## **Police Dept Proposes Parking Ticket Hike**

Police Chief Richard indicated at Knoebel Kewaskum Monday's Village Board meeting that he thought the village board should look at raising the price of parking tickets.

In his monthly report to the board Knoebel indicated that 94 parking tickets were issued that month.

Most of the tickets are from the village's winter parking ordinance."People would rather pay the ticket then move their cars from the street," said Knoebel.

The police chief indicated this is the highest number of parking tickets his department has ever issued in a month's period.

Right now the winter parking violation costs \$5 and the person receiving the ticket has 48 hours to pay or can be subject to suspension of all vehicle registrations held.

Other violations include: parking in a two hour zone, double parking, blocking alley, blocking driveway, blocking a crosswalk, parking next to a fire hydrant, parking in a marked no parking zone, improper parking, parking next to a yellow line, parking in violation of an official sign and weight violation. All of the aforementioned come with a restitution of \$5. Parking on private property without consent is a \$10 fine and parking in a physically disabled zone is \$20.

In Campbellsport, violators receive a fine of \$10 across the board. They have seven days to pay it. If not paid in seven days the ticket is raised to \$20, finally if not paid after 28 days of issue, the fine is \$30 and a notice is sent to the department of motor vehicles suspending any and all vehicle registrations of the registrant.

Slinger is similar only the violator has 30 days to pay the ticket or it jumps to

Village administrator Dan Schmidt stated that the last time he recalled a fine increase was in 1983 when tickets were raised from \$1

The police department is in the process of doing a study of area communities to see what the fines will be. There is no word when this will take effect.

## Controlled Burns Proposed In Tri-County Area

MILWAUKEE - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is proposing to conduct controlled burns this spring at several locations in Washington County, Ozaukee County and eastern Dodge County.

Burn areas range from 2.5 acres up to 535 acres in size and are located at Theresa, Allenton and Jackson Wildlife Areas, the Loew Lake Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest, and on private lands in Washington and Ozaukee Counties.

Controlled burns are conducted to increase plant diversity and stem density on grasslands, for site preparation for seeding warm season grasses, to set back undesirable woody vegetation, and to improve waterfowl brood and migration habitat.

A primary goal on upland sites is to improve nesting habitat for bird species such as mallards, blue-winged teal, pheasants, bobolinks, diekeissels and grasshopper sparrows.

The largest burn unit

will include the main flowage area of Theresa Marsh, located south of Hwy. 28. Water levels in that portion of the Wildlife Area were drawn over winter in preparation for burning. Burning, followed by reflooding to cover the tops of burned cattails, will improve habitat for waterfowl and other wildlife by providing more areas of open water and a larger variety wetland plants.

This type of project does not have the potential to cause significant adverse environmental impacts; therefore, the Department has made a preliminary determination that an environmental impact statement will not be required for this project.

On Monday, March 12, at approximately 4:45 p.m. she spotted two robins in the backyard of her Moraine Court home here in the vil-


"Iggy" also reported seeing robins, but then again she reports seeing a lot of strange things on Friday mornings.

The project is to be undertaken on the northern portion of Stark Street by Mueller Excavating of Campbell-sport.


This project will consist of adding an extension to the current water main and resurfacing the road from Main Street to the road's end at Moraine Court.

## News From The Capitol

#### Time For University To Be Open With Taxpayers

"It's awfully difficult for a white male to get into our law school." So said a representative of the University of Wisconsin Law School. Is this an appropriate thing for an employee of a state school to be telling a taxpaying applicant?

Racial preferences, or Affirmative Action have come under nationwide scrutiny with voters in both California and Washington even voting for constitutional amendments to eliminate this practice. In my opinion this is an odious practice obviously unfair to applicants which would otherwise have been given access. Even worse, labeling people by where their ancestors were born will permanently divide our country.

Traditionally America has been a great country because we view ourselves as Americans, not Chinese, Africans or Europeans. Other attempts at democracy in places such as Africa or the Indian subcontinent have not been successful because people view themselves as part of an internal tribe, not the country as a whole.

In an effort to determine the extent of this practice at the University of Wisconsin - Madison I sent a letter asking for application and acceptance rates by test score for both undergraduate and law school admissions on January 15th. Nine other state legislators signed on as well. I am sure in this computer age the University could have complied within a week.

After promising compliance for almost two months, I was informed last week that the University would not give us the information.

