Town of Scott Board Approves 2001 Budget

The Scott Town Board has approved a \$550,275 budget for the year 2001.

It is supported by \$256,139 of anticipated revenues resulting in a tax rate of \$3.53 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. This represents a 10.46% increase in expenditures over this year and 27.98% increase in revenues.

Eight thousand dollars in interest is anticipated, along with \$9,000 for trailer parking fees, and a rise of \$6,000 for building permits, plus \$500 for Hilltop rental.

The largest increase in expenditures comes from fire protection. It shows an increase of \$8,895 over last year. During the public hearing which preceded the adoption of the budget, former town board supervisor Richard Bemis remarked, that there are enough tankers in southwestern Sheboygan County. He termed it as "a bit of overkill" and suggested that departments merge such as has been done in areas in Milwaukee. Others agreed that it is time to look into fire departments merging.

Dallas Wixom, County Road S, raised the question about town salaries. He had reviewed a Wisconsin Town's Association survey of town salaries and said, "We are slipping away. We must be competitive.

He suggested that an increase of town salaries is a demonstration of appreciating those people who come forward and do these jobs.

Orville Mileager, Brazelton Drive, echoed Wixom's remarks. He said he was a firm believer on giving raises equal to the cost of living. Bemis replied, "These people are giving of themselves to the town. Look at the firemen, what do they get?

The new budget gives a \$1,000 increase in the Clerk-Treasurer salary bringing it up to \$16,000. The combined salaries of estimated that to have garbage picked up at the road, it would cost the town in the vicinity of \$72,000 annually. Under this type of system, it would be an extra \$7 to \$8 per month charged to each resident.

For the past few years. it has been the Town's objective to obtain revenue by selling the recycled materials. The market for recyclables has drifted down and the only thing selling now is paper. The town's recycle building is full with no place to get rid of material on hand.

With this in mind, and a need to cut costs, it has been decided to discontinue the quest of selling the recyclables. The town has entered into a contract with Superior Services, Sheboygan.

Recycling will continue with a few changes. Clear bags will still be needed for trash as it has in the past. Recycle materials can be comingled and all will go into one eight vard dumpster. The separation of different items is no longer needed except the paper and cardboard will need to be tied and a separate dumpster will be available for those items. These procedures will begin in the new year.

There is a small increase in the price of garbage bags. As in the past, the bags must be purchased from the town. Four large bags will cost \$5.00, eight small bags sell for \$5.00.

Residents are reminded to sign the book available at the disposal site. Signatures of those using the site are needed in order for the town to be eligible for recycling grant money.

Hours of operation are

also being altered beginning on January 6, 2001. The site will be open from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on alternating Saturdays. The summer hours will be weekly from May 1 to October 31.

The public hearing also brought comments from the citizens. It seemed to be the consensus of the group that the operation of the Hilltop was costing too much. During 2000, the town experienced \$4,000 in income while spending \$10,010.

Wixom asked, "Are we (the town) in governing or are we in real estate?" His question went unanswered.

The town is in it's second year of a three year agreement to operate the Hilltop in an effort to make it a profitable "Community Center." Negotiations are currently underway to some activity involving the WMCA and Supervisor Robert Gluck reports that reservations for weddings and other events have steadily been increasing.

Many who attended the hearing felt that the best scenario would be to have it taken over by private enterprise, leaving the town out of it.



At the present time, supervisors' salaries are not equal. This comes about because state statutes do not allow an increase in pay unless it is set up prior to taking out nomination papers. Nomination papers can be circulated after December 1 of each election year. With this in mind, a motion was passed to give a 3-1/2% salary increase across the board, in April of 2002, so that all salaries of supervisors will be the same.

Another change for the town will be the garbage and recycling activities. The cost of curbside pickup has been investigated. It was

Having a Defibulator at school events may be the only difference between life and death in those precious minutes between a heart attack and the time rescue personnel arrive on the

scene.

Any club, organization, or individual wishing to make a donation to the high school for the Defibrillator can contact the school district at 626-8427. Since the school district is a not for profit entity, individuals and businesses could take advantage of the tax advantages a donation would provide. Mr. Graczyk's extension is 8006 and Mr. Ganka's is 4132. KEYS to Administer \$55,700 In Scholarships in May; Two Added

The Board of Directors of Kewaskum Youth Scholarships, Inc. has announced that 15 scholarships totaling \$55,700 will be awarded to the Kewaskum High School Class of 2001 by KEYS.

One of the new scholarships will be the John "Spike" Schmitt Memorial Ride Scholarship worth a total of \$4,000 or \$2,000 (\$1,000 a year for four years or two years depending on the type of school). The other new scholarship is the McCarty William L. Memorial Scholarship worth \$1,000. The following is a listing of the amount and number of each kind of scholarship.

The Tessar Scholarship is a four-year college scholarship worth a total of \$16,000 (\$4,000 a year for four years) and is being offered for the second time in the spring of 2001. Two four-year college scholarships, each worth a total of \$10,000 (\$2,500 a year for four years) are also being administered by KEYS.

One of these \$10,000 scholarships is provided by the KEYS scholarship fund, and the other is provided by the Oscar C. and Augusta Schlegel Foundation. A four year KEYS scholarship worth \$4,000 (\$1,000 a year for four years) will be awarded for the fourth time this spring.

