Memorial Day Parade, Program Here Monday

On Monday, May 28, the Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384 of the American Legion will hold their annual Memorial Day Parade and ceremonial program.

The parade to honor those who gave their lives will be held at 9 a.m. beginning at the Kewaskum High School and proceeding to the American Legion on Fond du Lac Avenue in Kewaskum. A short memorial service will be held there.

All Legionnaires, fire department members, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H and youth groups, civic organizations, etc. are invited to march in the parade honoring our war dead. Participants are asked to meet in front of the high school at 8:45 a.m.

The parade route is from the high school to Third Street, south along Parkview, to Main Street, west on Main Street to Fond du Lac Avenue and north to the Legion grounds where the ceremony will then be held.

In the event of rain, the program will be held in the high school auditorium at 9:30 a.m. Marching groups will assemble in the halls and march into the auditorium.

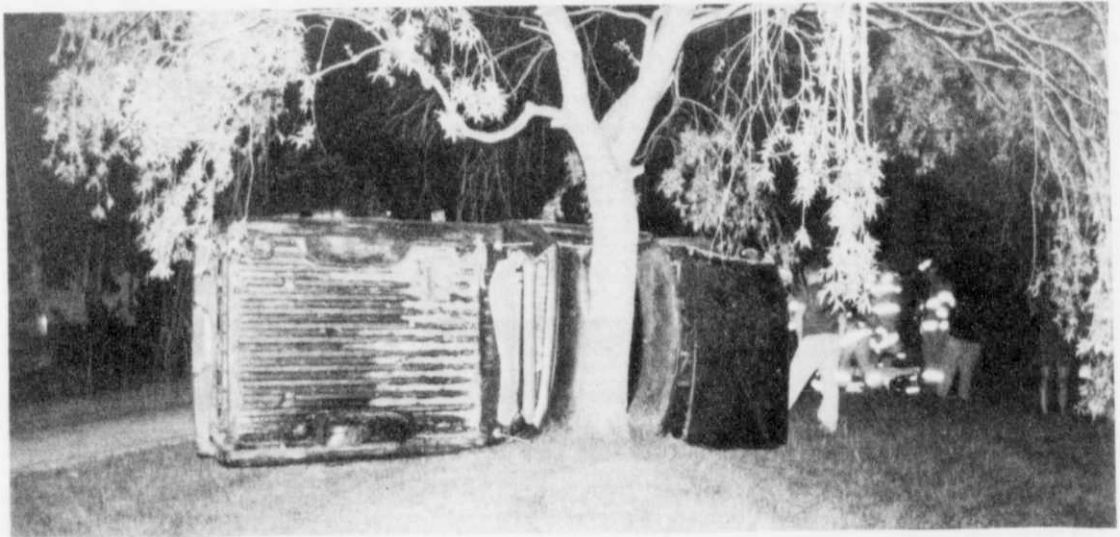

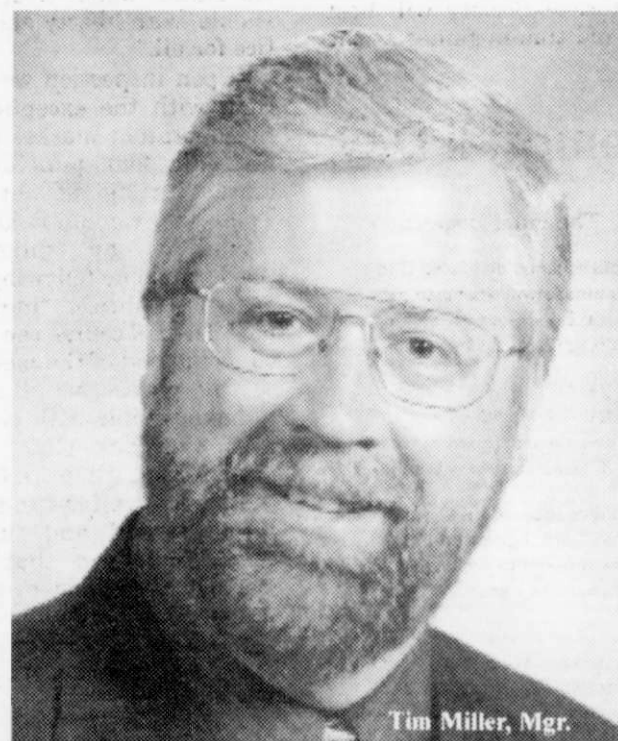

Town of Farmington Reinstates Traditional Memorial Day Service

Honoring the war veterans on Memorial Day has a long traditional in the Town of Farmington. Many residents remember the celebration from their school days. The schoolchildren worked at home the week before preparing wreaths from spruce branches, lilacs, and ribbons. These were carried to the local cemeteries on Memorial Day in a walking parade and placed on the gravestones of the war veterans.

This tradition was recreated as part of the Farmington township's sesquicentennial celebration in 1997. Since that time, the local Historical Society has continued to host a celebration on Memorial Day and include this traditional observance to honor the war dead.

This year a similar event will be held at the cemetery on the Fillmore Turner Ball Diamond at noon, on Memorial Day, Monday, May 28. The Kewaskum High School Band and Farmington Elementary and local 4-H students will participate.

Following the reenactment of the memorial service, the Farmington Historical Society will host two old timers games at the

Fillmore Turner Ball Diamond. Teams from the local volunteer Fire Department (Boltonville and Fillmore) will be joined by the two teams from the Over 40 league of the Thiemer Dome, Kewaskum.

