Lanaya Martin Named Congressional Page

Congressman F. James Sensenbrenner, Jr. recently informed Lanaya Martin of Kewaskum that she was appointed by J. Dennis Hastert, Speaker of the House of Representatives, to serve as a Republican Page for the 2001 summer Congressional session in Washington D.C. With only seventy-two Page positions open in the House, and over four hundred members of Congress recommending students, becoming a Page is a very prestigious honor. Lanaya is the only Page representing Wisconsin.

Pages are employees of the House and work as a team, not in individual Members' offices. Page duties consist primarily of delivering correspondence, legislative material and small packages with the Congressional complex. Lanaya has been assigned to the Members' Cloakroom answering phones, taking messages for Members, calling them to the phone if they are in the House Chamber and assisting in preparing the House Floor for sessions. She must be able to recognize and name over 200 Republican representatives. Other Pages monitor a telephone bank of incoming requests for Page service.

The practice of having Pages dates back over 200 years. As a participant in the House Page Program, the Pages serve as a valuable part of a larger community of people working in

support of the U.S. House of Representatives, the American Government and the principles of democracy. The role of the Page is more complex than most as it includes a full-time on-site living arrangement, unique educational and professional experiences as well as "off-campus" activities.

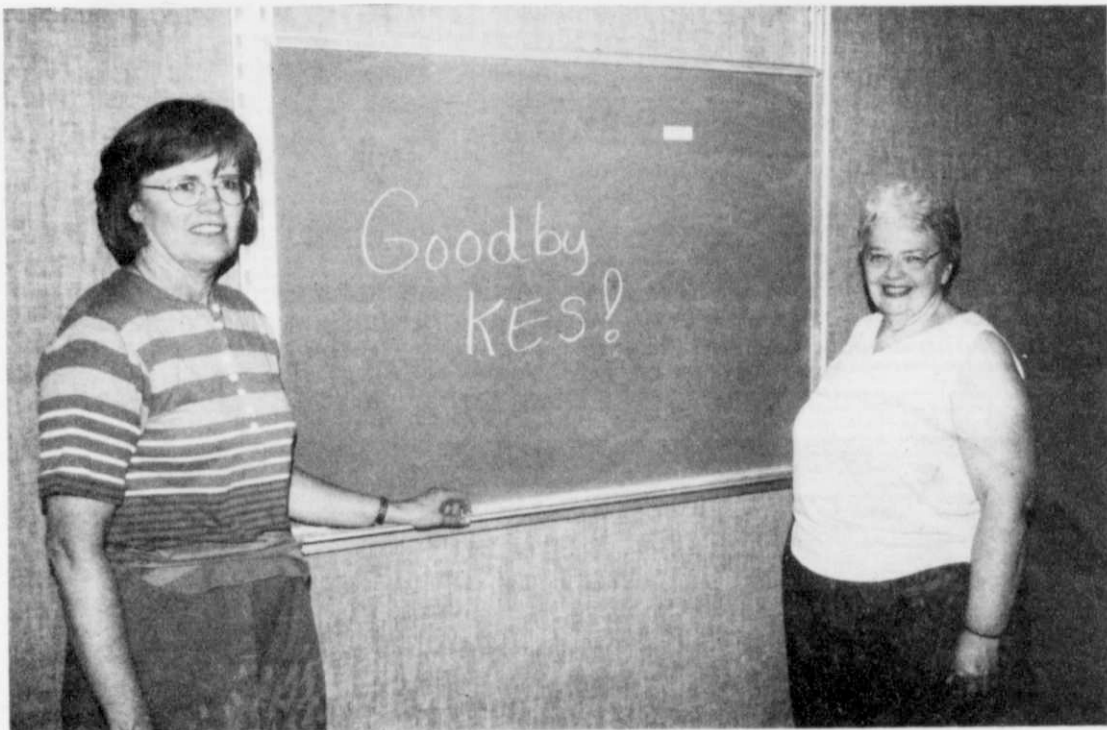

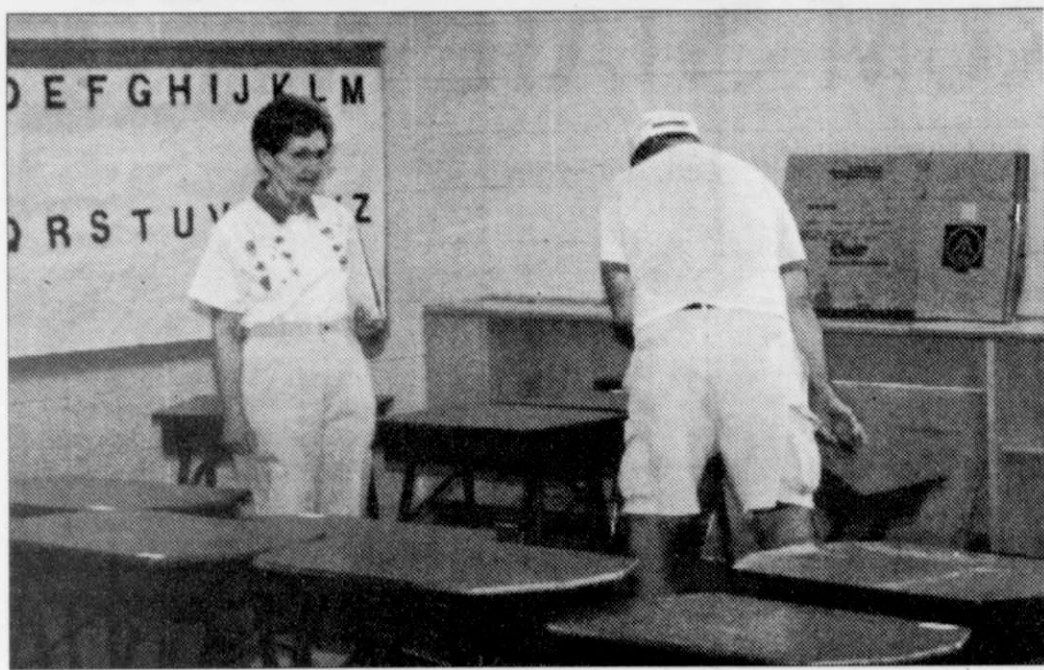
John Schmitt Memorial Bike Run Raises \$54,000



