewaskum receiving one vote each; Larry Ammel, Kewaskum- two; Floyd Brenholt, West Bend- two and Rick Stokdhke- one.

All county offices ran unopposed.

The state referendum which

stated: "Should the right to vote in federal elections be extended to the adult children of U.S. citizens who resided in Wisconsin before establishing residency abroad" passed with 946,217 yes votes.

The county referendum passed with 48,670 votes. It read "Do you support legislation to reform the state campaign finance system that would limit campaign spending, require stricter contribution limits and require full and prompt disclosure of election-related activities?"

School Announces Decrease in Tax Levy

Residents in the Kewaskum School District can be thrilled to learn that the combined tax levy for 2000-2001 is \$6,644,071, which is \$256,295 less than last year.

The decrease is the result of ending the practice of defeasing the school district's 1994 general obligation debt.

Over the last four years the school district defeased (paid off early) \$2,280,000 of the bonds issued in 1994.

This was done to reduce the school district's debt service requirements and to put the school district in a better position to issue new debt after the 1999 referendum.

The school district's financial advisors, Robert W. Baird & Co., recently recommended the defeasance end because it will reduce the loss of state aid to the district. The advisors explained that the school district is in a negative tertiary aid situation and that the additional expenditures for debt defeasance will result in a significant loss of state aid. rate is also decreasing. The 2000-01 tax rate will be \$9.83, down 73 cents from last year's rate of \$10.56. The decrease in the tax rate is the result of the lower tax levy.

The decrease in the tax rate will reduce the taxes on a home assessed at \$100,000 by \$73.00.

The operating budget for 2000-2001 includes funds to hire 5.33 FTE additional teaching staff. The additional staff are necessary to keep class sizes at 25 or less at the elementary level and to fully staff the instructional programs at the middle and high schools. The operating budget also includes appropriation an of \$140,000 from the school district's fund balance to pay for the cost of renovat ing the high school track. Business manager Paul Reichert released a memo to board members, in his memo stating that the proposed budget for 2000-2001 was prepared using a number of assumptions and estimates for such items as enrollment, equalization

Officials there do say that it's possible the count will be completed sometime Wednesday.

The difference in votes cast is 1,784 in favor of Bush, which is less than one half of one percent of all votes cast. Under these circumstances, Florida law requires an automatic recount of all votes cast.

The pressure on the recount was intense due to the fact that Florida, with its 25 electoral votes, is the state that will decide the winner of this closely contested presidential election.

Also adding to the chaos in Florida was voter confusion in Palm Beach County when several dozen voters said they voted for Pat Buchanan instead of Al Gore because of ballots that were not clearly marked and had an arrow from Gore's name, listed second, pointing to the third hole on the ballot. Elections officials said the Voters in Kewaskum chose Bush, giving him 998 votes. Bush also won Washington County with 41,016 votes or 67.00% of votes cast.

Gore received 486 in the Village. Countywide he received 18,075.

Also receiving votes under different tickets were: Harry Browne (L)- three Village of Kewaskum votes (VOK)/125 countywide; Howard Phillips (C)- one/56; Ralph Nader (WGR)- 36/1561; Monica Moorehead-0/30; James Harris- 0/2; John Hagelin- 0/17; Pat Buchanan- 0/286.

One write-in vote was cast for Kewaskum resident Trev Timblin.

There were no write-in votes for this campaign.

In the race for State Senator in District 20, local favorite Mary Panzer (R) is ahead with 64,253 votes, a final number is unclear as only 97% of reporting agencies have reported. Panzer received overwhelming support in the Village grabbing 1,029 votes. Countywide she received 28,014.

Dale Koski (D)- received 23,690 votes throughout the state. In the village he received 444 The school district's tax

aid, the revenue limit and equalized property values.

"In September and October the school district determines its actual enrollment, receives from the Department of Revenue the fall certified equalized valuation for the school district and receives from DPI a certified equalization aid amount."

"Now that we have received this information, it is possible to determine our actual revenue limit, to adjust the tax levy and budget accordingly, and to determine the tax rate."

Reichert addressed the following sections, discussing changes in the estimates.

Enrollment

During the budget development process the 2000-2001 revenue limit was estimated using the assumption that our September 2000 membership would be 15 less than the September 1999 membership. Another assumption used in estimating the revenue limit was that the summer school membership would remain constant. These assumptions resulted in an estimated three-year membership average of 1,917.

In fact, the September 2000 membership decreased by only one and summer school membership increased by four. As a result, the actual three-year membership average is 1,924.

Transfer of Service

A transfer of service exemption allows the school district to increase its revenue limit by the amount of increased costs incurred when students move into the school district from other school districts. The revenue limit estimate assumed a transfer of service exemption of \$85,000. This year DPI approved exemptions totaling \$114,544.

