Kettle 20 Winners Announced

KEWASKUM - Kyle Fraser won the 28th annual Kettle 20 Kilometer race (12.4 miles) when he finished in one hour, 13 minutes, and 26 seconds (1:13.26) on Sunday, July 8. Fraser, who runs for the University of Wisconsin-Madison finished second last year. Rick Stefanovic, a former Kewaskum resident, finished second with a time of 1:15.46 and Ted Shue finished third with a time of 1:15.57. Fraser was unable to accept his prize money due to NCAA eligibility requirements.

Sue Daggett-Miller, also a former Kewaskum resident, won the Women's Kettle 20 Division with a time of 1:21.35. Lisa Johnson of West Bend finished second with a time of 1:26.21 and Candace Moore finished third with a time of

Rudy Estrada won the Masters Division with a time of 1:21.04 and last year's Masters Division winner, John Megan finished second with a time of 1:22.54. Sally Schumaker won the Women's Masters Division with a time of 1:33.59. Nathalie McCoy of Kewaskum, who won the Women's Masters Division last year finished second with a time of 1:38.31.


Cash prizes were awarded to the top three males and females overall in the Kettle 20 and the Masters Winner. The first place prize was \$200, second place was \$150, and third place was \$50. The Master's winner (age 40+) each won \$100.

In the five mile races, Bill Gilmore won the men's competition with a time of 29:30 and Emily Steinhafel of West Bend won the women's competition with a time of 35:20.

A total of 139 runners completed the Kettle 20 course and 51 runners completed the five mile race for a total of 190 finishers. This compares with 94 Kettle 20K runners and 27 runners in five mile race last year for a total of 121 finishers. A total of 203 runners registered for this year's races including the 95 that preregistered.

Kewaskum Youth Scholarships organized the race with help coming from both KEYS members and the Kewaskum Lions. The race was held in conjunction with the annual Lion's Club chicken barbecue. Proceeds from the race go towards the KEYS scholarship fund for graduating seniors Kewaskum High School.

Exercise Class for Expectant Moms

"Absolutely Fit for Delivery" is a prenatal exercise class sponsored by St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend that will help teach expectant moms how to safely exercise and stay fit. The two-hour class will be held on Thursday, July 26, from 6:30 to 8:30

The two-hour introductory course is designed to educate women on methods to implement a fitness regime during their pregnancy. Some of the aspects included in the course are safety during exercise, cardiovascular fitness, appropriate calisthenics and stretching, appropriate body mechanics during pregnancy, and physiological changes during pregnancy.

News From The Capitol

A Budget Overview

Perhaps you have read in the mainstream media about the budget impasse. I thought I'd use this column to give an overview of the state of Wisconsin budget. The budget is for two years from July 1, 2001 to June 30, 2003. This year's total budget is \$46.7 billion dollars, a whopping 12.2% adjusted increase in two years. The total budget was \$33 billion only six years

Of this amount almost half, \$23.4 billion dollars, is what's referred to as General Purpose Funds, primarily sales and income tax, which the state can spend without strings attached. This amount is up an adjusted 6.9% compared to two years ago and was only \$17.4 billion six years ago. The other half of the budget is restricted and can be only spent on certain things. (Federal aid to be spent on the poor, tuition to be spent on colleges, gas tax which must be spent on roads, DNR fees to be spent on

related programs, etc.)

Where do your sales and income tax dollars go? While most people associate schools with the property tax, almost 44% of your state tax goes to the state's commitment to pay for twothirds of local schools. About 10% goes to medical assistance of some sort. Nine percent goes to shared revenues for cities, villages, and counties. The formula is very skewed towards benefiting Milwaukee. About 9% goes to the university, 6% to prisons, and 5% to various other welfare programs. The remaining 17% is split between regulatory agencies, the courts system, technical schools, juvenile corrections, institutions for the disabled, and other pro-

Regardless of how negoti-

go between the ations Democrats and Republicans, it is not much of an exaggeration to say that in this budget the prison system, health care, and schools will get more than their share of any increase in this budget and everybody else will get less. The prison population will remain virtually the same, but costs will go up as prisoners are brought back from cheaper, out-of-state prisons to more expensive Wisconsin prisons. Medical costs for the poor outstrip inflation, as do medical costs for everybody. Also, the very generous BadgerCare Program is predictably costing more than anticipated. School costs go up as people vote for referendums and the Legislature appropriates more money to lessen class sizes. (I personally feel it is not necessary to have fifteen children in the early grades and most studies agree with me.)

