## Kewaskum Man Killed in **Thursday Crash**

TOWN OF KEWASKUM-A head-on crash took the life of a 68-year-old Kewaskum man on Thursday and injured a Kewaskum teen.

The accident occurred just after noon on Kettle View Drive, south of County Road H, just outside the village.

Authorities say the 17year-old driver of the second vehicle was driving southbound, alone, on Kettle View Drive, when he allegedly drifted to the northbound lane.

According to reports from the Washington County Sheriff's Department the 17-year-old stated "I was adjusting the radio and I looked up and I was in the other lane.

Verlon T. Bryant, was northbound, alone, proceeding up a small incline and was struck head-on. He was pronounced dead at the scene of the acci-

## Village Plan Commission Hears Condo Complex Plan

The Village of Kewaskum's Plan Commission met last Tuesday evening and heard a plan from Allenton area developers Jim Emmer and Gary Klink.

The two developers presented a plan to build nine four family condo units. The complex would be located to the south of Meadowcreek Apartments on Roseland Drive in the village. The land is currently zoned R-4 for multi-family.

Emmer told the commission that the development would be done in stages. The first stage would include three units with one of them used as a model.

In a previous plan the land was slated to be used for 89 units whereas this proposal is only for 36.

The project must be approved by the Kewaskum Village board upon being further reviewed by the plan commission.

A plan commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday at 7:00 p.m. in the Village Municipal building.



## Bomb Threat at High School a Ploy

Threat of a bomb in Kewaskum High School had teachers, administrators and police scrambling last week Wednesday.

Officials say that the threat was found on a stall inside the 300 hall bathroom around 12:20 p.m. According to the police liaison officer, the threat read "There's a bomb!! In the

school, you will see at 8:00 o'clock, 12 April, 01."

The bathroom was sealed off and it was decided that officials would not evacuate the building as the threat pertained to the next day.

At the close of the school day, activities were cancelled and the building itself was sealed off while the officer and another school administrator searched the building. A staff meeting was held where it was

determined to bring in the Milwaukee County Bomb Division

On Thursday morning at 6:00 the building was closely inspected by the Milwaukee County Bomb Division officers and dogs. Nothing was found. Kewaskum police officers did checks of all students entering the building with metal detectors and bomb sniffing dogs.

"We are tracking down leads and hope that someone comes forward to put an end to this thing. It is not something a school district can nor should be proud of. One of these every 20 years would be too many," said Wayne Graczyk, district administrator.

According to police chief Richard Knoebel there have been no leads and anyone with any information can contact the Washington County Chief's Tip Line at 1-800-232-0594. All information is confidential and informants can receive up to a \$1,000 reward.

## **Efforts Being Combined** For Annual Blood Drive

On Monday, April 30, the Kewaskum High School Student Council and the Community Blood Drive coordinators will join efforts and host a blood drive at the Kewaskum High School in the choir room from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Parking will be available in the front and back of school.

Every effort will be made to accommodate all donors at anytime, however to help avoid congestion, high school donors may participate from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and community donors from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

More than 600 units of blood are needed each day to meet the needs of patients in 34 hospital sites in ten counties. There is no substitute for blood. If people lost blood from surgery or injury or if their bodies can't produce enough, there is only one place to turn - volunteer blood donors.

When you donate blood, you give a second chance at life to all kinds of people, young and old - a chance to recover and a chance to live. This is your opportunity to help others who might find themselves in need. Organizers of this blood drive are hoping to reach a

goal of 80 or more donors.

Donors must be 17 years old or older, weigh at least 110 pounds, be free of symptoms of cold, sore throat, flu or allergies on the day you donate and not have had hepatitis.

All donors are asked to provide your social security number and must present some form of identification when making their blood donation. Acceptable forms of identification are a picture I.D., blood donor I.D. or identification with a signature

The actual donation of a pint of blood takes approximately seven minutes. Plan 20 minutes prior to the donation to give medical history and to have your temperature taken and 10 to 15 minutes after the donation for some refreshments. The whole process takes about one hour

You will feel special for having done something so important. You may help a total stranger or someone in our own community.