By chance the Center for Equal Opportunity (CEO), a non profit organization out of Washington D.C., which is affiliated with Linda Chavez, had filed suit to get similar information. We were both denied with the University claiming that under the Family and Educational Rights and Privacy Act they could not release this information.

Interestingly, other state universities in Minnesota, Michigan, North Carolina, California, etc. had no problem complying when asked by CEO. Apparently the UW System feels less responsibility towards its students and taxpayers than other fine institutions around the country.

I am not sure what they are trying to hide. CEO has hired an over \$200 an hour law firm in Milwaukee to file a lawsuit to get this information which should be a public record. If the law-suit is successful the University will have to pay double the attorney's fee under Wisconsin's open records law thereby increasing college tuition. In the interim, the Attorney General's Office must waste resources fighting this law-suit rather than prosecuting criminals.

Also, apparently in response to my letter the

UW System Board of Regents passed a surprising resolution last Friday reconfirming their policy of treating different people differently according to their ancestor's homelands. This was another highly unusual step by the University in that the resolution was not distributed to the Regent's in advance of the monthly meeting. Therefore it forced them into a somewhat surprise vote.

Regardless about how you feel regarding racial preferences, it is only fair that the taxpaying public should be aware of what their state government is up to. Such secrecy in Madison breeds distrust and disrespect in the system and the Chancellor's Office. If they can't even be trusted to be open about such a simple request how can they be trusted when they claim

that they have a tight budget and need a significant transfusion of taxpayer dollars? I will demand from the University that they immediately produce this information and stop putting taxpayer dollars at risk as well as Wisconsin students in the dark as far as how their university works.




To be named to the Dean's List, a Carthage student must earn a grade point average of 3.5 or better on a scale of 4.0.




It is interesting to note that many students participate in more than one competitive area in this all day event that cost each participant a \$4 participation fee that covered lunch and entertainment.



## Little Folks School House Teams Up With Easter Seals

If you were to ask any of the little folks what the word "disability" means, they would probably tell you that a disability is something that makes walking, talking, hearing, seeing, or touching harder for some people. They might also respond that it's when part of the body doesn't work.

For the past few weeks, the teachers at the Little Folks School House have been working with the children, teaching about disability awareness. The goal in mind is to encourage a better understanding and acceptance of people with disabilities.

The tendency to fear or avoid someone with a disability is normal not only for children but for adults as well. Education about the causes of disabilities and how people adapt to them can lead to a better understanding which then builds attitudes and behaviors which are positive and accepting.

The unit was designed to help children understand that all people have similarities and differences and that people with disabilities may be different from us in one way but are like us in most ways.

To gain a deeper understanding of what it's like to have a disability, the children were introduced to special aids such as a pediatric wheelchair, walker and

crutches. They were also able to get a feel of what it is like to be blind or deaf. Each child had the opportunity to experiment and attempt to perform tasks while pretending they were disabled.

One of the highlights of the unit was a "HOP-N-ING." The Hop-n-ing is an educational fund raiser made possible through Easter Seals services. Prior to LFSH hop-n-ing, the children asked parents, relatives, neighbors and friends for pledges for hops made during a three minute period. On February 21, the lit-

tle folks hopped their little legs off and managed to raise \$400 for Easter Seals. Each child who participated will receive a prize, a certificate and the knowledge that they've helped someone less fortunate than themselves.

## 25 Years Ago

March 12, 1976

A three-day ice storm which started last Monday and Tuesday and reached its peak on Thursday, was reported to be the worst in memory, and was probably the worst ever. It included rain, freezing rain, sleet, snow, thunder and lightning. The devastating storm left damage Thursday and Friday like a tornado had struck the area. Electric and telephone poles and wires were downed, and an unbelievable number of trees, limbs and branches were felled all over from the terrific weight of the ice coating. Many sections were without heat, light and power for days and all events were canceled. People were warned to stay off the streets because of falling, arcing live wires and trees. Some villages and cities were isolated as highways and streets were closed and barricaded, and schools and industries were closed. Police and firemen were on duty around the clock. Roseland Drive between Midland and Western Avenue was one of the hardest hit in the village, as fallen trees and limbs blocked the street and six trees had to be cut off completely. Riverview Drive from Main Street to the village park was also blockaded because of fallen wires and branches. Winds gusting up to 50 miles per hour and below freezing temperatures on Friday added to the havoc. There was also the danger of water pipes freezing and farmers had problems getting water for cattle. Milking and milk cooling was difficult as farmers tried to get access to portable generators. Ice in ponds was borken for water, which was also hauled. Dry ice was distributed and shipped to where available to help keep foods from spoiling. In Washington County many poles themselves fell across roads. It was estimated that about 500 utility poles were down, some of them steel towers that carry high voltage lines. About 2,000 wires were down. Forty downed poles were counted on U.S. 45 between Kewaskum and West Bend. The last remembered ice storm was in February of 1933. Things were not as completely dependent on electricity for heat and power then so it did not appear as severe.