Equalization Aid

The estimated equalization aid for 2000-2001 used in preparing the proposed budget was \$7,959,112. On October 15, 2000 DPI certified the actual amount of equalization aid for 2000-2001 at \$7,956,206, an increase of \$6,094 over the estimate. Equalization aid in 2000-2001 will be \$315,156 more than last year.

Debt Defeasance

The tax levy for the Debt Service Fund in the previous four years has included extra funds that were used to defease bonds issued in 1994. The purpose of doing this was to eliminate enough debt so that any new debt issued after a successful referendum could be structured more favorably to the school district.

Analysts at Robert W. Baird and Co. have recommended that the school district should now end the practice of defeasing its 1994 debt. They advise the school district to only levy enough taxes in the Debt Service Fund to cover the debt service payments due in the year 2001.Consequently, the Debt Service Fund tax levy has been reduced.

Fund Balance Appropriations

The 2000-2001 Budget includes appropriations from the fund balance in several funds. In the General Fund \$140,000 of the fund balance is being used to fund expenditures for renovations to the high school track. An appropriation of \$29,546 from the fund balance of the Food Service Fund is being used to pay for kitchen equipment installed at Farmington and Wayne Schools.

repayment of The \$4,525,000 of bond anticipation notes on July 5, 2000 was paid from funds in the fund balance of the Debt Service Fund. Funds to pay for the school building projects during 2000-2001 are being taken from the fund balance of the Capital Projects Fund. Donations made last year and placed in the fund balance of the Expendable Trust Fund are being spent this year.

Equalized Property Values


Equalized property values, as shown in the Fall School District Certification 2000 Values-Tax of Apportionment received from the Department of Revenue on October 1, 3.44% increased to \$675,895,269. The proposed 2000-2001 budget was prepared using an estimated increase of 3.00% to \$653,000,000.

Tax Rate

The General Fund tax rate for 2000-2001 is \$8.11 per \$1,000 of equalized value, an increase of 29 cents over the previous year. The Debt Service Fund tax rate is \$1.72, a decrease of \$1.02 from last year.

The combined tax rate for 2000-2001 is \$9.83, down 73 cents from the prior year.

Recommended Motion



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Revenue Limit

The higher membership and exemption numbers have resulted in an actual revenue limit for 2000-2001 of \$13,465,642. This amount is \$85,039 more than was estimated during the preparation of the proposed budget and \$686,198 more than the 1999-2000 revenue limit.

The increase in the revenue limit was used to fund increases in the operating budget for three expenditures: 1) repairs to the air conditioning equipment at the middle school in the amount of \$41,000; 2) an increase of \$15,000 in the budget for substitutes; and 3) an increase of \$29,000 in the budget for open enrollment.

Tax Levy

The 2000-2001 tax levy for the General Fund (operating fund) is \$5,483,050. The operating tax levy is \$371,882 more than the 1999-2000 operating tax levy. The tax levy for the Debt Service Fund is \$1,161,021. This amount is \$628,177 less than last year. The combined tax levy for 2000-2001 is \$6,644,071, which is \$256,295 less than last year. To adopt the attached 2000-2001 Budget and to adjust the General Fund Tax Levy for operating expenses during the 2000-2001 fiscal year to \$5,483,050, to adjust the Debt Service Fund Tax Levy for debt retirement during calendar year 2001 to \$1,161,021, and to levy a tax for Prior Year Tax Chargebacks in the amount of \$851 for a combined tax levy of \$6,644,922.

Congratulations to the school's students and their families on a remarkable accomplishment!


Breakfast With Santa


Tickets will be on sale between November 15 and December 1 in the high school office for \$5 and must be purchased by 3:30 p.m. on Friday, December 1.

New Technology Program Offered

Beginning in January, Moraine Park Technical College will be the first technical college in the state to offer a new associate degree Business and Technology Coordinator program.

Business and Technology Coordinators work in all types and sizes of business and industry settings. Qualifications needed for a job include: project management skills, first-level technical support skills, high level written and verbal communication skills, the ability to train others, high level thinking and decisionmaking skills and the ability to use the advanced features of the latest in hardware and software technology tools in the performance of their work.

The program was developed based on a needs assessment completed last year. The assessment showed an overwhelming need for individuals to obtain not only business courses to succeed but also management and high-level computer software skills. The 94 companies in the Moraine Park district, that completed the survey indicated that 49 percent are having a hard time finding **Business and Technology** Coordinators and 76 percent were willing to send their current employees to Moraine Park for more training.

of the Graduates **Business and Technology** program will be able to manage projects, create and manage integrated electronic documents, provide and train others in computer software, perform first-level hardware/software installation and technical support, support e-commerce functions and web maintenance functions and investigate and implement new business technologies. The starting salary for Business and Technologies Coordinators is \$15 per hour with the wage for this career increasing to \$22.50 per hour in three years.