Reserve an hour on Monday, April 30. Those you help will be grateful you took the time to give such a precious gift.

## EDUCATION... IT'S EVERYONE'S BUSINESS

I will admit that I find myself writing this with feelings of apprehension since the topic could, and probably will be, misconstrued or misinterpreted. However, I believe that what I am about to write should be said, so I'm saying it. Everyone needs to know that we have good teachers in Kewaskum, and that each is a real person, with a real personality, with real feelings, and possess a genuine interest in children. They are truly people who take their teaching careers seriously. Having said this, I ask: When and why did teacher bashing become in

vogue? Lack of school spirit. Foul language. Disrespect. Kids with poor attitudes. No discipline. Test scores low. Parents not attending conferences. Why are all of these solely a teacher's fault? The last time I checked, teachers do not go in the home to insure that homework is done properly, or even done at all. Teachers don't encourage or teach their students to challenge parental authority, or be disrespectful. Teachers certainly don't teach children to take the easy way out, to "just get by," to actually work harder trying to get out of work than they do doing the work. Teachers surely didn't create television programs or movies that perpetuate a total disregard for authority, a lack of respect for others and property, not to mention a disregard for other people's rights. And as far as I know, teachers did not create a society that has been totally desensitized to the use of foul language, suggestive situations or violence.

Once the students enter the doors of a school building it seems there is a widely held belief that everything our children are exposed to outside of school somehow comes to a screeching halt. There is also a misperception that children miraculously enter school uninfluenced by the world outside. People somehow believe that in a mere 7 hours of contact, it is the teacher who not only can, but must teach pride, positive attitudes, solid work habits, encourage pure and language, wholesome respect for others and for property, and in their spare time, instill a love for learn-

If you've never taught in a classroom, especially in today's classrooms, the old Indian adage, Walk a Mile In My Moccasins, is fit to mention. Nobody is perfect, and I do not claim that our teachers and administrators are either, anymore than parents or society are perfect. We are all human. However, there must be a triangle of support if schools are to succeed even more than we now are. To be truly effective, this triangle must consist of the student, the parent, and the teacher, with the realization that the very triangle exists within a circle that represents the influences of the society we live in today, both positive and negative. If one point of the triangle is less than the other two, all three suffer. If all three are not working in concert, or refuse to work together, then we can never begin to address the difficult societal issues that face our children every day of their

So what is my point: It's easy to blame the teacher, and way too often, this is what is done. Maybe it makes people feel better to blame someone else. However, only by everyone

Host families are needed for a summer cultural exchange program in which Bblack children from rural and small towns in Mississippi spend between 12 and 19 days with Wisconsin families. This yearly exchange began in 1968 and is organized by Project Self-Help and Awareness (P.S.A.), a non-profit, nondenominational organiza-

The Mississippi children, ages 6-16, come from an economic cross-section, although most come from economically disadvantaged homes. Wisconsin families are allowed to choose the ages and sex of the child. The cost to Wisconsin families is \$40 per child to help cover transportation from Mississippi to Fond du Lac and insurance during their stay. The dates of this summer's exchange are June 10-21, June 10-28, June 17-July 5, July 8-19 and July

Prejudice against Blacks and other minorities is all around us. Even if you, as a parent, are a model of tolerance, your children see and hear it on television, from neighbors, relatives and friends. P.S.A.'s exchange program allows your children the opportunity to see with their own eyes that Black children play, laugh and cry at the same things we do, and that the color of ones skin has nothing to do with being a good person

Each year, over 100 children return to Northeastern Wisconsin as the exchange is a chance for them to live in an environment more free of prejudice and poverty. Many Mississippi children hope to come to Wisconsin this summer, but have no family to host them. You and your family, or someone you know, may be able to make that wish a reality. 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## Hafemann is a Champion Among His Peers

Another summer season brings another "race" for the Modified Eastern Wisconsin Stock Car (EWSC) Championship.