On Monday evening the Kewaskum Jaycees held their regular membership meeting and election of officers for the 1976-77 year. Jerry Buchel was elected President. Jerry was Internal Vice President for the 1975-76 year. Ralph Bier was elected Internal

Vice President; Wayne Riekkoff, External Vice President; Dave Rohlinger, Treasurer; Tom Bartelt, Secretary; Dick Thiemer, State Director; and Mark Kral, Ed Weddig and Larry Watry were elected as members of the Board of Directors.

Gayla Herriges and Todd Garbisch have been chosen as Kiwanis Students for the month of February. Gayla is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Herriges of New Fane and Todd is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Garbisch of rural Kewaskum.

In a battle between two conference champions, Kewaskum, the Scenic Moraine kingpin, ousted New Holstein, the Packerland Conference titlist, 77-72, in the Regional opener at Kiel Saturday night, postponed from Friday because of the ice storm. Two-time Class B state champion Sheboygan Falls, which won the state titles in 1974 and 1975, flashed its form of old in demolishing Kiel, 74-56, in the second game. Kewaskum and Sheboygan Falls thus earned the right to meet for the Kiel Regional Championship Monday night, in which the Falls Falcons whipped the Indians, 91-73, in their third impressive tournament win.



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


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

The Department of Public Works will resume scheduled wood chipping the **first and third Monday** of the month, beginning MONDAY, APRIL 2nd.

#### Please FOLLOW THESE REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Place large (butt) end toward the street, at the curb.
  2. Pile branches no more than 2 feet high; a long low pile is best for feeding the chipper. Leave a gap in the pile every 8 feet.
- 3. For small brush, TIE IN BUNDLES with string or twine.
- No boxes, bags or cans of branches will be chipped.
  (Reason, is that stone, gravel, wire, metal or dirt enters the chipper it will destroy the knife edges on the chipper, delaying our chipping until the knife is replaced and resharpened).
- 4. No roots of any kind, or material with any dirt on it.

Note: Yard waste, garden plant waste, corn stalks, sun flower stalk, leaves, grass and materials that will **rot** down in a compost pile can be brought to the DPW yard and placed in the yard compost bin. Hours are 7:00 AM to 3:30 PM Monday - Friday.

## DNR Outdoor Report

March 13, 2001

Winter once again demonstrated its intention to stay for a while in central and northern Wisconsin with snowfalls early the past week ranging from about eight inches in the Bayfield area to six inches through west-central and central Wisconsin, to only two to three inches in the northeast.

The new snowfall is further extending the snowmobile and cross-country ski season in those parts of the state. Snowmobile trails were in good condition throughout northwestern and north central Wisconsin, but fair to poor in the northeast.

Trails reopened in some counties as far south as Marathon and Wood. Be sure to call ahead to your destination for the most current conditions as all areas have been reporting that conditions have been changing quickly.

Both the Brule River and the Northern Highland American Legion state forests reported that their cross country ski trails were re-groomed after the snowfall and should be in good to excellent condition for late season skiing. Most trails throughout southern Wisconsin are now closed and trail managers are asking people to refrain from even hiking on trails as trails can be easily damaged as the ground thaws.

Mountain bike trails in the Southern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest are closed. They will begin to be inspected at the beginning of April to determine when they will be opened.

Lakes in northern Wisconsin still have up to 30 inches of ice, so ice-out is not anticipated for several weeks yet. Lakes in southern Wisconsin still have 16 to 20 inches as of March 13, though they are beginning to open up near inlets and outlets.

Most of the larger rivers in southern Wisconsin are in the process of opening up and some have already opened; rivers in central Wisconsin are just beginning to open, especially below dams.

Panfish anglers continue to do fairly well on waters throughout the state, as the general game fish season remains closed through May 5. Crappie fishing continued to pick up on northern lakes with some reports of limits. Crappies are not in any solid patterns, but are suspending at various depths in about 10 feet of water in many locations.

