Family Dollar to Open Store Here

Details of the opening of a Family Dollar thrift store are sketchy right now but the North Carolina based company says they plan on the store opening early in 2001.

"We hope to have the store opening in February but that we don't know for sure." said Cindy Green, a company spokesperson.

The store is planned to open in the Kewaskum Mall, which is owned local-

Construction to remodel the store is underway now.

Family Dollar's neighbor, Video Plus moved into the Kewaskum Mall in November. The mall also houses offices for Kettle Moraine Agency and Aurora Pharmacy.

The south end of mall became somewhat vacant after the construction of Geidel's Piggly Wiggly.

Family Dollar Stores Inc. operates a chain of self-service retail discount stores.

As of November 1, 1999, there were 3,371 stores in 39 states and the District of Columbia. The stores offer a variety of merchandise including men's, women's, boys', girls' and infants' clothing, shoes, domestics, household products, health and beauty aids, toys, school supplies, candy, snack and

other food items, electronics, housewares, giftware, paint, automotive supplies and seasonal goods.

In November the company's headquarters reported opening 47 new stores during the four-week period which ended November 25, 2000.

The Company has announced plans to open approximately 400 to 425 stores and close approximately 50 stores during the upcoming year.

The typical store has approximately 6,000 to 8,000 square feet of retail

As of November 1, 1999, there were approximately 1,700 stores located in communities with populations of less than 15,000, approximately 680 stores in communities with populations of 15,000 to 50,000, and approximately 991 stores in communities with populations of over 50,000. All stores are similar in appearance and display highly visible red and white "Family Dollar Stores" or "Family Dollar" signs.

The company's stores are operated on a self-service, cash-and-carry basis, and low overhead permits the sale of merchandise at a relatively moderate markup.

Most of the stores are open six evenings a week,

and many are open on Sunday afternoons.

Family Dollar does not accept credit cards or extend credit.

The Company purchases its merchandise from approximately 1, 825 suppli-

ers and generally has not experienced difficulty in obtaining adequate quantities of merchandise.

Approximately 55% of the merchandise is manufactured in the United States, and substantially all such merchandise is purchased directly from the manufacturer. Purchases of imported merchandise are made directly from the manufacturer or from importers.

Most merchandise is priced under \$10.00.

Family Dollar is headquartered in Matthews, North Carolina, just outside of Charlotte, and operates automated full-service distribution centers in Matthews, West Memphis, Arkansas; Warren County, Virginia; and Duncan, Oklahoma.

The Company has been a publicly held corporation since 1970.

Family Dollar, Inc. owns nine stores in the Milwaukee area and one in Oshkosh and Waupun.

Town of Kewaskum Postpones Land Annexation

The Town of Kewaskum Plan commission and town board met Monday to discuss the annexation to the village of Kewaskum property owned by Dr. Charles Ogi and James Reigle in section nine and 16 of the town.

West Bend attorney William Hickman was present to represent property owners around the property who oppose the annexation.

Hickman stated that property owners were misled in signing a petition for annexation and he asked the plan commission not to give the plan a favorable recommendation.

Chairman Scott Sager stated he thought it was best if the commission posponed any action pending further discussion.

In other business, Dan Troug of Coldwell Banker Realty, West Bend presented a concept plan for a 60 acre parcel on East Moraine Drive in section three of the town.

The plan called for a cul-desac to come off of East Moraine for the 11 proposed lots.

Troug was told that the plan

was somewhat vague and that they needed soil borings before they could give approval on any such project.

"As a realtor, I see a need for this in the community." said Troug.

Plan commission member Glenn Hartmann thought they needed to see if the road would be able to handle an additional 25-30 cars from the potential 11 lots.

Troug asked to be heard again at the January meeting.

The town board approved the raising of building permit fees for the first time in 15 years. Inspection fees were \$15 and after Monday's meeting they were raised to \$50.

The date for the town caucus was set for Wednesday evening, January 17 at 7 p.m. at the town hall.



LIBRARY LEDGER

Growing up, my family presaged the unwrapping of presents with a telling of the story of the first Christmas. We would all gather around my mom as she read from a picture book the story of Mary and Joseph, their journey to Bethlehem, the birth of Jesus, and the subsequent visits by shepherds, magi, and the rest. Of course, my siblings and I would already have our presents stacked up in neat, brightly-colored piles. We hovered over the packages like guardian angels until the last sentence of the familiar story when we would make our noisy descents, tearing paper into confetti and revealing what Santa Claus had left for us that year.