Starting his 26th season, Butchie Hafemann is a true example as to why taking a family to the races at Plymouth on a Saturday night would begin a good tradition.

Butchie's spirit for life, children and the sport of racing modified is evident in his smile and demeanor. He is "Mr. Congeniality" of the EWSC, a gentleman on and off the track. And it's apparent that his peers think so too.

At the 40th anniversary of the Annual EWSC Banquet held at the Millhouse Supper Club near Kiel, Butchie Hafemann took home the Dickie Berth Memorial Award. This award is voted on by the drivers/employees of the EWSC, such as ticket takers, pit stewards, scorers, etc. It is awarded for the dedication and support of the Eastern Racing Association, and to the sport of modified racing.

Hafemann was speechless at the podium, but later said, "It's a great honor winning this award. I don't know what to say, but I think it's great. Thanks to my wife, Blondie, who is the 'other half' of Hafemann Racing, for her faithful and loving support. This award means a lot to me because last year my son, Billy or 'Bear' as we call him, won the Modified Rookie of the Year Award in the winged modified car that was driven by Dickie Berth."

Butchie grew up in West Bend, near the West Bend Country Club. On some school nights and weekends, he would take a short trip down the road to see John "Chrome Dome" Kramer, who drove a "modified" for Cocky Keller of Kewaskum.

Ol' John would be working on his car and Butchie would love to help and actually got to go along to Cedarburg, Slinger and Plymouth to watch John and other area drivers compete. He was too young to go in the pit area, but that was the start of it. It got into Butchie's blood at the age of 16, and he has been involved with cars and racing ever since.

In 1975 his family moved to Campbellsport. His parents, Fred and Phyllis Hafemann bought an old blue coup from "Chrome Dome." Fred let Butchie and his friends work on the car. When it was ready to be put on the track, the family, crew and the whole neighborhood, took off for the races at the Beaver Dam Raceway in Beaver Dam.

The young man that was to drive the "modified," was scared to get behind the wheel. So, Butchie at the age of 17, got in the driver's seat... and the rest is history!

There were over 50 modified in those days and they traveled four nights a week to various tracks in the area such as Slinger (when it was a dirt track), Cedarburg, Francis Creek, Jefferson, Columbus and Hales Corners.

Competition was tough. Billy "The Cat" Johnson, Fuzzy "The Hound" Fassbender, "The Flying Grandpa" Etchie Biertzer, Billy "The Bunny" Goeden and Donny "Donald Duck" Schuppel were just a few drivers who had the nicknames that made them popular with the fans and children. It was a family sport.

When Butchie turned 18, he could race at Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth for the Eastern Wisconsin Stock Car Club.

Ken "Mighty Mouse" Marquardt, Johnson and Goeden were the "hot shoes" at the time.

In 1979 Butchie was able to purchase a modified from Ken Biertzer, the son of popular driver, Etchie "The Flying Grandpa" Biertzer. With his love of the cartoon "Pepe LePew," the lovable skunk, and the fact that other drivers had nicknames, it just seemed like the right thing to do when it came time to get the car ready for that season. A skunk was Butchie's mascot. And that was the birth of "The Lil' Stinker," which is still on the #18 winged modfied today.

In 1982, Butchie was able to save enough money to buy a modified stock car from Etchie Biertzer. Etchie always built good cars and this Pogo Outhouse Engineering chassis was something new. That year, Butchie posted eight fast qualifying times and won his first feature. He was "in the groove" and improving every year.

This was also about the time when drivers/owners no longer built their own cars "from scratch." In the early years (1940-1970) of racing, they would take car frames, bodies, engines and transmissions from the "junk yard" and get them "race ready."

These were also the years when you would make all the parts for the cars. Bend the safety tubes, wrap padding around the bars, use airplane harness for safety belts, and use differ-

ent parts of cars to make

the "modifieds" go faster.

In the 1980s they started coming out with "factory made" chassis. This meant that one could buy a chassis (frame), transmissions, torsion bars, seats, etc. from "racing parts houses." This was also the beginning of an

era, "the bigger the investment, the faster the car." It was not easy to keep up with the big sponsored modifieds.

