## KHS Boys' Track Takes Third at State Meet

State Championship Titles Won in 400m Relay, 800m Relay

4x100m relay team set a new school record when they posted the fastest time of the two qualifying heats. Their time of 43.34 broke the school record of 44.7 seconds that they had ran earlier at the EWC Relays and also officially eclipsed the time of 43.79 seconds that Jim Thelen, Fitts, Canter and Sparks had run at the state meet last year. Whitewater finished second in the 4x100m relay with a time of 44.37 seconds.

Sparks, the defending Division Two state champion in the discus, finished second on Friday with a throw of 160' 11" and Josh Parrent tied for second in the pole vault with a vault of 13' 0" on Friday. Kewaskum was tied for second place in the team scoring going into Saturday's competition with 15 points, eight points by Sparks and seven points by Parrent. "The cold wet weather and the three hour rain delay were both factors that didn't help any of the competitors. This was not the kind of weather that anyone wanted to see at the state track meet," commented head coach Jerry Gosa.

The wins in both relays Saturday gave Kewaskum an additional 20 team points and pushed their total to 35 points.

Kewaskum's fortune took a turn for the worse when Canter and Fitts couldn't get back for the official warm-up in the long jump before the event started. Kewaskum had notified the long jump officials that both of their long jumpers would be running in the 4x200m relay and the 4x100m relay with just six heats of the 400m dash separating the relays, plus potential medal awards and photographs on the awards stand. The athletes asked to be excused to report back to the long jump and were told that they couldn't leave the infield. By the time Canter and Fitts

## Farewell to KES June 16

UW-LA CROSSE - The unbelievable almost happened when the Kewaskum High School boys' track team came within three points of winning the Division Two state track and field championship this past weekend, June 1 and 2 at UW-La Crosse.

Amery won the State Division Two championship with 41 points and fellow Eastern Wisconsin Conference member, New Holstein, finished second with 40 points. The cold, windy and rainy weather at the state track meet on Friday and Saturday resembled weather typical of November or April and not the first weekend in June.

The Kewaskum boys brought home gold medals in both the 800m relay and the 400m relay, added a pair of second place finishes in the discus and the pole vault and then picked up a sixth place finish in the long jump to score 38 points.

Both the Kewaskum 4x200m relay and the 4x100m relay teams qualified for the state meet with the fastest times of all the

Division Two teams.

Friday On Kewaskum boys 4x200m relay team of Chris Canter, Tony Fitts, Tom Ogi and Charlie Sparks qualified for Saturday's final with the fastest qualifying time of 1:31.34 to set the initial state division two record in this new event. Kewaskum's time put them into the top seed lane, lane five, for the

Saturday the 4x200m relay team of Canter, Fitts, Ogi and Sparks became state champions when they won the 4x200m relay and set a new state record with a time of 1:30.04. Elkhorn finished a distant second with a time of 1:31.77.

Two events later the Kewaskum 4x100m relav team completed the sweep of the two sprint relays when Canter, Fitts, Kevin Miller and Sparks won in 44 seconds flat. "The relay team used tremendous focus once they were on the track. Their hand offs were excellent and they ran a great race," exclaimed a proud coach Gosa.

Earlier on Friday night after the three hour rain the Kewaskum

could report back to the long jump area the competition had already started and they were denied a chance to take any run through. After an official protest by Kewaskum they were at least allowed to take a tape and measure back to find their starting point.

Canter jumped 20' 9 3/4" on one of his three jumps in the trials and thus qualified for the finals. Fitts was not as lucky as his last jump taken in the trials was six to eight inches behind the take-off board and the resulting measured jump was 1/2 inch short of what was necessary to place him in the top nine to advance to the finals.

Canter's jump of 20' 9 3/4' placed him sixth in the competition and gave Kewaskum an additional three points to bring their team total to 38 points. Herc Hyland of Nekoosa won the competition with a jump of 21' 3 1/2".