For some reason unknown to me even today, there was an unspoken yet magical belief that Santa had indeed come sometime during the night. This belief was certainly not endorsed or encouraged by my parents who never tried to convince us that Santa was anything other than an fun story. Even so, I can remember my Dad decked in an old red and white coat, a cottony beard, and stuffed with pillows to hand out presents on Christmas Eve gatherings with my relatives. And it was always a curious ritual to perch on Santas knee, nod our heads hesitantly when asked if wed been good, and tell him what we wanted to see under the tree on Christmas morning. It was as though we knew that Santa could not or should

not exist, but the temptation was to believe was too strong to withstand, it pulled at your brain like spiced cider steaming on the Film and theater critics

often call this feeling the willing suspension of disbelief. Its the idea that you know what youre experiencing is not real, but you make the choice to believe in it for a little while. This same process happens in reading a novel, short story, or other piece of fiction. Every time we sit down to read the new Grisham, King, or Rowling, we very deliberately set aside our notion of reality get emotionally involved with the characters and the plot. Thats what fiction is all about, it helps us to escape and entertains us just enough to keep us sane.I recently reread the editorial that insists famously Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus and was taken aback by the seriousness of the writers tone. He rambles on at length about the spirit of giving and of the lack of faith in the modern world. Santa Claus is an American myth that continues to survive while folk heroes like John Henry, Paul Bunyan, and Pecos Bill are relegated to the history books. In this sense, he is very much alive and real but not in a fleshand-blood way. Santas power fades shortly after the last candle is doused on Christmas night and is gone by the time the tree comes down. In mid-July, Santa Claus is as forgotten as the

ice that precedes him. Even so, something thrilling happens when the snow starts to fall again and Santa is reborn. Its the same thrilling something that happens when we read a good book and discover the frost-bitten crispness of believing the unbelievable.



- 1 pkg. Pepperidge Farm* Frozen Puff **Pastry Sheets** (2 sheets)



Eleven New Homes Built In Town of Scott in 2000

Town of Scott Building Inspector Frank Mayer reported 11 new homes were built during the year 2000, with a value of \$2,024,449, with three of these being built during November.

A permit issued to Glen Karas nearly two years ago, is about to expire. He has requested an extension on the permit. Ms. Karas explained that the builder is not responding and she realizes that it is taking too long and that the home should have been on the foundation during the summer of 1999.

The Karas house was moved to the town in the fall of 1998. A permit was obtained in December, 1998, part of the foundation wall was begun, and then no further progress was made. Karas has been confronted by Mayer, but nothing has been accomplished.

To add to the problem, Karas has allowed friends to drop off used cars and other objectionable materials. The board all agreed that unless some activity takes place prior to December 26, the permit will not be extended and in the mean time, Mayer will contact the builder for knowledge of his plans for the Karas project.

A zoning change from P-2 to B-1 was requested for an .85 acre parcel owned by Daniel Wiebelhaus located in Section 16 in Beechwood. This is the site of the former Beechwood Fire Hall. The zoning change will allow Wiebelhaus to operate a retail mail order business for sporting goods.

Wiebelhaus was also granted a conditional use permit for his business. Conditions include that parking is not to obstruct area traffic, there will be no walk-in sales for the public, and all material must be stored inside.

Agreements were made to provide services to the town for the coming year with the Beechwood Fire Department, Batavia Fire Department and Batavia First Responders.

Poll workers for 2001-2002 will be Alice Harter, Reuben Harter, Russell Melius, Ms. Melius, Adeline Held, Janet Kumrow, Lynes Fellenz and Marion Fellenz.

Residents who take advantage of the recycling center are reminded that it is essential that they sign their names in a book provided by the attendant. These signatures are needed to keep the town eligible for recycling grant monies.

Tax collection dates for Scott property owners will be the last Friday and Saturday in December, 2000, and the last Saturday and January 31 in 2001.

Village of Kewaskum **NEWS NOTES**

The Village of Kewaskum's **Snow Emergency Response**

FACTS: The Village has four pieces of equipment used for snow removal. Three dump trucks with snow plows and the front end loader with a bucket blade. Totally the Village maintains an estimated 12 miles of streets, plus the two parking lanes on both Main Street (STH 28) and Fond du Lac Avenue (USH 45) equalling another estimated two miles of

The normal street requires four passes to be made by the snowplow. To achieve the fastest and most effective snow removal process the Village is broken down into basically three areas. The three areas are as follows:

I. The southwestern portion of the Village and south central portion of the Village.

II. The north central portion and the eastern portion of the Village.

III. The western portion of the Village.

Each snowplow covers their designated area and on an average snow removal makes an estimated 29 miles. It should be noted that certain areas can not be cleaned with a snowplow, so the front end loader covers those situations in all areas. Some of those areas are specific intersections, cul de sacs and alleys.

The systematic routine is for the removal of snow from street, firehouse/municipal building, alleys, municipal parking lots/utilities and municipal sidewalks. This is then followed up by any snow removal and hauling, which again is handled in a systematic manner.