Bluegills were being caught primarily near the bottom in up to 18 feet. Perch fishing slowed down

some this week, but they were still being caught near the bottom over mud and weed flats in 12 to 18 feet.

Some anglers have begun fishing walleye in open water below the Wisconsin River dams in central Wisconsin, but success has been slow. A few walleye and sauger have been biting below dams at Prairie du Sac and Wisconsin Dells.

The Mississippi River opened below the Dubuque Dam and anglers were catching mostly sauger with a few small walleye. Some walleyes were also being caught on the Fox River near the De Pere dam.

Bluegills and northern were hitting at Whalen's Grade on Lake Wisconsin. Panfish action on the Madison chain of lakes has

been changing daily. Bluegills were being caught on Mendota, Monona, and Waubesa. Some crappie were being caught on Lake Waubesa and some perch were still being caught on Mendota, but fishing has slowed.

Along Lake Michigan, perch fishing has continued to be slow on Green Bay, with just a few being caught off Door County. The season for yellow perch closed at midnight March 15 on Green Bay, its tributaries and the Fox River downstream of the De Pere dam.

Some nice northern pike were caught this week on Green Bay north of the Oconto breakwater. Fishing has been slow on southern Lake Michigan tributaries.

More horned larks have been seen this week. Songs of cardinals, purple finches and the white-breasted nuthatch are becoming more frequent. Downy woodpeckers have begun to drum on hollow trees to establish their mating territories. Great horned owls are sitting on eggs and bald eagles have set up nesting territories and will begin incubating eggs soon.

Returning diving ducks including mergansers and bufffleheads were seen on the open water of the Mississippi River. Sandhill cranes and Canada geese are returning in increasing numbers. Raccoons, skunks, and opossums are becoming more active with the longer days and warmer temperatures and the first woodchucks of spring have been reported.

## Wisconsin Hunters Set State, National Record Deer Harvest

MADISON - Wisconsin hunters set a national single state record for deer harvest during the 2000-2001 deer hunting season with a total kill of 618,374. The total includes all deer taken by archery, gun and tribal hunters.

"We needed a big harvest," said Bill Mytton, deer and bear ecologist for the Department of Natural Resources, "and we set the conditions for one by extending the gun and archery seasons and issuing free bonus permits with each license sold. Wisconsin hunters took up the challenge and produced a record harvest, but the work isn't done.

"We went into the 2000 hunting season with 1.8 million deer in the state. Even with the record harvest plus the winter we're seeing, we'll still go into spring with a breeding herd capable of putting us right back at that 1.7-1.8 million level by fall of 2001."

The 2000 season produced a record gun hunt harvest at 528,494. Archers added another 86,899 for their second best ever season total. The best archery year was 1999 with 92,203 deer registered. The early and late Zone T seasons may have contributed to the lower archery harvest even

through the early archery season was extended four days, to the Thursday before the traditional nine-day gun hunt.

A complete summary of the 2000-01 Wisconsin big game hunting seasons with county by county and management unit breakdowns will be published in the 2000 edition of the Wisconsin Big Game Hunting Summary. The summary will cover deer, bear and turkey and is due to be published around mid-May 2001.

Some winter kill has been reported in a few scattered northern counties. The severity of a winter is measured by the Winter Severity Index (WSI). The WSI was developed in the early 1970s. It is calculated by adding the number of days with 18 inches or more of snow on the ground to the number of days when minimum temperatures are 0 degrees Fahrenheit or below, between December 1 and April 30. A point is added for each day one of these conditions occur; two points are added for a day when both conditions occur. At the end of the winter all the points are added up, resulting in the WSI number for the whole winter. A winter with an index of less than 50 is considered mild, 50 to 80 is moderate and over 80 is severe.

Northern Iron County near Mercer and Upson currently are at a cumulative WSI of 103, Rhinelander is at 52 and Eagle River at 59. Overall, winter kill is not expected to be much of a factor in herd size for 2001, Mytton said.

The most important factor ahead, according to biologists, is the number of fawns born this spring. A greater number of does will give birth to twins following a mild winter.

With another large herd expected in 2001, DNR wildlife managers are once again proposing a statewide early antlerless gun-deer hunt involving 97 deer management units - the same number of units designated in 2000. Hunters would be issued one free bonus permit for each archery and each gun deer hunting license for a combined four-deer harvest privilege.


clearing 5' 6". Josh "J.P." Repovsch placed second in the JV high jump.