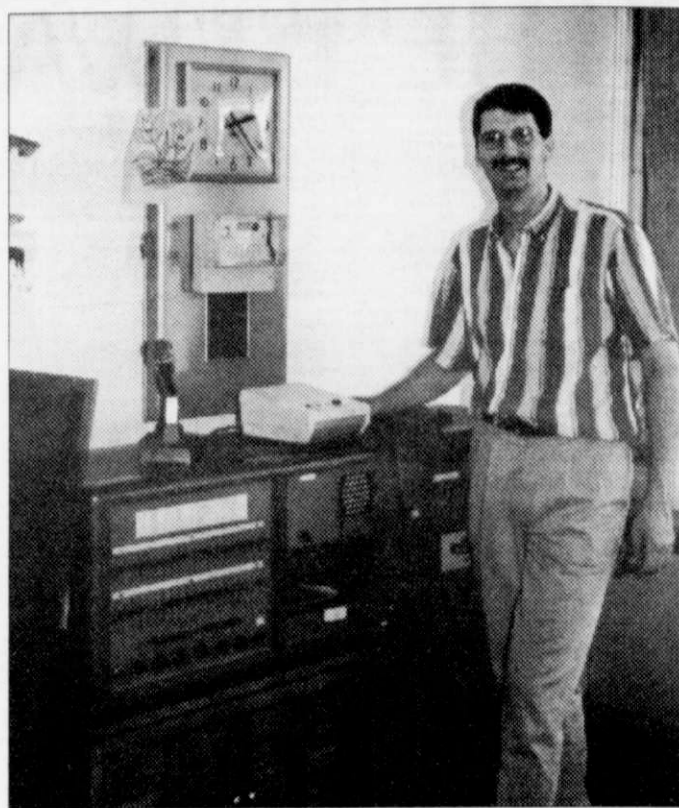

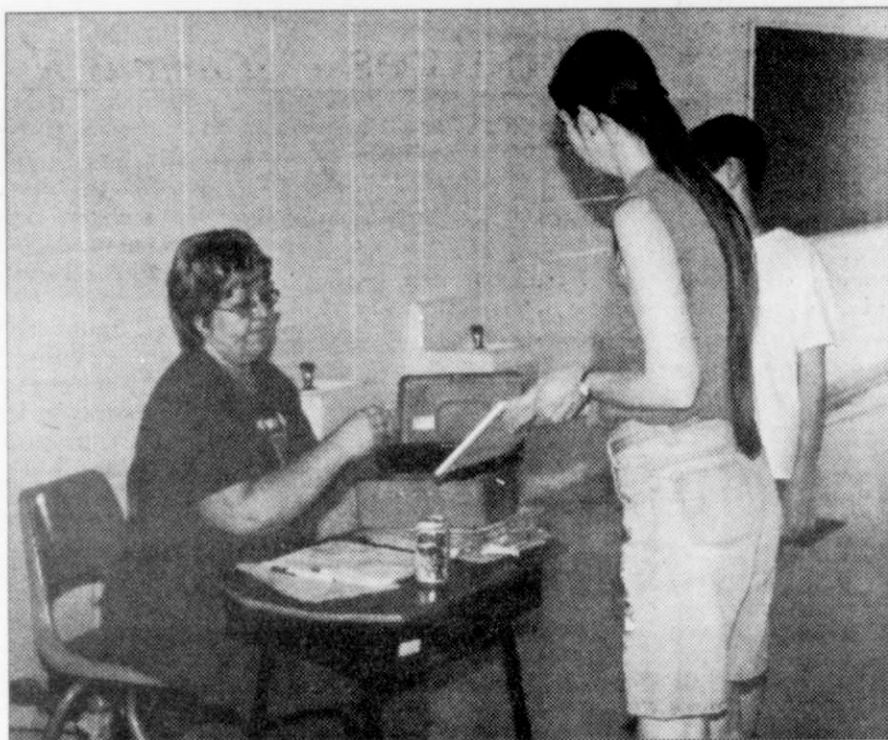
Farewell to KES Held This Past Weekend

Students interested in the Page Program must ask a Member of Congress for sponsorship. That Member contacts the proper hiring authority to begin the application process. Not every Member can sponsor a Page every time. Summer applicants may only apply before their junior year of high school or the summer following completion of their junior year of high school. The application consists of a high school transcript, resume of extra-curricular activities, a school report, three letters of recommendation, an essay explaining why they want to become a Page and a parental consent form.

Fire Station's Leaky Roof To Soon Be Repaired

The Kewaskum village board met Monday evening to discuss normal business and a repair to the fire station roof.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel was unable to comment on the situation as he was unable to attend the meeting. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated that the northside of the roof needs urgent repair, an estimate of \$9,300 from JT Roofing was approved with work to commence as soon as possible.

This was not a budgeted item, money would be moved around at the end of

the year depending on how funds look then. The leak was found when icy conditions this past winter forced firefighters to thaw out the downspouts.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel informed the board that an emergency siren was out on Knights Avenue. It has since been fixed and police officers are now able to set the emergency alerts from the squad car.

Lightning in Monday nights storm may have been a factor in the siren not functioning.

Plan commission representative Andy Pesch informed the board of a meeting to be held at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, June 26.

Public Meeting in Farmington June 28 On Proposed North Branch Milwaukee River Wildlife, Farming Heritage Area

The Department of Natural Resources will hold a public meeting to discuss the proposed North Branch Milwaukee River Wildlife and Farming Heritage Area.

The meeting will be held at 7 p.m., Thursday, June 28, at the Farmington Town Hall, 9422 Highway 144, Kewaskum.

In 1999 the DNR began to study the feasibility of acquiring lands from willing sellers for protection and recreation along the North Branch of the Milwaukee River. The draft study was released and a series of open forums were held in the fall of 2000. At this

time, Department staff is meeting with all townships in the study area to give an update on the project, answer questions and receive comments from the public.

