New Thermal Imaging Camera to Be Featured at Open House Here Saturday

The Kewaskum Fire Department invites everyone to their fire station Saturday, March 17, for a Community Appreciation Open House from 4 to 9

The Kewaskum firefighters will be preparing and serving their favorite soup and chili recipes for you to try, along with green St. Paddy's Day refreshments. Music will be provided by Jimmer's Jukebox.

The fire department has been busy raising funds for their new state-of-the-art thermal imaging camera that was recently purchased and the open house is their way of thanking the community for all the donations they received toward the

They will be featuring their newest acquisition at the open house and demonstrating some of the advantages this new tool will add to their fire fighting capabilities.

The thermal imaging camera's technology gives firemen the ability to see through the dense smoke to search the burning building for the source of the fire so

that it can be extinguished with minimal water damage to the building and risk to the firefighter.

Besides delivering the exact seat of the fire, the camera also allows the user to make sure all aspects of the fire are totally extinguished and no hot spots are allowed to recur.

The camera can also be used to detect victims so the firefighter can see their precise location before entering the burning building, adding to the survival chances of the victim and again, minimizing the risk to the fireman.

Additionally the camera features the capability to videotape so the department can use it for training purposes and reviewing the

The camera unit comes from a company named Bullard in Cynthiana, Kentucky. The company has been in operation for over 100 years and is dedicated to worker safety and strate-

The company was founded in 1898 by Edward Bullard in California as a mine supply business, designing a new protective helmet for miners. They later produced and supplied air respirators to protect workers on the construction of the Golden Gate Bridge. Their respiratory protection grew substantially over the years to shield workers in a wide variety of hazardous work environments.

In 1998, already a recognized leader in the fire safety products market, Bullard launched its first thermal imaging camera, another product capable of saving human lives.

Bullard found there were many benefits of using the thermal imaging camera. The biggest tactical advantage is the ability to locate the source of the fire quicker, monitor the changes in thermal conditions, and be able to account for all the firefighters.

Accountability is a major concern in the fire service today. Most departments have accountability systems, whether it's a tag placed on the rig, or a riding list that an officer carries. In retrospect, those are passive types, which don't tell

anything.

If something happens to an individual firefighter, or you have a catastrophic fire where the building collapses, or if fire conditions deteriorate rapidly and you need a head count, you have to go back to the rig and get the accountability list or

A thermal imager operating inside that fire building provides a more proactive accountability. You are monitoring the firefighters where they are operating. If a member goes down, there is someone inside with visual accountability.

As departments are changing from an aggressive interior operation to a defensive attack, they back out of the building. If the last person out is the one with the thermal imager, it might prevent that one firefighter from making a wrong turn and heading the wrong way. These are the types of things that a thermal imager can provide when operating inside the building.

The basic concept of infrared imaging is that there has to be thermal contrast. If there is no contrast, the thermal imager is not going to work. You wouldn't take a thermal imager into a cave, for everything is the same temperature.

Objects with different masses and densities absorb and give off energy at different rates. That's what gives contrast. The more contrast there is, the better the thermal imager is going to work. Thermal imagers like heat, for that's when they perform their best.

The firefighter will look for changes in thermal contrast. Depending on the object, he will get more definition in the image he is

The firefighter will see it before he will feel it. If he pulls up to a 40-foot ranch house at 2 a.m. and fire is blowing out the front bedroom windows, that's not much for the firemen. One line in operation, down the hallway, a room and contents, and the fire is going

If the firefighter would go to the house next door, the very next night, it might be the same 40-foot ranch, but it is puffing ugly black smoke out of every nook and cranny. It is not the same fire that happened the night before. Firefighters don't have that visual indicator as to where the fire is. It might be in the same bedroom.

With the thermal imager, the operator has to look up at the ceiling to get an idea of the thermal conditions. He or she is going to see the convected gases moving. If the convected gases are moving toward him or her, it could mean the fire is in front of the operator.

As he/she lowers the thermal imager down and takes a look, they are going to see the greatest thermal contrast leading back to the room where the seat of the fire probably is. Day in and day out, that's what the thermal imager is going to do for firefighters.

Another advantage of the thermal imaging camera is nen there bility in a burning building.

KES 'On Schedule', Plans for **Administration Building Starting**

The Kewaskum School Board heard information from the District's business manager Paul Reichert on the progress of Kewaskum Elementary School Monday night at the monthly school board meeting held in the KHS Library.

In his monthly update he

■ The exterior brick work should be completed by the end of this month.

Crews have begun installing windows.

· Ceramic tiling in the bathrooms and around water fountains should be completed by week's end.

 Cabinets have been shipped and are on site. Carpentry crews have been installing the cabinets for two weeks and have most of the first floor cabinets installed.