Baseball also has a long tradition in Farmington that can be traced back to the 1890's. Originally pick-up teams played in the local farm fields until competition was organized in the Kettle Moraine League with Batavia, Beechwood, Cascade and Sheboygan Falls. During the 1930s and 40 the Rainbow League was active as was the Turner Hall. The Boltonville Athletic Club was formed with girls and boys for the

local school children.

The Saxonia House, across the street from the Fillmore Turner Ball Diamond, will also be open for tours. Built as an inn for German immigrants, it has served at one time as the post office and a general store. It has been home to many families over the years and today is being developed as a historic site.

The event on Monday, May 28, is open to the public. The schedule includes:

Veteran Memorial Observance - noon; Old Timers Games - 1 p.m. and 2 p.m.; Tours of the Saxonia House - ongoing; Youth baseball batting cage - ongoing; Concessions - noon - 4 p.m.

I Pledge Allegiance.... The American's Commitment

How many know that the Pledge of Allegiance contains only four phrases. Let us lay the Pledge out so we can see.

"I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Upon inspection we note that, with the exception of the quotation marks, there are only four punctuation marks setting off phrases. There is a comma following "stands," one following "God," and one following the one-word phrase "indivisible." Then of course the period at the end of the pledge.

One phrase we all seem to have trouble with is "one Nation under God." For some reason when we recite the pledge we tend to separate "Nation" and "under God." I believe that the framers of the added words "under God" intended that we indeed be "one Nation under God" and not that our Nation would be separated from God's grace.

As Red Skelton said in his recital of the Pledge in his program in 1969, "Wouldn't it be a pity if someone said this was a prayer..." This is not a prayer, it is a condition of being, it is a blessing from God.

So whenever we recite the Pledge of Allegiance let us all remember that by His grace we are "one Nation under God." Let us carry this message into the schools when we do our Flags programs and everytime we recite the Pledge.

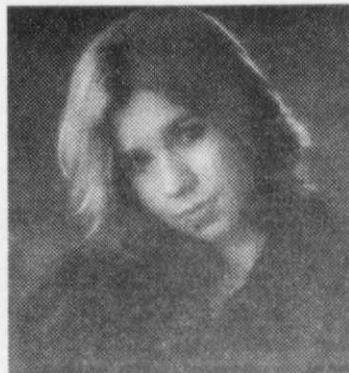

Dear Editor:

You've said it like it is, Joanne (Amerling)!