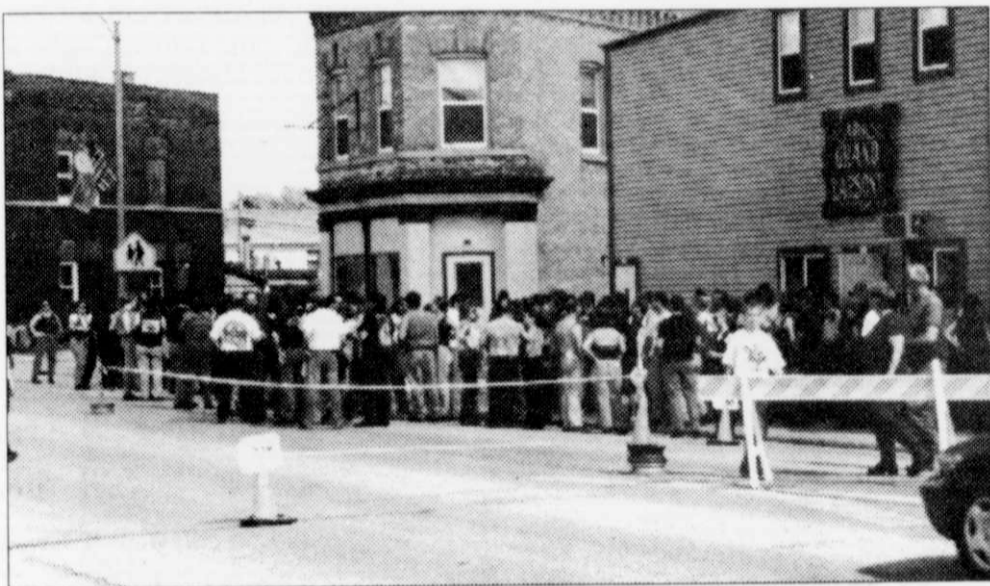

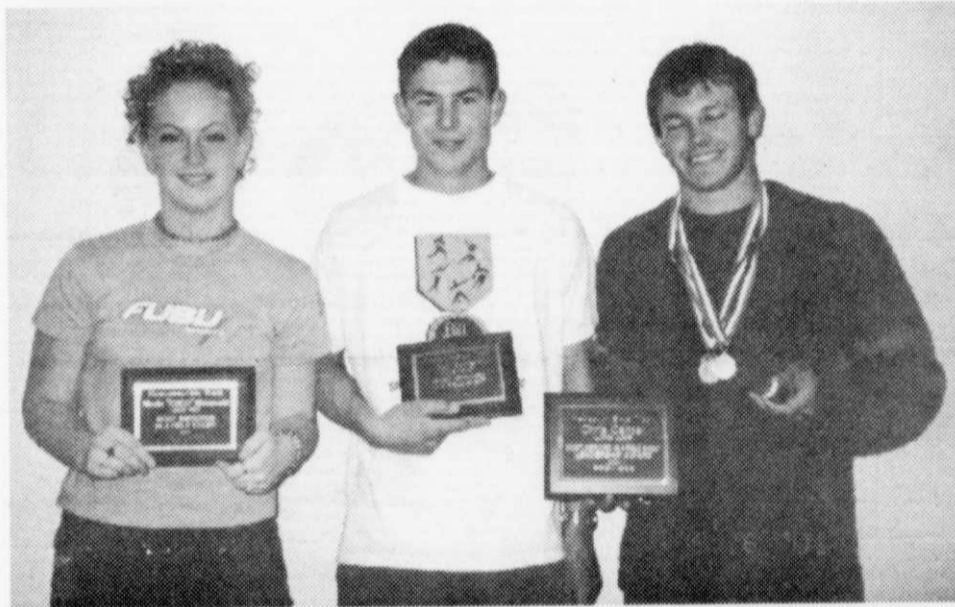

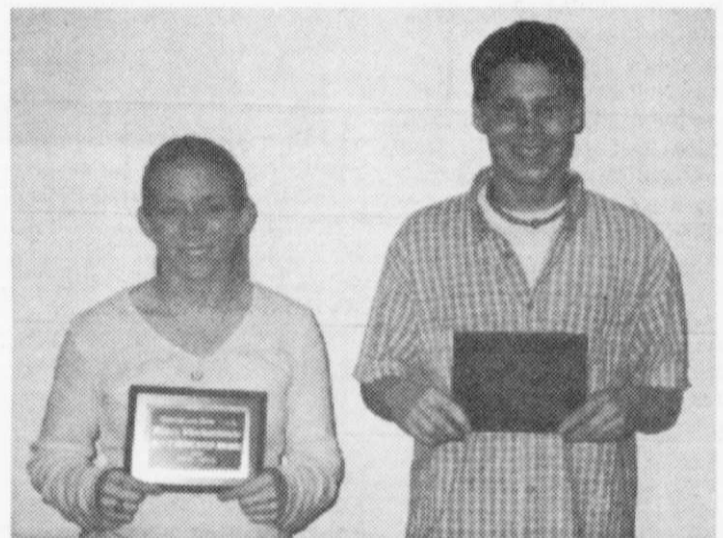