Friday night the Kewaskum girls 4x400m relay team of Becky Herriges, Breyan Donath, Jenna Roecker and Jessi Graham had to again run the race of their life to qualify for Saturday's finals. Kewaskum relay team has a state qualifying time and season best time of 4:12.7 the Pewaukee Sectional. That time placed them ninth out of the 14 teams that qualified for state. Kewaskum needed to finish in the top nine in order to qualify for Saturday's finals. There was additional concern because four teams had qualified only one second behind Kewaskum.

"The girls had fallen asleep on the floor of the fieldhouse after the three hour rain delay Friday night. I woke them up around 10 p.m. and they proceeded to warm up for half an hour. We huddled together right before the race and again stressed that they had the heart to do it and that they had to really give it everything they had if they were going to qualify for finals on Saturday. I also told them that I knew that they could do it," reported coach Gosa. The girls race started at almost 10:50 p.m.

Kewaskum needed to finish in at least fourth in the second heat because the first five places in heat one had run times of 4:07.8 or better. The Kewaskum foursome did just that. They ran a hard fought inspirational race and finished a close third in their heat with their season best time of 4:09.62. just 0.03 seconds behind second place and 0.21 seconds ahead of the fourth place team that qualified as the last team for finals. Kewaskum thus placed eighth of the nine teams that qualified for Saturday's finals in the 4x400m relay. "We were definitely happy for them and proud of their

effort," commented coach

Running only 16 hours later on Saturday afternoon in the finals Herriges, Donath, Roecker and Graham placed eighth with a time of 4:12.12. "After the race I told the girls that they realistically couldn't expect themselves to run the race of their lives twice within 24 hours. They gave it everything they had and had a great state meet," summarized coach Gosa.

Colleen Gosa, who had placed sixth last year at the state meet to earn a state medal, finished ninth in the discus on Saturday with a throw of 113' 2", just two inches out of eighth place. "Colleen threw well, but at the state level you have to throw near or at your best in order to finish where you want to," commented coach Gosa.

Emmy Forester finished 10th in the 100m high hurdles with a time of 17.05 seconds in the preliminaries on Friday and did not advance to the finals. Graham finished 12th in the 400m dash on Friday with a time of 1:03.46 and also did not qualify for Saturday's finals.

"We are extremely happy with the boys results and very proud of the effort that all the boys and girls made at the state track meet. We know that some of the athletes are disappointed that they didn't do better, but they should be extremely

proud of their efforts and their accomplishments this season. They had a great season filled with great memories. We are definitely going to miss our seniors: Charlie, Colleen, Emmy, Kevin and Amber," concluded coach Gosa.

### **Number of Accidents During Spring Turkey Hunting Season is Highest on Record**

MADISON - Wisconsin's tradition of safe turkey hunts received a setback this spring when seven hunters were injured in six separate incidents, according to Tim Lawhern, Hunter **Education Administrator for** the Department of Natural Resources.

"The Wisconsin turkey hunting season has historically had a low rate of injuries, especially compared with other wild game opportunities," hunting Lawhern said. "But that wasn't the case during this spring's season."

The seven accidents this spring yielded hunting accident rate of 10 per 100-thousand hunters - much higher that the accident rate during Wisconsin's gun deer season (three accidents per 100-thousand hunters) or for all Wisconsin game hunting combined (seven per 100-thousand). An average of just 2.5 hunting accidents were reported during the past 10 spring turkey hunting seasons.

"This spring season, we saw the most turkey hunting accidents in Wisconsin since the reintroduction of the bird to the state in 1976," said Lawhern. "But to call them 'accidents' is misleading. In most situations it's a matter of the hunter simply not following the basic rules of safe hunt-

ing."
Turkey hunting "incidents" are very predictable. Nearly one-third of all injuries occur when hunters shoot themselves. Another common incident occurs when two hunters separate and one ends up stalking the other's call or decoy,

shooting their partner based on movement, sound or what they thought was a turkey.