You also said you never wrote a letter to a newspaper. Neither did I and I probably wouldn't get involved, but I've had a fight of my own. I still feel cheated for having my child sent away from home.

Nothing much has changed in our district in 40+ years for the disabled. Professionals are still telling us and the school board what is "best for our child."

I believe our board should talk to people who have lived through the experience of a disabled child, be it mental, hearing, or vision. People with degrees are not always right. It is not the best way for the family. You can tell it's not their money they're spending when they admit it will be more expensive to send the Menzel child to Hustisford on a bus every day than to set up a program with an interpreter right here in Kewaskum.

This is four-year-old pre-school, not calculus or physics. Make it a good program and admit children from the area, like Hustisford, Mayville and Lomira do.

We would be keeping money in the district instead of sending it out. There are more children in the district, but we never hear about them. Why do we have a special ed director if the best thing she can do is send our kids away from home? She owes more to this district. This is where she is getting paid.

Pay attention, Board. Get an advocate on your Board. This is not all the board's fault, just some members. There's plenty of blame to go around. If our district has enough money for new buildings to show off, new bleachers, a new track, athletic equipment of all kinds, coaches, indoor play equipment, and buses to take athletes many miles from home for sports, they should be able to find money for what schools are really for --- educating ALL children, according to law.

If extra-curricular (mostly ego builders) are so important to making a "whole child" then we should make it possible for a disabled child to be whole too -- near home. We don't send the mentally disabled away, nor should we. So other disabilities should be given the same attention and money.

I'm sure their parents are most grateful to have them at home. Maybe they can put in a word for the Menzels. Or is our district practicing discrimination? I have heard that in the past there has been one child to one teacher. That wasn't expensive?

This is a good time to

integrate and teach other children that everyone is not as fortunate as they are. Four-year-olds can learn kindness, compassion, patience and maybe even sign language instead of being bullies and laughing at other children. And signers are not that hard to find. The board has been misinformed again.

If these people consent to send their child out of the district now it won't end there. The professionals will keep insisting to the Board that the child be pushed from one district to another to keep that child out of their hair.

Having gone through two generations of the pressure on parents, I can empathize with these people. My child had to leave home at the age of eight to live with strangers in Milwaukee because we were not allowed to put her on a bus to take her that far from home, then to a residential school 100 miles away.

Housemothers raise your child. Kids can't come home to Mom when they're sick, they don't get to see their parents and siblings and their peers and it makes a big hole in your family life. They grow away from the family and where are the professionals? Home with their "normal kids," of course.

What's normal? My granddaughter was also disabled and my daughter went through the same fight. Wisconsin School for the Visually Impaired wouldn't accept her because she had too much sight and Beloit Public School didn't accept her because she didn't have enough sight. They finally had to accept her because of the law, but didn't provide the proper books and materials until my daughter found her own advocate.

Keep fighting Menzels, for your family. If the district does have to spend the extra money and suppose it doesn't work out, there's been a lot of money wasted on far less important things. These people pay taxes just like everyone else. Just walk in their shoes for the next 18-20 years until the child is through college and I'll guarantee you, your attitude will be different. It's a fight all the way.

The disabled in this district are being thrown around like old shoes -- and so are the parents. Do not blame only the Board, but remember who they are in the next election, and administrators... remember who's paying you.

P.S. The letter by Russell King in the May 10 issue of the Statesman was also right on. I hope you didn't miss it. Too much money is

being spent on things, not people.

I have nothing against sports, but it is an extra-curricular activity and should be treated as such. Any funds should first be used in educating all students, not sports. If anyone on the school board thinks otherwise, I don't believe they belong there. Residents should begin to determine how each board member feels on these issues and take the necessary action during the next election.

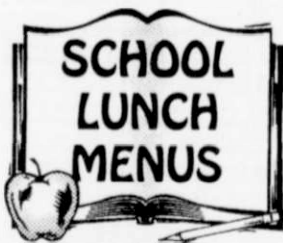

Newsprint and Magazine

TYPE OF NEWSPRINT AND MAGAZINES: Basically all types of newsprint and magazines can be recycled. Waxed paper and other waxy paper goods are not accepted. Office paper and computer paper may also be recycled.