Courses will be offerd at the Fond du Lac and West Bend Campus evenings and Saturdays. This program is designed for the person who wants to expand their skills, assume greater work responsibilities, advance in their career field or wishes to make a career shift or start a new career. The curriculum will consist of existing courses from the Computer Information System: Technical Support, Supervisory Management, Administrative Assistant and Web Developer programs along with the new courses developed specifically for this program by

the Moraine Park staff.






In a change from my usual meandering column, I want to dedicate this week to letting you know about some upcoming events at the library.





Free Veterans Day E-Card

Veterans Day is November 11, but you probably will not find a greeting card in your favorite shop. With 26 million veterans in the nation, The American Legion realized many people would like to say a special "Thank You" to a veteran. That's why the nation's largest wartime veterans organization is offering a free, musical e-mail card.


"Many people forget that young military men and women serving today are veterans. Just about anywhere they are serving they have access to e-mail and receiving a special 'Veterans Day' card would be a nice surprise," National Commander Ray Smith said.

This is the third year The American Legion has offered the cards. The Veterans Day e-card service is accessed directly from The American Legion's homepage at www.legion.org. Once at the site, it is a simple matter to follow the instruction and send your special greetings. A special feature of the service allows senders to put their greetings together, and then choose to send the card then, or at a preselected later date. President Woodrow Wilson signed Congressional Resolution on November 11, 1919 establishing "Armistice Day." The resolution said: "This day should be commemorated with thanksgiving and prayer and exercises designed to perpetuate peace through good will and understanding mutual between nations." The resolution further called for a day to be observed in schools

and churches or other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies. Since 1919, November 11

has become Veterans Day. Yet the same spirit that gave birth to Armistice Day continues today as America remembers the men and women who have served our country in the military.

"I hope millions of Americans will send an ecard to a veteran they know. It will just take you a moment to send the card, but it could mean much more to the person receiving it," Smith said.



This Saturday, November 11, Veterans Day, the Washington County Historical Society will host a special "Veterans Day" program. The museum will be open from 10:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. and there will be special Veterans Day displays to honor Washington County Veterans from the Historical Society Collection, and local Veterans groups.



Just a few days after the presidential election, we will commemorate Veterans Day 2000 on November 11. The relationship of these two events is significant. The miracle of democracy has provided our nation with the peaceful and orderly transfer of government power, based on the will of the people, for more than two centuries. And that miracle of democracy is a legacy of our veterans, who have defended our nation's liberty and spawned freedom around the world.

The right to vote and all the other rights we possess could not have been secured or maintained without the selfless service and sacrifices of millions of patriots who served in the U.S. armed forces in times of war and peace.

The 17 Americans on the USS Cole who were killed in a terrorist attack in Yemen recently -- including Marc Nieto, a 24-year-old sailor from Fond du Lac -- made the ultimate sacrifice on our behalf. Their tragic deaths reminded us that we owe our freedom and security to the men and women who served in the military.

Because this year marks the 50th anniversary of the beginning of the Korean War, we are paying special tribute to veterans who served during what is often called the "Forgotten War."

Their efforts helped stop communist aggression in Asia and allowed South Korea to evolve into a prosperous democratic nation, which is now seeking a peaceful relationship with North Korea.


Yet, despite their heroic efforts in the cause of freedom, many of our Korean War veterans are not receiving all the state and federal benefits they've earned for their service. To help our Korean War veterans and all other

To help our Korean War veterans and all other Wisconsin veterans obtain the benefits they've earned, I launched the I Owe You campaign in September. This statewide campaign features color posters of Uncle Sam in his familiar recruiting pose with a large headline announcing: "I Owe You." The message from Uncle Sam to veterans is: "You were ready when I needed you, now I am ready to help you."

Hunters Harvest More Than 67,000 During Special Early Antlerless Deer Hunt

MADISON - Hunters harvested 67,241 antlerless deer during the October 26-29 Zone T antlerless gun deer hunt, according to a preliminary tally of registration stations.

We saw an excellent turn out of hunters, especially in the north," said Bill Mytton, Department of Natural Resources deer and bear ecologist. "The early harvest numbers we're seeing are very encouraging. I'm also hearing comments from people that they really enjoyed the mild weather and the chance to hunt with sons and daughters while the kids were off school during the teacher's convention.

Several DNR biologists initial impressions were that there was an outstanding participation rate, almost like an opening day in some areas. Hunters in the south, where they're used to the October hunts, came through with good numbers and enthusiasm according to Mytton.

Although there were inevitably some hunters that didn't see deer at their stand, overall a lot of deer were harvested. All indications are that we will at least equal last year's record total harvest and should exceed it, moving us closer to established population goals.

