Why Not More **Discussion About Ritalin**

With the Legislature not currently collectively in session my time is spent developing legislative initiatives for January. I am fortunate enough to head a committee on the use of prescription drugs for children -particularly Ritalin. Testimony at our first two hearings was very informative and quite frankly shocking.

production Ritalin increased 700% from 1990 to 1997. Amphetamine production, also related to the of ADHD treatment increased 3,754% from 1993 to 1999 and 65% in one year from 1998 to 1999. Professor Bill Frankenberger from University of Wisconsin at Eau Claire has spent the last 14 years studying the use of these drugs in depth.

From 1990 to the late 1990's the number of children in emotionally disturbed classes using stimulants increased from 8% to 40%, in LD classes from 5% to 16%, and among general education from 1.5% to 5% in the state of Wisconsin. This is despite the fact that helping professionals in schools increased the number of children labeled as special needs at 3% per year.

Shockingly, the use of drugs seems to have hurt children on Ritalin compared to those whose families in similar situations who decided not to use Ritalin on standardized achievement tests relating to mathematics and reading comprehension. This decline was shown as children progressed from first to fifth grades.



WINTER PARKING

The Winter Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions go into effect on December 1, 2000.

Municipal Code Section 90-96 Night Parking Restrictions, reads as follows: Signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wisconsin Statutes, no person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December 1, to A pril 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions v hicles may be parked a period of time not longer than 3 minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further tha no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner v plated thereby.

The fine for violating the ordin ance is:


\$5.00 if paid within three (3) days of the issuance of the parking citation.

\$10.00 if paid after ten (10) days but before 28 days.


After 28 days, the amount is \$20.00 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend your vehicle registrations and refuse renewals until the citation is satisfied.

An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation whether or not he or she was the operator.

Municipal Code Section 90-96 Removal of Illegally Parked Vehicles. This section covers the issuance of citations to and possible removal of such vehicles in violation of this ordinance. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 90-65 of this code, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of the towing and storage.



The couple chartered trips to Nashville, Brewer Games (including opening day trips), horseshoe, dart, and pool tournaments, the famous Tiddley Winks tournaments. They also sponsored pool, baseball and bowling teams. They hosted St. Patrick's Day parties for the Threshold benefit for 19 years and donated over one hundred thousand dollars in that time. They sold "Green Pig Tickets" and afghan rafP fles at the in-house raffles and gave part of the bar proceeds to the Threshold. They also sold 500 to 600 pounds of home cured corned beef and prepared it the same

day. Joe was a member and past president (1984) of the Slinger Allenton Rotary Club, a charter member and member for over 36 years of the Town of Polk Planning Commission, a member of the American Legion Post #486 of Jackson and the Zunker-Held VFW Post #3358 of Slinger for over 50 years, West Bend Moose Lodge #1398 member for 49 years, Washington County Tavern League Association for over 50 years.



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Village Board **Meeting Minutes**

Public Hearing Meeting November 27, 2000 7:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Special Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President John Kenworthy presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the November 20, 2000 were approved as printed.

The public hearing was held on the proposed budget for 2001 as noticed in the November 9, & November 16, 2000 Kewaskum Statesman. It was noted two reporters were present as well as one resident. Administrator Daniel Schmidt informed the Village Board of the incorrect figures within the West Bend Daily News article on the Villages budget. A review of both the revenues and expenditures were gone over by the Administrator with questions being asked and answered. The budget as proposed and heard, would equal a general budget increase of 6.4% or \$115,075. The tax levy as discussed would equal an increase of \$99,502 or 12.8% partially caused from the real growth within the Village and a decrease in state shared revenue. The Village tax rate also reflects an increase of 61.4e or 9.9% per \$1,000 assessed value. The Village's rate as proposed would equal \$6.82 per \$1,000 assessed value. The net tax rate would be \$22.70, an increase of \$.11 or .486%. Several other vital tax facts were reviewed in conjunction with the proposed budget. On a motion by Trustee Harry Roecker, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent".

The public hearing was held on the proposed Library Fund, Debt Service Fund and Special Revenue Fund budgets for 2001. A review of the funds revealed no major changes on the accounts. On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Andy Pesch and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent".

The public hearing was held on the proposed Water Department budget for 2001. The Board reviewed me budget and it was noted the utility was meeting the PSC's requirement in reference to a rate of return. A rate adjustment is again needed at this time to provide the rate of return as required by the PSC. On a motion by Trustee Larry Ammel, seconded by Trustee Mathew Heiser and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent"

The public hearing was held on the proposed Water Pollution Control Department budget for 2001. The Board reviewed the budget and noted that the engineering work for Main Street and Riverview Drive will start in 2001. The expenses associated with this project are to be capitalized and not part of the utilities operating budgets. It was noted that the revenues and expenditures did not balance and is suggested that a rate adjustment will be needed in 2001. Snowmobiling **On Ice Is** Dangerous

MADISON - A Grafton snowmobiler who died after breaking through ice on the Milwaukee River has state conservation wardens issuing this stern warning: If you are going to snowmobile on ice, know the conditions before you go.

"I'll never tell anyone it's safe to ride on ice, especially on a river or near a dam," says Department of Natural snowmobile Resources administrator Karl Brooks. "Due to the current, conditions can change very quickly. You might see eight inches of ice in one area, and just a few feet away there might be an inch or less.'

According to reports, the Grafton man died December 10 after his snowmobile plunged through ice near a dam. Brooks said the accident illustrates the dangers of riding on newly frozen rivers. "Rivers near dams are one of the last areas to freeze because of the swift current."

Brooks added that recent weather conditions make conditions very dangerous right now for riding on any ice. "The early blanket of snow we got is acting as an insulator, so the cold cannot penetrate the water as well."

Brooks said a particular concern right now is snowmobilers heading out at night. "When you're riding at night, it's almost impossi-

ble to see open water, especially if you're driving above the speed limit (the DNR recently established a 50 mph nighttime speed limit). When the wind is calm, open water just looks like black ice. Once you realize it's open water, it's too late. Therefore it's imperative that you know conditions before you head out. Snowmobiling in unfamiliar territory is asking for trouble. Even better advice is to stay off ice altogether."

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






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