Two \$2,000 KEYS College or Technical College Scholarships (\$1,000 per year for two years) will also be awarded. The Barbara York College Scholarship worth \$1,200 will also be awarded for the eighth time this year.

Three additional memorial scholarships of \$1,000 each will also be awarded this year: the Ann-Marie Horner Memorial Scholarship will be presented for the 12th time; the Evelyn Joyce Gruber Memorial Scholar-ship will be presented for the ninth time, and the Michael H. Strelka Memorial Scholarship that was re-established in 1999 will be presented for the third time. The Kevin Joseph Neese Memorial

Scholarship of \$500 will also be awarded for the third time in the spring of 2000.

A KEYS \$1,000 College or Technical College Scholarship will be presented along with a \$1,000 KEYS Technical Scholarship.

The \$55,700 in scholarships to be awarded in the spring of 2001, brings the total amount awarded by KEYS to \$379,700 since 1986! The KEYS organizations wishes to thank the alumni, businesses, organizations, and community members for their generous donations which make these scholarships possible. 

At the library we often put an emphasis on reading because books are our business, but I also believe that within every reader is a writer who just needs the right invitation to pick up a pen and start writing. Three such invitations have recently been made available to me and I would like, in turn, to make them available to you.

The National Story Project was born in the mind of writer Paul Auster who "wanted to tell other people's stories and not just [his] own." He was offered time on National Public Radio's Weekend All Things Considered, so on the first Saturday of every month Mr. Auster reads a few short narratives sent in by listeners. They range from emotional coming-of-age stories to mysterious twists of fate to humorous reminiscences.

The National Story Project is more than a fifteen minutes of fame for the people involved, it is an archive of personal histories and true-life anecdotes that would otherwise have been forgotten. Like the old field recordings of Alan Lomax, Auster's project is a way of harnessing modern technology to save a piece of the past. 



VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM NEWS NOTES "Snow and Ice Removal

The snow and ice season has arrived bringing along some problems. To alleviate these problems or to clarify a few items, let us refer to the Municipal Code, Chapter 82.6, which covers "Snow and Ice Removal."

SIDEWALKS TO BE KEPT CLEAR. The owner or (a) occupant of any lot or lands within the village abutting upon a public street along the line of which a sidewalk shall have been constructed shall, whenever such sidewalk shall be encumbered with snow or ice, clear the same therefrom within 24 hours after cessation of each storm. If it is impossible or impractical to remove the ice therefrom, he shall treat the same with sand, cinders, ashes, salt or some other substance continuously until removed so that such sidewalk will not be slippery or dangerous to pedestrians. If any such owner of occupant fails to remove such snow or ice from such sidewalk or to treat such ice, the director of public works may do so; and the expense of such removal or treatment shall become a special tax or charge against the property to be collected in the manner specified in subsection (c). If the director of public works orders such removal of snow and ice, a minimum charge of \$25.00 per occurrence shall be affixed as the expense of the removal or treatment. If the cost of removal or treatment exceeds the \$25.00 minimum, the actual cost for such work shall be charged plus a ten percent handling charge.

SNOW NOT TO BE DEPOSITED IN STREETS. No (b) person shall cause to be deposited snow from his premises on the sidewalk abutting thereon onto any street in the village without a permit from the director of public works, who may require to be paid a fee sufficient to reimburse the village for the cost of removal of the snow. The expense of such removal or treatment shall become a special tax or charge against the property to be collected in the manner specified in subsection (c).

Assessment of cost. After clearing or treating any such (c) sidewalk as provided in this section, the director of public works shall file with the village clerk/treasurer a written report containing a description of such lot or tract charged and the amount of the expense chargeable to the same. The clerk/treasurer shall thereupon make out and mail to the owner of such lot or tract at his last known address an itemized statement of the cost; and, when paid, the amount so paid shall be credited to the village general fund. If the same is not paid within 30 days, it shall bear interest at the rate of six percent per annum from the date on which the work was completed. If any such bill shall remain unpaid on October 1 next following the clearing or treating of the sidewalk, the village clerk/treasurer shall insert such charge in the general tax roll of the village and the same proceedings shall be had thereafter for the collection of such taxes as in cases of other taxes extended upon such roll.



Merging Parishes Receive New Name

Milwaukee -- Milwaukee Archbishop Rembert G. Weakland, O.S.B., has issued the name "Shepherd of the Hills" for the new parish being formed from the merger of three parishes in Armstrong, Dotyville and Eden in Fond du Lac County.

The parishes involved are Our Lady of Angels, Armstrong; St. Michael, Dotyville; and St. Mary, Eden. The parishes will merge on January 1, 2001. The merger is a result of an on-going parish planning initiative that began in the 10-county Archdiocese of Milwaukee in the late 1980's. The parish planning process resulted in recommendations for many parishes throughout southeastern Wisconsin to work more closely together or directed parishes to merge.

Although the parish planning directives issued by Archbishop Weakland in November 1997 did not call for these parishes to merge, the leadership of the three parishes asked the archbishop for permission to merge, which he approved. Each church will remain open and Sunday Mass will

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