As you can see from the above, serious efforts to get Wisconsin out of the top three in taxes in the nation must focus on the above items. Next week we will discuss the differences between the parties and my opinion as to where there is too much spending in this



Planning For Financial Hard Times

A shaky stock market, job layoffs and a weakening economy are raising financial fears among many households that only a year ago were flowing with optimism. Even in good times, bad things can happen to families that cause a personal financial hardship. Here are some ideas for how to prepare financially for tough

Hold realistic expectations. Before high-tech stocks, and the stock market in general, took a nosedive in 2000, many people had come to believe that we had entered a "new economy" in which the stock market only went up and the economy was no longer subject to business cycles. How quickly reality threw cold water on that viewpoint. Simply understanding that stocks have been returning well above the historical average or 11%, and that at some point they would fall to or below those averages, goes a long way in preparing for tougher times. Families who believe that stocks will return 20 or 30 or 50% every year are less apt to curb their personal spending and more apt to take chances on risky investments - both patterns that can come back to haunt you when the market drops and the economy

Diversify, diversify, diversify. This is a cliche, but nonetheless one that's still true. Financial plan-

ners say they cannot harp on this enough. People most frequently think of this advice with regard to investing: spread your portfolio among a variety of asset categories, and investments within those categories. Executives heavy in company stock and business owners whose wealth is mostly tied up in their company are especially vulnerable. But diversification also applies to other financial arenas. Spouses who both work for the same company or in the same industry face greater financial risk in a downturn. Diversifying job skills so that you can be more flexible, should you lose your job, can help when hard times hit. Diversification can apply to estate planning, where oftentimes it saves taxes to get assets out of the estate through lifetime gifting or irrevocable trusts.

Know your financial worth. Most people either don't know their net worth (assets minus liabilities), or think they know it and are wrong. Your net worth provides a useful benchmark for how well you are doing, in good times and bad.

emergency Keep funds. Tying up all your money in stocks and illiquid investments may force you to sell some of those assets at fire-sale prices during hard times - in short "locking in" losses. Keeping adequate cash resources in money markets, short term bond funds and certificates of deposit gives you flexibility to see you through a job financial crisis.

establish budget. Even times or riding through

the affluent often does a poor job of minimizing debt and budgeting. You might get away with this in good times, but excessive debt and poor use of your money become an albatross when financial times toughen. Reducing high-interest debt, budgeting, strategic tax planning and buying smart (from insurance autos to groceries) frees up money to bank for those emergencies.

Insure against tough times. You can't insure against layoffs, but you can insure for another common work disaster: a disability. Yet disability (incomereplacement) insurance is one of the most overlooked types of insurance. Business owners also are commonly underinsured. Consider an umbrella liability policy lawsuits are a common source of personal financial crisis these days.

yourself Educate financially. Perhaps there is no better way to prepare for hard times than to educate yourself - and your spouse - about how to wisely manage your money. It's often not so much the financial successes we have than the financial mistakes we avoid that keep us financially healthy in difficult times.

Actively manage your money. People tend to let circumstances dictate their financial decisions, not the other way around. Taking charge of your finances, planning and saving for tomorrow, and following through on the advice of your financial advisor or layoff, down market or other your own planning usually make the difference between Minimize debt and suffering through hard

them with confidence.



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

In addition to acknowledging all former legends that attend the weekly racing program at Fairgrounds, former champions will receive special honors for the achievements and support of the clubs throughout the years.

Gib Wiser, the 1974 Eastern Wisconsin Champ, will receive recognition for his dedication to auto racing over the years.

In a driving career that began in 1964, Wiser began competing in races sanctioned by the Milwaukee Stock Car Club. What started out as a few races in 1964 turned out to be the beginning of a long and successful career in not only modified stock car racing but spring cars as well. His first car was purchased from Wayne Erickson, now the owner of Slinger Super Speedway.

With the help and tutoring of many time Wisconsin modified champion, Billy "The Cat" Johnson, Wiser honed his racing skills in a Coach bodied modified built together with Johnson. He steadily rose through the rankings of the Milwaukee Club each year and when that club eased to sanction races, joined Eastern and rose to that groups champion in 1974.

Wiser continued on in the modified division until 1980 and then turned his attention to the sprints car circuit and won the Interstate Racing Association title four straight years from 1982 through 1985. Along the way he was many times track champion at Wilmot and other venues where he competed.