"I don't think this hunt will have much effect on the continuing archery season of gun season harvest," Mytton added. "We expect hunters will still harvest what they traditionally do during the nine day November season. In fact, following the 1996 Zone T season we found that when people were able to fill their freezer space during the early season, they tended to avoid taking yearling bucks during the November hunt, letting them grow for another year and produce some handsome antlers as twoand-a-half year olds."

Many areas of Wisconsin had a new look for this time of year as orange-clad hunters across the state took to the woods and fields for the hunt which was extended to nearly threefourths of the state for 2000 in an effort to put the

brakes on Wisconsin's rapidly expanding whitetailed deer herd, estimated at 1.7 million animals this fall.

Wisconsin has extended gun deer hunting several times over the last decade to control high populations in farmland deer management units. This year, 86 of Wisconsin's 132 deer management units were included in the early gun hunt and for the first time some central and northern forest units are included.

A deer management unit is considered for inclusion in the hunt if wildlife managers determine that the traditional nine day November gun hunt is unlikely to bring the unit to within 20 percent of its legally mandated population level.

It is impossible to make comparison from the Zone T harvest this year to previous Zone T hunts, said Larry Konopacki, assistant DNR deer ecologist, because each of the hunts involved different deer management units and different frameworks. The highest previous Zone T harvest was about 25,000 in 19 units in 1996, but there was an "earn-abuck" requirement for those units that in, in which hunters had to shoot an antlerless deer in order to shoot a buck, "so that's comparing apples to oranges," Konopacki said. In 1999 with a similar season structure 6,990 deer were taken

in eight units. "Wisconsin hunters and the out-of-state hunters participating in the hunt are to be congratulated for a safe hunt," said Tim Lawhern, DNR's hunter safety education coordinator. "There were some safety concerns going into the hunt given the greatly expanded areas involved but we cam through with only one reported nonfatal hunting

accident." "That accident involved the same members of a hunting party in Wood County. At this time we've not received any reports of non-hunters being involved in any safety related incidents. In fact, in the entire history of Zone T hunts, there has never been a non-

hunter involved in a reported hunting accident.

Also new for this year's hunt is a greatly expanded venison donation program. Through the program hunters can donate venison to state food pantries by simply registering a deer and dropping it off at one of over 150 participating meat processors. There is no cost to the hunter for processing the meat. As word of the expanded program spreads, more and more organizations have contacted the DNR to ask how they can get involved in the distribution of venison to food pantries. New Hunting Hours to Take Effect Nov. 18

hunting hours will take minutes from south to place for all gun deer, bow deer, small game and bear hunters beginning on Nov. 18, 2000.

Effective at 12:01 am on Nov. 18, legal hunting hours will be a uniform one-half hour before sunrise to 20 minutes after sunset. Until Nov. 18, legal hunting hours will be a listed in the 2000 Wisconsin Hunting Regulations pamphlet.

The new hunting hours will also apply to damage shooting permits and any other hunting activity that occurs throughout the year. Next year's regulation pamphlet will list hunting hours for the entire year.

The only exception to this change is waterfowl hunting. For waterfowl, hunting hours will remain one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Waterfowl hunting hours are determined by federal regulations that require hunting to end at sunset each day.

"In addition to the new legal hunting hours, actual times for sunrise and sunset have been adjusted for south north variation," to explained Doug Bilgo, Department of Natural Resources conservation warden. "For years, sunrise and sunset were based on Milwaukee time. Now, two locations are used. Sheboygan is the new standard for the south and Powers, Mich. for the northern half of the state.'

Actual sunrise-sunset times vary by up to 20 minutes from far western

An important change in Wisconsin and by up to six north.

Department The Natural Resources has published two new hunting hours tables, one for southern Wisconsin and one for northern Wisconsin, one its website at <u>http://www.</u> dnr.state.wi.us. Click on "outdoor activities," then "hunting." Copies will also be available at service centers. The new hours are not published in the 2000 Wisconsin Hunting Regulations pamphlet because the National Resources Board had not yet authorized the new hours at the time the regulations were printed.







This is in addition to the regular business hours of 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The Milwaukee Service Center, 2300 N. Dr. Martin Luther King Drive (King Drive and North Avenue) will be open Tuesday Thursday, through November 14 through 16, 7:45 a.m. to 6 p.m. Customers can park behind the building off of N. Second St.

The DNR Sturtevant Service Center, 9531 North Rayne Road, is located one block south of Hwy 20 and one block east of Hwy H in Racine County. It will be open Saturday, November 11 from 8 a.m. to 12 noon, and, Wednesday through November 15 Friday, through 17, 7:45 a.m. to 6 p.m. Customers can park in front of the building off Rayne Road.

The Plymouth DNR Station, W5750 Woodchuck Lane, located off Highway 67 one block north of Highway 23 in Sheboygan County and Pike Lake State Park, 3544 Kettle Moraine located along Road, Highway 60 in Hartford, will be open Wednesday, and Friday, Thursday