The Department of Public Works trys hard not to discharge anymore snow than mandated by the storm in anyone's driveway. The Department of Public Works also tries hard not to do damage to any personal property. It should be noted, however, the Department of Public Works is not responsible for the removal of snow to provide adequate access for mail delivery by shoveling or plowing out any mail box or cluster mail box.

Private contractors are requested to remove snow in a safe manner, not depositing the snow from one property onto another or on the street. No person shall cause to be deposited snow from his premises or sidewalk abutting thereon onto any street in the Village without a permit from the Superintendent of Public Works, who may require to be paid a fee sufficient to reimburse the Village for the cost of removal of such snow.

As for such ordinance of the Kewaskum Municipal Code Chapter 82-6 and all ordinances, a penalty is also provided for in Chapter 25.04 of this Municipal Code.

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

Regular Meeting November 6, 2000 8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President John Kenworthy presided. All other Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the October 16, 2000 meeting were approved as printed.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel presented the October report:

Fire calls 6 Year to date 29 Jaws calls 2 Year to date 18 Rescue calls 27 Miles 440

Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel reported that the new Officer was on his own as of November 6, 2000.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles reported as follows:

1) The PSC has notified the Water Utility that it is being moved from a Class D to a Class C Utility. This means a different type of accountability is needed and that more paper work will be mandated.

 The wood chipping is wrapped up for this year and the leaf collection will wrap up by the week of November 13, 2000.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the following with the Board:

1) Review of League and Taxpayer bulletins.

2) Reported on the latest developments regarding the Malt House clean up. It was noted the EPA is still working with the Madison Office of DNR to allow for the reasonable clean up of the site, but that the negotiations with the Milwaukee DNR Office is rejecting such actions at this point. The Madison DNR is hopeful something can be worked out. Word on this should be received within two or three weeks.

On a motion by Trustee Harry Roecker, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the payment of bills as recommended by the Administrative Committee. The total of all claims as recommended are as follows:

General 133,260.89 Sewer 55,033.26 A/P Ck. #17828 - #17949

Library Fund 2,742.86 Payroll 35,650.83 P/R Ck. #10189 - #10245

Water Fund 46,690.87 TOTAL 273,378.71

Chairman of the Protection & Public Safety Committee, Trustee Harry Roecker reported on the committee meeting held November 6, 2000 to review 2001 budget information for the Police Department. It was noted the Committee did recommend the placement of two stop signs and directional arrows and two way traffic signs on Edgewood Road in Old Glory Subdivision.

On a motion by Trustee Larry Ammèl, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and unanimously carried by voice vote the Board directed that one stop sign be installed at the intersection of Edgewood Road and Jefferson Drive. The second stop sign to be installed is at the intersection of CTH "H" and Edgewood Road. The additional two way directional and arrows are to be installed on Edgewood Road.

Chairman of the Public Works Committee, Trustee Larry Ammel reported on the committee meeting held on November 6, 2000 to review budget information for the Department of Public Works.

Trustee Andy Pesch, the Plan Commission Board Representative, reported a Plan Commission meeting was held October 31, 2000 and Mr. Rick Kania was present to discuss Chapter 4 of the zoning ordinance. Mr. Robert Wagner was present to share information with the Commission regarding the storage of recreational vehicles. It was noted that topic would be a separate agenda item for the meeting of November 28, 2000.

Trustee John Kenworthy, the Library Board Representative, informed the Board that the Library Board has reviewed and prepared a proposed Library Budget for 2001. It was reviewed indicating the tax levy for that portion needed by the Library was increased by \$8,851 or + 14.2%. In related information it was noted the budget actually was reduced by \$2,189 or - 2.0%, because of the loss of county library funds.

Administrator Daniel Schmidt reviewed the status of the USH "45" project and the timing being 2003 & 2004. The reconstruction of CTH "S" / Riverview Drive in 2004 and the resurfacing of STH "28 / Fond du Lac Avenue in 2005 were also discussed. It was also noted that the sale of the RR ROW was on hold until a passenger train study would be completed. (Estimated time frame would be two years.)

Administrator Daniel Schmidt explained what and how the budget proposal that was prepared ended up reflecting the dollars indicated. The difference between revenue and expenditures was discussed and several alternatives how to reduce the separation were discussed. It was agreed by consensus that dollars be moved from the open space fund in the amount of \$17,500 to cover the \$3,500 budgeted for the KKCP toilet facility seed money, \$5,000 budgeted for the KKCP water apparatus seed money and \$9,000 budgeted for the KKCP and RHP picnic table purchase. Also that a total of \$25,575 would be moved to the revenue side of the budget from the designated fund from the following accounts \$23,489 from interest earned for levy relief, \$856 from the refuse account for garbage receptacles.