PREPARATION: Tie in bundles with twine or strong string. Bundles should be limited to 8" in height. Office and computer paper may be bundled or shredded and stored in plastic see through bags. Place bundles at the curb next to the dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag. Place the bin or bag, at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be Wednesdays for both solid waste and recyclables. Multi-family dwellings of six or more, remember, your recycling pick up will be the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month.

Free Fishing In Area Weekend June 2-3

People who are interested in learning how to fish or who have not fished recently can take advantage of Free Fishing Weekend June 2-3 to fish in any Wisconsin inland waters without a license or state trout stamp. The waiver of fishing licenses and stamps applies to both residents and nonresidents. During the free fishing weekend all fishing regulations, such as size and bag limits are still in effect.

Theresa Stabo, Department of Natural Resources aquatic resources educator, says this event is designed to encourage families to get out and fish together. She encourages people to participate in special activities planned at parks throughout the state, and also to take advantage of programs at several parks and at DNR regional offices, that loan out fishing equipment. The weekend provides a good opportunity to introduce young people to fishing. Fishing clinics are scheduled at various locations around the state, several in conjunction with the state parks open house, so people do not need to purchase a fishing license or park admission sticker to participate. Because children under the age of 16 do not need a fishing license to fish on any day of the year, Stabo suggests that the motto for Free Fishing Weekend be, "Take a grown up fishing!"

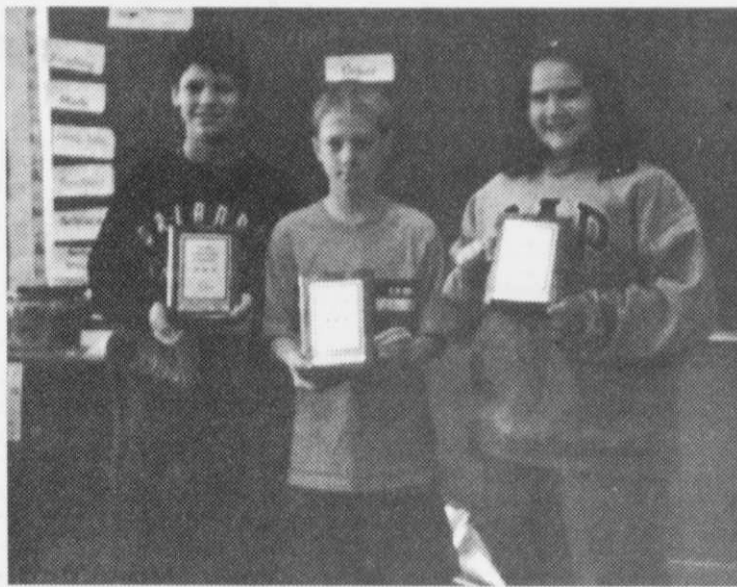

Theresa customers will see an immediate benefit from this investment. On May 23, a new advanced service, Caller ID, will be available to Verizon customer. Caller ID permits a customer to see who is calling before the phone is answered, using a display unit that is built-in or attached to the phone. Caller ID lets you know when a friend or family member is calling and can deter harassing calls. It also keeps a record of calls received. Cost of the service is \$7 a month. For more

information, customers should call Verizon customer services at 1-800-483-4000 for residential customers or 1-800-483-5000 for businesses.

Callers with unlisted phone numbers and others who wish to protect their privacy can prevent their numbers from showing on a Caller ID unit. This can be done on a per-call basis by dialing *67 (or 1167 on a rotary phone) before placing the call. This service is called Selective Blocking - Per Call and is automatically on the phone line at no charge.

Whitt said Verizon has been a leader in deploying advanced technology throughout the state. Verizon's investment in its Wisconsin network exceeded \$95 million last year, bringing the total investment since 1996 to over \$411 million.