■ Installation of the acoustical ceiling began on the north end of the first floor. Installers will complete the first floor instructional and office areas then move to the second floor.

■ The lighting, fans, basketball backboards and curtain wall divider have been installed in the gym.

■ The first floor is completely painted.

Community members will be invited to walk through the building and see the construction progress between the hours of 1 and 3 p.m. on Sunday,

Reichert also told the board that they have been looking at architects drawings for the new administration building.

Taxpayers approved the new administration building in a package deal with the elementary school.

The building is estimated to cost \$350,000.

Reichert asked the board for their input on how to design the community/board room. Plans were handed out and this will be discussed at a later meeting.

The community/board room is scheduled to have a kitchenette and separate restroom. It will also feature a separate entrance and be sealed off from the administration offices.

The building is to be erected on the parking lot across from the current administration building. This would close off the one way School Street.

Another complication that could arise is the buried fiber optic lines in the parking lot. The depth of the buried fiber optic lines has to be determined. If they are too close to the surface, the building will not be able to be built over the lines. If the lines are 36 inches below the surface, as shown on the telephone company's map, the building can be constructed over the fiber optic lines.

This tool is going to give them their eyesight back. In the past, that couch or bed was not there until they could actually touch them. Now they will have visual indicators.

There are many other potential uses for the thermal imager. The firefighter is limited only by their own imagination. Thermal imaging has been in the fire service since the 1980s. It wasn't until after being trained that the full potential was understood. Other uses include outdoor search, hazardous material incidents and overhauling.

While overhauling a fire room, the entire room will look white. There are no guarantees. The firefighter looks for the spots in the camera display that are whiter. The thermal imager will help to prevent rekindles, but it doesn't replace the hook.

The thermal imager is a quick way to get an idea of fire extension and travel but the thermal imager doesn't replace sound overhauling procedures. The thermal imager isn't the answer to manpower problems. It is just another tool.

The thermal imager can also be used to complete a secondary search. The thermal imager is not the answer to do a thorough secondary search. Firefighters still have to get down on their hands and knees and have to go through the debris and get down to the floor.

The weight of the camera is 5.75 pounds and it has a height of 12", length of 10" and width of 6". It can withstand temperatures of 650 degrees for five minutes. The operating time is one and a half hours with battery life of 1,000 charge cycles.

Images from the camera can be transmitted to a television screen which will be placed inside the fire department's equipment truck. The images can also be recorded on a VHS tape and viewed later.

To see this amazing technology purchased by our fire department with funds that the community has donated, be sure to stop at the fire station Saturday between 4 and 9 p.m. Not only will you be able to see the thermal

imaging camera, you will find our firefighters are multi-talented as you sample the soup they have prepared in appreciation for all the donations made toward this camera, the latest tool our firefighters have acquired to help them help us.

National Guard to Build New Helicopter Facility in West Bend

The Wisconsin Army National Guard broke ground for a new Army Aviation Support Facility (AASF) at the West Bend airport Friday, March 9, at 3 p.m. U.S. Rep. F. James Sensenbrenner was to speak briefly at the ceremony, which was attended by facility workers, unit members, community officials and representatives from National Guard state headquarters in Madison.

The new facility will

include a 55,700-square foot maintenance building, a 27,700-square foot aircraft storage hanger and a 52,000-square yard aircraft and vehicle parking pavement system, on a new 17-acre site leased to the Guard by the City of West Bend.

The expansion is needed to relieve severe overcrowding at the current facility and allow eventual conversion to UH-60 Blackhawk helicopters. The 17-acre site is adjacent to the company's current facility at 125

Chopper Drive.

The existing building, which has served the unit as hanger, maintenance facility and armory since it was built in 1960, will be remodeled for continued use as the unit's armory.

Total cost of the project is estimated at \$11,069,400, with the federal government paying \$10,204,030 and the state picking up the remaining \$865,370. Construction will begin in April, with completion scheduled for the fall of 2002.



25 Years Ago

March 5, 1976

Dennis' Family Shoe Store, 1269 Fond du Lac Avenue, formerly Paul's Shoe Corner, officially opened for business on Thursday, February 26. Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Janisse have purchased the store from former owner Paul Blumer. In addition to Dennis' Family Shoe Store, Mr. and Mrs. Janisse also own and operate Dennis' Shoe Repair in West Bend. The new owners of the store are planning to keep the present brands of shoes and making some new additions. The store will also sell hosiery and handbags as well as offer complete shoe repair service.