And, in 1985, Butchie wanted to go sprint car racing, so he sold his car to Donny Goeden of Kewaskum. Donny went on to finish 25th in the point standings and win the Eastern Wisconsin Rookie of the Year Award for that year.

Butchie tried his skills in the sprint car division, but monies and traveling played a big part in coming back to Plymouth. "Here you have the kids that come out and see us every week. That's what I like. The kids! In the sprint car division, traveling didn't give me the 'one on one' part with the fans and the sponsor exposure. I missed that family feeling," he said.

In 1991, he bought a "brand new" Enticer Chassis built by Ken Biertzer. Getting back into the circuit proved to be a challenge. He had to race on a part-time basis. He went to Plymouth a few times and also took to the Wilmot track in Wilmot, Wisconsin in 1992-93.

By 1994, his special lady, Janet "Blondie" came on the scene. She has always been a racing enthusiast. They worked together and raced a full schedule at Plymouth. It was a slow start, but it has been a wonderful life

ever since.

In July of 1995, Butchie and Blondie tied the knot and has been Butchie's "silent partner and financial advisor." They were married on a Friday, raced at Plymouth on Saturday, enjoyed the races at Slinger Super Speedway on Sunday night and took off for their honeymoon on Monday! Blondie was hooked, not only by "The Lil' Stinker," but by the sport of winged modified racing.

With Blondie's love and support, the Hafemann team has come a long way. With the purchase of a racing motor of their own, they have been able to have a "highs" in few more Butchie's career. If one is in racing awhile, they find out that it is better to do the best you can with what you can afford, rather than rely on someone else who may not be as dedicated to the sport and is only looking at the money.

Commitment to the sport and to achieve what you can with what you have to work with, is more important than trying to "keep up" with the well financed teams.

With that new motor investment and continued help from their sponsors, Goeden's Auto Body of St. Michaels, Matenaer Plumbing, AC Signs, Richie's Little Rascals of Mayville, The Amber of Campbellsport and B & B Engine Rebuilders, the Hafemann Racing Team has been able to make competitive improvements in the past two years

During that time, Butchie again conquered the top qualifying spot for three EWSC shows and has been a consistent competitor, with qualifying in the top 10 every EWSC event and winning a few heat races.

Butchie works as a set-up mechanic for Bob Fish. He works overtime installing snowplows on trucks for extra monies that are needed for racing expenses.

The Dickie Berth Memorial Award, which Butchie won last year, is a prestigious award. But that's not the only award Butchie has won. The Hafemann Team takes pride in the #18 Lil' Stinker Winged Modified and it shows with all the best appearing car awards.

The #18 modified has won the Eastern Wisconsin Stock Car Best Appearing Car Award for three years in a row. No one has ever achieved that. ("Not even Donny Goeden," says Butchie). He also won first place at the two shows held by The Babicz Annual Racing Show in Illinois and Kenosha.

In 1999 and 2000, he entered the Northeastern Wisconsin Motorsports show in Green Bay and took home the top honors for Best Appearing Car Award for both years.

Although Butchie has never won the EWSC Modified points championship, he has won the hearts and respect of many fans and his peers, the drivers. A championship would mean a lot to Butchie at this time in his life, but if he doesn't win the big one, he certainly knows what it is like to win the race of life.

Today he enjoys his time with his wife and looks forward to the 2001 season. "Throughout my whole career, just like other drivers, I dream of winning the championship. We all have had some high and low experiences, from winning races to breakdowns and crashes. I feel the biggest thrill of my life now is to be able to race with my son Billy. To watch him gain experience behind the wheel and take some of my advice," Butchie concluded.

This summer, when you go to the races at Plymouth, after the races are over, take time to visit the pit area and meet Butchie, Blondie and Billy. It is truly a family affair and great family entertainment.