Following the aforementioned, the adjustment in revenue, the difference between revenues and expenditures is \$204,937 which would equal an increase of \$1.61 or + 25.7%. Several cuts were suggested such as:

 Splitting the Memorial Drive street project to a two year project, a savings of \$44,000.

2) Removing \$10,000 from Civil Defense leaving only \$2,575 for the purchase and installation of a new siren on the SW side of the Village. This will postpone said purchase.

3) Removal of the two, or three year purchase of a new dump truck/snow plow. A savings of \$50,000.

4) Removal and postponement of the hiring of a new 2/3 DPW employee for only 2/3 of 2001. A cost savings of \$17,395 on the general fund and a \$8,737 savings on the water utility.

5) reducing the amount of money on five outlay accounts to go towards the USH "45" project in 2003/2004. A savings of \$5,241.

The above actions lower the difference to an increase of \$78,593. Using the increase of village growth and the noted increase, the levy for the general fund would increase \$90,651 or 12.8%. This would equate out to a total tax rate of \$6.819219 or an increase of \$.61428 or +9.899%. It was so noted that looking at the overall tax rate for the village and all other entities would equal a gross rate of \$24.635493 or an increase of .112385 or 0.4583%. It was noted the tax credit information is not available to project the net tax rate.

Several other alternatives were discussed as to additional cuts. It was noted by several Board Members that the budget is very tight with no extra funds and it was further noted that if further cuts were imposed it would compound the problem in future years as did tight budgets of the past. On a motion by Trustee Harry Roecker, seconded by Trustee Mathew Heiser and unanimously carried by voice vote the Board directed the administrator and staff to prepare the public hearing notice reflecting the above information. The Public Hearing is scheduled for November 27, 2000 at 7:00 p.m.

A review of the Debt Service Fund, Special Revenue Fund, Library Fund, Water Department and Water Pollution Control budgets took place with several adjustments. On a motion by Trustee Harry Roecker, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board directed the information reviewed be included with the public hearing notice.

On a motion by Trustee Larry Ammel, seconded by Trustee Mathew Heiser and unanimously carried by voice vote the Board approved the Village Board meeting schedule for December 2000 and January 2001 as reviewed along with the December/January holiday schedule for the office and all employees.

A brief discussion took place regarding the park reservation fees, rules and community room rules as previously discussed and reviewed at an earlier Village Board meeting. On a motion by Trustee Larry Ammel, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the new fees and rules for the parks and community room, to take effect January 1, 2001.

On a motion by Trustee Robert

Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the names submitted as Election Inspectors by the Republican Party for 2001/2002.

On a motion by Trustee Andy Pesch, seconded by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the names submitted as Election Inspectors by the Democratic Party for 2001/2002.

The Administrator reviewed the Board of Canvassers to assist him, they are Janet Knops and Jerry Gilles. On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the appointments of the Administrator to the Board of Canvassers.

Motion by Trustee Larry Ammel seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and carried by the majority roll call vote, to adjourn. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent."

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

Over 16,000 Antlerless Deer Taken **During Special December Hunt**

MADISON - According to a preliminary survey of the state's deer registration stations, 16,614 deer were harvested in the Zone T antlerless deer hunt held December 7-10.

"We saw excellent weather for deer hunting across most of the state for the duration of this four-day hunt. There was sufficient snow cover, which aids in visibility and tracking and temperatures were cold, but not so cold that hunters should have been uncomfortable," said Bill Mytton, Department of Natural Resources deer and bear ecologist.

"We expected the total number of deer taken in this hunt to be much less than the 67,389 deer taken during the similar hunt held in October," Mytton said. There was likely decreased hunter enthusiasm after many other deer hunting opportunities, and there was reduced deer numbers after more than 575,000 animals were taken in other seasons. However, the late season harvest of 16,614 is better than expected and will definitely help us in reaching a new record harvest in the vicinity of 600,000 deer."

Almost three-fourths of the state was included in an effort to help slow the growth of Wisconsin's rapidly expanding white-tailed deer herd, estimated at 1.7 million animals entering this fall. Wisconsin has extended gun deer hunting several times over the last decade to control high populations in farmland deer management units. This year, 86 of Wisconsin's 132 deer management units were included in the early and late antlerless gun hunts and for the first time some central and northern

forest units are included.


A deer management unit is considered for inclusion in the hunt if wildlife managers determine that the traditional nine-day November gun hunt is unlikely to bring the unit to within 20% of its legally mandated population level.

Also new for this year is a greatly expanded venison donation program. Through the program hunters can donate venison to state food pantries by simply registering a deer and dropping it off at one of over 150 participating meat processors. There is no cost to the hunter for processing the meat. As word of the expanded program spreads, more and more organizations have contacted the DNR to ask how they can get involved in the distribution of venison to food pantries. Processors will be accepting whole deer donations until the end of December.









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