During a sleet storm early Monday evening, lightning struck twice in the area. A transformer near a rural home was hit and lightning struck a home in the village, causing a fire which did extensive damage. The transformer hit was across the road from the Ardell Cadarelle home on Highland Drive in the Town of Kewaskum, about 1-1/2 miles northwest of the village. The Cardarelle home was not damaged but the lights and telephone were knocked out. The home that was struck was that of Mrs. Mary Roeder at 202 Forest Avenue, where 32 firemen worked nearly four hours fighting smoke and flames in inclement weather. The bolt near the Cardarelle home struck shortly after 6 p.m. While Fire Chief Augie Bilgo Jr. was being notified of it by the sheriff's dispatcher, and informing them he would send several of his men to check the area, the dispatcher got the call for a fire at the Roeder home at 6:10 p.m. When firemen reached the Roeder home they found the house filled with smoke which was especially thick in the basement area. Bilgo believed that lightning had struck the electrical system in the basement causing fire which followed wires throughout the house.

They were finally eliminated in the Sectional finals Saturday night by a strong Clinton team (19-1), 46-30. Kewaskum and Campbellsport., which are only six miles apart, had to travel over 90 miles to Edgerton to play each other in the Sectional.


Receive Degrees


UWM is the second largest university in the State of Wisconsin, with 23,000 undergraduate and graduate students.

Dairy Agent Tina Struyk, (3) Manure Handling, Storage Systems and Nutrient Management, with Paul Sebo and Scott Petges Washington County Land Conservation Staff, (4) Freestall Barn and Feed Center Design with Dr. Dave Kammel and Washington Co. Farm Mgmt. Ed. Jack Trzebia-Farm towski.

AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AND RECREATE AN ORDINANCE TO LICENSE AND REGULATE THE SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR IN THE TOWN OF AUBURN

The Town Board of the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, State of Wisconsin, DO ORDAIN AS FOL-

SECTION 1: All prior ordinances adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Auburn relating to the licensing and regulation of the sale of intoxicating liquor, adoption of State Intoxicating Liquor laws and all ordinances dealing with or relating to matters covered by Chapters 176 and 125 of Wisconsin Statutes, including but not limited to the following:

An Ordinance adopted June 18,1934, entitled "An Ordinance to License and Regulate the Sale of Intoxicating Liquor Within the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin.' Ordinance No. 4 adopted July 13, 1964, entitled "An Ordinance to License and Regulate the Sale of Intoxicating Liquor Within the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin.'

SECTION 2. An Ordinance entitled ALCOHOL BEVERAGE CODE FOR THE TOWN OF AUBURN is hereby created to read as follows:

ALCOHOL BEVERAGE CODE FOR THE TOWN OF AUBURN

1.01 PURPOSE. The Town Board of Supervisors of the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin, finds that it is in the best interests of the public to regulate the sale and use of alcohol beverages within the Town. Further, the adoption of this ordinance for such regulation will promote government and good order of the Town for its commercial benefit, and for the health, safety, welfare and convenience of the public.

1.02 STATUTORY AUTHORITY. This ordinance is enacted pursuant to Sect. 125.10 of Wisconsin Statutes and the general police power of the Town Board.

1.03 DEFINITIONS. The definitions contained in Sec. 125.02 of Wisconsin Statutes are hereby adopted and made a part of this ordinance by reference.

1.04 LICENSES AND PERMITS REQUIRED. No person except as authorized by this ordinance and Chapter 125 of Wisconsin Statutes shall within the Town of Auburn, serve, sell, distribute, vend, offer or keep for sale at retail or wholesale, deal or traffic in or engage in any other activity for which a license or permit is

1.05 LICENSE CLASSES AND FEES. There shall be the following classes of licenses, which when issued by the Town Clerk under the authority of the Town Board after the payment of the appropriate fee herein-after specified, shall permit the holder to sell, deal, or traffic in alcohol beverages as provided in Chapter 125 of Wisconsin Statutes. Except as otherwise provided in this section, the full license fee shall be charged for the

(1) RETAIL CLASS "A" FERMENTED MALT BEVERAGE LICENSE: \$20.00 per year. (2) RETAIL CLASS "B" FERMENTED MALT BEVERAGE LICENSE: \$50.00 per year.

DNR Outdoor Report

March 6, 2001

Signs of spring are starting to show up in southern and central Wisconsin, but northern Wisconsin continues to be quite firmly entrenched in winter.

The northern tier of counties are reporting anywhere from 30 inches of snow remaining on the ground in the Superior area to up to 42 inches of snow along Penokee Range of Iron County.

For those looking for continued winter recreation, the northern most counties down through the Hayward, Spooner and Cumberland areas continue to report snowmobile trails in good to very good condition.

The cross-country ski trails in the Brule River, Flambeau River and Northern Highland American Legion state forests are being reported in good to superb condition for March

skiing.

However, conditions deteriorate fairly quickly the farther south one goes. Snowmobile trails in the Forest and Lincoln county areas were reported in fair to poor condition, and most trails in the southern half of the state are closed or in poor condition.