"The chances of actually getting close enough to a turkey by stalking are very slim," says Lawhern. "The turkey is wary by nature and has extremely keen eyesight. A hunter should never attempt to stalk a turkey. Instead they should try calling the bird to within their unobstructed shooting range.'

This year's spring turkey hunting incidents occurred in the following counties: La Crosse, Grant, Portage, Trempealeau, Richland and Jackson.

In La Crosse county, a 14-year-old boy shot himself in the foot while moving his shotgun. The boy had the gun's safety engaged, but placed it in the off position when he sat down. In Trempealeau county, a hunter mistook two other hunters for turkeys and shot them as they were walking on a trail. In Richland and Jackson counties, hunters shot their partners after mistaking them for turkeys. In both cases, the shooters reacted to movement or color, not the telltale beard of a male turkey.

"It's clear to see that in each of these situations the hunter did not follow one or more of the most basic rules of firearms safety," Lawhern said. "Know your target and what lies beyond it and keeping the safety engaged until you're ready to use your firearm are fundamental when it comes to enjoying a safe hunt."

### Don't Take **Wild Animals Out of Wild**

MILWAUKEE -This time of year it's fairly common to come across young animals in the wild and sometimes it appears these baby animals are abandoned or orphaned. In almost all circumstances, that is not the case.

Many wild animals leave their young in hiding for brief periods while they search for food; or the animal may have been temporarily "spooked" away from its young. If you encounter a baby animal, it's best to leave the area quietly to allow the parent to return as soon as possible. If you are sure a young animal is orphaned, call your local Department of Natural Resources office for instructions.

Please don't take wild animals out of the wild.

Don't try to move young animals into your home or to another location. It's a myth that a parent won't take back its young once humans have touched it. If you are in doubt about a wild animal's need for your intervention, leave it alone.



The Village of Kewaskum Water Utility source water is from well water. The aquifer formations that the wells are pumping water from is the Silerian Dolomite. I am pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and meets federal and state requirements. This report shows our water quality and what it means.

Notices of meetings are normally posted at the Kewaskum Post Office, St. Francis Bank and at the Municipal Building. Notices are also sent to the Kewaskum Statesman, official newspaper for the village, WBKV radio and the West Bend News.

The Kewaskum Water Utility routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The following tables show the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st, to December 31st, 2000. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk. The Department of Natural Resources may not require analysis of every constituent each year. The table includes the most recent analysis.

#### **Health Information**

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. 



Nine area high school varsity boys golf teams qualified from three separate regionals to participate in the W.I.A.A. Division Two Sectional Championship Tournament on Tuesday, May 29, at the Golf Club at Camelot.

Only two teams with the lowest team totals and the top three individuals not on those two teams advance to the State Tournament which was conducted at University Ridge Golf Course in Verona on June 3rd through the 5th.

The weather did not prove to be a factor as the day started out, cool, then becoming partly sunny, pleasant and calm winds. However, the competitors played from the championship (black) tees and summer rules, except where there were some bare spots in their fairway.

Unfortunately, the greens were slow and inconsistent resulting in several snakes.

The Kewaskum Indians were one of the first teams to tee off in the tournament hosted by Campbellsport due to their third place score at Quit-Qui-Oc on May 23. Playing along were the other third place qualifying teams, the Ripon Tigers, and eventual champions, Milwaukee Lutheran.

At the turn, six schools were within four strokes of the lead held by pre-tournament favorite Pewaukee and St. Mary's Springs of Fond du Lac at 163. With Milwaukee Thomas More (164), Milwaukee Lutheran (165), Grafton (166) and Mayville (167) all applying pressure to the two front runners on the front nine.

Yet no one could have anticipated what happened next on the back (outside) nine at Camelot.

Coach Eichstedt was pleased with his team's efforts while understanding that Kewaskum was not likely to be able to record scores capable of advancing to the State Tournament.


The Indians demonstrated improvement throughout the season but certainly met their match at the 2001 W.I.A.A. Division Two Sectional Golf Championships.