Verizon, which serves more than 400,000 customers in Wisconsin, pumped \$1.8 million a week into its Wisconsin infrastructure last year.

The Theresa upgrade will not affect the price of local service. Customers may notice a slightly different pitch in their dial tone and busy signal.

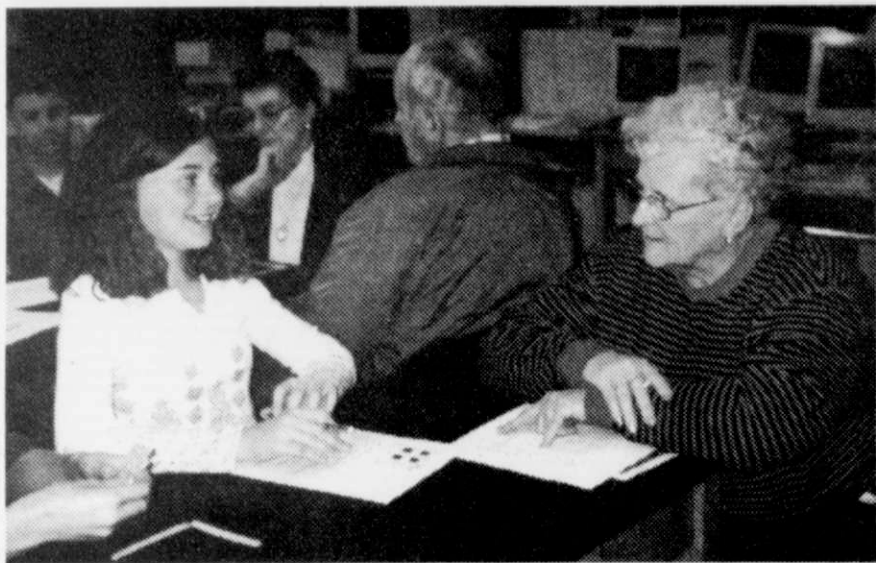

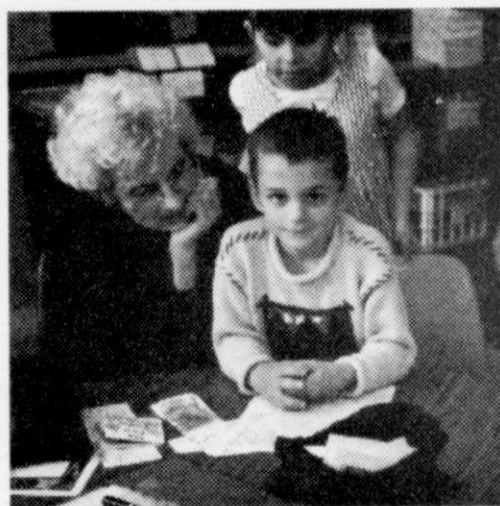

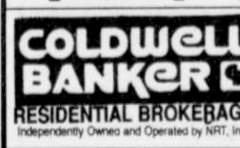

Indians Start Strong But Fade at Finish of EWC Championship Match

The 2001 Eastern Wisconsin Conference Boys Golf Championship Tournament was conducted at Meadow Links Sports Complex in Manitowoc on Thursday, May 17.

Manitowoc Roncalli High School hosted the annual league finale on the 18-hole, par 72, 5934 yard layout on a warm, partly sunny and calm day using Summer Rules and the White Tees.

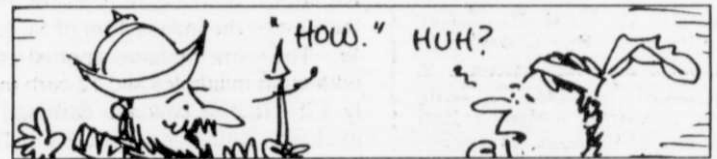
Members of both teams gradually improved the level of their play throughout the conference season to the point where the Indians are confident that they are now capable of competing with the better teams in the league.