Some ski trails in central Wisconsin remain open and range from fair condition in the early morning to poor condition as temperatures warm up by mid-day. Trails in southern Wisconsin are generally closed or very icy and skiing is not recommended, with the exception of Blue Mound State Park, where skate skiing conditions were still being reported as good.

The general game fish season closed March 1 on most inland waters, though it remains open on some waters. Check the current Guide to Wisconsin Hook and Line Fishing Regulations for waters that remain open.

Late winter, early spring panfishing is starting to show signs of picking up on northern waters. Crappie and bluegill fishing was reported as fair to good on many northern waters with just a few initial reports of crappies beginning to school.

Most bluegills were being caught near the bottom. Perch fishing has continued to slow down on northern waters, but some perch action continued to be reported in the deeper water of Vilas and Oneida county lakes.

In the south, bluegills and some crappies were

being caught on Madison area lakes. Some nice-sized crappies and smaller bluegills were reported from Jefferson County lakes. Ice anglers are starting to pick up a few panfish, especially crappies, in the backwaters of the Mississippi River and anglers were still getting saugers below the Genoa dam. Some bluegills were being caught in the backwaters of the Wisconsin River, where a few northern pike were being taken on tip-

In the southeast, portions of the Sheboygan, Milwaukee, Menomonee, Pike and Root rivers are open, but shelf ice and high water levels have made fishing slow. Shore anglers in Port Washington were catching a few brown trout.

The early trout opener was reportedly a success, with temperatures in the 40s bringing anglers out in droves in southern Wisconsin. Jig and spinner anglers were especially successful, but fly fishers using larger patterns such as woolly buggers and leeches also reported fish.

Several early hatches reportedly occurred in the afternoon, providing some success for dry fly users. The early season is strictly an artificial lure only, barbless hook, catch and release season.

The 2001 hunting and fishing licenses went on sale March 10 and while current licenses don't expire until the end of the month, the new licenses can be used immediately.

The first sightings of robins and bluebirds have

come in. Sandhill Cranes were also observed last weekend and an Osprey was observed near the Yahara River at Madison.

Waterfowl have begun to return and are setting up territories and beginning mating rituals and displays. As the Mississippi River begins to open, watch for diving ducks such as ringnecks, scaup or bluebills, buffleheads and goldeneyes.

Bald eagles are continually migrating along the Mississippi River, with as many as 100 seen below the navigation dams south of La Crosse this past week. Gobbler flocks of turkeys are starting to disband and several birds have already been seen displaying.

Deep snow in the north is causing hardship for some wildlife. Some saw-whet owls, a tiny species, were found in Sawyer County dead from starvation due to the snow, which has covered and protected the mice they feed on.

And quite a few reports of dogs chasing deer have come in from the north. Dogs are able to run on top of the crusted snow, which the deer's hooves break through. Please keep dogs tied up during this period.

Winter Not Expected to Adversely Effect Spring Turkey Hunting

MADISON - The tough winter conditions faced by wildlife this year should not have any significant effect on the upcoming April 11 through May 20 spring turkey hunting season, according to Department of Natural Resources' turkey management expert, Keith Warnke

"This has been a harder winter that we've seen in the past several years but it's not out of what we'd consider the normal range as far as over-winter loss in the wild turkey population," said Warnke. "As for any long term population effects, spring production is the most important factor. Turkeys reproduce quickly enough so that with a good nesting season, winter mortality is easily offset."

Annual mortality from natural causes in wild turkeys is in the 50% range say wildlife experts. The birds compensate for this by being able to breed in their first year and laying many

"Turkeys are very adaptable to winter conditions. They'll eat almost anything and they're willing to move fair distances to find food. And, once they find a food source, they'll remain there all winter. One important source of winter food is undigested grains the birds

pick from manure spread by farmers during the winter."

"When it's crusty out they have learned to follow deer and feed in the areas where deer have pawed through the snow looking for browse," says Warnke.

This spring, for the first time in recent years, there were more permits available than applications received. A total of 150,403 permits were available for 140,390 applications. The application process closed on December 10, 2000 for the spring 2001 season.

With more permits than applications, everyone should be able to get a permit as long as the applicant is willing to be flexible in their choice of hunting period. There is also a much greater probability for getting a second permit according to licensing staff at DNR. The long term average for hunting success over all of the six spring turkey hunting periods is 29%. The popular first and second periods only improve on that by nine and four percent, respectively.

People interested in turkey management should plan to attend the April 9, 2001 Annual Spring FIsh and Wildlife Rules Hearings. Three questions regarding turkey management are on the agenda: the DNR will ask for a vote on establishment of two new turkey management zones and prohibiting existing and new game farms in existing wild turkey management zones from being licensed to shoot wild turkeys. The Conservation Congress will ask for an advisory vote on the establishment of two additional five-day spring hunting periods.