The year 2001 on the Eastern Wisconsin stock car schedule has the regular program of racing. Look for #18 and #2 in the Winged Modified division. The Limited Late Models always put on a very competitive show and the Super Stocks will again bring the thrills and excitement to the Saturday night program. Practice for all the divisions is Saturday, April 21, at 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Season Opener is on Saturday, May 5, with qualifying starting at 6 p.m. and races at 7 p.m.

## DNR Outdoor Report

April 10, 2001

Spring is finally fighting its way into Wisconsin with sometimes heavy rain and damaging wind over most of the state the past week.

Snow cover and ice on the lakes and streams have pretty much disappeared in all but the northernmost parts of Wisconsin. The Brule Ranger Station reports that 99 inches of snow has fallen there this winter, as compared to an average winter's snowfall of slightly over 68 inches.

As is the usual case in spring, most hiking trails in the state are soft or muddy and slippery in places. It's a good idea for hikers to wear waterproof boots when out in the woods. Mountain bike and equestrian trails are closed to bikes and horses until conditions are dry enough to prevent damage.

It's also not a good idea to go exploring on logging trails and unpaved roads this time of year. Recent rain and snowmelt in most parts of the state make getting stuck likely and tearing up the roads inevitable.

Catch and release trout anglers are reporting some success on streams, especially where rain and melting snow and ice have not muddied the water too badly. Remember that this is a catch and release, artificial lure and barbless hook season only that ends on Sunday, April 29.

Steelhead are actively spawning on the Bois Brule River, although water levels are high. On the Root River, water temperature is 48 degrees and water levels are up. Fish were processed at the Root River Steelhead Facility on Monday, April 9.

So far this season, 713 steelhead have passed upstream and 250 have been spawned. If water levels drop in a few days, look for steelhead at Kletzsch and Estabrooks parks on the Milwaukee River, near and upstream from the stadium on the Menomonee, and throughout Oak Creek. Another interesting

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spring fish experience is the annual sturgeon spawning on the Wolf River. There are good viewing sites on the Wolf where it's possible to watch these large prehistoric fish make their way to very shallow water to spawn as they've done for millions of years.

Inland fishing for panfish has been spotty around the state due to iceout conditions, cold water temperature and poor weather for anglers to get out. Game fish like walleys, saugers, or northern won't be in season in most inland lakes and streams until the general fishing opener on May 5.

The Wisconsin River, one of the areas where gamefish can be taken, has been mostly good in the north where the water is open and further south in the areas of the Nekoosa and Prairie du Sac dams. Walleye fishing is also reported as good on the Pecatonica River in Lafayette and Green Counties and in the Rock River near Jefferson.

Lake Michigan is mostly clear of ice, but fishing last week was generally poor due to bad weather. Those anglers who had success used planer boards and flatlines. Stickbaits and spoons in black, orange and chartreuse seem to work best. A few respectable lake trout, brown trout, brookies and cohos have been caught from Kenosha and Racine, mostly in warmer water near rivers and streams.

The first spring turkey period started on Wednesday, April 11, and a good hunt was expected throughout the state. Hunters need to have a valid spring turkey hunting permit, spring turkey hunting license and turkey stamp in order to hunt turkeys.

Many of the state's migratory birds have returned and are busily engaged in mating rituals and nesting. The ruffled and sharptail grouse are booming in the Black River

State Forest and the Clark and Jackson County Forest Prairie Chickens can be heard in the early morning in northern and eastern Clark County as well as in the Buena Vista area in Portage County. Sandhill cranes have also made their return to much of southern and central Wisconsin.

Spring brings two other reminders. The deer will be moving around more and feeding along roadsides and everyone needs to be careful when driving. April is one of the highest months for car crashes involving deer.

Also, burning permits are needed in those parts of the state where burning is allowed. Check with your local DNR office to see if you need a permit and what restrictions it might carry. The spring fire season starts when the snow melts and lasts until the trees and vegetation green up around late May.

Many of Wisconsin's most serious wildfires in recent years have occurred in the spring and it only takes a few days of warm, dry, breezy weather to create very dangerous conditions.

COLOR: Clear, Green and Brown
